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Mild weather, rising river levels leave fishers on thin ice

For Doug Peterson, winter is all about ice fishing with friends and family along the Red River.

In hopes of getting a bit of an extended season this year, Peterson decided to move his green ice shack from their usual place near St. Andrews Airport to the end of CIL Road in East Selkirk.

"You still got three feet of good ice out there but you don't go wandering around at the same time," the Winnipeg resident said last week. "You gotta know where you're going if you're going to go out there.

"I'm still driving my truck out there."
Despite moving his shack a little further down the Red River, Peterson said he still got the same notices as everyone else and will have to move it off the river later this week.

Due to recent mild weather, plenty of ice shacks were spotted being removed from the Red River early last

week. Many shacks also had notices taped to them notifying fishers they had to be removed by March 5 to make way for the amphibex ice breaking program.

Peterson, who has been ice fishing in the Selkirk area for nearly 10 years, said he's never experienced a winter as mild as this one.

"This is the warmest winter I've ever seen ... with I've gotta say the strangest ice conditions in I'd say the last 10 years," he said. "We had a heavy flow of water in the fall so when all of the ice froze up this year it froze up in a very rough condition.

"Which is why you don't see many people fishing in the Lockport area. Normally there would be thousands of people in that area ... but it's actually dangerous. There are pockets of open water underneath that ice." Mild winter weather in recent weeks has also prompted RCMP to release a thin ice warning last week.

Selkirk RCMP Cst. Jim Dao said it's crucial that those still ice fishing on the river be mindful of the conditions before venturing out.

"Especially this time of year or due to weather and the fact that they are on a river with water continuously running underneath the ice it can quickly erode the ice surface," Dao said. "So if you have a large vehicle, that could definitely make it go through the ice."

Early last week a truck had been spotted after it went through the ice near Lockport.

Over the weekend the province advised those living in the Winnipeg area to stay off the Red River as high water from the United States makes its way north.





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Flood risk remains moderate to major in Manitoba: province

The risk of overland flooding remains moderate to major across most of Manitoba, but this could change depending on weather conditions between now and the spring melt, according to the province's first flood outlook of 2017.

At this time, Manitoba Infrastructure's forecast models suggests that the Red, Souris, Pembina, Roseau and Lower Assiniboine rivers and the Whiteshell Lakes areas are at major risk of flooding; the overland flooding risk is moderate in the Interlake region, along the upper Assiniboine River and the northern portion of the province including the Saskatchewan River; and major lakes remain a concern and current river flows and other lake levels are normal to above normal for this time of year.

There is a risk of major spring flooding on the Red River main stem. The current soil moisture condition varies from above normal on the U.S. portion of the basin to near normal

on the Canadian side of the border. Winter precipitation has been above normal to well above normal this year throughout the basin.

There is sufficient community protection within the Red River basin as community dike elevations are higher than the predicted levels, according to the province's report.

"At this time, we encourage communities to continue with preparatory measures such as ensuring emergency protocols are in place," Infrastructure Minister Blaine Pedersen stated in a release on Monday, the same day the province released its flood forecast. "The province's Hydrologic Forecast Centre will continue to closely monitor precipitation, spring melt and inflows from the northern United States in the Red River Basin and the Souris River basin in the west. As the flood outlook becomes clearer, we want to ensure the safety of our communities and all Manitobans."

Pederson added the province continues to assess data as it begins work on the second and final flood outlook scheduled for release in late March.

The mid-February early melt, which occurred in the southern portion of the Red River Basin, has diminished most of the snowpack south of Grand Forks, N.D. This has slightly reduced the potential for flood flows on the Red River in Manitoba, but it has also left the soil saturated and prone to high run-off volumes from future precipitation.

Future precipitation, the timing and how fast snow melts and the timing of run-off in Manitoba, the U.S., Saskatchewan and Ontario are still key factors. Conditions in the Souris River basin, will affect the lower Assiniboine River in western Manitoba.

The Manitoba government and municipalities are continuing to prepare for spring flooding. province's practice is to plan and prepare for unfavourable weather conditions and the scenario of highest flood risk.

This includes working with municipal emergency management teams to review existing emergency response plans and sharing information through conference calls

and flood information seminars in Morris, Brandon and Selkirk, Pederson said.

Environment Canada's latest long term forecast shows equal chance of below normal, near normal and above normal precipitation for the next three months.

Crossing into Canada

Bezan calls on gov't to 'secure our border' during surge in illegal border crossings

James Bezan believes the federal and provincial governments could be doing more when it comes to the recent spike in illegal border crossings into Canada near Emerson, Man.

The Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP and Conservative defence critic says he is calling on the Liberals to provide more resources for RCMP officers and increase border security to deal with an influx of asylum seekers that he believes will only continue to increase as spring nears.

"Ultimately the federal government and the province needs to provide the resources to the municipalities that are impacted here," Bezan said during a telephone interview with the *Record* last Friday. "Emerson is just a little town of less than 700 people and their first responders are almost all volunteers and they've been incredibly charitable and hospitable in welcoming these people.

"But they can't do this forever."

Since Jan. 1, 2017, the RCMP has intercepted 143 people illegally crossing the border.

Between Feb. 22 and Feb. 27, RCMP say they intercepted 39 people illegally crossing the border near Emerson, all of which were taken to the nearby Canada Border Services Agency port. RCMP say they will provide another update on Monday.

Bezan said he has requested more information regarding how many of these individuals have qualified for refugee status.

"There are more people that have applied for refugee status legally that shouldn't be pushed to the back of the line because of illegal crossings by other asylum seekers that are coming from a country that have very similar qualifications," he said.

Bezan said he is also calling on the Liberal government to strengthen the security of the Canadian border.

"This is a drain on resources, this is going to become a bigger problem,"

he said. "We need to stem this flow now, we need to put in more deterrent measures and secure our border."

Last week, the province announced new supports to help with the influx of asylum seekers. Included in the announcement was 14 units of emergency housing in response to the growing need for temporary shelter for refugee claimants. These units, which have already been made available, will be managed in partnership with the Manitoba Interfaith Immigration Council (MICC) and Welcome Place and will also include space for support services.

The province also announced \$70,000 in funding for the Manitoba Association of Newcomer Serving Organiza-

tions (MANSO) to support a refugee response co-ordinator for 2017-18 as well as \$110,000 in funding for Welcome Place for 2017-18 to support services for refugee claimants including paralegal services and safe transportation from Emerson to Winnipeg.

"We are incredibly grateful for the support of the provincial government and look forward to continuing to collaborate as we provide emergency shelter and other supports to those in the greatest need," Welcome Place executive director Rita Chahal said in a release on Feb. 23. "The ability of our community to pull together is unmatched and we have no doubt that Manitobans will continue to open their hearts."





Federal funds help fuel renos at Lower Fort Garry

Historic site to reopen to the public on May 8

As snow banks begin to shrink and grass peeks through the slush, one Selkirk resident says the excitement of spending time outside at Manitoba's national parks is starting to set in.

"Each summer there seems to be something new or renovated at a park, which is exciting, " said Amy Clarkson, a fifth and sixth grade teacher at Daerwood School.

To Clarkson's luck, the park that is seeing some big changes is the one closest to home for herself and other Selkirk residents — Lower Fort Garry National Historic Site.

Construction at the site, which is located along Highway 9 about 5.9 kilometres from Selkirk, is well underway thanks to the \$3 billion Parks Canada received from the federal government in 2015 to fund a five-year infrastructure rehabilitation project.

"We're so fortunate to have all this money from the government," said Parks Canada asset manager, Elvis Riou. "We've been working on these projects for quite some time and most are pretty well completed."

The funding is being used to back three major projects that are currently underway at the site, Riou said.

Currently, construction is taking place on a new waste and water system, restorations to the historic stone wall, more accessible entrances for visitors with disabilities, and new plumbing and heating to some of the heritage buildings, he said.

One of the restoration goals is to

eliminate the moisture around the foundations of the historic buildings, which Riou says will help preserve them for as long as possible.

"There's always ongoing work to maintain any building of any sort. Whenever we're given the opportunity to get more funding, we take it."

Another ongoing project at Lower Fort Garry is increasing Indigenous programming, he added.

This will include a flag raising ceremony on Aug. 3 to commemorate the signing of Treaty No.1, which happened on the site in 1871.

Over the two years Riou has worked

for Parks Canada, he said the emphasis on reconciliation has grown and finding new ways to honour Indigenous history is a continuous effort.

"We want our programing to continue improving so that it welcomes all types of visitors," he said.

In addition to the \$3 billion Lower Fort Garry has to work with, the feds funded the site an additional \$4.4 million for further restorations last spring. But Riou said that backing won't see light for another year or two.


"Right now we're focusing on the Canada 150 celebration instead and we don't want to have the site under construction during this busy time," he said.

As to when further restorations will begin is still being decided, but Riou says future projects may include exterior updates to the heritage buildings, repairs to the site's drainage system and an expansion of the water treatment plant.

Riou said he also hopes tourism at Lower Fort Garry brings new visitors and more business to Selkirk.

"I think the community will benefit in the long run too."

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Geese set record for early return

A record-breaking goose sighting early in the season might be enough to give people goosebumps about changing climate patterns.

On Feb. 21 at 1:45 p.m., seven geese were spotted flying over Oak Hammock Marsh, breaking a previous record for the earliest sighting set on Feb. 28, 2000.

Jacques Bourgeois of the Oak Hammock Marsh Interpretive Centre said the geese have been arriving around mid-March for the past 20 years and even as late as April 6 in 1996.

However, for the past three years, the geese have returned earlier than usual with return dates on Feb. 21 for 2017, March 6 for 2016 and March 10 for 2015.

"It seems like it's getting progressively earlier," said Bourgeois, noting that climate change could be a factor if the pattern stays the same for several years."A lot of people are excited that spring is early, but then they realize that spring is earlier every year. However, I don't think winter is quite over yet. Manitoba Merv said it would be another six weeks of winter, so we'll see which one is right."

Each spring, the geese are eager to return to Manitoba to scout out their best nesting spot, he said.

"Lately, we've been hearing a lot about refugees. If you think about it, the geese are like refugees in the winter. They're basically weather refugees because they go south hoping to come back to their home when all that winter stuff is done," Bourgeois said.

"They want to be the first one back here so they can claim the best spot and the best territory. They don't want

other geese to come and take over their spot."

However, if the geese come back too soon, they could face problems due to a lack of food.

"If we get another couple of snowstorms and everything gets covered in snow, then they have a hard time finding food. The cold doesn't affect them at all. They're very well equipped. As a matter of fact, the warmest thing you can put on is a goose-down jacket, so the cold is no problem," Bourgeois

"So usually when they come back, that's when things are starting to warm up and the water starts dripping. They can easily access the leftover food from last year like the old grains left in the field and so on. But if it gets covered in snow, then it's more challenging."

Since last week's sighting, even more geese have been spotted over the marsh and beyond.

"In the fall, that's when we have hundreds of thousands of geese all over the place. They're gathering together and coming from as far away as Churchill or even the Arctic. They're spending a couple days in the marsh, sometimes a couple weeks, so they can fatten up and get enough energy to fly back south. They usually congregate in big numbers," Bourgeois said.

"In the spring, it's a very different story. They usually come in smaller groups, and more often than not, they'll be chasing each other because they want to get those best spots so that no other geese will start nesting in their territory. They're a little bit more territorial."

As spring approaches, Oak Hammock Marsh Interpretive Centre will offer plenty of opportunities to enjoy the season. A Maple Syrup Workshop is scheduled for March 18, and spring break will be jam-packed with Wild Weird and Wonderful activities to learn about the creatures of the marsh.


Over the years officer manager Rose Walsh has been known as the glue that held the office together. The local business also devoted lots of their time giving back to the community and surrounding areas.

"We want it to be a positive atmosphere. We want to make people vote informed," said Debbie Burka, Spence supporter and key organizer. "Spence recognizes that Selkirk residents are Peguis, regardless of residency."

Following Spence's presentation six candidates vying for a councillor position, including Glennis Sutherland, Burke Ratte, Valerie Sinclair, Darryl Sutherland, Pauline Thomas, and William D. Bird, also had a chance to speak.

"I live a drug and alcohol free life. It's important to be an example to youth," said Spence, a former school principal, adding she has not taken her role as chief lightly."I live my life in a respectful way. In the last two years my life has been dedicated to the job of chief."

Spence told the crowd she is seeking re-election because she needs "more

"There are still a lot of things to clean up," Spence said, referring in part to her work in cleaning up Peguis' finances and dealing with a \$31 million debt she had taken over from the former administration.

As in her first go-round in seeking leadership, Spence's platform focuses on issues of transparency, integrity, land issues, and economic development. Spence also emphasized the importance of using all the St. Peter's reserve compensation money for land acquisition for future generations.

"The money is intended for land and nothing else," she stated. "Some inves-

tigation shows that some of the money was not used for land purchase, but for other things."

The Spence team provided attendees with numerous copies of legal documents, some from two ongoing forensic audits, the full details of which will be released once the audits are com-

During her speech, Spence made reference to factious disagreements on Facebook and anger at bounced cheques caused by having been issued from Peguis' old bank, the Royal Bank, rather than from its new one, the Bank of Montreal.

The Peguis election will take place on March 24, with polls open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Peguis Community Hall and at the Peguis Winnipeg Office located at 1075 Portage Ave. Eligible voters can also mail-in ballots.

Candidates for chief include former chief Glenn Hudson, who held the post for eight years until 2015; and past band councillor, Albert E. Sutherland, in addition to incumbent, Cindy Spence, Peguis' first woman chief.

Hudson was in Selkirk earlier this

month, on Feb. 18, meeting with his supporters at the Selkirk Inn and Conference Centre.

Sutherland is also scheduled to appear at the Selkirk Inn and Conference Centre on March 2 from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. along with 10 councillor candidates who will also give presentations. He expects that about 100 people will be in attendance.

This is Sutherland's first time running for chief. He had been a band councillor for six years and decided to run because he is disturbed by a deepening division resulting from the polarizing effect of Hudson versus Spence. He wants to unite the people.

"That's the main reason I decided to run," said Sutherland during a telephone interview with the Record on Monday. "There is always talk about big projects in the city, like the Kapyong Barracks and Assiniboine Downs. But at home there is bad housing and high unemployment. Fix things here first."

There are 28 candidates in total vying for only four councillor seats. They include: Brian Bear Jr. (Bucky), Mary Tyler Bear (Sutherland), Darlene D. Bird, William Bird, Allan H.E. Cochrane, Martin Favel, Tracy Govereau, Travis Hudson, Adrienne Manningway, Sylvia Mckay, David Mcpherson, Burke Ratt, Linda Sinclair, Pauline B. Sinclair (Nee Wilson), Val Sinclair, William F. Sinclair, Curtis Spence (Coot), Walter Spence Jr., Annette Spence-Meeches, Ernest Stevenson, Lisa Stevenson (Leese), Darryl Sutherland, Glennis Sutherland, Mike Sutherland, Wade Sutherland, Edie Thomas (Nee Mcpherson), Ray Thomas, Walter E. City of Selkirk, RCMP seek input on policing priorities

Selkirk residents will have a chance to offer their views on what policing priorities in the city should be over the coming year at a meeting on Thursday, March 9.

The Performance Plan meeting will be held in the banquet room of the Selkirk Rec Complex at 7 p.m.

RCMP detachments across the country have a Performance Plan, a strategic document, updated annually, which outlines priorities for local policing. Insp. Dave Kalist, from the Selkirk RCMP detachment, and David Thorne, the city's director of protective services, are inviting members of the public to help create this year's plan.

Kalist reached out to the city and asked Thorne if they'd be interested in joining the RCMP in hosting a public meeting at the Selkirk Recreation Complex to allow the people of Selkirk input on policing in their community.

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said the meeting exemplifies the city's strategy of working with groups and individuals to improve services.

"We're very happy the RCMP want to work with the city, and the public,

to create a strong plan that works for everyone," Johannson said. "A safe community is so important. People want to live where they feel safe and secure. Police in every city have their challenges and it's a good sign that here, in Selkirk, our RCMP want to work together to make a plan that's not just theirs, but the entire community's."

Thorne agreed, saying it's important for the people of Selkirk to have a say in the policing of their city.

"We don't want the local detachment or city administration standing alone setting the priorities for the city," Thorne said. "The ability of the 10,000-plus people of Selkirk to share

their ideas and concerns regarding public safety with local police is paramount. This is the key point that we want to share at this meeting,"

The city's CAO Duane Nicol said seeking the opinion of Selkirk citizens is a priority for the city.

"With this public meeting, we want a good, robust, respectful conversation with the Inspector and with our Director of Protective Services, to hear directly from citizens," Nicol said. "We do hear from citizens through phone calls or things we pick up on social media. Councillors hear from residents too and pass their concerns on to the RCMP, but bringing everyone together for a discussion takes it to the next level. It's about the entire community fully understanding the challenges that everyone is experiencing. Broader communication is really the enhancement here."

The Performance Plan is updated every year. Thorne said it is a "living plan" that can be altered at any time to reflect changing priorities. Thorne added that he'd like to continue communication with the public to enhance community safety and share the successes of the detachment going forward.

The Steelers, meanwhile, have just one regular-season game remaining before they begin the post-season. Halvorsen is confident that the Steelers can make a lengthy playoff push.



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



Dad was an active member with the Knights of Columbus and enjoyed meeting and making friends at the local coffee shops and casinos.


