Beginning on Friday, Nov. 24, volunteers will be available to drive a passenger and their car home. The program will also operate on Dec. 1, 2, 8, 9, 15, 16, 22 and 31 from 9 p.m. till 3

To book a ride, call 204-482-6673. The service will operate in Selkirk, East St. Paul, St. Andrews, and most of the Interlake region.

When a person calls for a ride home, Operation Red Nose sends three people: A driver, a navigator, and an es-

The driver and the navigator help get the passenger and their car home safely, while the escort vehicle follows them and picks up the driver and the navigator after they are done.

Although the service is free, some choose to make a donation, which goes directly to the Selkirk Dolphins Swim Club. Funds raised go towards keeping the team's fees down as well as covering coaching, equipment and pool costs.

Julie McPherson, one of the co-ordinators for Operation Red Nose in Selkirk, said that they're still looking for volunteers, especially for New Years

"We're just looking to add more people," she said. "I'd like a team always freed up, so they're not waiting a half hour, 40 minutes.

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### Selkirk program for at-risk youth earns \$10K funding boost

When Andrea Pietracci was a teenager growing up in the RM of St. Andrews, skipping school and making poor choices quickly caught up with her.

"I was getting into trouble with the law, drug problems, school attendance was not there," she said. "My parents were banging their head against the wall, they didn't know what to do."

It wasn't until she had a run in with the law that an RCMP officer recommended she look into joining the Selkirk Team for At-Risk Teens (START) program.

Now at the age of 26, Pietracci credits the program for helping her turn her life around.

"It just changed everything," she said.

Last week, the START program, which has been offered in Selkirk for 15 years, received \$10,000 in funding through the province's criminal property forfeiture program.

The program's partnership-based approach connects youth and young adults between the ages of 11 and 21, their parents or guardians, and involved agencies on a regular basis to set positive personal goals and deter-

mine how best they can achieve them.

"This partnership has proven to be incredibly successful in ensuring atrisk youth in Selkirk have every opportunity to succeed," Justice Minister Heather Stefanson said during the funding announcement at the Lord Selkirk Education Centre last Friday.

"Our government is proud to invest in important programs such as this because it provides measurable benefits to individuals, families and the community."

Tammy Thompson, the program's co-ordinator, said approximately 200 youth have gone through the program so far and their numbers continue to rise. Up to 35 youth can enroll in the year-round program at one time.

"Issues with youth don't stop because school stops so we continue on throughout the summer," Thompson said.

Many of START's clients have been involved in the justice system and face challenges related to mental health and drugs or alcohol use.

In 2016, the program recorded some significant successes with 96 per cent of clients attending school, 86 per cent reporting improved home conditions and 76 per cent were seeing a coun-

sellor to deal with drug- or alcohol-related issues.

Overall, START's success rate is 93 per cent with at-risk youth, helping them improve multiple areas of their lives including improved living conditions, education, accessing resources, creating safety plans and reduced recidivism.

For Pietracci, who spent two years in the program, her favourite part was when she had one-on-one time with Thompson.

"For me that was the most helpful part because I didn't just feel like another case number, I felt like a person and she cared about me," Pietracci said. "My parents still refer to her as our angel."

To Pietracci, the term "at-risk youth," has a whole new meaning for her.

"A lot of youth today don't have that support and when they have it, they can do so many things," she said. "This program has done so much for me and my family.

"These are great opportunities to help youth get the most out of life."


Pietracci is now a single parent, homeowner and a supervisor at a local restaurant. She says going through the program will only help her as parent.

"If I need help, I'll know where to go," she said.

START partners include the Lord Selkirk School Division (LSSD), RCMP, Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority, Addictions Foundation of Manitoba and several provincial government departments.

The program's funders also include the City of Selkirk, the LSSD as well as the rural municipalities of St. Clements and St. Andrews.

Brandon said they are hoping for a large turnout so that they can continue with this concert series next year.


"Right now the plan is to do it again," he said.

### Annual Red River Operation Clean Up organizer earns provincial nod

The organizer behind the annual Red River Operation Clean Up was recognized at the Manitoba Legislature earlier this month.

Natural Resources officer and district supervisor in the Lockport area, Robert Belanger, initiated the river cleanup in 1999. Since then, it has helped collect 500,000 pounds of garbage, trash, old tires, furniture, car parts and miles of fishing line from entering the Red River near Lockport.

The East Selkirk resident said that while he appreciates being recognized, what he really needs is government funding so he can continue the program.

"It was a lot of fun to go out there and be recognized ... for my two decades worth of work," Belanger said. "What I would like to see is a funding commitment. We need commitment

from this government, who was nice enough to give me an award, to help fund it.

"Having to constantly apply for grants is tough. It needs sustainable funding to continue."

Belanger said he'd like to use the funding to not only continue operating, but to possibly extend the program to the winter months.

He added there are multiple reasons why there continues to be garbage left along the river.

"There's no one factor to the garbage problem, it's a lot of different things

.. the Red River is now being used as a toilet," he said. "People don't want to pay tipping fees, or landfill fees, so if they have a truck filled with refuse, if they don't want to pay landfill fees, they'll just find some remote road and dump their garbage there."


But Belanger, who has been a conservation officer for more than 30 years, encourages people to think twice before littering. He said those caught dumping garbage into the river could face a more than \$200 littering fine.

Belanger said that ice fishing is also a huge problem, as anglers often leave things like broken chairs, tents, and other garbage out on the ice after they

finish up for the season.

Even though we find ourselves quickly switching from open water angling to ice fishing, a few of our brothers have given us some great boat fishing stories which perhaps we might enjoy before going on to winter ones. One such brother is Scott Penner, a young, jovial guy from Ritcher. He told of a time when he and some friends went boat fishing on Crow Duck Lake and the water became a very hazardous place. It was a fine, warm morning when they started. There wasn't a breath of wind. A low, brilliant sun reflected off the languid water. They tied their two boats together and began catching and releasing one pickerel after another. They passed food and drinks back and forth laughing and joking. It was a good time. Then just before noon dark, grey low clouds began appearing in the north. The clouds' bottoms looked alarming, rolling and twisting as they made their way over the men. Scott and his buddies began casting worried glances at each other. Suddenly gusting winds began battering their boats about. The winds got stronger tearing at the men and spinning both boats unbelievably in a circle. Frozen in fear they hung on as Scott spied a small beach beside a cliff on shore. With the whirlwind blinding them they cut the lines holding the boats together and pushed their motors to full power heading for the small landing. Then in just minutes the black clouds overhead now sent thick bolts of lightning to the water. Cracking thunder surrounded them as torrential rain began slamming down on them. Winds tore at them and rain lashed them as they reached shore. Scrambling out of their boats they ran for an overhang in the cliff. They crowded together sheltered, but cold. Upstream of Selkirk I met a grey haired, athletic, likable, self-effacing fellow from Winnipeg, Herbert Grosshans. He gave us a wonderful story that illustrates how just because you're an outdoors person who loves boat fishing, doesn't mean you won't get seasick. He and his buddies were fishing on Big Whiteshell one day and the waves were pretty high with lots of cross wind. The boat was being tossed about something awful to Herbs' great discomfort and his pals' teasing. Even though he was sick, he persevered and caught the first fish, a forty-four cm Walleye which required "the jeering section" to pony up a loonie each. The crew continued fishing, catching a few which Herb put on the string at the end of the boat, between seasick retches. When it was time to quit poor Herb wasn't fast enough and before he could lift the string of fish his friend gunned the motor turning the fish into mush with the prop! When Herb lifted the mangled string of fish he got even sicker!

Each day now more of us are roaming the seven inch thick ice on our pothole lakes, slow moving rivers or creeks to ice fish. How exciting! Tim Hiebert sure was! I found him on the Red River last week with a nice mess of pickerel. He held them up for me and I took his picture as I congratulated him on being the first ice angler with a catch to be put in our article this season. Good for you pal! As I leave you for this week, it might of interest that I've noticed fairly smooth ice on Shoal Lake, the Red River and Gull Lake by Stead with rough ice off most beaches on the south Lake Winnipeg basin.

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### Former St. Andrews club treasurer sentenced to 15 months behind bars

A former St. Andrews Community Club treasurer who stole nearly \$300,000 from the club has been sentenced to 15 months in jail.

Sharon Wasny, 54, was quiet and reserved as the sentence was delivered inside the Winnipeg law courts last Tuesday morning.

The sentence was passed down by Judge Timothy Preston, and will be followed by two years of supervised prohibition, along with restitutions to be paid to the minister of finance and the St. Andrews Community Club.

"I want to express my heartfelt apology towards St. Andrews ... I realize that no apology I could give would make this better. I never intended to hurt anyone, but my actions hurt so many people," Wasny told the court

before her sentencing was delivered. "I acknowledge that no amount of time will go by that I won't be reminded of what I have done.

"My only hope is that the court will give a punishment that will allow me to take care of my husband."

Judge Preston said that although he considered many factors, such as Wasny's terminally ill husband, he ultimately needed to send a message.

"(The defendant) claimed that she needed the funds to help her out of financial ruin," Judge Preston said. "But she used that money for personal expenses which I can only describe as luxury ... This was a planned, premeditated action, and the damage to the community will take a long time to repair ... A message has to be sent to individuals in positions of trust."

The prosecution wanted Wasny to be sentenced to two years of jail time, while the defense argued for one year of jail time. Wasny will have to pay \$10,000 to the minister of finance as well as other restitutions to the local community club.

In April 2015, RCMP arrested and charged Wasny with theft over \$5,000 and falsifying documents in relation to fraud. Court later heard she spending the money on jewelry, hairstyling appointments, and trips to Vancouver to watch the Vancouver Canucks play.

St. Andrews Community Club president Rob Ataman said he respects the judge's decision and wanted to once again thank the community and board members for their support.

"I'll respect the judge's decision, I think he did a good job of balancing what was asked for on both sides," Ataman said. "I don't think a few months either way was going to make a difference, jail is jail, it's a terrible place to be ... I'll be able to probably sleep tonight.

"I'm surrounded by an incredible group of people on the board that worked very hard and stood by us. I'd also like to thank the community for giving us the opportunity to do what's right."

Ataman said that the club is looking to recoup some of their lost funds, which will go towards maintaining the building and other costs.

He's thankful that the matter has been resolved and he hopes the community club can go back to being a recreational hub for St. Andrews residents.

Working at local grocery store helps St. Andrews man regain his confidence

Aaron Kost used to spend most of his time in his room.

Due to his intellectual disability, the 22-year-old would stay home, play video games, and was unable to interact with the St. Andrews community in a meaningful way.

But ever since he started working at Harry's Foods in St. Andrews, he's become more confident, responsible, and he's even started to save for a trip to Universal Studios.

"Working here lets me know all the people," Kost said with a smile. "It's helped me become ... more confident."

Kost works at the locally owned and operated grocery store three days a week and some of his duties include making popcorn for customers, stocking shelves with fresh products as well as checking expiration dates.

Aaron's father, Robert, feels like this job has changed his son for the better. "It's definitely made him more confident," Robert said. "Aaron has had a



problem with carrying on a conversation. Now he's meeting people, and people in the community come by to talk to him ... It's really changed his character, he's motivated.

"We love the fact that he's happy working here."

Aaron has a job thanks to the work of Community Living Selkirk, an organization that aims to assist persons

with intellectual disabilities, and help them live full productive lives in the community. They worked with Harry's Foods in creating the position, and helped him transition into the workforce.

Gimli MLA Jeff Wharton came to visit Aaron as part of Take your MLA to Work Day, where MLAs can come and see the contributions that Manitobans with disabilities are making in the workplace. Selkirk MLA Alan Lagimodiere also recently visited some workers earlier this moth.

Wharton said that it's great to see Aaron working, and he encourages other businesses to hire more people living with disabilities.

"We hired two employees with dis-

abilities for my moving business in the late 80s, early 90s ... They both started in the warehouse, and worked there way up, and one of them ended up being my driver for several years," Wharton said. "He was one of the best employees I ever had. If you have an opportunity to partner with these organizations, then do it. Because in my experience, it's a very positive move for your business, and for the community at large."

### **Province adds 25 road condition** cameras to Manitoba 511 system

With new road condition cameras installed, Manitoba is now more prepared to rise to the annual challenge posed by winter to the province's highways and roads.

"As every Manitoban knows, heading out on the highway in the winter poses some distinct challenges for motorists," Infrastructure Minister Ron Schuler stated in a release last week. "The addition of 25 road condition cameras throughout the province will help Manitobans see what conditions are like on many of the roads they're planning to drive on before they put their keys in the ignition."

The additional cameras have been added to the Manitoba 511 system with images available on the Manitoba 511 website and mobile app, said

"A total of 33 camera locations around the province upload still images at regular intervals to provide a snapshot of current road conditions," said Schuler. "Winter driving in Manitoba can be challenging and change rapidly, so it's a good idea to check the weather and road conditions before heading out."

The cameras are at strategic locations along provincial highways including:

- Trans-Canada Highway (PTH 1) at:
- Oakville, Deacons Corner, Kirkella (being relocated), West Hawk, Hadashville, west of PTH 12, Austin, PR 332, Oak Lake and Brandon;
- PTH 2 at junction of PTH 2 and PR 83;
  - PTH 5 at Ste. Rose south;
- Williams River, Devils Lake, junction of PTH 6 and PR 236, St. Lau-

rent, Fairford and Ponton,

- PTH 10 at:
- Minnedosa, Souris River Valley, junction of PTH 10 and PTH 60, and Birch River;
- PTH 16 (Yellowhead Highway) at:
- Shoal Lake, Russell Assiniboine Valley West, and Arden;
- PTH 59/101 (North Perimeter Highway); and
- PTH 75 at:
- Ste. Agathe, junction of PTH 14 and PTH 75 (Letellier), Morris (north side of town) and Emerson (at the border).

"The cameras are strategically placed along roadways in the province to provide motorists and maintenance crews with a visual representation of road conditions," said the minister."The number of cameras will be increased over time to bring more drivers another option to check road conditions."

In addition to the cameras, Manitoba Infrastructure operates a fleet of 205 plow trucks, 108 graders and 80 wheel loaders, with approximately 500 employees working together to clear 19,000 kilometres of provincial roads. All provincial highways are inspected regularly during the winter to determine if action is needed and provide current information on road conditions for motorists.

After a snowfall, the first priority is to clear the highway lanes to restore safe traffic flows as quickly as possible in the affected areas. Removal of snow from areas adjacent to traffic lanes occurs during daylight hours once traffic flows are restored.

"We all need to remember to slow down and drive to conditions," Schuler said.
