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Interlake docs urge health authority to merge ERs

Group threatens to quit if nurses continue to run emergency rooms

A group of Interlake doctors is threatening to walk off the job if the perpetual practice of using nurses to run emergency rooms doesn't end.

A letter obtained by the *Record*, and at least one other media outlet last week, stated ER doctors in the Interlake will no longer support the practice in "any capacity" unless the RHA agrees to amalgamate ERs in the region by May 1.

"What's happened is the doctors have banded together. They've sent a letter to say 'hey, we really need to move away from nurse-managed care," said Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority CEO Ron VanDenakker.

VanDenakker said the doctors have suggested some ERs like Gimli and Arborg or Ashern and Eriksdale be joined together.

The move, at its best, would see one ER staffed with a doctor as opposed to having two ERs open but without adequate staffing resources.

Several ERs are under nurse-managed care in the Interlake and have been for years.

The practice meant initially only to be temporary, sees nurses triage patients and determine if a patient should be sent home, treated by a nurse, or sent in an ambulance to a hospital with a doctor.

The RHA and province have both repeatedly touted the practice as "normal."

In 2013, former RHA CEO John Stinson said the practice was a "very good" solution to the Interlake's growing doctor shortage.

Three years later, VanDenakker said that's now changed.

"We have to rely on (the physicians') professional integrity and skill," he said. "When their college and insurers and nursing unit says 'hey, we tried this and this isn't sustainable,' we have to respect that and move on to coming up with what's going to work."

He said the RHA is in talks with the doctors to work out a solution to the

problem and discuss what their "exit strategy" looks like.

VanDenakker said he doesn't see the doctors' letter as a threat, but instead as an opportunity to work together noting a challenge has been a division amongst doctors in the region.

"There's been no group practices, there's been no or limited amounts of docs backing one another up, helping each other out when there's vacations things like that," he said. "This is the first sign of doctors having worked together to try to come up with a regional solution."

Last month the RHA said it was short as many as 45 doctors.

When the *Record* asked the RHA for a detailed breakdown explaining the doctor shortage by hospital, we were told to file a Freedom of Information request.

That request, filed last Thursday, has yet to be fulfilled.

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Robert Smith School students stretch away stress

Program helps students exercise their mind, body

Robert Smith School students didn't let abnormally cold temperatures and a little bit of snow stop them from getting outside on Monday.

The Selkirk school offers what it refers to as "mindful stretching," similar to yoga, to its students so they can go outside every recess and exercise their body and minds.

"It's a way for kids to work through things like stress and anxiety," said Margo Yeomans, the school's guidance councillor

Yeomans said the stretching program is part of the MindUp curriculum, which teaches students to pause, listen, and breathe when they find themselves in situations that could cause stress or anxiety.

"There has been a lot of issues with

kids having stress and anxiety and parents asking if teachers can help," Yeomans said.

About 60 students have joined the club, which saw students outside stretching on Monday for the first time this spring.

"I promised them that after Easter we will meet every recess, and spring just won't come, but we came out because I promised them,"Yeomans said.

The school recently received a \$600 Healthy Schools grant to buy brand new mats for the program.

Grade 6 students Cassidy Drummond and Lenae Peebles both said the program is a great way to relieve stress.

"I like mindful stretching because it helps me with deep breathing, so if I am upset about something this can help me feel better," Drummond said.

Peebles added there are certain days when stretching and breathing really come in handy.

"If I have a test or something like that it helps me a lot," Drummond said."It takes away the stress."

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Tina Turner tribute artist bringing PTSD tour to Selkirk

Luisa Marshall to perform at Selkirk Legion on April 20

A travelling Tina Turner tribute artist is hoping to raise awareness about Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) during her tour stop later this month in Selkirk.

World champion tribute artist, Luisa Marshall, is bringing her Hope Beyond Thunderdome PTSD Awareness Tour to the Selkirk Legion on Wednesday, April 20 at 7:30 p.m.

Marshall and the rest of her band are taking their tour bus on the road and travelling to different legions across Canada in an effort to raise awareness about PTSD.

"We wanted to do a Canada-wide tour to see if we could raise some awareness and raise money at the same time and be able to engage a lot of people," Marshall said. "And of course we wanted the legions to be involved.

"We're getting a lot of support from the legions and it's just wonderful. People are very excited."

Marshall said she started performing as Tina Turner back in 1995 and has been on "The Oprah Winfrey Show" twice and the "The Ellen De-Generes Show."

"My first wig was a \$10 wig but that started it all," Marshall said with a laugh. "The first time I wore the wig it literally brought the house down and that was when my career as a tribute artist was born."

Marshall said \$5 from every ticket

sold on her tour will go towards the Veterans Transition Network or any other program selected by each legion. During her show in Selkirk, the funds will be donated to Project New Hope Canada, Inc.

The non-profit educational and humanitarian organization, based in Teulon, provides veterans and their families with the education, training and skills needed to manage their lives after operational service through

family retreats, seminars and workshops.

Kayleen Valley, the Selkirk Legion's entertainment chair, said so far nearly 103 tickets have been sold for the show and the legion seats more than 200.

"We're excited and a lot of people are excited about this," Valley said. "I've seen a couple of shows she's put on in Toronto and on Ellen the audience really thought she was Tina Turner."

Tickets are \$25 and can be purchased at the Selkirk Legion, located at 403 Eveline St., or online at brownpapertickets.com.

Valley said they chose to have the funds raised go to Project New Hope Canada so the money will help out veterans across the Interlake.

"I'm glad that it's staying in Manitoba," she said, adding a person from the organization will be speaking before Marshall takes the stage.

Marshall's show in Selkirk will be the 16th stop on her tour.

As of last week, Marshall said their tour has already raised more than \$6,000.

"We have been received very well by the people ... and it's just amazing and I think we're going to reach our goal which is \$60,000."



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Businesses step up to help elderly couple assaulted in Selkirk home

Two local businesses are stepping up to help an elderly couple that was seriously assaulted in their Selkirk home on Sunday night.

Noventis Credit Union's Selkirk branch is collecting monetary donations for the local couple this week and Brown and Sons Construction has agreed to help better secure their home.

"My mother and father live in town here, they're an elderly couple as well, and this just really hit home for us," said Joanne Brown, who owns Brown and Sons Construction with her husband. "We're going to make sure they're all secure as well."

Brown added their company, which is associated with Selkirk Soil, helps look after a lot of local seniors.

"We look after their snow, we'll go cut their hedges, whatever they need," she said."We look after quite a few seniors who don't have anybody else ... so when somebody gets hit like that in our town we're going to step up to the plate and do what we can to help."

Brown said they plan to reinforce the couple's doors and add a small security camera system to their home.

"They're probably going to be pretty scared to be in their home after this," she said, adding after this incident she plans to better secure her own parent's home in Selkirk.

News spread quickly throughout the

community on Monday following the assault on Sunday night.

Selkirk RCMP said on Sunday around 8:30 p.m. they were called to an assault within a Selkirk home.

Officers immediately responded to the scene and found an 88-year-old male and an 85-year-old female who had been "seriously assaulted and were suffering from injuries" inside their home.

The elderly couple were transported to hospital and are currently in stable condition, RCMP said in a release on Monday.


Shortly after the initial call, a second call was made to Selkirk RCMP about a suspicious male walking near the home. Officers then tracked down the man and arrested him in relation to the assaults.

Sylvia Magyar Brambilla, Selkirk's Noventis Credit Union branch manager, said she noticed a post on Facebook suggesting the community help the couple out so they decided to step

Hundreds gather for Disability Matters debate

People who live with disabilities and those who support them came together for the first Disability Matters Great Debate last week.

Four provincial candidates gathered with hundreds of Manitobans last Thursday in Winnipeg to discuss issues surrounding people living with disabilities.

Hundreds filled the room at the Norwood Hotel for the debate as well as two overflow rooms, while hundreds more watched the debate live at eight satellite locations, including one in Selkirk at the Canalta Hotel.

Community Living Selkirk executive director Maria Freeman said she was encouraged to see how many people showed up in different locations to watch the debate.

"What we have found is disability issues never make the platforms of the parties," Freeman said. "We are always the last group to be looked at and we decided we can no longer sit idly by."

The Disability Matters campaign, formed by Abilities Manitoba and Barrier-Free Manitoba, is asking candidates in the upcoming provincial election to make inclusiveness an election issue and organized last week's debate.

Liberal, PC, NDP and Green Party candidates debated a number of issues related to people living with disabilities as well as issues surrounding those who care for and work with

Debate moderator Marcy Markusa told the crowd disability staff are among the lowest paid workforce in Manitoba and make significantly less than those working in childcare and homecare.

She said yearly employee turnover rates for front line staff range from 25 to more than 66 per cent.

An adult living with a disability in Manitoba may have as many as 164 caregivers in 10 years, Markusa said.

Freeman said wages are an important issue because of the "revolving

door of employees."

"When you have staff that can make this a career and don't have to leave because they want to start a family and can't afford to live on their wages, than you can have consistent staff," Freeman said. "The client will have a better quality or life because they are with someone that knows them, and they don't have to get to know someone and learn to trust someone every time there is new staff."

PC Candidate Ian Wishart said many people working with those with disabilities especially in rural areas "are

not making a living wage."

"We recognize this has been an ongoing problem for many years," Wishart said. "What we need to do is to examine all the spending of government and look at the priorities, because clearly looking after those with disabilities has not been a priority."

Liberal candi-

date Vanessa Hamilton said a Liberal government would "base wages on consultations with people working in the system."

"If we don't take care of our workers than we can't take care of who is in front of them," Hamilton said.

NDP candidate and Minister of Family Services Kerri Irvin-Ross said an NDP government must find ways to turn jobs into careers.

"It is a consistent message that I hear about the frustration of wages," Irvin-Ross said."We need to make sure this is full time work and not casual work."

Green Party Leader James Beddome said his party would "implement a guaranteed income for every Manitoban through tax reform."

Candidates were also asked questions about getting more people with disabilities into the workforce and how to offer a "dignified income" for those with disabilities that can't work.

Freeman said no party has done enough yet to get her vote, and she will not decide how she will vote until she sees written specifics by each party.

The provincial election is set for April 19.

"There's not typically a big expo out this way so people coming from Gimli, Pinawa, and Selkirk ... people who don't maybe drive, it's just something more easily accessible for them."

This year's career expo will take place on Wednesday, April 13 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Selkirk Rec Complex.

Shymko said this is the first year the event is being held at the rec complex and those attending are encouraged to wear pink for anti-bullying day.

Options Employment is helping organize the event and Shymko said nearly 30 exhibitors will be on site to offer up a wide range of information.

Some of the exhibitors include the University of Manitoba, Manitoba Hydro, Brokenhead Ojibway Nation, Manitoba Aerospace, the Manitoba Print Industry Association, Assiniboine Community College and more.

"Some of them will be recruiting, some of them will be bringing information for their programs," Shymko said. "We have several guest speakers as well."

The Canadian Armed Forces will be doing a demonstration and some of the guest speakers will include the Canadian Mennonite University and Sunova Credit Union to name a few.

Food vendors will also be on site.

Welcome friends. The sun was warm and bright a couple of weeks ago as I picked my way around the slippery glare ice on Gull Lake at Stead favoring thin snow patches for better traction. I had left my truck in the parking lot choosing to hoof it out to groups of anglers scattered about the lake. I made for a young family and upon reaching them introduced myself.

Our new angling friends were Ed and Julie Neiser from Winnipeg and as we stood beside their portable ice shack getting to know each other their girl who was maybe three years old played with great vigor in the snow as only a child can. Ed remarked how they liked to fish here for perch.

He smiled pointing to a number of them lying in the snow they had caught that morning. He also said that because walleye are their second favorite fish they kept a hard wall shack on Lake Winnipeg north of Libau.

Suddenly we were startled from our easy conversation as the air was pierced by the little girls' screams of pain. Our attention darted to her. She had slipped and fallen face first onto the ice hitting her nose. Ed and I stood shocked as Julie scooped her baby up checked her nose then plopped down cross-legged on the ice cradling and rocking her child until the crying and tears faded away. Eventually all was well.

Ed and I shook hands and as I turned heading for shore, I remembered how the same thing had happened in my family years ago.

Two or three weeks earlier the ice was still pretty thick at Lockport which is where I found a Tristin Stothers of Winnipeg sitting in a chair nursing two ice holes. It was a fine calm warm gray day. One could hear the roaring river waters pouring over the gates of the locks nearby as Tristin; a tall, athletic guy gave us an unusual story.

Bed capacity leads to long wait times, expert says

An emergency medicine expert says both the NDP's and PC's plans to fix emergency room wait times in Manitoba are "doomed to fail."

"Manitoba is becoming the epicenter for everything that is wrong with emergency medicine in Canada," chair of the public affairs committee for the Canadian Association of Emergency Physicians Alan Drummond said.

Drummond, who is based in Ottawa, is an advocate for an improved standard of emergency care in Canada and is the 2008 recipient of the Canadian Medical Association's Sir Charles Tupper Award for Political Action.

Both Selkirk NDP candidate Greg Dewar and PC candidate Alan Lagimodiere have offered up promises they say will ease up emergency room wait times.

One of the NDP's promises involves opening more Quick-Care Clinics in Manitoba, and in a recent interview Dewar said the existing clinics are easing up wait times because "thousands of people are visiting them, so they are certainly working."

Drummond said "non-urgent" clinics such as QuickCare Clinics don't solve ER problems.

"In order to solve the problem you have to understand what the problem is," Drummond said. "You've had ER crowding identified since 1994 and every several years some incarnation of the government says they are going to fix it, but they try to fix it by attacking the wrong problem."

Drummond said governments in Manitoba continue to believe "overutilization or abuse of system" is the problem and the answer is to divert people with non-urgent issues to other facilities such as QuickCare Clinics.

According to Drummond, a number of studies show that hospitals with long ER wait times do not have a large enough bed capacity.

"The cause of ER crowding is hospital crowding, so you get an emergency department that has a patient that needs to be transferred to a ward and there is no beds, so the person spends 12 to 34 hours waiting for a bed to become available," he said. "When that bed is used by a patient that means it can't be used by a patient in the waiting room, so it has nothing to do with directing patients elsewhere."

Drummond added many people spend long times in hospital beds because there is nowhere else for them to go.

"So after treatment is complete you have a person, often the elderly, who can't get a bed in a care home and they can't be sent home, so they sit in a bed, which again leads to the overcrowding."

Three keys to stopping long ER wait times are more available beds in care homes, better home care services so more patients can go home, and spending money to get higher bed capacity in hospitals, according to Drummond.


"At the end of the day we know increasing bed capacity is expensive, but there is a grey tsunami coming and the problem is going to get worse as the population ages," Drummond said. "You are going to have to increase the number of beds because the problem isn't going to go away."

The Manitoba PCs have pledged to create a wait times task force to tackle the problem and said they would consult directly with frontline workers, health professionals and"impacted stakeholders."

Lagimodiere said in a recent interview a PC government would go directly to frontline workers to ask them what they think is needed to fix problems with health care.

"There is no reason for a task force because we know exactly what the problems are, so I am not pleased with that announcement," Drummond said.

Drummond said if hospitals can have capacity reduced to about 85 per cent, overcrowding would be "non-existent."

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NDP pledges to fund Selkirk to Winnipeg bus route

Dewar says NDP would fund 50% of the cost in wake of Beaver Bus shutdown

Finance Minister and Selkirk MLA Greg Dewar says an NDP government would fund at least 50 per cent of a public bus service between Selkirk and Winnipeg.

It was announced late last month that Beaver Bus Lines will permanently shut down their Selkirk to Winnipeg service on July 1.

Last Thursday Dewar, who is seeking re-election, announced an NDP government would work with both Winnipeg and Selkirk "to develop a seamless transit system between the two communities."

"A daily transit system between Winnipeg and Selkirk is important for our seniors, students, people with disabilities and working and middleclass Manitobans," Dewar stated in a release."I will work with our municipal partners to find a solution for people who rely on this bus service before the existing service stops."

Currently under the NDP government, the province covers 50 per cent

of both the Winnipeg Transit and Selkirk Transit operational costs.

"An agreed-upon transit route between the two communities will also receive at least 50% funding from an NDP government," Dewar said.

When reached for comment last week, Dewar said the party could not make the funding agreement if a private company took over a Selkirk to Winnipeg route.

"In our opinion the best solution would be for a private sector provider to continue on with the service," Dewar said. "But if that is not possible we would be prepared to give 50 per cent of the costs if the solution can be found with the City of Selkirk and the City of Winnipeg."

Dewar cautioned despite last Thursday's announcement it's too early to tell if the cities of Selkirk or Winnipeg would work to create a Selkirk to Winnipeg route, but he believes "it is now a possibility."

"There are logistical challenges but I

have spoken with Selkirk Transit and they are open to discussing the concept, but they are understanding of all these logistical issues that need to be resolved."

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said the city will work with the province to "find a solution."

"We will not shut any doors, so of course we would look at it," Johannson said. "Citizens from all walks of life take the bus. It's not one generation or one class of society.

"It's going to be missed and this could be an opportunity to work together on reinstating that."

It has been reported that Beaver Bus Lines Selkirk to Winnipeg service was losing money, so Johannson said he knows the city would have to look at ways to make a service feasible.

"Of course you'd want it to be a success," Johannson said.

Johannson said he doesn't want

Selkirk residents who work or go to school in Winnipeg to feel having a car is their only option.

"If I worked downtown I would much rather take public transportation," he said.

The Beaver Bus service currently takes residents back and forth from Selkirk to Winnipeg 10 times a day during the week. But the company says they will discontinue their Selkirk to Winnipeg scheduled bus service on July 1 "due to decreased ridership and rising expenses."

Although between 250 to 300 people use the service daily during the week, that still isn't enough to make it feasible, Beaver Bus Lines Selkirk division manager Kim Macdonald previously told the Record.

Beaver Bus currently runs between Winnipeg and Selkirk and also makes stops in Middle-Church, Rivercrest, St. Andrews and Lockport.

Kelly Lewis, the chairperson of the Selkirk and District Community Foundation said one of the greatest traits of Stewart is his "humility."


When asked how he feels about the upcoming honour, Stewart was very humble.

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
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Selkirk senior brings lifetime of artwork to Gwen Fox



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West St. Paul mayor welcomes 2016 federal budget

This year's federal budget offers a much-needed focus on critical infrastructure, according to West St. Paul Mayor Bruce Henley.

"This budget offers a real win for West St. Paul and Canadians as a whole because it enables us to continue to build wastewater, water and other needed public infrastructure works," Henley, who is also a a Federation of Canadian Municipalities Manitoba director, said in a release last week. "I'm happy to join FCM President Raymond Louie in supporting this budget as it represents a real turning point for all municipalities."

Budget 2016 recognizes the key role local communities play in identifying infrastructure projects needed to improve quality of life and promote sustainable economic growth, Henley added

"This budget has laid out a strong foundation for a new era in federal municipal collaboration that will allow us to build the great hometowns and the great country that our families deserve," Henley said.

By streamlining the funding process, Budget 2016 can provide smart federal investments for vital "shovelworthy" projects while building the foundation for future development.

Henley also welcomed new funding to manage data on the condition of existing infrastructure. As municipalities are responsible for 60 per cent of Canada's infrastructure, this ensures money spent on infrastructure goes where it is needed the most, he said.

Henley was also in favour of the re-capitalization of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' Green Municipal Fund, and the recent federal announcement of \$75-million for FCM's other climate change program.

West St. Paul mayor Volunteers team up to sponsor Syrian families

Local volunteers from various churches are joining forces with one goal in mind, to help bring three Syrian refugee families to Manitoba.

So far dozens of volunteers from 15 churches from Selkirk and surrounding areas including St. Andrews, St. Clements, Winnipeg Beach and Gimli have signed on to help out with the cause.

"Our goal is to reach out to everyone we can," said Don Forfar, the coordination team's chair and former long time St. Andrews mayor. "A lot of churches are reticent to sponsor a family because it's a huge commitment.

"They're much more willing to do it as a group of churches."

The group of volunteers have dubbed themselves the Red River Churches Refugee Team and their first meeting took place in February.

Forfar, who lives in Clandeboye and is a member of the St. George's Wakefield Anglican Church, said so far they have decided to help out with three families initially and have set themselves a budget of \$100,000 to do that.

"It depends on the size of the family ... and how much you need to support them and for all their household set up," Forfar said. "It's about \$30,000 a family so we've set a budget of \$100,000.

"Talking to other groups that have done it, stuff comes up. In Dauphin something that came up is expensive dental work. There's things you don't think of until they're here."

Forfar said they are still formalizing their relationships with all of the churches involved. He added they plan to meet their \$100,000 goal by the end of June through hosting various fundraisers and getting the word out that they are accepting monetary donations.

"We want to have a significant amount raised by then," he said.

Forfar said they have looked at how other groups have gone about sponsoring families and they have decided to work with a sponsorship agreement holder, which will be one of the national churches, but the details are still being worked out.

"There's basically four different ways of sponsoring a refugee family," he said. "You can either tag on with a sponsorship agreement holder and that tends to be one of the national churches ... you can go on as a co-sponsor or just a group of people as long as there's five people. Also a community sponsor."

He added they hope to have their application submitted to one of the national churches by June and then start waiting for their first family to arrive, which could take weeks or months after that.

Forfar believes it's going to be much more difficult to get volunteers on board to help the families once they get to Manitoba than it will be to raise the \$100,000.

"There's just tons of roles for volunteers and we think that's going to be the toughest challenge," he said. "It won't be impossible but a lot more work than going out and looking for money."

Forfar said once the families arrive, volunteers will be responsible for driving them to their appointments, English lessons, looking after children and taking them to community events.

"You want to help integrate them into the community, so you want them to go swimming, you want them to go to a hockey game, whatever things that go on in a community," he said. "Volunteers will also have to help them find work and maybe even drive them to work."


Forfar said it was an easy decision for him to get involved with this simply "because it's the right thing to be doing."

"Having all these churches in our community working together, it's just great to see so many people from different denominations all working together," he said.

As previously reported in the *Record*, the Clandeboye Amalgamated United Church has also taken on the sponsorship of a Syrian family of four, and Shandra Czarnecki of Petersfield said seven members of her book club are taking on the "ground work" to help them with their resettlement and transition into life in Manitoba.



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Levy disqualified from upcoming provincial election

Joanne Levy has been disqualified from being Gimli's Liberal candidate because she worked as an election enumerator earlier this year.

The NDP filed a complaint with Elections Manitoba early last week accusing Levy of engaging in "political partisan activity" while she worked as an enumerator.

The NDP claimed Levy posted pictures and articles on her Facebook page about the Liberal Party while working as an enumerator.

Last Wednesday Levy got a letter from Elections Manitoba telling her she had been disqualified as a provincial candidate because she had worked an enumerator for the 2016 election.

The Elections Manitoba Act states a person can't be nominated as a candidate if he or she is an enumerator, but Levy has said she thought it would not be a problem because she quit the enumerator position before her nomination on March 14.

A spokesperson for the Manitoba Liberal Party said Levy would not comment directly about her disqualification, but she did release a statement.

"Although I believed I ceased to be an enumerator once my duties were complete and my oath returned on Feb. 28 that is not how Elections Manitoba interprets and enforces The Elections Act," Levy said in a statement.

Levy said she will not fight the decision.

"No matter how much good faith I brought to the process the bigger picture involves what is best for Mani-

tobans. I believe that means re-focusing on the Manitoba Liberal Party platform, the leader, Rana Bokhari, and the incredible team of candidates that are fighting in this election.

"I want to apologize to the voters of the Gimli Electoral District. I was anxious to give them the choice of a Manitoba Liberal and I will not be able to do so."

Levy previously ran unsuccessfully for the Liberal Party of Canada in the Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman riding during October's federal election.

Incumbent Tory MP James Bezan won the MLA seat in Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman with 51.9 per cent of the vote, while Levy came in second with 31 per cent.

Last week also saw four other Liberal candidates have their nomination forms rejected by Elections Manitoba because they were not filled out correctly.

The Liberals won't have a full slate of 57 candidates for the upcoming provincial election, marking the first time that has happened since 1999.

The provincial election is set for April 19.

It may not feel like summer is on its way, but the City of Selkirk is already gearing up for plenty of events at the Selkirk Waterfront.

The city's summer events schedule at the Selkirk Waterfront kicks off on Saturday, June 18 with a performance by Aaron Starr as he opens up for Ray St. Germain.

This year's Canada Day celebrations on Friday, July 1, easily the city's biggest bash of year, will include a performance by country singer Kendra Kay who took home the 2015 Manitoba Country Music Association Female Artist of the Year award and won the 730 CKDM's Battle of the Bands at the 2015 Dauphin's Countryfest.

"We were contacted by her manager a couple weeks ago who said Kendra has always wanted to play the waterfront," said Vanessa Figus, the city's marketing and communication coordinator. "An unknown sponsor has sponsored her to play here so we're really excited to have her."

Closing out the show on the Canada Day will be AC/DC tribute band Whole Lotta Angus with a big fireworks display to follow.

Last year roughly 7,000 community and surrounding area members attended the festivities to celebrate Canada's 148th birthday in Selkirk.

"This year for Canada Day we're going to have longer sets and fewer bands," Figus said. "We feel that will

make more of an impact."

On Saturday, July 23 the waterfront will host the Multicultural Extravaganza, which will include performances by the Selkirk and District Ukrainian Dancers, Scandia Fun Folk Dancers and African drumming, rhythm and movement dancer, Coffieman.

Rock the Waterfront will take place on Saturday, Aug. 6 this year and include performances by JukeBox Heros and KISS tribute band the Paul Stanley's.

The Waterfront Festival, formally known as the Country Carnival, will take place on Saturday, Aug. 20.

Figus said the reason behind the

name change this year was so they weren't limited to only having country music performers and fans come out for the event.

"It wasn't always country themed," she said. "We thought we're limiting ourselves ... and we can leave it open to a different genre every year if we like."

The festival will include a magic show by Ryan Price and a performance by Fleetwood Mac tribute band Dreams and Rumours.

Employees at the water treatment plant are responsible for ensuring Selkirk has a continual and safe source of water, which the city calls for as a priority in its strategic plan.

Dan McDermid, the city's director of operations, said there are more than 700 operators in Manitoba and Selkirk's crew is always recognized as being among the best.

"We have an illustrious history of producing high quality people," Mc-Dermid said.

Partyka said he was honoured to be recognized by the MWWA and sur-

prised at the same time.

"It's humbling, right? You don't expect anything like that to come down your way, you're just doing the best you can while you're here and home thinking you made a bit of a difference and feel good about that," Partyka said.

Partyka added he enjoys his work, in large part because everyday offers something different. It's also an important job.

"People are happy when the tap water is running and the toilets are flushing but behind the scenes it's quite complicated. It's also very interesting what we can do to water to make it safe and also what we can do to wastewater to make it safe for the receiving streams," he said.

Dale Scott, the city's manager of water and wastewater, and himself a previous MWWA award winner, most recently recognized last year with the Lorne Sayer award for lifelong dedication to the job, nominated Partyka. Scott said Partyka is an employee who goes above and beyond.

He recently worked on a portable water station that will make its debut this summer at various events in Selkirk. The station can be connected to any water source and will allow people to fill their bottles with cold, refreshing water for free. It's about the size of a hot dog cart, has three filling stations, one that is wheelchair accessible, as well as a fountain.

"I have always asked the guys to think about making the job we do better. Ed has done that time and again, with projects like the polymer feed system and the water hydration station," Scott said. "Each time we improve something, we make the job more efficient and easier for who comes behind us. This frees up time to again, improve the next project."

Third party legislation will be in effect this election

For the first time during a provincial general election, third party legislation will be in effect in Manitoba.

The new rules aim to promote fairness by limiting spend-

ing by individuals and interest groups who may influence public opinion during an election, according to Elections Manitoba.

The legislation defines "third party" as a person or group

(other than a political party, candidate or con-

stituency association) that promotes or opposes a registered party or candidate during an election.

The legislation came into effect February 21, 2013 in The Election Financing Act.

Lake Manitoba fishers ban nets to protect perch

The Lake Manitoba Commercial Fishermen's Association (LMCFA) made a voluntary gesture of goodwill towards fish stock preservation at its AGM in St. Laurent last month.

The association is suspending threeinch meshes (nets) until it can determine whether perch stocks have re-

"Our resolution was to put them on hold for three to five years as the perch have been destroyed by jackfish [pike]," the association's chairman Allan Gaudry said.

Jackfish, the "water-wolf" of freshwater lakes, have increased to such an extent that Gaudry said only 100 of the association's 400 licensed members are active during the lake's winter fishing season.

Perch fetch a higher price at market than jackfish do and with declining catches, the livelihoods of many fishers have been affected.

"It [the arrival of pike] was caused by the flood in 2011," Gaudry said.

The theory is pike habitats, such as marshes, were created in flooded areas, allowing the species to thrive.

Interlake MLA and Conservation and Water Stewardship Minister Tom Nevakshonoff said he was encouraged by the association's voluntary move to suspend the three-inch mesh.

He said it will also prevent fishers from inadvertently catching young walleye [pickerel] while fishing for

"You can catch baby pickerel in that mesh," said Nevakshonoff, who attended the Association's AGM.

In light of last October's Seafood Watch report that criticized both the government's management of the fisheries and the fishers on Lake Manitoba, Lake Winnipeg and Lake Winnipegosis, the Association "knew something had to be done," said Nevakshonoff.

Using data from a scientist at the David Suzuki Foundation, Seafood Watch recommended fish from the three lakes be "avoided."

"For 2011 and 2012, commercial deliveries of Lake Manitoba yellow perch were at their lowest levels since the early 1980s," and "...walleye deliveries have generally declined since the late 1970s," according to the report.

"They [LMCFA] put forth the resolution...as a sign of goodwill," said Nevakshonoff."That was commendable."

Lake Manitoba is managed by a pulse system, which, in essence, means restrictions are laid and lifted as fish stocks change, as well as by a lake quota of two million kilograms "that all fishers can work towards," said Nevakshonoff.

Lake Winnipeg, by contrast, is managed by a multi-species quota system, whereby fishers can catch up to three different species to meet an individual quota.

That system has come under attack by biologist Scott Forbes of the University of Winnipeg. He recently spoke at the Manitoba Wildlife Federation's AGM in Brandon and posted a video of the meeting on YouTube.

The system, he implied, gives Lake Winnipeg fishers carte blanche to go after whatever species they want and discard fish that aren't as valuable to the market.

Calling the system "insane," Forbes said "we don't have the data to evaluate management models."

He said despite the myths perpetrated by fishers, the Lake Winnipeg fishery collapsed in the 1960s because of overfishing and "took a long time [about 20 years] to recover."

Today pickerel stocks in Lake Winnipeg have soared to such an extent that they're"unsustainable," said Forbes.

Emotions can run high when some commercial fishers perceive a threat to their livelihoods, whether that threat comes from an external source, such as California-based Seafood Watch, university biologists or the province's Conservation department.

"When you step that [fishing] back, fishers voice their opinions," said Ne-

Gaudry said after the self-imposed moratorium period, test netting will be carried out to determine whether the perch have rebounded.

World Health Day aims to raise diabetes awareness

For the first time, this year's World Health Day on Thursday, April 7 is hoping to raise awareness about diabetes and its global impact.

In Canada, diabetes has reached epidemic proportions—with an estimated 11 million people living with diabetes or prediabetes and a Canadian is diagnosed with diabetes every three minutes.

"People with diabetes play a critical role in ensuring the best health outcomes with the disease. Working closely with their health-care team, they manage blood sugar levels, foot care, eye care, physical activity and healthy eating," Dr. Jan Hux, chief science officer at the Canadian Diabetes Association (CDA) said in a release last week. "Self-management is the cornerstone of diabetes care and people affected by it need the knowledge and skills to properly manage diabe-

for many serious complications such as heart attack, stroke, kidney failure leading to dialysis, and blindness. Nevertheless, for many people it is possible to live a healthy, full life with diabetes.

Diagnosed with type 1 diabetes at age 13, Garry Giesbrecht, 61, from Steinbach explains how diabetes has impacted his life and why daily management of his diabetes is essential to his health.

As a young adolescent, it was tough to attain independence with his diabetes. Needles had to be boiled each morning for his daily insulin injection and he had a regimented diet that prohibited spontaneous treats.

He experienced frequent hypoglycemic reactions from physical activity and at that time blood sugar testing was only done several times per year at the hospital.

As an active father of two sons who enjoys skiing, cycling, reading, travelling and golfing, Giesbrecht uses an insulin pump to manage his diabetes.

"Today we have better technology available to help manage diabetes. My health-care team has also had a very positive impact on my life—guiding me through my health journey by advising and co-ordinating specialized services," Giesbrecht saisd. "Selfmanagement of diabetes is important, because it is the only route to personal wellness. While your health-care team provides information and services, they cannot implement healthy lifestyle choices for you. Those daily decisions and actions rest with the individual with diabetes, as do the results and consequences."

According to the CDA's Report on Diabetes: Driving Change, access to diabetes education is vital for learning more about nutrition, physical activity, blood sugar monitoring, medication and ways to make even little changes that can lead to success.

Some tips to keep on top of your diabetes include: taking action to learn as much as possible and using diabetes programs and services when needed; setting your targets and goals to maintain optimal average (A1C) and daily blood sugar levels; performing self-checks for foot problems; and scheduling regular eye exams. Slow cooker pork roast and veggies



Ingredients

3 each large carrots and parsnips, peeled and cubed

- 3 cloves garlic, minced and divided
- 1 onion, sliced
- 2 tbsp (25 mL) chopped fresh parsley 2 tsp (10 mL) canola oil
- 1 tsp (5 mL) each dried oregano and dried basil leaves
- 1 tsp (5 mL) fennel seeds, crushed

1 tsp (5 mL) smoked paprika 1/2 tsp (2 mL) fresh ground pepper 1 boneless pork loin roast, trimmed, about 800 g

3/4 cup (175 mL) sodium reduced vegetable broth

1 tbsp (15 mL) tomato paste Directions

Combine carrots, parsnips, garlic, onion and parsley in slow cooker.

In a small bowl, combine oil, oregano, basil, fennel, paprika and pepper. Rub all over pork roast and place on top of vegetables.

Whisk together broth and tomato paste and pour around roast onto vegetables. Cover and cook on Low for 8 hours or on High for 4 hours or until pork and vegetables are tender.

Remove roast to cutting board and let stand 10 minutes before slicing. Serve with vegetables and slow cooker juices.

Pork Tenderloin With Pears and Sweet Sherry



Serves 4 as tapas or 2 as main course 1 pound pork tenderloin

- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 small red onion
- 2 garlic cloves
- 1 pear, not too hard if possible Scant 1/2 cup sweet oloroso sherry Few tablespoons chicken broth (optional)

Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Heat a ladled sauté pan to mediumhot. (The trick to pan-frying meat is the temperature of the pan. It should be hot enough to brown and seal the meat, but not so hot that you burn the bottom of the pan, as the sediment left adds a delicious flavor to the final

Trim the tenderloin of any white sinew and cut into 1/2-inch slices. Add the oil to the pan and, when hot, add the pork. Cook the slices, browning on both sides. Remove when the meat is sealed and brown, but if the slices are thicker, reduce the heat a little to cook through.

Meanwhile, chop the onion and slice the garlic.

Remove the meat to a bowl and add the onion and garlic to the pan. Cover the pan with the lid and gently cook the onion, scraping all the tasty sediment left by the meat (add a dash of water to help remove it before it burns if

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Pork and Shrimp Posole



Makes 6 servings 1/4 cup all-purpose flour Fine sea salt and freshly ground black

pound boneless pork shoulder (picnic ham), trimmed of most of the exterior fat and cut into 1-inch cubes

2 to 3 tablespoons olive oil

1 medium Spanish onion, chopped 1 small red bell pepper, seeded and chopped

1 fresh long red chile or serrano chile, seeded and minced

1 garlic clove, minced

- cup good-quality, low-sodium chicken broth or fish broth
- 15-ounce can diced tomatoes, with juice
- 15-ounce can posole (whole hominy), drained and rinsed
- ounces large (26-30 count) shrimp, peeled and deveined

Finely grated zest and juice of

1 lime

cups chopped fresh cilantro

Preheat the oven to 200 F.

and 1/2 teaspoon pepper on a sheet of aluminum foil. Toss the pork pieces in the seasoned flour to coat completely. In a large Dutch oven, pour enough

Mix together the flour, 1 teaspoon salt

olive oil to coat the bottom generously and place over medium-high heat. Heat until the oil is shimmering hot. Working in batches as needed to avoid crowding the pot, add the pork to the hot oil and cook to brown nicely on all sides, about 5 minutes per batch. Transfer the pork pieces to a plate as they are finished. When all of the pork is browned, set aside. Do not discard the remaining flour mixture.

If the pot seems dry, add more olive oil and return to medium-high heat. Add the onion and bell pepper and sauté until the vegetables soften, about 5 minutes. Add the chile and garlic and sauté until the garlic is aromatic, about 30 seconds more.

Add the reserved flour mixture and stir until dissolved in the oil in the pot. Cook, stirring constantly, until the flour toasts lightly, about 1 minute. Add the broth and the tomatoes with their juices and stir to mix well. Return to a simmer and season with more salt and pepper, if needed. Return the pork to the pot, along with any juices that accumulated on the plate. Stir in the posole. Cover, transfer to the oven, and cook until the flavors have blended and the pork is fork-tender, about 6 hours.

Remove the pot from the oven, uncover, and stir in the shrimp and lime juice and zest. Re-cover and set aside and let the shrimp cook in the steam until firm and opaque throughout, about 2 minutes. Stir in the cilantro and serve.

the pan is too hot).

While the onion is cooking, peel the pear, quarter, core and cut into thin slices. Add the pear and continue to cook for another 5 minutes, covered. When the onion and pear are soft, return the meat to the pan, mixing into the onions and season with salt and pepper.

Increase the heat to medium-hot, add the sherry and cook at a brisk simmer for 2 minutes to amalgamate the flavors. If you like your meat with a bit more sauce, you can add a few tablespoons of chicken broth or even water when the sauce comes to a boil.

Set aside for a few minutes then serve as a tapas or main course.


Selkirk came together real nicely as a team down the stretch.


"He's one of those guys that you watch him play the game and watch his work ethic and watch what he brings to the table and he's what, you hope, the younger guys will inspire to be," Poponick
