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ESMS students keeping busy in 2020

Changes have not kept kids from learning, growing, and thriving in school

Some students at East Selkirk Middle School wanted to share with the region what they are doing to keep busy now that COVID restrictions have made school and home life different for them. To do that they asked their teacher, Scott Van Caeseele if he would contact the local paper so that we could all have a virtual chat about what it's like being in grade six during COVID.

"I really do feel lucky myself. I tell my kids this on a weekly basis that they are probably the best class I've ever had to work with. They work hard every day. Right from the beginning, we had discussions about COVID-19 and about what the pandemic looks like for us, and so on a regular basis, the students are just, we're doing our very best to make it through together," said Van Caeseele.

Each student that wanted to speak about their experience wanted to let residents know about a different change they experienced and how they and their classmates were making the most of this time.

The discussion started with Paige Mooney who described a fun project that the girls in the school undertook to make the biggest snow-woman that

they could make in one recess.

"It started with me and one of the other girls. We had planned to build like the biggest snowman by all 11-year-old girls. And so we had during the process, we had one boy join us and we asked him to make the snow dog for our snow-woman because we didn't want to exclude anybody, but we also wanted the snow-woman to be by all girls," said Paige.

She and her group of friends ended up making a 7.5-foot tall snow-woman which took some ingenuity on the part of the students as it was so tall that they couldn't lift the middle snowball that they made on top of the first. They ended up stacking snow into a ball on top of the first tier and using the second snowball that they made as a step ladder to get the next tier — the head — of the snow-woman built on the top.

McKenna Hunnie said that it was important for the girls to do a project like this together because they are already learning about gender equality and wanted to let everyone know what the girls in their school could accomplish if they work together. Their goal was to make the biggest snow-woman ever made by 11-year-old girls who they named Frostina.

After a few years with the 59 highway down to a single lane over the floodway bridge in the northbound direction, work is now being done to replace the bridge which was damaged when a truck, with it's box not properly lowered, hit the underside while on the entrance ramp at the east

end.

The bridge was constructed in 1964

Call our toll-free number at 1-866-267-5818 for updates on emergency department and physician availability by hospital or visit www.is.gd/EDscheds. and when it was damaged in July of 2018 the province determined that because of the age of the structure it was in travellers' best interests to replace it instead of attempting a repair.

This repair work is anticipated to take approximately three years and be completed in two stages finishing in August of 2023.

In phase one, the existing bridge will be used as it is today with the righthand northbound lane being closed with a new structure being built next to the existing bridge. Southbound drivers may experience intermittent periods of single-lane travel during this time and the access ramp under the bridge and off-ramp from the highway to Oasis Rd. will be periodically closed.

In December of 2021 traffic will be moved on to the newly constructed bridge for phase two which will see two lanes of traffic for vehicles travelling in either direction. The off-ramp from the highway to Oasis Rd. will be open in this phase.

The completed structures will be two bridges over 300m long each having two travel lanes and an acceleration/deceleration lane. As part of this project, a new two-way access loop will also be constructed under the bridge. A portion of the highway will also re-aligned to connect with the new structures.

Hart doesn't anticipate that the project will cause many delays for residents travelling through the area.

"The way they've projected the project looks very similar to what drivers experienced now because they're going to be keeping that existing bridge in the first phase, that existing bridge will continue to take all the traffic flows it does today," said Hart.

The work will, however, have an impact on active transportation users



and snowmobilers as the Duff Roblin Parkway and Snowmobile Trail 46 will both be closed to the public for the duration of the construction.

"We're happy to see that the construction is about to begin," said Hart.

"They are two ladies that are a force to be reckoned with," Mollard said. "They just went above and beyond coming up with ideas and engaging everybody."

Garand said cookbook sales have already been a success.

"I think it's great, it feels like our guys are more included in the com-

munity and it's nice to be recognized," she said.

The book contains more than just recipes for soups and comfort food; the pages include photos of people Inclusion Selkirk supports and stories tied to the community. Mollard said the book is a product of the love and care that comes from residents in the area.

"It gives me a glimpse into the staff that I knew, the family members that I knew, and it's just amazing the amount of time and care that goes into everything, including creating a meal that everybody's going to enjoy when they sit down at the dinner table," Mollard said. Proceeds from the sales will go back into the organization to help further support clients of the organization by way of activities and making their office space more accessible.

MB invests in local companies for PPE needs

By Manitoba government

To date, the Manitoba government has invested more than \$211 million with more than 50 Manitoba-based companies to produce or procure medical equipment to address the COVID-19 pandemic, Central Services Minister Reg Helwer and Health, Seniors and Active Living Minister Cameron Friesen announced Dec. 17.

"When the pandemic hit Manitoba last March, Manitoba businesses and organizations stepped up, both through donations and through the province's procurement process, to help us care for Manitobans," said Helwer. "We will continue to work with these local companies to address the needs of our health-care system, and ensure we have the supplies and equipment we need to ensure continued quality care."

In March and April 2020, Manitoba manufacturers or businesses were asked to register their interest with the Manitoba government if they were able to provide supplies or retool and rapidly scale up production lines to develop products made in Manitoba to help in the fight against COVID-19. Some of the industry partnerships include:

• Precision ADM (\$37.8 million) – manufacturing reusable N95 masks based on a design by local doctors Christian Petropolis and Adrian Robertson, as well as manufacturing 500,000 3D nasopharyngeal swabs;

• Grand Medicine Health Services (\$8.8 million) – providing two million reusable gloves;

• Win-Shield Medical Devices, Inc. (\$8.8 million) – recyclable COVID-19 face shields;

• MWG Apparel (\$3.6 million) -

producing 200,000 reusable hospital gowns;

• Ben Machine Products and Alberta Operations, subsidiaries of Winnipeg's Exchange Income Corporation (\$3.1 million) – producing face shields and intravenous poles;

• Cerebra Health (\$2.5 million) – providing 250 'Winnipeg' ventilators' pending final construction;

• Polymer Shapes (\$2.1 million) – increasing capacity for face-shield production;

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First COVID-19 vaccines administered By Staff

Last week Wednesday saw the very first doses of the COVID-19 vaccine administered to Manitoba healthcare workers.

"Today is a monumental day in Manitoba and a long-awaited day of hope as we begin to deliver the first doses of the COVID-19 vaccine nine months after our first positive case in the province," Premier Brian Pallister said in a statement.

Those doses were the first of about 900 scheduled to be administered over three days at the University of Manitoba's Rady Faculty of Health Sciences beside the Health Sciences Centre (HSC) in Winnipeg.

When it comes to rolling out the vaccine, the province has given first priority to health-care workers of a certain age who have close contact with COVID-19 patients and Manitobans most vulnerable to the virus.

"Our front-line health-care workers have been stepping up throughout this pandemic and we know that stepping up now to protect them first is the right thing to do so that we can protect them and the patients they look after," Pallister said.

Receiving Manitoba's very first CO-VID-19 vaccine was Dr. Brian Penner, who works in internal medicine at HSC.

"I am now safer for my friends and colleagues, and I hope everyone does their part to stop the spread," he said. Not far behind Penner was Sherry Plett, a registered nurse who works at the Boundary Trails Health Centre.

"It's important for me because I'm a front-line worker, I work in the emergency room," Plett said." I just feel like I need to be there, I need to be healthy so I can be there and look after people in the community."

The recipients of these first doses will need to get a second shot in three

weeks. That will take place at the RBC Convention Centre in Winnipeg, the "super-site" the province is setting up for the storage and administration of the vaccine. Additional vaccination sites are planned for communities across Manitoba in the new year as more vaccine arrives.

Currently, the Pfizer vaccine arrives in 975 doses that must remain in the

same location where it is delivered. Manitoba expects to receive other COVID-19 vaccines in the future that can be broken down into smaller amounts and be transported, which will allow for mobile vaccination teams and, gradually, a more conventional immunization program in the year ahead, the province has said.

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Big cheques, bigger dreams for community

Students recipients of grants to help residents fare through holidays

Two students from the Lord Selkirk Education Centre have received \$3,000 in grants to help out families in need this holiday season.

The Rising Youth Grant, sponsored by Service Canada, Canada Service Corps and Taking IT Global, doled out two, \$1,500 cheques to Shaylynn Connolly and Cadence Stevenson, students of the education centre.

"I'm just trying to spread the joy during all of these lockdown conditions," said Stevenson, 18, on how it feels to receive the money.

Carly Chartier from the Selkirk Friendship Centre said after Service Canada recognized the number of grants they've applied for in past, they reached out and offered a partnership with the organization and the learning centre to award microgrants to those wanting to help their communities. Chartier has helped organize over 40 grants in three years for different initiatives.

The Rising Youth Community Service Grant Initiative finds young people looking for ways to give back to their communities and awards them money to support those ideas. They have three levels of grants available: \$250, \$750 and \$1,500. Connolly and

Stevenson were both awarded the largest sum for their idea.

The money awarded to Connolly and Stevenson will be used to create care packages for families in need around the community. Items will include food, sanitization products, masks and gift cards to be used towards the purchase of goods needed over the holidays.

Chad Whiteside, a teacher for the education centre, said the centre usually partakes in fundraisers and events to help the community but restrictions have halted those plans.

"COVID has definitely changed the sort of climate around stuff like that a little bit," he said. "So it's another way for us to, you know, just recognize and support families in the community."

Chartier said, with restrictions and the closure of halls and cancellation of programming, staying connected to people has been a challenge.

"It's hard to be community driven when you're legally not allowed to be a community," she said.

The centre's annual holiday dinner, consisting of food cooked by students and dished out to over 150 family members and friends, was cancelled due to public health restrictions on gathering sizes. Whiteside said this is

a good alternative for students to continue to give back to the community.

Connolly, 17, said she wants to help others such as close relatives during the pandemic and stringent lockdown measures, as she's seen them struggling to get by amid the lockdown.

"I did this at first because it sounded interesting and I wanted to help people out, and I want to keep doing that," she said.

Stevenson said it's the community she cares deeply about and hopes to

help as many people as possible with the cash.

"I can get masks and hand sanitizer easily, but not everyone can do that, so I want to keep people safe," she said.

Stevenson would like to help her family, who live in Winnipeg separately from her, in the upcoming year.

Chartier and Whiteside decided on the 20 families who will be recipients of care packages and they have already been shipped out to families as of last week.

• Winpak (\$669,000) – committed to supply Manitoba with 100,000 face shields;

• Icon Technologies Ltd. (\$498,000) – producing 60,000 face shields; and

• Deasil Custom Sewing (\$412,000) – manufacturing 41,000 reusable gowns.

"The government of Manitoba's decision to procure PPE locally has



enabled Precision ADM to create 80 new jobs, innovate and manufacture domestically when international sources were not available, shipments were stopped at our borders or materials did not meet Canadian health standards," said Martin Petrak, president and CEO, Precision ADM Inc. "We've been able to create, develop and deliver different types of equipment, including the CANSWAB testing device, the Precision AIR medical reusable respirator and medical procedure masks, which are being tested locally at the Orthopaedic Innovation Centre."

The Manitoba government will make it a priority to continue to work with local companies as the pandemic continues, the ministers said.

"Our company was created to bring a 'made-in-Manitoba' designed face and head shield to market. We've created a manufacturing and distribution operation that is now delivering shields to provincial distribution facilities," said Rob Ranson, president, Win-Shield Medical Devices Inc. "Tested by a group of front-line, Manitoba-based medical staff and physicians, the results showed the shield "met or exceeded all criteria," and it has already started to attract global attention as one of the best and most comfortable shields on the market." In total, Manitoba has secured more

than \$423 million of personal protective equipment. The ministers noted the partnerships with local businesses have been crucial in the work to care for Manitobans during the pandemic.

"Front-line staff require highquality personal protective equipment to ensure they and their patients are safe in our health-care ac. facilities," said Friesen. "Our government is grateful for the hard work and dedication of so many Manitoba companies who stepped up to help their it fellow citizens during this difficult al time."

New treatment plant supports a growing city and region

When the City of Selkirk broke ground for its new wastewater treatment plant in 2018, the council of the day was certain of a couple of things - first, it was making a decision that would impact citizens, and the environment, for decades to come, and second, they had better get it right.

We're only a little more than two years from that date in August, but early indications are they're succeeding on point number two.

Chief Administrative Officer Duane Nicol says the \$30-plus million plant is state of the art and will treat effluent to a higher standard than provincial regulations. It can handle Selkirk's present day population and up to 11,000 more from day one.

"The city's new wastewater treatment plant has been designed to meet our needs today as well as into the future," Nicol said.

"Selkirk's population could more than double and the new plant could handle it. Our vision is to be a regional service provider and we're prepared for that as well."

The city's old plant was built in 1976 and does not meet current provincial regulations that require treated wastewater, or effluent, to contain no more than 1mg/L of phosphorus and 15 mg/L of nitrogen.

The new plant's Membrane-Bioreactor Treatment process, which provides

the best environmental protection for the Red River and Lake Winnipeg, will produce an exceptionally high quality of effluent, so if regulations change in years to come, the city will still likely meet the standards without costly retrofits or new construction.

The plant provides a level of security for citizens that Selkirk won't find itself in a situation similar to the City of Winnipeg, whose north end treatment plant is in need of upgrades for compliance that are stalled as the city and province disagree on an interim phosphorus removal plan.

Raven Sharma, Selkirk's Utilities Manager, said the city's new plant should be operational by summer of 2021, and she, along with the rest of the team, is excited to be part of such a monumental project.

"I can speak for my utility team and I that the new Selkirk wastewater plant is using innovative technology that will open the doors to be able to accept wastewater from other communities to come," Sharma said.

"The utility team and I are prepared and very dedicated to our responsibilities in treating water and wastewater. We will be very busy in the next couple of months commissioning and fine tuning the new wastewater plant." The plant is designed in a way that

expansion, when it's required, can be done easily and economically.

It's purposely been built to its morethan-sufficient size, Nicol said, to keep operation costs as low as possible today, but the design has tomorrow's needs in mind and the internal infrastructure is there to be tapped into.

"With the capacity we have now we can provide cost-effective service to neighbours today as well as grow our city. Beyond the current capacity we designed the plant so it can easily be expanded, at a very low relative cost," Nicol said.

"We can add 50 per cent capacity to the plant with very minimal investment into the plant the day after it opens if we needed to."

The plant makes use of two sets of membrane filtration cartridge units, each capable of handling 6,000,000 litres per day for a total of 12,000,000 litres per day. Nicol said when growth surpasses 11,000 beyond the city's current population, it's a quick fix for the city.

"We have space for a third set built and ready to go, all you have to do is drop the cartridges in. That's about a \$1 million investment. But all we have to do is drop it in and that adds 50 per cent more capacity just like that. We

Soil moisture normal in MB

Manitoba's fall freeze-up hopefully bodes well for flood season next spring.

Manitoba Infrastructure's Hydrologic Forecast Centre has released the 2020 Fall Conditions Report that indicates soil moisture levels before freeze-up were normal to below normal in most Manitoba basins.

"The 2020 Fall Conditions Report describes the hydrologic conditions of Manitoba basins at the time of freezeup," explained Infrastructure Minister Ron Schuler last week. "Hydrologic and weather conditions in the winter and spring are the main factors that affect the risk and extent of high water events."

Due to minimal summer and fall precipitation, the soil moisture at freeze-up was normal to below normal for most of southern, central and western Manitoba basins, with the exception of the Little Saskatchewan River basin and in areas close to Brandon where the soil moisture is normal to above normal. Northern Manitoba basins, including the Saskatchewan and Churchill river basins, have normal to above normal soil moisture.

The minister noted another factor affecting potential spring high water events is the base flow in rivers and the water levels on lakes prior to freeze-up. Base flow is a portion of the stream flow that is not from surface run-off; it is water from the ground, flowing into the river channel over a period of time. Base flows on most rivers are normal to below normal for this time of the year, with the exception of northern Manitoba rivers, where base flows are well above normal to record high.

Environment and Climate Change Canada's December long-term precipitation forecast indicates precipitation will be normal to above normal from December to February for most of Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The National Weather Service (NWS) Climate Prediction Center's outlook indicates above normal precipitation within the U.S. portion of the Red and Souris river basins from December to March.

"We will continue to monitor watershed conditions closely and will release spring flood outlooks through the winter as required," said Schuler.

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Honoring golfer beyond the green

Lifelong member and player awarded post-mortem distinction

Golf Manitoba has inducted Brian Gilhuly into their Hall of Fame as part of their 2020 class.

Gilhuly, who passed away in 2017 at the age of 77, was not only an active member of Golf Manitoba and the Selkirk Golf & Country Club but also volunteered his time in the community ingraining his legacy for years to come.

Chad Krut, president of the Selkirk Golf & Country Club, said Gilhuly was more than just a member of the club.

"He kind of held every position at the golf course other than president," he said of Gihuly's dedication.

A life-long resident of Selkirk, Gilhuly grew up and went on to live just a few yards down from the clubhouse until his death. An accountant by trade, Gihuly took the position of treasurer at the club after retiring from his day job.

"He was always more on the frugal and cautious side and always looking at expenses and everything else like that," Krut joked.

While keeping the finances of the club at the top of mind, Gihuly was generous with his own money. Donations in his name for the amounts of \$100,000 went to both the country club and the Golf Manitoba Scholarship Fund.

"He was a very good member for a lot of years and cared very deeply about the golf course," Krut said. John Drzystek, a friend of Gihuly's and fellow board member of the club, said the induction into the hall of fame comes as no surprise.

"When he and I were on the board together, I just saw the passion and the absolute dedication he had to making our place a better place and to make sure that we made good financial decisions," he said. "The Selkirk Golf and Country Club is a much better place because of the countless hours of work and expertise that he brought in."

Drzystek and Gilhuly were part of a group that made annual trips to the U.S. to play on and later rank golf courses. Gilhuly ranked over 300 courses between Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario in his lifetime.

His involvement in community sporting events did not go unnoticed, with being awarded an Order of Sport Excellence by the province and the Distinguished Service Award from Golf Manitoba in 2010.

When he wasn't immersing himself in golf, he could still be found mulling around the clubhouse helping with whatever he could. This often included checking in with office manager Rosey Martin on a regular basis.

"I've been told my records are impeccable, and I always say that's because I was taught by the best," she said of Gilhuly. "He taught me so much; he was was not only my employer, he was also my mentor and my friend."

The money donated on Gilhuly's behalf to the country club will be used towards general improvements for the golf course, including a dedicated hole in his name. The donation to the Golf Manitoba Scholarship Fund will be used to further help young players improve their game while financially supporting them. Krut said he will always remember Gihuly as straightforward in business and life, with a kind heart.

"He certainly set a legacy at the golf course," he said. "He was always thinking what's best for this place, and I think that's an important thing that I've tried to carry on and will continue to do so just like he did."
