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# East St. Paul releases climate change plan

### Implementation Plan lays out how climate change will be tackled in RM for years to

The RM of East St. Paul has passed a milestone with its climate change plan having approved and released the final of three reports that outline how they will handle climate change to come and what they will do to mitigate its effects ahead of time.

The plan has been many years in the making with East St. Paul Mayor Shelley Hart saying that it started before her time in office with previous councils recognizing that there was a need to prepare for what was to come.

"It'll take us years and many small actions to change our trajectory. So it's important to understand them, address them, identify them, and then put money and commitment behind," said Hart.

Though the seeds of the climate change plan occurred many years before, the initial steps towards this particular plan started with Climate Change Local Action Plan For Greenhouse Gas Reduction, which was released in 2017. This initial plan was instrumental in the RM getting a grant from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities to hire help in creating this new plan, which goes more indepth about tackling climate change than the initial 2017 plan did.

The first document that was produced as part of this new plan was The Risk and Vulnerability Assessment, which was adopted by council on December 15, 2020.

This assesment identified the areas of concern with regards to climate change impacts in the community and, though all parts of the plan included input from residents, RM employees, council, and business owners, this one

also took into considerations from a survey that had 163 responses from people expressing their worries about what would affect them the most.

Some of the main concerns that were identified by the RM in this report was the changing of overall temperature with more days of +30 degrees Celsius weather and fewer days that will drop below -30 degrees Celsius which could have an impact on pest and virus spread, increased precipitation overall but with changes in weather patterns that result in more larger precipitation events that occur less frequently which means there is increased likelihood of more drought and longer periods without rain in the summer months. The combination of the previous two findings is also a concern resulting in the development of extreme weather events such as flash floods, destructive winds, and ice storms.

The findings from this first report were used in the development of the second report which is The Resiliency Plan which was adopted on March 23 of this year.

"It's built on the first report and it proposes some short and long term actions that our RM staff can do to undertake to better prepare our community and so some of the proposed actions in that plan, were developing new design standards for the RM infrastructure, land drainage study [plans], to develop plans [for] upgrading building components for our buildings and maintaining our tree maintenance programs," said Hart.

The second report also contains a timeline of methods and responsible parties associated with these actions,

which are further fleshed out in the third report which is The Implementation Plan.

The final report, which was just adopted on April 13, is the component of the plan that lays out how everything will get done. It creates a set of actions

to occur over seven years, which coordinates with a general recommendation for re-assessment of the plan on a five to ten year timeframe. The seven years are further broken down into

The artists of the region have come together once again to create a space where people can find inspiration and take a break to look at some art created by our talented residents. This month the gallery has gotten more variety with fibre, woodcarving, acrylic, watercolour, and many mixed media pieces created by the exhibiting artists.

#### **Brenda Hedberg**

Hedberg has been painting since she picked up her brushes in 2012 and began to take art classes in Teulon's Green Acres Art Centre. Living just outside the community, she takes a great deal of her inspiration from the region specializing in bringing beauty to impressionistic renderings of the area's ditches and finding the fun in many painting of clotheslines which she is well known for.

"You start putting paint on paper and it gives you a really good feeling. Colour does that for me. So, from then on, I've been painting it was like a totally brand new experience for me," said Hedberg.

She feels that she hasn't been impacted as badly as other people by the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic as she is used to living and working in

isolation in the country, and so has used her time to continue to create and has focused on experimenting with art.

One of her most recent experiments has been allowing herself to be influenced by some of the old masters particularly Monet and Vincent van Gogh.

One of her paintings that will be up this month is a portrait painted in a similar style to van Gogh and another is an image that she took at the Imagine Van Gogh exhibition which she chose to paint on fabric to stretch her creativity.

"At first, I did it on fabric thinking, 'Okay, I'm going to make masks out of it,' Once I spent all that time on it, there was no way I'm going to cut it up," said Hedberg.

Hedberg, who is also the Volunteer Coordinator, is glad to be exhibiting this month as she has missed not being able to take art classes or participate in the gallery like she has been able to in previous years.

#### **Pat Findlay**

Findlay is a mixed media fibre artists and has been playing with textiles since she was about four years old but has really started to give it her full attention in the past 20 years.

"I retired from my regular job in 2001 and, as of that, I started doing this full time. In the beginning, there were not very many fibre artists around now that the

genre has exploded, and they're all

over the place," said Findlay.

Her art is a mixture of mediums on fabric incorporating skills from watercolour, dyeing, calligraphy and much more to create unique pieces that draw you in with colour then keep you looking with their delicate complexities.

"Often, I will have a title before I have the piece and then allow that phrase or [thought] to percolate in my brain for a while until I'm ready to do something [with it]. Then I'm driven by colour. I love colour and everything I do is [impacted by] colour in some way. That is my happy place. So then, I select everything I can find in my colour frame — from beads to tape, to

"That is what this gallery gives me. Most of them are painters, but they've accepted me as a fibre artist. I like to think my work follows the same elements of art. You can't just jump in, you've got to study your art, you've got to practice your art and the best way you're going to find out these things is by associating with other art-

Though she lives in Winnipeg, Findlay feels the community at Gwen Fox Gallery is worth the drive to Selkirk so much so that she has been a member for 15 years.

#### **Pat Johnson**

Johnson in addition to being the Gallery Coordinator is a prolific multidisciplinary artist who says she's been making art from day one and doesn't like to have idle fingers.

"I was always making something out of nothing, you know, like anything I could lay my hands on. And I'm still that way. I still have to keep my hands busy when I'm sitting," she said.

In this month's exhibit that adaptability really shows with watercolours, acrylic collage, and woodburning pieces being sprinkled throughout the gallery in addition to the lovingly carved angel and mermaid pieces that are some of the artwork that she's most well known for.

New mediums that she's tried recently are wood burning, which she used to make a walking stick celebrating elements of her Ukrainian heritage and textiles that are not featured in this exhibit, but may make an appearance in a future all members show.

# Dementia presentation gives residents tools for future

Gordon Howard Centre hosts zoom session that helps people learn care for their loved ones

Residents with family members with dementia were able to learn more about the ways that they can help their loved ones during a virtual presentation hosted by the Gordon Howard Centre.

The presenter for this meeting was Samantha Holland, Regional Coordinator for the Alzheimer Society for Interlake Eastern Health Authority and she started out the meeting giving an overview about the dementia behaviours that would be discussed in this meeting, which included repetition, sundowning, hallucinations and delusions, and wandering.


"Dementia in and of itself isn't a disease, it's a collection of symptoms, sometimes called a syndrome, resulting from diseases of the brain. These diseases are many and very diverse. There are over 100 different types. The ones on the screen are the most common ones and Alzheimer's disease is the most common [of all encompassing] two-thirds of all cases," said Holland.

Before she jumped into the presentation she urged the participants to approach their loved ones with dementia with patience and understanding, as even if their behaviours don't make sense to us there is a reason for them.

"When trying to understand your friend or family member's behaviour, keep in mind that all gestures words, and actions, communicate meanings, needs, and concerns. More broadly put, all behaviour has meaning whether it's a facial expression or a gesture, there's always something behind that. The person can't often communicate their needs, clearly — what might be wrong — and what we can do to help so it's important for us to take a step back and think about that," said Holland.

She then discussed communication for those with dementia because many of the behaviours of those with dementia stem from the changes to the communication areas of their brains.

"Imagine or maybe you don't have to imagine, you know what it would feel like to know that something is wrong, and not be able to pinpoint what ex-

actly is wrong, or relay that to others," said Holland.

Tips that she gave to improve communication were to use dementia-friendly signage, which would include more direct ideas like clear photos in bright colours. Another way is to give the person extra time to communicate because dementia can slow how quickly they can process information. She also suggests introducing yourself when speaking in person or on the phone so that they don't feel pressure to remember, starting conversations on a positive note, and slowing down as speeding through things can create stress for them.

The first behaviour that Holland discussed was repetition, which she described as the repeating of a sound, a word a question, or an action and it can sometimes seem like the person experiencing it is stuck in a loop.

She suggested that this can sometimes be due to short term memory loss

"It might suggest a need for information. It might suggest an emotional need. And it might be, you know, a wish to communicate, but difficulty formulating other thoughts," said Holland.

One of her suggestions was responding with memory aids. An example of this could be creating an information station with a clock that gives information about the date and time as well as things like a calendar and anything else that might help them find the answers they may be looking for.

She then spoke about sundowning which is a state of confusion occurring in the late afternoon and continuing into the evening, or even overnight. The hallmarks are anxiety, agitation, aggression, restlessness, pacing, wandering and exit seeking.

Though there isn't a known cause of it, it seems to be triggered by a loss of routine, by changes of medication or even too much sound or shadows in the evening.

"Something to try [is] journaling the changes that you notice, this can help to provide collateral information for the doctor, for the people that are with us that are working in long term care," said Holland.

She also suggests increasing activity during the day, restricting caffeine and sugar and joining groups like Minds in Motion.

The third behaviour Holland spoke about was dealing with delusions and hallucinations.

"I know this is a big one. For a lot of people, and it's, it's going to be kind of a more difficult one to give suggestions about because everyone's hallucinations are so different. And their delusions are so different. And what they respond to is, is heavily and highly individual," she said.

Though everyone is different Holland's tips are to see if the person needs new glasses or hearing aids as a bad prescription can cause problems. She also among other things suggests responding to the feelings that the person is expressing and not the

words

She then spoke about wandering behaviours and how to keep people safe. "Sixty per cent of people with dementia will wander at least once and it can happen at any stage," said Hol-

Some of her suggestions are to let neighbours know what's going on so if they see their neighbour outside looking confused they can help. She also says hiding jackets and shoes and putting business cards in jacket pockets are good ways to avoid triggering wandering and making it easier for the person to ask for help if they do wander. She also mentioned GPS locating options but said that that was an ethical question that each family would have to approach for themselves

When talking about all of these behaviours she also mentioned making sure to keep your doctor and care team aware of what's going on so that they can change medication when needed and help out where they can.

# Meals on Wheels never hit the breaks

This year has been a difficult one for many volunteer organizations and with last week being national volunteer week we wanted to feature one more of the many organizations that are kept going by their amazing volunteers. Meals on Wheels is run by Services to Seniors in Selkirk and continued to provide hot food for seniors in our community throughout the entire year despite pandemic restrictions which required adaptation and extra care from everyone who gave their time.

"We are following all of the provincial regulations. What's happening is we are using hand sanitizer, trays are disinfected at the hospital, we're making sure that there isn't germ transfer. [Trays] are in the very far back of the volunteer's vehicles when we pick up the dirty trays. For some clients [when delivering] we put the trays on a chair outside of their homes but we do make sure that they are there to pick the tray up," said Helen Brosowsky, manager at Selkirk Services to Seniors.

The service delivers about 350 meals a month to seniors in our community with a rotation of volunteers who give an hour of their time to the delivery process.

"It's all ages. It's, you know, basically from the younger generation to the older generation," said Tina Case,

community resource coordinator for Services to Seniors.

The women feel that this service is very important in our community and prioritized keeping it going despite difficulties caused by the social changes that have happened in the past year.

"There's people who are no longer able to [cook]. Their stoves may be decommissioned because of confusion or dementia, but they still live independently. There's the isolation factor, they may not be seeing anybody and having a meals on wheels volunteer coming and delivering to them, that meal could be a social contact," said Brosowsky.

She also says that the nutritional component of the meals is also a factor as cooking a healthy meal can difficult at the best of times.

"They're not kind of just eating, you know, tea and toast or ramen noodles. [We deliver] soup or salad, their entree and dessert. It's something for them to look forward to just having something good to eat three days a week," said Brosowsky.

Both Brosowsky and Case say that they get plenty of positive feedback from their volunteers that it fulfilling.

"We have many of [the volunteers] that call each month that want to pick up weeks to do [deliver meals]. They love the interaction with the seniors, when they are able to see them, and

they just love the idea that they're helping out, especially at a time like this," said Case.

Just because Services to Seniors has amazing volunteers does not mean that they aren't looking for more people wanting to help out however.

"A lot of times it's the same people and you know, they do get burnt out as well. And, you know, they need a break," said Case.

Case and Brosowsky encourage anyone wanting to join up to contact them and try it out.

The best number to call to see about volunteering is 204-785-2737.

"Our volunteers are so precious and appreciated. We couldn't run our program without our volunteers," said Brosowsky, "Having them step up and do this for us is just amazing."

actions that can happen in the immediate future, mid-term and longterm and acknowledgement is made that budget requirements and staff time are rough estimates as many of the short term actions will provide greater clarity for long and mid-term actions.

Some of the actions that Hart is most excited about are the ones that allow the RM to connect to its residents as well as creating more spaces with native plants, and possible workshops that could be provided to residents.

"I'm [also] really excited about things that we're doing to improve our water retention ponds. Honestly, I didn't know until I got into this business, how important those are to our drainage system. They hold water back from flooding our sewer systems and so those become water features. But, they also provide a very important function to our drainage and so I'm excited about

improving those retention guidelines," said Hart.

One thing that the RM made sure to incorporate into the plan was funding and possible funding actions to support the climate change projects.

"Anything you do costs money. So if you don't actually have funding behind any initiatives, you don't really have a strong initiative. Unless you've got massive volunteer groups that are giving their time and energy to something that doesn't take a financial contribution, you can say you're doing all sorts of things in vour community but if you put money behind it, then the community knows we're doing it," said Hart.

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# Tighter gathering restrictions in effect Wednesday

Stricter public health orders go into effect this Wednesday, April 28, as Manitoba tries to stem the third wave of COVID-19.

Officials on Monday announced plans to further restrict gathering sizes after seeing the province's CO-VID-19 case counts rise by the hundreds daily over the previous week.

"Despite our best collective efforts ... Manitoba's case numbers, our test positivity rates have been rising and our hospitalizations have been going up somewhat as well," said Premier Brian Pallister, noting the more contagious variants of concern are spreading rapidly.

An overburdened health care system puts not just COVID patients at risk, the premier noted, but anybody who may need care for other serious ailments and injuries.

And so, new public health measures have been added to the existing code red restrictions.

Until May 26, no visitors are allowed in private households, either indoors or outside, with certain exceptions allowing one visitor for people who live

No indoor gatherings are allowed and outdoor gatherings in public spaces are limited to 10 people.

Faith-based gatherings are limited to 25 per cent capacity or a maximum

of 10 people, with indoor mask use now required at all times.

Patio dining is restricted to groups of four people, with no household restrictions. Indoor dining remains capped at 50 per cent and people may only dine with others from their household.

Food courts in malls and shopping centres must close.

Gyms and fitness centres continue to be limited to 25 per cent capacity, but everyone inside is required to maintain physical distancing of nine feet from one another.

Spectators at outdoor sports and recreation facilities are limited to one parent/caregiver spectator per youth participant, so long as physical distancing of six feet is maintained.

Dance, theatre, and music schools continue to be limited to 25 per cent capacity, but the new orders limit the maximum number of people on site to 10 with one parent/caregiver spectator per youth participant, all physically distancing.

Personal service businesses can continue to operate at 50 per cent capacity, but appointments are required.

Day camps are permitted to have up to 10 children indoors and outdoors.

Retail stores are limited to 25 per cent of the capacity of the store or up to 250 patrons, whichever is lower, while malls are limited to 25 per cent

of the facility's capacity.

"To all Manitobans I say this today: stay at home if you can, significantly limit your close contacts, and get your vaccine as soon as you are eligible to get it," Pallister urged.

The vaccine eligibility requirements continue to change rapidly. As of Monday, anyone age 50 years or older and First Nations people age 30 and up can book an appointment at the vaccination super sites.

The province has also expanded eligibility to allow all front-line police officers and firefighters age 18 or older to be vaccinated at the super sites.

Manitobans 18+ who live and work in what the province has deemed high-risk communities are also able to be vaccinated. Right now that list includes several neighbourhoods in Winnipeg and the entire Northern Regional Health Authority.

Meanwhile, any Manitoban age 40 or older can book an appointment at a pharmacy or medical clinic offering the AstraZeneca/Covishield vaccine.

# 210 new cases announced Monday

Health officials on Monday announced 210 new cases of COVID-19 and a test positivity rate of 7.6 per cent provincially and 8.2 per cent in Winnipeg.

There were 2,093 active cases of the virus at the start of the work week. A total of 34,747 Manitobans have recovered from the virus since last spring. The number of people who have died is 968.

COVID-19 hospitalizations were at 148 Monday, including 37 people in intensive care.

Breaking it down by health authority, Interlake Eastern was reporting 106 active cases, eight hospitalizations, and two ICU patients. The region has lost 38 residents to the

In the Interlake, Gimli's active case numbers are up to 28, Winnipeg Beach/St. Andrews 20, Arborg/Riverton 1, Eriksdale/Ashern 6, Fisher River/Peguis 7, Selkirk 7, St. Clements 13, Stonewall/Teulon 10, Unknown 6. Meanwhile in the east, and Beausejour 2, Springfield 2, Pinawa/ LacduBonnet 2 and Powerview/Pine Falls 2. Meanwhile, Whiteshell and Northern Remote recorded none.



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
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# St. Clements FD helps handle blaze

# Manitoba partners with N.D. to get truckers vaccinated

Government and industry officials last week heralded a partnership that will allow Canadian truckers to get COVID-19 vaccinations across the border in North Dakota.

North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum and Manitoba Premier Brian Pallister welcomed the Essential Worker Cross-Border Vaccination Initiative as an opportunity to support the integrated economies by co-operating on the vaccination of individuals who work in both jurisdictions.

The Manitoba Trucking Association (MTA) and its members identify and co-ordinate with eligible individuals and work with North Dakota to schedule vaccination appointments for truck drivers during their routine trips to the U.S. over the next six to eight weeks.

The North Dakota Department of Transportation's rest area near Drayton will initially serve as the vaccination site, which will also be open to North Dakotans ages 16 and older to get vaccinated. Vaccinations will take place from noon to 8 p.m. on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays.

The state and province are establishing a joint-operations group to manage the initiative. The North Dakota Department of Health will provide nurses and other staff to administer the first and second doses of the vaccine to provide full immunization of truckers. There is no cost to the state or province as the U.S. government supplies the vaccine and reimburses the costs to administer.

It remains to be seen how many truckers may take advantage of the opportunity, although officials are estimating roughly 2,000 to 4,000 Manitoba drivers could participate.

"When it comes to the COVID vaccine, the most important question is not where can one get it but when can one get it?" noted Bernie Driedger, president of Portage Transport in welcoming the initiative.

"To see Manitoba and North Dakota coming together to creatively collaborate on a vaccination strategy that will expedite the vaccination of Manitoba truck drivers working to or through North Dakota is excellent news. This move protects these important essential workers and their families, while also freeing up vaccination spots back in Manitoba. A genuine win/win."

The shared goal of this initiative is to create a model of continental co-operation as the governments aim to safely reopen the shared border. Officials noted Manitoba and North Dakota will consider further joint initiatives

to vaccinate other essential workers and Manitobans.

"As Manitoba faces the third wave of the pandemic and the significant challenges associated with variants of concern, our number one limiting factor in protecting Manitobans is the availability of COVID-19 vaccines," Pallister said.

"Manitoba is proud to partner with North Dakota on this innovative strategy to provide life-saving vaccines to Manitoba's essential workers delivering the goods and services Manitobans, Canadians and Americans rely on," he added. "Manitoba and North Dakota have enjoyed a strong relationship of mutual respect and friendship, and I want to thank them for their willingness to support Manitoba through this joint vaccination effort."

But not everyone is so excited at the prospect of heading south for vaccination.

"I'm not sure of the logistics, but it would require an extra trip for myself," said Jon Martens, a Winkler trucker.

It seems like a good idea in theory, but there are issues with it, he suggested, noting that his driving takes him across the border regularly but usually not to the rest area on Interstate 29.

As well. Martens noted it is his understanding that an extra trip such as this without transporting product is not allowed under existing restrictions.

"So right now, I would have to take a day off work along with taking a trip that's not allowed, and that's on top of the fact that I'm in the percentage of people that doesn't quite trust the vaccine yet, although I could be convinced by my family," he said.

"If I should decide to get vaccinated, I think it would be much simpler if they would open it up to my age or my employment to get vaccinated locally

# **Keep vehicles free of debris**

RCMP respond to collision caused by ice on vehicle

On April 19 at approximately 1:20 p.m., Stonewall RCMP received a report of a chunk of ice flying off a truck on Highway 6 and going through the windshield of a nearby minivan, injuring the driver. When officers arrived on scene, EMS was providing care to a male with serious, non-life threatening injuries.

Investigation determined a van was southbound on Highway 6, approximately four kilometres north of the Perimeter Highway when a dump truck passed it. When the truck was approximately two car lengths in front of the van, a chunk of ice flew off the back of the truck and then came through the windshield of the van striking the 68-year-old male driver in the face, rendering him unconscious.

The passenger, a 61-year-old female, was able to handle the steering wheel until the vehicle came to a stop, thereby avoiding a collision.

The male was transported to hospital in Winnipeg, where he remains in serious but stable condition. Both occupants of the van are from East St. Paul.

The female passenger is very thankful for the help provided to her by other motorists who stopped to assist as well as the first responders who attended to herself and the driver.

The RCMP would like to remind everyone to ensure their vehicle is clear of snow, ice, and any other debris before heading out on the road. At highway speeds, debris on a vehicle can become a deadly force.


The Society is excited to see the unique ways that people are participating online. While we can't all participate in the same place for this year's fundraiser, we can still come together virtually to support families living with dementia.


A water main break on Manitoba Ave. between Mercy St. and Easton Dr. caused the rerouting of westbound traffic while repairs took place April 21.





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# U.S. government lifts pause on J&J COVID-19 vaccine

# Vaccines benefits determined to outweigh risk of developing a clot

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) lifted an order that had put a hold on the use of the one-shot Johnson & Johnson (Janssen) COVID-19 vaccine after determining the vaccine's benefits outweighed the risk of developing serious blood clots and potentially dying.

The two agencies had paused the use of the vaccine on April 13 after over 6.8 million doses had been administered in the U.S. Blood clots had occurred in 15 women between the ages of 18 and 59. Three women died. The onset of symptoms occurred between six and 15 days after being inoculated.

Despite evidence linking the vaccine to the blood clots, the agencies lifted the pause on April 23, saying people should be warned of the possibility of developing blood clots and low platelet levels.

"Safety is our top priority. This pause was an example of our extensive safety monitoring working as they were designed to work—identifying even these small number of cases," said acting FDA commissioner Dr. Janet Woodcock in a joint statement issued April 23. "We've lifted the pause based on the FDA and CDC's review of all available data and in consultation with medical experts and based on recommendations from the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices."

The agencies said they conducted a risk-benefit analysis and concluded that the potential benefits of the vaccine outweighed the risks.

"We are confident that this vaccine continues to meet our standards for safety, effectiveness and quality. We recommend people with questions about which vaccine is right for them have those discussions with their health care provider," said Dr. Woodcock.

Two days before the pause was lifted, the FDA reported it found unsanitary conditions and possible contamination at the Baltimore-based Emergent BioSolutions manufacturing plant, which makes both the Johnson & Johnson and the AstraZeneca COVID vaccines.

Emergent had earlier been forced to dump 15 million doses of the Johnson

& Johnson vaccine.

The FDA's inspection report cited "multiple failures" at Emergent Bio-Solutions, including possible cross-contamination of vaccine drug substances, loose debris, peeling paint and some sort of dark residue coating the walls. It also found flaws in the size and maintenance of the manufacturing facility and determined that workers did not follow proper procedures to prevent contamination.

Doses of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine that Emergent had in reserve will be tested by the FDA for quality.

"In the case of Emergent BioSolutions, we are working with the company to address the conditions identified. At the agency's request, Emergent BioSolutions has agreed to pause new production while it works with the FDA to resolve potential quality issues," said acting FDA commissioner Dr. Janet Woodcock and director of the FDA's Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research Dr. Peter Marks in an April 21 bulletin. "For the vaccines already manufactured, the products will undergo additional testing and will be thoroughly evaluated to ensure their quality before any potential distribution. We will not allow the release of any product until we feel confident that it meets our expectations for quality."

Health Canada had already given interim approval in March to the Johnson & Johnson vaccine before the blood clot events and deaths occurred. It made an agreement with Johnson & Johnson to receive up to 38 million doses of its vaccine. A shipment to Canada is expected this week.

Canada's chief public health officer Dr. Theresa Tam said she didn't know the specifics of the report on Emergent BioSolutions, but Canadians shouldn't worry if they received an AstraZeneca vaccine that was made there as Health Canada has measures in place to ensure safety.

"As far as I understand, what is happening in the U.S. right now does not impact us in the vaccines we have already received and that's being deemed of high quality and met the regulatory standards as we receive them," said Tam during a virtual meeting with media last week.

# National Day of Mourning April 28 for workers killed or injured

### City of Selkirk to issue proclamation

Workplaces across Canada, including the City of Selkirk, will be remembering workers who were killed on the job or suffered an injury or illness in the workplace on the annual National Day of Mourning April 28.

The day also marks a renewed commitment to improve health and safety in workplaces, protect workers and prevent further tragedies.

Susan Smerchanski is president of the Selkirk and District Labour Council, a union representative for the Manitoba Federation of Labour in Selkirk, a representative (Area 5) on the Safety, Health & Environment Committee of the Manitoba Government and General Employees' Union (MGEU) and teaches about workplace safety and health. She has been a safety and health advocate for 20-plus years.

She would help organize a walk in Selkirk on April 28 each year "to fight for the living and mourn for the dead," but COVID cancelled the event last year. There won't be a walk this year either.

But she said the Manitoba Federation Labour (MFL) and its president Kevin Rebeck will be hosting an online vigil that day to remember and honour those who died at work.

"MFL will be doing a virtual presentation about the Day of Mourning to

recognize Manitobans that have been killed or injured on the job. In Manitoba there are typically between 30 and 40 deaths from work-related incidents or accidents, ranging from exposure to asbestos that later develops into cancer to being killed in an accident at work," said Smerchanski by phone last week."This day is to remind people about how important it is to be safe on the job, make sure your staff have the proper training and equipment and watch out for each other."

The federal government enshrined a National Day of Mourning into law in 1991. It's observed on Parliament Hill by flying the flag at half mast. People across the country observe the day in a myriad of ways, including laying wreaths, lighting candles, holding walks and pausing for a moment of si-lence to remember workers who've lost their lives on the job or became injured or ill. The event has spread around the world, marked by countries such as the U.S., Iceland and England.

The City of Selkirk issues an official Day of Mourning Proclamation every year to recognize workers.

"I've been doing the walk in Selkirk for a number of years," said Smerchanski."We didn't do it last year and won't be doing it this year because of COVID-19, but I'm still advocating for safety. And the City of Selkirk will be doing its proclamation."

COVID is now considered a workplace safety and health hazard, according to the MFL. Data from a Workers' Compensation Board report shows there were over 1,200 confirmed cases of workplace transmission over the past year. Manitoba's frontline workers, such as health-care professionals, have died from COVID.

That's why the MFL has been advocating for paid sick leave for those who contract COVID. Instead of having to make a choice between a paycheque or coming to work out of necessity while infected, employees would be able to isolate at home.

Non-unionized employees have the same rights as unionized employees under the Workplace Safety and Health Act. And COVID-related workplace issues are becoming a growing concern as they're affecting both our physical and mental health, said Smerchanski.

"Right now, the big focus in any workplace and the talk on the street especially because of COVID - is the mental health part of workplace health. It's huge," she said. "People have always thought it's about steeltoed shoes, hi-vis vests and safety glasses and you're safe. But the health part includes mental health. It's about your whole wellbeing - your body, mind and spirit - that's sup-posed to be protected at work."

In addition to COVID, a number of other issues can affect people's well-

being in the workplace, she said. Those include harassment, bullying, having to work extra hours, having to work faster, pressure to take on unpaid extra work when there are staff shortages and excess pressure to produce more work - all of it can affect people's mental health to varying degrees or even lead to disability or post traumatic stress disorder.

"It's all about the dollar in a lot of workplaces," said Smerchanski. "Workplace health and safety is an international issue and it affects people every day."

Date from the Association of Workers' Compensation Boards of Canada show there were 925 work-place fatalities in 2019.

The Manitoba Federation of Labour's online candlelight vigil will take place on April 28 starting at 11:30 a.m. The event will be hosted via Zoom. Call the MFL at (204) 947-1400 for information on how to register or visit its website and search for Day of Mourning 2021.

### MB joins eTick platform for expert identification

The snow on the ground this past week makes tick season seem a ways away still, but the creepy crawlies will be out before you know it.

To help Manitobans stay safe while out exploring the great outdoors, the provincial government has joined the eTick platform to help people better determine their risk of Lyme disease.

"More and more Manitobans are exploring nature and the outdoors during the pandemic. While this is a safe, healthy way to connect during the pandemic, we also want people to pay attention to reduce their risk of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses," said Health Minister Heather Stefanson in making the announcement last week."The eTick program will ensure people can access rapid tick identification and distribution maps, while enhancing the surveillance of tick species in Manitoba."

Manitobans can submit pictures of ticks they might find on themselves, a loved one, or a pet to the eTick program for experts to identify.

Developed by Bishop's University and funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada, the program is useful in figuring out if a given tick belongs to a species capable of transmitting the bacteria responsible for Lyme disease.

In addition to learning what species of tick users have found, identified specimens are mapped to better outline the distribution and seasonality of the various tick species. This information will help Manitobans understand where and when ticks have been found in precise areas of the province.

A new mobile application has been developed to facilitate and streamline the submission of tick observations in Manitoba. It is now available for free download under the name eTick on the Apple App Store and Google Play.

Don't want to download the app? You can also submit your tick observations directly on the eTick website at www.etick.ca.

Blacklegged ticks, which can carry anaplasmosis, babesiosis and Lyme disease, are most commonly found within and along the edge of forests and in areas with thick, woody shrubs and other vegetation. These ticks are typically found between April and November (from snowmelt through snowfall), with adults most active in the spring and fall months.

### Winnipeg Beach mom and Shenanigans restaurant raising funds for St. Amant Centre

A Winnipeg Beach mom, whose son died from COVID last year while he was living in the St. Amant Centre in Winnipeg, has raised a considerable amount of money for the organization and has received some help from a Beach restaurant.

Odette Carreiro said she has raised over \$100,000 for St. Amant, which cared for her son Mark, through her popular"Bidding Wars for St. Amant" Facebook page. And the non-profit organization stands to benefit even more now that local restaurant Shenanigans on the Beach created a BLT platter in Mark's honour.

Shenanigans two co-owners had called Carreiro after Mark passed away, offering to donate half of the proceeds of the platter to St. Amant until the end of the year.

"Oh my God, I just went crazy," said Carreiro by phone last week. "Even though Marky passed away, his name is still alive here in the Interlake. There are businesses that want to do something to help."

Shenanigans' co-owners told her they sold about 69 Marky burgers in April (as of last Thursday), raising \$409 for St. Amant, said Carreiro. Hundreds of people also sent donation cards directly to St. Amant after Mark's passing. Robin's Donuts in Gimli also pitched in last month to help raise funds.

Mark was born healthy in 1984, but after he received his first baby vaccination for pertussis (whooping cough), he had seizures.

"I had never heard of contraindications with vaccines," said Carreiro.

severe brain damage. His brain was totally fried. He couldn't even hold a toy."

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, side effects of the pertussis vaccine can include rare adverse reactions such as chronic neurological problems.

Carreiro cared for Mark at home for the first 15 years of his life, taking him to medical appointments and therapy programs, and also running a special needs childcare in her home, she said. When he moved into St. Amant, she would visit him nearly every day.

"As a mom of a special needs child, you're very protective and you want to be there with your child all the time," said Carreiro. "I used to go to St. Amant four or five times a week."

She said she came up with the idea of the fundraising page for St. Amant a few years ago.

"I took all the stuff in my house that I didn't use, appliances I bought and never used, and took pictures of everything. I created a site on Facebook

and I invited friends to join," she said. "And all of sudden it boomed. Now I have 1.700 followers all over the Interlake and I've raised over \$100,000 for St. Amant."

People donate the "most amazing" items to her, not junkyard stuff, she said, and some items get distributed to needy families in the Interlake through a connection she has in the community.

"I didn't expect my Facebook page to grow like this and be so popular," said Carreiro, who's in her sixth season working for the Town of Winnipeg Beach as gardener and landscaper. "I have three friends that help me with my bidding site, doing photoshoots and documenting the winning bids."

Carreiro said Interlake children with autism use St. Amant's services and special equipment, and the organization provides training to staff at Heima Er Best and Cornerstone in Gimli. The funds she and businesses raise for the centre will support Interlakers. She and her helpers will also be selling St. Amant triple-layer facemasks in the Beach this summer to further support the organization.

The Express reached out to St. Amant for comment, but did not hear back by deadline. It made a number of attempts to reach Shenanigans.

Although she lost faith in vaccines after Mark experienced brain damage, Carreiro said she would have wanted him to have been vaccinated against COVID-19.

"I prayed that Marky would have been able to get vaccinated against COVID at St. Amant. I was terrified of it," she said. "I decided to get the COVID vaccine. I never thought in a million years I'd do it, but I did. The shots need to get out there. This is a nightmare."

There's a lot of talk about "grey divorce" these days, but there really should be more about "grey marriages." They seem to be on the rise over the last few years – even with COVID. Everybody deserves to be happy, but you also want to be protected, so good for you to be considering a marriage contract!

Marriage contracts are typically entered into prior to the marriage, hence the term 'pre'nuptial. However, they can also be signed or amended at any time during the marriage. I would always recommend getting a marriage contract because they are extremely beneficial for comprehensive estate planning which includes death succession, not just a possible divorce. To protect clients, I am much more interested in what is to happen in the event of a spouse's death, and of course it is necessary to ensure the marriage contract and the Will are "in sync." You see, marriage contracts can, and often do, override Wills.

Let's look at an example. You cannot

gift more to your surviving spouse via your Will than in the marriage contract, unless the contract states that you can do so. Typically, the Will states that the testator is a party to a marriage contract already in existence, citing the marriage contract by its date.

Today, many people have had multiple marriages, have complicated financial lives, properties, children, grandchildren and perhaps even dependents that need constant care. It is not a lack of love or future commitment to your new partner, but rather your conscious need to set out the manner in which your finances and property will be shared or divided in the event of divorce or death; based on your wishes and intentions, not on provincial statutory law. Marriage contracts are limited in their scope and to be valid and enforceable, the spouses must have made full and complete disclosure of all their assets and the values, including trust interest and all debts and liabilities. It is also prudent to obtain a certificate of independent legal advice so that the marriage contract is less vulnerable to challenge and to being set aside by the court. Of course, it goes without saying that you must have this done with your lawyer and for the benefit of all parties, really should be signed well in advance of the date of the wedding.



# WHL announces no playoffs this season

The Western Hockey League announced last week that the 2020-21 WHL season will conclude following the completion of the 24-game regular-season schedule.

The WHL looks forward to recognizing individual award winners and all four WHL Division champions at the conclusion of the 2020-21 WHL regular season, including the presentation of the RE/MAX Cup for the B.C. Division champions and the Subway Cup for the East Division champions."

The WHL will continue to work with Government and Health Authorities regarding schedule options for the 2021-22 regular season.

Back in 2014, my parents heard there was, at that time, frisbee golf and they took me and my siblings out to play and eventually I found myself into disc golf and I kind of got into it from there on the fly and I was hooked," he said.

Giesbrecht said more courses are definitely needed in Manitoba, especially in Winnipeg. He really enjoyed the many challenges that the Stony Mountain course offered.

"It was definitely unique," he said. "I've never played on a terrain like that. Everything is stone, everything is rock, gravel, so it was just different. But the course is really fun with a lot of unique holes. It's definitely something that a lot of Manitobans have not played before. It was cool to have the unique setting."

Giesbrecht wanted to invite disc golf players to the courses in the Winkler and Morden area.

The bad news is that no fans will get to see it.


The Manitoba Soccer Association made a curious decision last week, banning all spectators from the sidelines at any youth or senior practice, exhibition, or league game.

For mini soccer players (ages three to eight) a parent will be allowed to attend but must participate on the field with the player.

Leagues can start exhibition games immediately, with the outdoor competitive season beginning this Saturday.

Current public health orders have a 10-person outdoor gathering maximum but the province says if people are playing a game, more than 10 people may be involved, including players, coaches, and others who may be helping with the game from the sidelines.

The Manitoba Soccer Association said it reviews their Return to Play protocols as new Public Health Orders are released from the provincial health authorities. The current restrictions are in effect until May 12, 2021, at which time the new restrictions will once again be reviewed with their Return to Play. "It is our hope that the pandemic situation improves and that the health orders increase the number of persons allowed at gatherings so that we may consider the return of spectators to games," read a statement.




