"We saw a picture of [Snoopy and his dog house] and so we decided to see if we could recreate it. And it just seemed to turn out pretty good," he said.


He said it was nice to cheer up the neighbourhood and that they got some compliments when carving the sculpture.

Local group's snowmobile ride has raised funds to support those with Huntington disease for a decade

The HD 500 celebrated its ten year anniversary of raising funds to support people with Huntington disease last week. The snowmobile ride has attendees travel a 500km long trek in the region while having fun and supporting a good cause.

"[The HD 500 is] a ride from Lockport to the Bird Lake area. It returns the next day, so it's a two day ride. They go through Pine Falls on the way up and they have lunch there. They stay at the Nopiming Lodge, most of them, some of them in their own cabins, as well. Then the riders ride back the next day travelling almost 500 kilometers," said Vern Barrett, president of the Manitoba chapter of the Huntington Society of Canada.

The idea for the ride came from the experience of Lloyd Mitchell who passed away from Huntington disease in 2009. He worked for Bombardier for about twenty years and one of the most enjoyable experiences he had there was being a mechanic on the Ski-doo team for the I-500 Power Toboggan Race from Winnipeg to Minneapolis. His son Brett Mitchell, who residents might recognize as owner of *The Selkirk Record* and Selkirk's 2021 Citizen of the Year, was inspired by this.

"Brett remembered that as a young fellow and wanted to emulate that in memory of his father. So, he put together a 500 kilometer ride," said Barrett.

Huntington disease is a hereditary, neurodegenerative illness with physical, cognitive and emotional symptoms. People with the disease typically start showing symptoms from ages 35 to 55 and, though there is no cure for the disease, there are medicines that reduce some symptoms.

The first HD 500 took place in 2014 and was a definite challenge for both riders and organizers. The first night of the ride temperatures dipped down to -50C. When the forecast came out many registered riders pulled out of the run.

Five riders were brave enough to give it a shot though two decided to turn back at Pine Falls. This meant that three riders ended up completing the run that first year.

Despite the difficult weather, the ride still managed to put \$2500 in the bank for Huntington care and research.

Now ten years later the group has grown to an average of about 25 riders a year and so far, with help from sponsors Waste Connections of Canada, Steeltown Ford & Harley Davidson Winnipeg, Boyd Auto body & Glass, Westside Honda, Nopiming Lodge, and *The Selkirk Record*, have managed to raise close to \$350,000.

This year, retired City of Winnipeg Fire Fighter Jay McIsaacm came to the run to share his experience with Huntington's disease.

He spoke about how the disease has affected his life after inheriting the condition from his mother.

"[Around when my mom was about 35 to 40] she would sit there and her fingers would be tapping. She wasn't tapping to a song. They were tapping to their own thing," said McIsaacm. From there, his mother's disease

From there, his mother's disease progressed and she passed away from Huntington's.

McIsaacm made the decision to be tested to see if he had the disease in his twenties. When the results came in with his positive diagnosis he didn't yet have symptoms but it still impacted many aspects of his life and his future planning.

"It's a really heavy disease. The weight of it is real. I know that it's just a matter of time and I've completely accepted that and I'm just trying to make good happen with the time that I have left," he said.

This year's HD 500 proves that residents in our region want to support those with Huntington disease. From its chilly beginnings, the ride has in-



creased to over 40 riders this year.

"I think it resonates with people that the Huntington community needs support," said Barrett.

"They look forward to it every year. And there's a lot of camaraderie and a lot of good times and memories that have come out of this as well. It's just a great group of people," he said.

# *The Selkirk Record* Thursday, February 23, 2023 **5** Environmentalist teaches library patrons how they can help create pollinator habitats

Wendy Buelow stopped by the Gaynor Family Regional Library's Circle of Friends program last Friday to chat about native plants, creating habitats for pollinators and local and national resources that people can use to further their knowledge.

Buelow introduced herself as a videographer who worked for CBC News for many years. Locally, she has been involved with videography for Holiday Alley. She says she is not a master gardener or a butterfly expert but came to have a passion for native plants and pollinators by way of her interest in bird watching.

"What do birds need? They need caterpillars to feed their young because they can't feed hard little seeds to baby birds. They need soft little caterpillars and caterpillars need plants and trees to live on and the ones that the insects use are mostly native plants. It's all part of the food web and local birds, insects and other wildlife have evolved with plants for thousands and thousands of years," she said.

Buelow explained that the insects often need a specialized plant to lay eggs on. The famous example is monarch butterflies and milkweed but all sorts of native plants are important.

Starting from that perspective, she continued to learn about native plants from local experts and eventually found out about the Butterflyway project which was initiated by the David Suzuki Foundation. She now volunteers with the program as a Butterflyway Ranger.

"It started in 2017 and it's basically volunteers all across Canada. You join up and we get education and support and resources," said Buelow.

"[We] go out into our communities, and get people to maybe plant in their own gardens, or possibly start a public park. So, I worked on public gardens, and I did a zoom webinar and got some people to join and so we've got a good enthusiastic community now in Dunnottar," said Buelow.

Dunnotar has achieved its Butterflyway status thanks to 15 gardens that have been established in the community. Some of the public gardens that can be viewed are the Artesian Well Garden and the Ponemah Garden.

The idea behind the project is that spaces that have native plants that are good for wildlife can be fragmented from each other. Also, residents own portions of land on their properties. If many people established areas for pollinator species, which they call pollinator patches, in their yards and communities, then the insects could hop around between the spaces.

Buelow then spoke about establishing native plant spaces. She says that your native plant garden doesn't have to be all native plants. In the spaces that she set up in Dunnottar she added Cosmos and Zinnias in the first year just to bring some colour to the spaces while the other plants established themselves.

"Another thing you can do with these gardens is you can actually help restore some rare plants like these from Prairie Originals, the Western Silvery Aster. It's a threatened plant and if we can grow them in our garden, why not?" she said.

One of Buelow's best tips for establishing a pollinator garden in your yard is to mark out the area in some way or to put up a sign so that other people in the community know what you are doing. She said that especially in the first year of your new garden when not much is going on yet this can be helpful in letting people know what is happening.

She also said that there is no minimum or maximum size for your garden to be part of this project so it doesn't matter if you have a little space on a balcony or a large yard to devote to native plants, all are welcome.

She then spoke in depth about many of our local native plants that are both beautiful and useful for pollinators that can be incorporated into pollinator patches before encouraging attendees to add some native plants to their spaces.

"Humans need insects to survive. They don't need us, We need the pollinators," she said. To learn more

# St. Andrews family's Polish heritage inspires vodka infusions

St. Andrews business Baltic Brothers pays homage to Bernard Pacak's Polish culture and family roots while also winning awards and giving back.

"It's a beautiful culture to be a part of, and we want to showcase it to the world," Pacak said.

In 2018, Bernard along with his brother Martin Pacak and friend David Moskiewicz founded Baltic Brothers, which creates infused vodkas, known as nalewki in Polish.

Pacak's parents and brother moved from Poland to Canada in 1981, leaving through the Baltic Sea, which is the inspiration behind the name Baltic Brothers. The family first lived in Winnipeg and within a couple years moved out to St. Andrews.

The family would celebrate their Polish heritage in many ways, including through folk dance, food and traditions.

"Slavic culture is pretty amazing. It's more than just pierogies and kielbasa," Pacak said. "It's folklore. It's colour. It's everything — the embroidery, the stitchwork on the clothing. Everything has a meaning and purpose, and it's a beautiful thing."

Bernard and Martin's dad has always made nalewka (singular for nalewki) for Christmas, birthdays and other holidays.

In 2017, their dad served the drink to family at Christmas. A cousin who married into the family was so impressed with the taste, saying it was unlike anything he had ever tried.

This got Pacak and his family thinking about how more people could get a taste, leading to the launch of Baltic Brothers.

Before selling their own infused alcohol produced at Winnipeg's Capital K Distillery, Baltic Brothers first released dry infusion pouches that people could use to flavour their alcohol.

Each pouch is named after something important to their family or to Manitoba. For example, Pacak's uncle immigrated to Pine Falls from Poland in the 1950s, inspiring the name of the Pine Falls Gin.

Baltic Brothers follows the Pacak brother's great-grandfather's handwritten recipes, the same recipes that their dad uses.

"It's four generations of family flavours," Pacak said.

The original recipes use measurements like "scoops" and "handfuls," which the Baltic Brothers adapted to more standard units, even measuring the exact amount of their dad's handful of ingredients. This allowed them to consistently replicate the recipe on

### a bigger scale.

Pacak said his dad comes by for quality checks, making sure the recipes are on the right track.

"We're just the caretakers of the recipe. My dad is the one that kept it alive," Pacak said.

"That's why my mom and my dad's signatures are on the bottle because we wouldn't have Baltic Brothers, or the recipes, or the idea or anything without them."

Baltic Brothers have a range of infused vodka flavours, including the Manitoba Mule and Baltic Bison. The brand offers cocktail recipe suggestions on its website and social media.

The Bomba series of Baltic Brothers nalewki are the more "easygoing, sipping vodkas," Pacak said. His late mother would use the word bomba to describe the explosion of flavours you get from this style of drink.

When launching the Blueberry Lavender Lemonade Bomba, Baltic Brothers released a special Ukraineinspired label. Through proceeds from this bottle as well as a scarf featuring iconography representing Ukraine and Canada, Baltic Brothers raised more than \$10,000 that supported newly arrived Ukrainians in Manitoba.

"Not too long ago, what's happening in Ukraine happened to Poland," Pacak said. "It's an extreme stress to go through anything like that, and to be able to support a fellow country or somebody so close to your roots is just the thing you have to do."

A couple flavours from the Bomba series have won notable awards. The Honeyberry (haskip) Bomba recently won best in class at the 2022 Canadian Artisan Spirit awards. The Sour Cherry Bomba, or wiśniówka (sour cherry vodka in Polish), won gold at the San Fransico World Spirits Competition in 2022.

"Wiśniówka to Poland is like as traditional and cultural as it can get," Pacak said. "Every family has their own version, their own recipe, their own nuance to it. So this is ours."

From following family recipes to incorporating Polish culture into the design of labels, Pacak said Baltic Brothers is ultimately a way to celebrate his family's past and share about the diversity of Slavic culture.

"Every culture is so unique and so fun," he said. "It brings to the forefront how important it is to keep yourself rooted in your traditions and culture, but always with an eye on the future and how you can preserve and protect these gems [like nalewki]."

# Selkirk RCMP searching for three suspects following shooting

At approximately 11:45 p.m. on Feb. 17, Selkirk RCMP responded to a report that a male had been shot at a residence on Britannia Close.

Upon arrival, officers located a 28-year-old male outside of the residence who had been shot as well as an injured 26-year-old male who had been assaulted with an object. Both males were transported to hospital.


The investigation has determined that three suspects had forcibly entered the home but were pushed out by the residents. Once outside of the home, one of the suspects shot the 28-year-old male victim who was one of the residents.

All three suspects fled in a vehicle prior to officers arriving on scene. The vehicle is described as a dark blue or black, two-door, Chevrolet Cobalt.

The RCMP believe this was a targeted attack and that the suspects and victims are known to each other.

The suspects have been identified and all have warrants for their arrest in relation to this incident.



# **Province discontinues COVID vaccine app and card**

Another significant number of Manitobans died from COVID in the second week of February, along with an increase in hospitalizations, according to the provincial government's respiratory surveillance report for Feb. 5-11 (reporting Week 6).

Seventeen people died from COVID in Week 6. The previous week's report showed 11 deaths.

Manitoba's COVID death toll was 2,439 as of Feb. 4, according to the federal government's COVID webpage, and Canada's death toll is now 50,863.

There were 61 new COVID hospitalizations, with eight intensive care admissions, according to the differences in severe outcomes between weeks 5 and 6. There were 53 people hospitalized with 10 ICU admissions reported the previous week.

There were 108 new COVID infections detected by PCR testing in Week 6, an increase of 43 cases over the 65 reported the previous week. Provincial data are an undercount of the true number of cases as the government restricts PCR testing and rapid antigen tests aren't tracked.

The provincial government no longer provides in its surveillance reports the names of personal care homes and hospitals experiencing COVID outbreaks


Wastewater surveillance data for COVID for Winnipeg and Brandon up to the end of Feb. 7 showed sustained activity.

The Week 6 report shows nine new cases of influenza A, one hospitalization and no new deaths.

There were 64 new respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) cases reported in Week 6, down 11 cases from the 75 reported the week before.

### Other health news:

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority declared on Feb. 10 a gastrointestinal outbreak at the Teulon hospital. Gastrointestinal outbreaks at the Selkirk Betel Personal

Iceland, Australia, parts of Africa and South America are currently seeing an increase in the number of COVID deaths while Canada is showing limited change.

Care Home (declared Jan. 31) and at the Ashern Personal Care Home (declared Feb. 6) continue, according to the IERHA's outbreaks webpage (viewed Feb. 17).

-The provincial government is scrapping the COVID vaccine verifier app and is no longer issuing physical vaccine cards, according to an announcement it made in COVID-19 Bulletin #589 of Feb. 10.

A spokesperson for the government said by email the changes come as the province moves out of the pandemic.

"As Manitoba transitions out of the pandemic, many of the related public health measures are no longer necessary. Manitoba's proof of vaccination requirement expired in March 2022 and with it the need for a verifier app. Neither measure was intended to be permanent," said the spokesperson.

The immunization card app is not being discontinued and it will be updated, said the spokesperson.

But it, along with the verifier app, have been removed from Google Play and Apple stores, states the bulletin.

"While Manitoba QR code access will no longer be available, Manitobans travelling abroad will continue to have access to their pan-Canadian proof of vaccination through the app and COVID-19 immunization information can continue to be updated," said the spokesperson.

When asked if Manitobans might have to pay out-of-pocket for COVID vaccines in the future – in the United States people will soon have to pay for the vaccines - the spokesperson didn't say.

"Manitoba continues to offer CO-VID-19 vaccinations free of charge," said the spokesperson.

-The World Health Organization says the COVID pandemic continues as countries see high numbers of new infections and deaths.

Worldwide, there were over 6.7 million new COVID infections and more than 64,000 new deaths reported over the period Jan. 16 to Feb. 12, according to the WHO's epidemiological report published Feb. 15.

In total there have been over 755 million confirmed COVID cases reported globally and over 6.8 million deaths from the virus as of Feb. 12.

### Multi-denomination service invites all residents

Everyone is invited to the 2023 World Day of Prayer service that will be hosted on March 3 at Notre Dame Catholic Church this year.

"It's an ecumenical service that is put on once a year and different churches within the area take turns in hosting it," said Pat Ward a representative from the Notre Dame Catholic Women's League.

The origins of this day go back to the 19th century when Christian women of the United States and Canada initiated a variety of cooperative activities in support of women's involvement in missions at home and in other parts of the world. After the first World War, there was a renewed call for world peace and in 1926 a worship service was distributed to as many countries and partners in mission as they could.

Now, World Day of Prayer has evolved to be a movement led by Christian women who welcome people to join in prayer and action for peace and justice.

This year the service was created by the World Day of Prayer Committee of Taiwan and the theme is 'I have heard about your faith'.

"It's a service like an order of worship, where we'll have a number of the ladies from the different churches, doing readings and I also have a young girl from our church that's doing all the music, and hymns," said Ward.

There will also be a display with items from Taiwan so that residents can learn more about the culture that

the service is originating from.

As part of this service, residents will also have the opportunity to donate to the World Day of Prayer organization which supports many different groups worldwide.

Donations in 2021/22 in Manitoba went to Dignity House in Winnipeg. Dignity House is an organization that provides transitional shelter for victims of sexual exploitation. Elsewhere, grants were given to many other groups including the Talitha Houm Society in British Columbia, which is an employment readiness lab for women, a group in India received funds to help train women farmers in food security and, in Guatemala, grant funding was given to help a midwife training program with COVID protocols.

"Last year, a total of \$60,000 was sent out," said Ward.

After the service residents will be able to stay and enjoy a light snack including coffee and tea and food from Taiwan.

"One that was mentioned to us that is a favourite [dessert from Taiwan] is a pineapple cake. So, one of the ladies is going to make a couple of those and some of the others will make other desserts," said Ward.

"I feel it's very spiritual and very uplifting and it's just so inspiring that





any further information, including details of the allegations, until the examinations are complete and the public report is released.

### Manitoba government announces ice-jam mitigation scheduled on Red River

The Manitoba government's yearly ice-cutting program will begin next week on the Red River to reduce the potential impacts for ice-jam flooding, Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Doyle Piwniuk announced Monday.

"Our government is remaining vigilant by implementing the ice-jam mitigation program in order to protect Manitobans in the chance of flooding due to ice jamming," said Piwniuk. "As part of the mitigation strategy, the Manitoba government is committed to further advancing preparedness solutions including ice-cutting operations in the province."

The ice-jam mitigation program, which consists of cutting and breaking river ice, was launched in 2006 to reduce the risk of flooding caused by ice jams on the lower Red River and several other rivers. Ice jams form when floating ice is blocked from moving downstream, forcing water to back up and overflow riverbanks.

Remote controlled ice-cutting units and three Amphibex icebreakers are used each year to cut and break approximately 28 kilometres of ice on the Red River from Selkirk to Netley Marsh for an approximate width of 100 metres. Ice-cutting and breaking operations are also often undertaken on the Icelandic River at Riverton and at the outlet of the Portage Diversion. Currently, ice-cutting operations are

also planned on the Icelandic River in mid to late March, but are not expected to be required at the Portage Diversion. Conditions in the Assini-

boine River basin will continue to be monitored to determine whether icebreaking activities at the Portage Diversion become warranted.

Notices have been posted in areas where ice-cutting machines will be working. River users are advised as a safety reminder to stay off ice where notices are posted or where evidence of recent ice cutting is apparent. Ice fishers are also reminded to remove huts or other materials in areas covered by the ice-jam mitigation program.

The icebreaking and ice-cutting equipment is operated and maintained by Winnipeg Environmental Remediations Inc., a Manitoba company that provides comprehensive environmental services, general contracting and civil earthworks.



The gym should be rockin'.





### Kale and Kimchi "Fried" Rice

- 1 cup kale, chopped
- 1/4 cup kimchi, chopped
- 1 teaspoon soy sauce

1 egg, lightly beaten

Heat rice according to package directions.

In medium microwave-safe bowl, combine kale, kimchi and soy sauce. Cover and microwave 1 minute.

Add rice and egg; mix well to combine. Cover and microwave 30 seconds. Stir and serve.

Serving Suggestions: Drizzle with sesame oil. Add cooked shrimp.



### Ask the Money Lady

Dear Money Lady: I am planning to buy a home with my new partner, and I have the money for the down payment or more. My boyfriend Mike has no savings but has the income to get the mortgage. I am currently working part-time, but I don't make enough to pay the mortgage payment. We each have adult kids from previous marriages. Can you tell me what is the best thing to do? Maryanne.

Dear Maryanne, I am so glad to share your question with our Canadian readers because this is a common event with older couples, especially those divorced and now wanting to start a new life with someone else. I have seen this before where one partner may be asset rich – meaning they have the savings, but they do not earn much, and the other partner may not have the savings but earn a larger income. When you go into the banks, they are only interested in facilitating the transaction of setting up a new mortgage, however without a clear division of the asset, if you were to split in the future, there are a lot of grey areas. Also, the partner who makes more money most likely would end up paying more towards the monthly expenses which could be a problem over time.

The other reason I would want you to clearly define your new asset together is in the event of a death. What happens if the adult children of the deceased force the sale of the home to capture their inheritance? And, if you were to separate, would you sell the property and split the proceeds equally? What if one partner wants to stay and the other wants to sell? The best solution is a collateral charge. Let me explain why you want this type of product instead of a standard mortgage.

With a collateral charge you can capture 100% of the value of the residence, (I know you don't require that much equity, but stay with me and I will explain why you want it). A collateral charge also has no term or renewal so once you get approved for it you can keep it for the next thirty years if you like, even with a zero balance; always available to you in the future if needed. The other reason I would recommend this product is that you can clearly define the percentage of ownership and if needed, a collateral charge can be split into multiple segments to be used for investments, business loans, helping family, etc., (with most segments being setup as tax write offs on the interest of individual segments).

In your situation Maryanne, I would suggest you split the cost of the purchase 50/50. You put down as much as you can on your 50% ownership

and then setup a segment for your remaining amount owing. If you have enough for the full 50% ownership, then I would suggest you put it all down, so you do not have a loan payment. Mike would have a segment for the remaining 50% and have a monthly payment that he would be responsible for. Each segment will be labelled with your names and clearly defined; however, title will be registered equally under the full collateral charge. If Maryanne were to put down the full 50%, she could now have the 50% available credit in the equity of the collateral charge should she need this in the future. I would suggest Mike take out separate life and disability insurance on his loan so that if he were to die, the debt would be paid out. Better still, it is best if you both have additional life insurance naming each as beneficiaries. By doing this, you will eliminate a forced sale if one were to die, allowing the surviving partner enough funds to pay out half of the value of the property to their partner's estate and continue living in the property debt free. With the collateral charge now free and clear with no debt, the surviving spouse does not have to worry about qualifying for a future loan and can have access to credit should an emergency arise. Remember, the collateral charge has no term or renewal and is not a mortgage. Once you get it setup you are free to use it as you please, changing segments, paying it off, drawing it down again or leaving it for years with a zero balance. You can even switch it to interest only payments if needed. 


