

Two teens face charges after online threats close schools

Multiple online threats prompted the Lord Selkirk School Division (LSSD) to shut down all 15 of their schools on Monday and put schools into "hold and secure" mode on Tuesday morning.

As a precaution, all LSSD schools were put into "hold and secure" mode after another online threat was made via a text message on Tuesday morning. The hold and secure was later lifted before 2 p.m. on Tuesday.

Selkirk RCMP said on Tuesday they have increased patrols at schools throughout the community and added"online threats are taken very seriously and anyone participating in this type of activity can be charged." No further details were available before press deadline Tuesday.

LSSD Supt. Michele Polinuk said they were notified last Sunday evening about a threat made online and then a second post was made later that same evening.

Polinuk said the school division's online messaging system was down Monday morning, which forced them to rely on their website and social media to get the word out to parents, staff and students.

"This community is great at ensuring those who need to know know," Polinuk told the *Record* on Monday. "People were trying to get the word

out as much as possible and RCMP acted right away."

On Tuesday, Selkirk RCMP said they have charged 18-year-old Kingsley Brett Williams with two counts of Uttering Threats and one count of Failing to Comply with an Undertaking in regards to online threats made last Sunday. A 16-year-old male youth has also been charged with one count of Uttering Threats.

Both accused have been remanded into custody and their court appearance was scheduled for Tuesday morning.

An 18-year-old female who was previously arrested for uttering threats will not face any charges.

Selkirk RCMP said they are not looking for any other suspects and the investigation is continuing.

Polinuk said the decision to close down all of their schools on Monday was to ensure the safety of their staff and students. She added she believes this is the first time the school division has had to close all schools due to an online threat.

These online threats follow an incident which took place on Oct. 16 when a 17-year-old high school student was arrested after he brought a shotgun and ammunition to the Comp in his backpack. The school was put into lockdown that same morning.

Selkirk Bear Clan looks to Red River Dental to move into reopen homeless shelter

The Selkirk Bear Clan Patrol is looking to reopen the city's shuttered homeless shelter in hopes of providing those in need with a warm place to sleep this winter.

Local bear clan volunteers submitted their proposal to the City of Selkirk on Nov. 26. They're looking to take over the former St. Francis Place homeless shelter building located at 202 Christie Ave., which is owned by the city. The bear clan says the building could become a headquarters, a homeless shelter, and a community centre where residents can find resources to help them get back on their

Lainee Walker of the Selkirk Bear Clan Patrol said they want to get the facility up and running as soon as

"It's starting to get cold out, and we need a homeless shelter here. We need city council to support us, we need a safe place for people to sleep," Walker said. "If we have a shelter, it'll help with vandalism, with petty crime, because people are desperate when they're cold.

"We need to heal this community."

St. Francis Place, which closed its doors nearly one year ago due to a lack of volunteers, was run by the Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen and consisted of six beds serving as a emergency shelter for the city's homeless. It opened in 2014.

René Gauthier, the former chair of Our Daily Bread, told the Record in an earlier interview that usage of the shelter had been shrinking leaving them to wonder if there was a need for a shelter in Selkirk.

Lainee said they've been in contact with the city, and they're working out

the finer details of their proposal. The Selkirk Bear Clan currently operates out of Selkirk United Church, who let them use the space for their Thursday evening patrols.

Selkirk Bear Clan organizer Tara Campbell said while they're thankful for their hospitality, the Bear Clan needs their own space.

"The United Church has been amazing, we thank them for opening their doors for us, and letting us hold meetings there. They've been so good to us, but they open their doors for everyone, and we do need our own space," Campbell said. "We're on Treaty 1 land, and this will be a place that welcomes everyone, from all faiths."

Campbell said they're also planning to use the space as a community hub. They plan to host things such as bead weaving classes, support groups, and guest speakers to help promote Indigenous culture in the area. They're thinking about calling the building "Kookum's House,"kookum being the Cree term for "grandmother."

The owner and driving force behind a new health, wellness and doctor training centre opening in Selkirk next year has revealed one of the first tenants moving into the medical clin-

Dr. Anthony Anozie told the Record via email last week that Red River Dental will be moving into Easton Place Clinic in the summer of 2019.

"I am delighted that such a successful and well established dental practice has chosen to relocate to Easton Place," Anozie said. "There will be more announcements in the new year helping to establish Easton Place as a one stop destination for health, wellness and education."

Dr. Jamie Wozney, who along with Dr. Thomas Lee and Dr. Kira Kjear practices at Red River Dental, con-

firmed they would be moving into the clinic hopefully before the fall of 2019. They are currently located at 347 Main St. Wozney said they plan to vacate the space and are hoping to sell it.

He added Red River Dental has been practicing in Selkirk for more than 20 years and the move to the new clinic will provide themwith more room to grow.

"Technology is changing and we want to provide Selkirk with an up

to date dental clinic and just where we are we're lacking space,"Wozney said. "We just want to start fresh and provide Selkirk and the Interlake with a total modernized dental facility."

Crews officially broke ground on the 16 acres of land where the Easton Place Clinic is being built, across from the Selkirk Regional Health Centre on Easton Drive, during a brief sod turning gathering in early October. Construction of the first phase of the project is expected to be completed in the summer of 2019.

The project was originally announced in 2016 and is being personally funded by Anozie, with some assistance from Sunova Credit Union.

Once complete, it is estimated the health and wellness centre could cost around \$80 to \$100 million.

Community Futures seeks Just Watch Me video contest entries

A unique contest is now seeking video submissions from rural Canadians living with a disability or health condition and running their own business in Manitoba.

The Just Watch ME! video contest opened on Monday, Dec. 3, coinciding with the United Nations International Day of Persons with Disabilities, a day observed worldwide to empower persons with disabilities and ensure inclusiveness and equality. The contest is an initiative aimed at celebrating the small business success of rural Canadians with disabilities and encouraging others to embrace entrepreneurship on their own terms.

In Canada, the unemployment rate is higher for people with disabilities. According to Employment and Social

Development Canada, persons with disabilities are more likely to be unemployed, to live in poverty and to earn less than people without a disability. They state that only 49 per cent of Canadians with disabilities, aged 25 to 64, are employed, compared to 79 per cent of Canadians without disabilities. Canadians with disabilities also reportedly earn 44 per cent less than Canadians without disabilities.

The contest is open for submissions from December 3 until January 22, 2019. The winners will be announced in February of 2019. There are several prizes to be won, including cash prizes for Start Up and Seasoned Entrepreneurs. This year's first place Seasoned Entrepreneur winner will receive \$1,000 cash and additional prizes to support their business, while the Start Up winner will

El Niño could bring mild, snowy winter weather to Interlake region

A mild and snowy winter could be in the forecast for Selkirk and Interlake region residents, according to Environment Canada.

The Interlake region might get a warmer than average winter from December to January, based on Environment Canada's latest forecast. This is based on an El Niño weather pattern, that will bring slightly higher-than-average temperatures over the next few months.

Amanda Prysizney, a decision support meteorologist with Environment Canada Manitoba, said that their forecast is based on a number of weather trends.

"According to (climate forecasts), there's an 80 per cent chance of an El Niño this year, which will affect the jet stream. There's likely to be more precipitation, higher than the average, with some slightly warmer temperatures," Prysinzney said. "It's not a guarantee, that's just the trend we seem to be going in."

El Niño is when the Pacific Ocean warms up, which causes high-pressure weather patterns to travel around the

world. Typically, this means higher temperatures and greater precipitation in various regions. One of the strongest El Niño patterns occurred in 2015-16, and gave Canada its second-warmest winter in recorded history.

According to Prysinzney, November was slightly warmer, around -4 C, than it normally is in Manitoba, which typically is -8 C. However, there's a lowpressure system moving from Colorado to Ontario, meaning that temperatures will drop back down for the first few weeks of December.

Some residents say they are looking forward to a mild winter.

Trevor Hitchins of Selkirk says he's been enjoying the milder temperatures so far this month.

"(My son and I) aren't the biggest fans of winter, we have to stay cooped up at home whenever it gets really cold," Hitchens said. "Hopefully the weather stays nice, so we can get out and enjoy some outdoor activities."

On average, the Interlake gets about 23 centimetres of snow in December, with temperatures averaging around -8 C high to -15 C.

Last Tuesday the trees along the Red River downstream of Selkirk were adorned with a Christmas-like snow fall as "old red" carried me down the road past the monkey trails. Coming off the rivers ice holding a curious structure of white plastic piping was a chap trudging toward his parked truck. I turned and nosed up to him calling out, "What the heck is that gismo?" as I left my truck. "It's a transducer for the best sonar underwater fish finder on the market," he shouted quickly, his eyes darting about, his arms gesturing with energy. "I'm Arnie, I write a fishing column. Would you have a fishing experience my readers might enjoy?" I asked. "I can think of one," he shot back putting his transducer beside its monitor on his trucks tailgate.

"I'm Jeff Laurin from Winnipeg and I remember once when my fatherin-law and I went ice fishing on Lake Winnipeg, it turned into a one step forward and two steps backward experience." They were about to do some tailgate fishing, Jeff continued and when he took the auger to drill an ice hole the pin holding the drill to the motor let go just as he broke through to water! The drill just kept on going right to the bottom! They tried to snag it-but no luck! Finally, discouraged, they went home.

The next day they returned to the hole only to realize it was frozen over. Back to town they went and bought a new drill to rescue the lost one. Later at the re-drilled hole they worked blind making many holes trying to find the old one. It took hours before they snagged and brought it up. As it lay on the ice with Jeff looking at it, he remembered an ad that showed a sonar fish finder that would have displayed the sunken drill. That night at home he searched the internet and

now before me as Jeff told his story he proudly demonstrated his new very pricey Garmin Live Scope. "This thing shows by computer resolved sonar in real time the top and bottom of the water and the fish in size and movement in a thirty foot circle! I always wanted one of these things and if I ever lose another drill..." his voice trailed off as he cast a humorous grin my way.

Again, a few days later low warm grey clouds mixed with snow, mist and fog had turned the trees into a white Christmas-like hoarfrost laden wonder world. I was on my way to visit with anglers on the ice off the west shore of Lake Winnipeg when the driver of a truck, about to meet and pass me had a worried look on his face. I stopped and rolled my window down. He did the same. After a brief hello he explained their trailer on the ice had gotten a flat. Hoping to help I told him I would go home to fetch

the tools he needed to change the tire if he and his gang would think of a fishing story for us while I was gone. His concerned expression relaxed. I headed home, got the tools and went back finding them on the ice. The three younger guys in the group went to work while a tall, well built fellow walked up to me saying he was Mike Whittington and that they were from Stonewall. He then dropped into the snow on his stomach under the trailer and with strong bare hands and tools began removing the frozen rusted wheel bolts. The driver, a soft spoken chap given to voicing what needed to be done came up to me and said," I'm Al Kilgallem and I've thought of a story."

While we watched the guys working in the snow Al pointed south along the Lake Winnipeg shoreline. He went into a story of a time two winters ago when he and some friends dragged his hard wall ice shack out to the Salimonia. They spotted themselves by the creek mouth, drilled ice holes and as it turned out Al got a line and their fish finders camera in the water first. The rest of the group busied themselves putting baited hooks down their holes when Al happening to look at the camera monitor and saw the picture moving in a circle on its own! Puzzled, he turned to his rod. It was gone! He pulled the cameras transponder cable out of the water to see his rod and line tangled on it. As he freed his fish line he felt a trembling. He pulled the rest of the line up and was happily surprised to see a nice big pickerel wiggling on one of

Now, to those lucky enough to find a fish finder under the Christmas tree this year, perhaps these by chance stories about them may have given Santa the hint. One can only hope! Bye now.

Thousands celebrate art, creativity on Holiday Alley

Old downtown Selkirk's second annual Holiday Alley saw an increase in visitors this year with 5,000 community and area members visiting the festival over two days last weekend.

"This is all about bringing people together and bringing tourists from outside of the community to see how amazing this city is," said Roxi Bohemier who hosted beer and vodka tasting, a soup cook-off station and multiple live performances during Holiday Alley "I love this downtown, and it's only going to get better and better."

In their early 20's, Miranda Schmidt and Jocelyn Kreml, moved into the main floor of Selkirk's historic Trader Bank building, opened The Mighty Kiwi Juice Bar and Eatery because they saw a future in the old downtown.

"The reason that we chose to build our business on Manitoba Avenue is because of the City of Selkirk's plans to revitalize the downtown," said Kreml who was on the Holiday Alley planning committee from day one.

During last year's Holiday Alley sales at the Mighty Kiwi were second only to their opening day. But Kreml says the Friday night of Holiday Alley 2018 has now set the bar even higher, as the business received more traffic on Nov. 30 than it had ever seen.

"It's really a demonstration sport for what's possible for our downtown," said Holiday Alley co-creator, Shirley

Though not all the numbers have been tallied, multiple businesses on the street say they saw an increase in business over the course of the week-

The weekend event included giant selfies with Santa, a total of 40 dogs

dressed up for the first Canvasback Pooch Parade, more than 25 musicians and singers performed and a life sized elk made of deadfall was auctioned off for \$3,300. More than 200 artists and crafters also displayed and were selling their art, 14 novice blacksmiths competed to forge the best marshmallow roasting forks and seven chainsaw wood carvers worked live and showcased their sculptures. The event also saw 39 buildings draped in 125,000 LED Christmas bulbs which will be on during the darkest days of winter.

Province launches online course to help prepare youth to enter workforce

The province is launching a new online Young Worker Readiness Certificate Course to teach youth the basics about workers' and employers' rights and responsibilities for safety and health in the workplace.

"Having a job can be a fulfilling experience for youth as it can provide a sense of accomplishment and responsibility," Growth, Enterprise and Trade Minister Blaine Pedersen stated in a release on Monday. "This course contains important information everyone should know before getting their first iob."

The interactive course is based on Saskatchewan's successful youth readiness course and is tailored for Manitoba.

The course replaces an outdated process where employers were required to apply for a government permit to hire a young worker between the ages of 13 and 15, regardless of type of work. Manitoba was the only province in Canada that required such a permit, which created red tape headaches for employers and was difficult to enforce, Pedersen said.

The minister noted a person must be 13 years of age to work in Manitoba and employers must follow rules to protect

the safety and health of young people in workplace.

Youth can now complete the Young Worker Readiness Cer-Course tificate online at ywrcc. safemanitoba. com/. The course is administered by the Manitoba government and was developed in partnership with SAFE Work Manitoba.

End of Canada Post strike welcome news to small businesses

Small businesses can breathe a sigh of relief at the announcement that the Canada Post strike has ended.

The Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) is pleased the federal government has listened to small business by doing what was necessary to ensure postal service can resume ahead of the holiday season.

"Small business owners depend on Canada Post to send and receive payments and get customer orders out," said CFIB president Dan Kelly. "The weeks leading to Christmas can represent a huge chunk of annual sales for retailers. The strike was quickly becoming an emergency for many small

firms and for Canadian consumers at this very important time of year. The government made the right decision to introduce back to work legislation."

A recent survey of CFIB members found that 71 per cent supported legislating the postal workers back to work. Two thirds of small businesses reported they had been negatively affected by the strike, at an average cost of \$3,000. In fact, 67 per cent suffered cash flow interruptions as a result of delayed cheques and invoices, and 53 per cent had to switch to a more expensive delivery service.

CFIB is Canada's largest association of small and medium-sized businesses with 110,000 members.

South St. Andrews COPP welcomes 15 new volunteers

Fifteen new members of the South St. Andrews Citizens on Patrol Program (COPP) are now ready to hit the streets and keep their community

A group of 15 volunteers were warmly welcomed and trained during a training session at the St. Andrews Fire Department on Nov. 24. The community's COPP director and one of the group's founding members, Robert Jesson, said it's "very rare" to train that many new volunteers at one time.

Jesson said the South St. Andrews COPP was started in 2001 after community members noticed a number of break-ins taking place along St. Andrews Road.

"We ended up having a community meeting and there was probably around 80 community members there at the time so a lot of people were interested in it," Jesson said, adding they started with around 50 to 60 members and they currently have around 42.

Jesson, 71, who has lived in the St. Andrews area for nearly 30 years says the patrol program is helping combat

"It makes a big difference to the community. As soon as we started patrolling, the break ins started to disappear," he said. "They see us driving around. The not so nice people see that, they know they're being watched. We're just extra eyes and ears for the community.

"It's just a way of giving back to where you've lived."

The main goal of the COPP is to be on the look-out for any suspicious or criminal activity, to record this activity and, where appropriate, to report such activities to the police. COPP members act as additional "eyes and ears" for their community and the police in an effort to reduce crime.

Jesson said COPP volunteers always patrol in pairs and can choose to patrol during the day or in the evening. The group meets on the second Monday of every month except during the summer. He added they are always looking for more volunteers to join.

'Their legacy will carry on forever'

Man known for waving at passing vehicles in Brokenhead dies at 73

A man who helped put Brokenhead Ojibway Nation and Scanterbury on the map for waving at passing vehicles alongside his brother died late last month, but his niece says their legacy will live on forever.

Mary Sinclair-Chartrand of Brokenhead Ojibway Nation said herself, family members and loved ones surrounded James Starr when he died peacefully on Nov. 22 at a personal care home in Winnipeg. He was 73. His funeral took place in Scanterbury on Nov. 28.

"He was always joyful, happy, he just loved to be around family," Mary said during an interview with the Record last week.


Starr, along with his brother Nelson Starr who died at age 71 in 2007, spent more than 20 years waving at passing cars from Highway 59 on Brokenhead Ojibway Nation. The friendly gesture led the brothers to become smalltown celebrities.

"Their legacy will carry on forever," Mary said. "They made people laugh and smile. It was a good gesture for them to wave because a lot of people said they enjoyed going by there ... they miss them now."

Wavers of Brokenhead, a gas station across from where the brothers would sit and wave was also named after the duo, and two big chairs now sit there in their honour.

Mary said the brothers were surprised to be honoured in this way.

"They were very surprised when that came in," she said. "The band asked the family if they could do that."

Mary said flowers were placed on the chairs late last month in James's honour. She added the outpouring of support and memories shared online from passing motorists who remember the brothers has been "overwhelming in a good way" for the

Rise in smoking rates across Canada 'a wake up call,' lung association says

The Lung Association of Manitoba says knowledge and prevention is key when it comes combating rising smoking rates across Canada.

"The key is to prevent people from taking up smoking in the first place," said Neil Johnston, president and CEO of the Lung Association of Manitoba. "Usually, people start smoking

in their early teens, so you have to start teaching them in Grade 4. We're working on a couple of projects to do just that."

Throughout the month of November, the Lung Association of Manitoba promotes Lung Month, a chance for Canadians to understand the importance of lung health. But a recent Statistics Canada survey revealed that

the amount of Canadian smokers has increased, a sign that smoking prevention programs are no longer work-

According to a recent survey by Statistics Canada, the number of Canadian smokers aged 25 and up hit 16 per cent of the population in 2017, up from 13 per cent two years earlier.

Health Canada recently launched

a review of it's Federal Tobacco Control Strategy (FTCS). The FTCS spearheaded number of initiatives between 2001 and 2017, including putting warning labels on cigarette packs and creating a toll-free "quitline" to give information how to quit smoking.

Johnston the fight against tobacco smoke isn't over.

"That's a major concern for us. For many years,

smoking rates have been dropping, now all of a sudden we have an uptick or a plateau," Johnston said. "This survey is a wake up call that we're not quite done with cigarettes."

Johnston added that the Lung Association is concerned about E-cigarettes and cannabis smoke, as they might be a gateway for non-smokers to start trying tobacco products. Many vaping products contain nicotine, the same addictive chemical found in cigarettes, and they should only be used by existing smokers to help them quit.

Adrian Powell of Selkirk took up vaping to quit cigarettes and says vaping is a viable alternative to smoking tobacco.

"I think everyone gets that smoking is dangerous, and I wouldn't be surprised if some study came out saying that (vaping) is bad for you," Powell said."Honestly, everything can be bad for you if you do it too much."

Smoking is the leading cause of premature death in Canada, according to Statistics Canada. Recent studies have estimated that 21 per cent of all deaths over the past decade are due to smoking.

Cook as well as Reeve Cheryl Smith of the RM of St. Laurent were elected during the AMM's 20th annual convention in Winnipeg last week. All newly-elected district directors will serve until June 2019.

"I'm really looking forward to working at the next level and representing the Interlake area, the issues across the region and being part of that advocacy group that takes issues forward to the Province of Manitoba," Cook stated in a release on Monday.

Selkirk is the one of only two cities in the Interlake region, which also includes neighbouring municipalities West St. Paul and St. Andrews. Cook said there's diversity in the region but everyone's concerns will be represented.

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson was also elected the AMM's new Cities Caucus Chair, as previously reported in the Record.

More than 800 municipal delegates from around Manitoba also elected a new AMM president and two vice-presidents last week.

Reeve Ralph Groening from the RM of Morris was elected as AMM President. Groening has been an AMM board member since 2005 and vice-president since 2012.

AMM delegates also elected Reeve Brad Saluk of the RM of Brokenhead and Reeve Kam Blight of the RM of Portage la Prairie to serve as the association's new vice-presidents.

The new executive team will serve for a two-year term.

The Consumer Protection Office (CPO) of Manitoba has tips and resources available to Manitobans to shop safely online during the holiday season and year-round.

Online shopping can offer convenience, specialty items and attractive sales. However, it is important that consumers stay safe when shopping online. The CPO recommends shopping with recognizable and trusted businesses. If you are considering using a new company, search online to read about other customer experiences and familiarize yourself with their terms and conditions including how to modify, cancel or return an order. Consumers should be cautious when using online auction sites, as consumer protection laws may not apply.

Personal information is as valuable to scammers as money. The CPO recommends protecting your personal information by only shopping on secure websites, which have 'https://' at the beginning of the web address. Learn how your browser indicates a website is secure, which might be with an icon of a lock or a green address bar, and be sure the website address you are visiting is accurate.

Before completing an online purchase, review your shopping cart to ensure the products, prices and quantities are correct. Notice any extra costs such as taxes, shipping and handling, foreign exchange rates or duty fees that may be applicable. Afterwards, monitor your banking statements for any charges that you may not recognize.

Manitobans who pay by credit card for online purchases have extra protection if issues arise with their transactions. The Consumer Protection Act

- protect consumers against the unauthorized use of credit card information;
- limit a consumer's liability to \$50 when credit card information is used without proper authorization;
- provide the right to reverse or cancel a credit card charge if the consumer was entitled to a refund and has not received one from the vendor;
- give consumers the right to cancel a sale prior to receipt of goods or services if the seller has not provided certain information to the consumer;
- provide the opportunity to cancel an Internet sale if the seller fails to deliver goods or services.

Solar panels being installed at rec complex will help drive down city's energy bill

The Selkirk Rec Complex will soon be soaking up the sun and driving down the city's energy bill and its carbon footprint in one fell swoop.

Solar panels are being installed at the Rec Complex and once activated the building will be one of the largest solar powered in Manitoba.

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said being good environmental citizens is important and the city is glad to do what it can to become greener. Geothermal heating was installed when the Rec Complex was built in 1985 and the solar panels will help take us even further off the grid.

"Taking advantage of natural resources to heat our buildings, to power places like the Rec Complex, which is such a huge building, makes a lot of sense," Johannson said. "By installing

solar panels we'll be more kind to the environment, which I'm a huge fan of, and we'll be saving taxpayers' dollars at the same time, so it's a win-win situation, and we're glad to be on board."

The solar panels will cost the city \$437,000 after a \$200,000 Manitoba Hydro grant is factored in. Dan Mc-Dermid, the city's director of operations, said he estimates the solar panels will save the city roughly 16 per cent in energy costs.

"The Rec Complex is a very large user of power because of the building that it is," McDermid said. "We make ice for about eight months out of the year, it's a big building, it has a banquet hall, it's got a lot of stuff going on in it, so it makes sense to try to supplement the power."

The panels will occupy most of the south-facing roof, the ideal direction

> for solar panels to face for optimum exposure to the sun's rays.

> The life expectancy of the solar panels is about 30 years and the city expects that they will pay for themselves in 17 years, which means there's 13 years of revenue generating gained from the addition of solar power. The pay-back period may be shorter if Manitoba Hydro's rates continue to climb.

> Sycamore Energy Inc., is doing the install and CEO and co-founder Justin Phillips said he believes the rec complex is the largest rooftop installation in the Province of Manitoba and largest by a municipality.

> "Just the fact the City of Selkirk is taking the initiative to install this kind of technology, it's not a small investment...so taking that initiative is encouraging," Phillips said. "The 200-kilowatt installation, it's humongous. We've done other installs and that's enough to power entire farms."

> The savings from solar power are substantial, Phillips said, citing the Levelized Cost of Electricity (LCE) per kilowatt with solar at about 4.5 to 5.5 cents compared with about 8 cents for Hydro.

cancer behind smoking.

Radon cannot be seen, smelled or tasted, making it very difficult to detect in homes and other buildings. In most cases the source of radon in structures is formed from the normal decay of the elements uranium, thorium and radium in rocks and soil upon which homes are built. Homes act as chimneys, helping gases, including radon, rise from the ground level through foundations.

Although no level of radon is completely harmless, The American Society of Heating, Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Engineers suggests radon levels do not exceed 2 picoCuries per liter (pCi/L). The Environmental Protection Agency allows a slightly higher top level of 4 pCi/L. Outdoors, radon levels average 0.4 pCi/L. Certain areas of North America have higher levels of radon than others. On the EPA's radon zone map, those residing in red areas (zone 1) on the map can expect to encounter radon levels above the recommended level.

Only a radon test can determine if

Did you know?

radon levels inside a home are unsafe. Tests can be purchased for around \$20 at many home supply retailers. Radon testing often is required when individuals purchase a home as well.

If high levels of radon are detected, it's important not to panic, as there are ways to mitigate the problem effectively. First of all, you may want to retest, which can confirm if your initial test was a fluke or caused by unusual weather. Short-term tests can measure radon over the period of a week, but longer assessments lasting about a month or more may paint a more accurate picture of your home's average radon concentration.

If high levels of radon are discovered, one of the first things to do is to ventilate the home to bring more fresh air in and dilute radon concentrations. You may then want to consult with a radon removal contractor. You may need to use a heat recovery ventilator to introduce more fresh air or ventilate the home using a fan.

Contractors may use suction to vent air from below the foundation of the house, through a pipe and above the roof. This way the radon does not leach into the home. This method ventilates radon well out of the way of human breathing spaces.

You also may want to have your water tested for radon, as homes that rely on well water may have radon in the water source, too.



Community rallies around resident who lost everything in house fire

In the span of a few months, Kenton Scramstad lost everything.

The Selkirk resident's family home, filled with precious family heirlooms, was hit by lighting and burned to the ground over the September long weekend. Scramstad only walked away with the clothes on his back and his five pets, all of which are rescues.

Then, on Nov. 23, someone broke into his trailer, and tore the place apart. Most of his furniture was destroyed and he began to lose hope.

"I lost everything. My father built that house 65 years ago, and I've lived in it for most of my life, taking care of my three dogs and two cats. That house was full of memories and family keepsakes, and now it's all gone," Scramstad said while trying to hold back tears. "It was horrible. I would not wish it on my worst enemy."

At the time, Scramstad's trailer was sitting on the empty lot where his family's house used to be. After he posted about the break-in on Facebook, a few Selkirk residents decided to help him out.

Ashley Capner-Choboter, a longtime Selkirk resident, said she was heartbroken over Scramstad's story, and felt like she had to help.

"It hit me close to home. I know what it's like to lose everything,"Choboter said. "My home burned to the ground in 2011, I couldn't take anything with me, I got out of there with just the clothes I was wearing."

"It's wonderful. After everything that's happened, I had lost all hope, it's just been a horrible nightmare," Scramstad said. "But to see everyone

Scramstad said he has a long list of people to thank, including the Selkirk Fire Department and the City of Selkirk. He's currently staying at the Canalta Hotel, where he's been offered him a room at a lower price while he's trying to figure out his next move.

Scramstad added that he will pay it forward, and help others in the same way the Selkirk community has helped him.

Scramstad has a ready-to-move

home available to put on his old family lot, but he's waiting for council to approve it. The decision is expected to be made on Dec. 10.

In the meantime, Choboter is still accepting donations for Scramstad. Those interested in donating some items, can call Ashley Capner-Choboter at 204-481-0727.



Mutcheson to be inducted into Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame

For most people, getting the call into a hall of fame is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

But for Matt Mutcheson, a talented pitcher, it's as routine as a first-pitch strike.

Mutcheson will be entering the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame next June as part of the Brandon Cloverleafs' team from 2006-12.

"That team won a number of provincial championships and in 2007, I think it was, we went to Quebec and came back with a silver at the Canadian national championships," he explained.

There were a lot of really good baseball players on that Brandon team.

"We had a really solid team," remembered Mutcheson, 40, who was born in Morden but now lives in St. Andrews. "We had a couple of imports, including a pitcher they brought out from B.C. that threw a big game for us at nationals. We also had a timely hits that year at nationals. We were behind a few games and fought back."

Mutcheson has been inducted with three other teams in the Manitoba Senior Baseball League - the Birtle Blue Jays, Brandon Marlins, and the Morden Mohawks.

More special for Mutcheson, however, is the fact he went into the province's baseball hall of fame with his family back in 2012.

His parents, Jim and Sylvia, were inducted along with their boys, Joey, Michael, Ray, Jack, Jim, and, of course, Matt.

Not only were they a great family - they were a tremendous baseball family that loved the sport.

"Going in with your family is very special," Mutcheson said proudly. "There are very few families that are in the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame, so it was a great honour. Our family had a lot of success in baseball with coaching and playing - it's been amazing.

"I owe all of my success to my (brothers) and especially my parents...without them I wouldn't be where I am today."

Mutcheson feels it's pretty special to be inducted into a hall of fame with so many great baseball peo-

"There's a ton of talented ball players in there that I played with, like Donnie Smith, the Fortin brothers, and they also went in as a family," he said. "It was more of me being with the right team at the right time.

"It's very humbling for me to go into (the hall) not just once, but multiple times," he continued.

Mutcheson has played for a lot of teams during his career. He was a member of three Team Manitoba Selects' teams that competed at Canadian champi-

He pitched at the collegiate level for Mayville and Valley City in North Dakota and Indian Hills in Centerville, Iowa before enjoying 14 outstanding seasons in the MSBL

He was the MSBL Pitcher of the Year four times, MSBL Player of the Year three times, and Manitoba's Senior "AAA" Player of the Year three times.

Mutcheson also spent a week playing professionally for the Winnipeg Goldeyes.

"My family got to come in for those games so it was a great experience to get that opportunity and play on that stage for a little while," he said. "It was very exciting but the first time out there I was nervous. There were five, six thousand fans out there so I was nervous a little bit but the excitement was

Mutcheson still plays the game (winning the "AA" provincials with Morden this past summer) and enjoys every minute of it.

He used to throw pretty hard when he was younger but has developed into more of a complete pitcher in recent years.

He also helps instruct youngsters the art of pitching and has plenty of advice for them.

"Being a pitcher and not a thrower," he insisted. "I've trained a lot of kids in the winter the past seven, eight years out in the Steinbach area and I always teach them that it's not how hard you throw.

"It's if you can put the ball where you want it. (Former Major Leaguer) Greg Maddux has always been an idol of mine and he didn't throw hard. He threw 87, 88, 90 but he was inside outside and always hitting the corners and changing speeds."

Throwing strikes consistently and getting ahead of hitters are keys to success, said Mutcheson.

"When I work with kids and talk to kids, throwing the first pitch for a strike is the best pitch you'll have and if you have a good changeup then you're ahead of the game," Mutcheson said.

"A lot of 12 and 13 year olds nowadays want to throw a curveball but their arm hasn't developed yet. They're better off pitching inside outside up and down to get the hitter's eyes moving."

Dakota downs Selkirk in varsity boys' final

The Selkirk Royals ran into a very good Dakota Lancers' team in the Boston Pizza "AAAA" varsity boys' provincial final on Monday at the University of Manitoba.

The No. 2-ranked Lancers defeated the fourth-seeded Royals in four sets (25-21, 29-27, 21-25, 25-18) to capture the varsity boys' volleyball championship.

"They're a really good team," said Royals' head coach Jeff Scarcello. "They're solid all the way around and they had a great season. They were consistent all of the way through but we had our moments and we had our chances in the 20s.

"We had them on the ropes a bunch of times and championship teams come through and win important points."

The Lancers were dominant all season, finishing 13-0 in league play and 47-4-1 overall.

But Selkirk gave Dakota quite the battle in the most important game of the season.

The second-set loss was detrimental to the Royals as both teams battled hard for each and every point.

Dakota trailed 8-3 and then 15-6 before tying the game at 24-24.

"They played well and really earned it but I'm not at all disappointed with how we played," Scarcello said. "We played great."

It's tough to come back and win any match when down 2-0 in sets, but it's even tougher against a strong team with a provincial title at stake.

"We were winning most of the first set all of the way through until 20-18 and then they took over from there and finished us off," Scarcello recalled. "And, in the second set, it was the same thing. We were up 24-20 and had lots of chances to put it away but we couldn't put it away."

Selkirk forced the fourth set, but could not find an answer for Dakota's talented left-side Isaiah Olfert (later named the provincial's most valuable player) and Colby Stocker.

To reach the final, Selkirk upset the St. Paul's Crusaders, the province's top-ranked team, 3-1 (18-25, 25-21, 28-26, 25-22) to clinch a berth into the provincial final.

"We finally put together the match that we wanted to against them," Scarcello said proudly. "Everyone saw that as a big upset and thought of it as a real surprise but, from our end, that's what we expected to happen. But it just hadn't happened yet."

Selkirk won the thrilling third set

despite trailing 8-2 early. The Royals played unbelievably well defensively to secure the final point.

Selkirk also fell behind in the fourth set 6-1 but battled back to eventually tie the score at 18-18.

It was just St. Paul's fifth loss in 48 matches this season.

"That's a real good team and we had to play at a top level," Scarcello stressed. "That was a really big win - I'm very proud of that one."

Nick Brzoza was selected as Selkirk's Boston Pizza player of the game.

Selkirk, meanwhile, will lose eight players - Liam Allen, Brzoza, Damon Budge, Easton Donohoe, Faial, Cam Gayleard, Carl LeBlanc, and Adam Trudeau - from this year's team due to graduation.

That's a lot of talent to lose from one season to the next but Selkirk is confident that it will be very competitive again at the varsity boys' level again next season.

The Royals, incredibly, have reached the varsity boys' provincial final in six of the past seven seasons.

"We're going to be a young team and relatively inexperienced next year but we're going to have talent again," Scarcello said. "That JV group is fantastic and you put them with that Grade 11 group that has a lof talent as well, so we'll be competitive again and have another good season."

Selkirk spiked in varsity girls' provincial final

The Selkirk Royals varsity girls' volleyball team has absolutely nothing to hang their heads about.

Selkirk was on the losing end of Monday's Boston Pizza "AAAA" provincial high school volleyball championship at the University of Manitoba's Investors Group Athletic Centre.

The Royals were defeated 3-1 (15-25, 25-23, 25-17, 25-23) by the College Jeanne Sauve Olympiens.

"When you go into these games I think you need to go in believing that you're going to win and if you don't put all of that effort in, you won't be successful," said Royals' head coach Kyla Michalski Tuesday morning. "It's always hard after that situation. But our season, as a whole, was fantastic. We had only three vets on our team and mainly rookies.

"We just soared and had a great season but we just weren't able to capture that last title."

It was the second straight varsity girls' provincial title for Jeanne-Sauve. The fifth-seeded Olympiens are a real good volleyball team.

They had a number of returning players from last year's team and went unbeaten in their regular season - posting an 11-0 record - to finish atop the SCAC Tier 1 Division.

"They had some really talented players on their team as do we but they had (just) one Grade 11 on their team," Michalski noted. "They are all vets that have won before and we're a little bit younger. Sometimes, in heightened moments those things could show a little bit, but we played solid, for sure."

The Royals took advantage of a struggling Jeanne Sauve squad with a

convincing 25-15 first-set win. But the Olympiens played much better the rest of the way.

"In the first set, we just off to a great, hot start," Michalski said. "We were swinging aggressively and we had really good matchups, so our blocking matchups were bang on. We obviously scouted them and their coach switched things up. As a coach, you're trying to guess what the other coach is going to do and he moved things around and we can't predict that.

"We didn't have people blocking certain players that we wanted, which was fine, but they switched it up and it obviously worked in their favour."

The second-seeded Royals, which finished the season with an impressive 44-8 record, reached the final after sweeping the third-seeded Portage Collegiate Saints in a semifinal matchup on Nov. 28.

Selkirk won by set scores of 25-15, 25-23, and 25-19.

"We came out and took care of business," Michalski said. "We served tough and it wasn't flashy. It's wasn't the most exciting game but we were just clean and took care of business."

Olivia Weremy was selected as Selkirk's Boston Pizza player of the game. In the other semifinal, the Olympiens upset the top-seeded MBCI Hawks 3-2 (23-25, 25-17, 25-17, 19-25,






