Two local groups made it as finalists in the Caring for Our Watershed 2023 competition. Ava Fernandes, Olari Wachukwu, and Emma Weiss took home sixth place for their Planting Hope project and Courtney Soltys took home the second place spot for her I Beg your Garden project.

"The Caring for our Watersheds program asks students in grades seven to 12 to submit a proposal that answers the question, 'What can you do to help improve your watershed?' Students must research their local watershed identify a concern and then draft a written proposal containing one realistic sustainable solution," said Megan Allen, program coordinator for the Manitoba Caring for our Watersheds competition.

This competition is sponsored by Nutrien and started in Alberta in 2007. Three years later the competition came to Manitoba and students from Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary School (LSRCSS) have been participating for most of that time.

"There's a wide variety of different proposals that students have come up with over the years. It doesn't have to be a huge change just as long as it's something that does contribute to improving the watershed in some way," said LSRCSS teacher Magda Kuber.

After submitting their proposals, Soltys from LSRCSS and Fernandes, Wachukwu, and Weiss from Lockport School then presented their projects to a panel of judges in the finals.

The students found out about their wins on April 22 an especially significant day as it is also Earth Day.

Soltys's project I Beg your Garden is a project that aims to reduce the trash pollutants from our shopping. The idea is that if people grow their own food in their own gardens then the food doesn't come with plastic packaging or any ties or bands.

"My project is creating small home gardening kits to provide to people in Selkirk, to be able to help reduce some of the plastic waste coming from things from the store so that people can feel good about what they're eating because it comes from their own backyard," said Soltys.

The kits will have a three item tool set, six packages of vegetable seeds, one package of native wildflower seeds to attract pollinators, biodegradable peat plant pots, and instructions.

Along with winning cash prizes, both teams will have their projects funded.

Soltys plans to set up an Instagram page once she receives her funding in order to distribute kits and then is also hoping to distribute them at a local Earth Day celebration next year.

She encourages other students to give the Caring for our Watersheds competition a go in the future.

"I had a lot of fun with it, although it is a lot of work to have to do all the research and then the oral presentation afterwards. But, it is

a great opportunity to get your idea out into the world and have it funded. I think that more students should know about it because this is my first time hearing about it and I would have done it maybe last year if I had the chance," said Soltys.

The group of three from Lockport School also had fun creating their



Planting Hope project. The idea behind their effort is that they are planning to use and expand the garden space at their school and then plant it with edible plants.

"We're going to donate the food that we grow to the Selkirk Food Bank, and then keep a little bit of it for the Home Ec. classroom to teach people how to use the healthy foods," said Fernandez.

Because this project will take place over the summer the group will be going back to school regularly to maintain the garden.

"We're going to be growing tomatoes, potatoes and carrots, which are our main three but we're also growing herbs and different flowers," said Weiss.

So far they have already started to plant some of their vegetables in small pots inside their classroom and then they will transfer them outside when it's warm enough outside.

The group also encourages other students to participate in this competition in the future.

"Put in your application, just to see if you could think of an idea that will actually help the watershed and even the community too," said Wachukwu.



The Selkirk Record Thursday, May 4, 2023 5 Ways to be safer after contamination leads to hospitalizations

Local clean up to take place on May 11

After recent reports of contaminated substances causing people to end up in the hospital in The Pas, local Manitoba Harm Reduction Network, Network Coordinator in Selkirk Tristan Dreilich hopes to spread information about safety measures that could reduce the risk of something like this happening again.

"When we talk about contaminated drugs, typically we're referring to what is commonly known as the illicit drug supply. Those are drugs that are largely unregulated or obtained in fashions that would work around regulation. Drugs that have been criminalized often. And so, when we say tainted, what we really mean is, folks don't have, either the ability or the knowledge, of what's in their substances because there is no oversight," said Dreilich.

He explains the situation as similar to what happened with alcohol when prohibition was in effect. At that time, people were being harmed by ingesting moonshine or bathtub gin because it was being made in an unregulated way meaning that the product wasn't always created properly or to the same strength. Now that alcohol is regulated it's labelled in a way that allows residents to know exactly what is in a bottle they purchase.

"Often, what's been happening lately is that fentanyl is being introduced into drugs that people wouldn't expect," said Dreilich.

Xylazine is also making its way into the drug supply, according to what Dreilich is hearing. Unlike fentanyl, which is responsive to naloxone, xylazine is not and has other properties that increase risks when mixed with substances.

In the recent incident in The Pas, reports indicate that MDMA also known as ecstasy or Molly was contaminated.

"For the most part, it would be odd to introduce something like fentanyl to it, but that's what's happened. There's probably a variety of reasons for that but what happens then

is folks purchase MDMA expecting to consume only MDMA. When you introduce fentanyl to the mix there's both a lack of tolerance and a lack of knowledge around the fentanyl. So, an overdose becomes a very quick reality," explained Dreilich

He recommends that residents check out www.safersites.ca which issues drug alerts when new substances are suspected of being contaminated.

"Manitoba is currently not keeping great data, or at least releasing great data on the overdose death rates in Manitoba but we know from past years that those figures are climbing. So, there's increasing evidence that both the supply of substances is becoming more risky and that our response to those risky supplies needs to be even more comprehensive, and we're not meeting the need right now is what I would say," said Dreilich.

Though the situation is troubling, there are ways that those who are taking substances can use practises to try to avoid these types of poisonings.

"This is exactly what Harm Reduction asks, is, 'What can we do to keep people safe?' There're some very core things that folks can do if they're engaging in substance use. We have to recognize that folks are not going to stop using substances, often, just because there's a risk out there," said Dreilich.

His first tip is to not use substances alone and to stagger use if possible. This way if something does go wrong there is someone there who can contact an ambulance and administer help right away.

Dreilich says that the knowledge that he's sharing comes from the people who use substances also called peers by the MHRN.

"The folks who have been criminalized and kind of marginalized, because of the drugs they use, have always had to rely on each other to keep each other safe. So, I'm sharing outwardly some of the knowledge that that we benefit from, from them," he said.

He also recommends carrying naloxone kits which can reverse some but not all drug poisonings or overdoses.

"If folks aren't trained in Naloxone, or need access to Naloxone, that's something that the Network helps out with. I offer that training for free,' said Dreilich.

He also says that people can start low and slow with substances so that if they have an adverse reaction the hope is that they are not too far into a dangerous position.

Finally, there are some options for testing substances to ensure that the substance is what it is meant to be. "We have fentanyl testing strips, for

example, that we offer for free here at the MHRN and that's able to tell folks yes or no if fentanyl is present in their substance. There are some more robust drug checking tests that can be done. They take a little bit more [And time. it

to being able to ship your substances off through getyourdrugstested.com. They can do a full exam to tell you exactly what is in that substance," said Dreilich.

As for people that don't use substances but want to support harm reduction in our community Dreilich suggests listening to the peers in our community. He says that they are experts in their experiences from how policy changes affect them, to the harms of an unsafe drug supply, to unstable housing.

"If we don't involve them from the start, the whole thing is not going to turn out the way we want it to," he said.

There will also be a Harm Reduction Community Clean Up hosted by the MHRN at 1 p.m. on May 11 at the Selkirk Friendship Centre.

This clean-up is open to all residents in the community and clean-up equipment will be provided.

After the clean up the participants will regroup at the Friendship Centre

and information and services will be available including naloxone training, medicine teachings, and refreshments.

Dreilich asks that residents give him a heads up if they are planning to attend the clean-up event so that he has enough clean-up equipment on hand for all also if you have any questions about harm reduction resources in our community contact him at tristan@ mhrn.ca or call 204-785-7501.

"We're going to have some fun. It's going to be an accessible way to learn about harm reduction. RCMP seize weapons from vehicle on Main St.

A traffic stop was initiated by the officer. When the officer went to present the written warning for not having the lights on, the officer noticed open alcohol in the vehicle, and at that time, a search was initiated.

A search of the vehicle revealed a sawed off rifle and pepper spray.

The driver of the vehicle, a 40-yearold female from Selkirk, received the written warning in relation to the lights. A rear passenger, 38, from Selkirk, was taken into custody and charged with Possession of Firearm Contrary to Order x3 and Unauthorized Possession of a Firearm. He remains in custody.

Even if you've seen the group before McLean says that you'll enjoy a repeat performance as every show is a little different since they have a vast repertoire and different performers do the solo pieces.

McLean says that the group has con-


tinued to perform all of these years because it's great fun for everyone involved.

East St. Paul, Birds Hill included on routes

A new cycling group has the goal of helping older women become more comfortable riding their bikes.

"Maybe they only ride around their neighbourhood. They don't feel comfortable maybe getting out onto a trail by themselves. Maybe they think they're too slow," said group leader Sarah Gravelle-MacKenzie. "It's identifying and looking at the barriers that senior women face to cycle."

The new group is called Cycling with Sarah. Through this, Gravelle-MacKenzie will offer group rides for women 55 and older. Some of the rides will take place in East St. Paul and Birds Hill.

"There's nothing better than getting on your bike," said 68-year-old Gravelle-MacKenzie. "It's so good for us as we get older because it's easy on our joints. And there are just so many health benefits — social, mental health, cognitive — it's sort of the perfect exercise for senior women."

Gravelle-MacKenzie is launching Cycling with Sarah after becoming an ambassador for Liv Cycling, a cycling brand dedicated to women. The group is supported by Bikes and Beyond in Winnipeg.

Cycling with Sarah will officially launch with an event at Bikes and Beyond on May 10, starting at 1 p.m. There will be door prizes and in-store promotions, and people can bring their bikes in for a mechanic to check it to make sure it's ready to ride.

At the event, Gravelle-MacKenzie will give more details about the upcoming rides, and registration for Cycling with Sarah will open on May 11. The group rides will be on a firstcome, first-served basis. There will also be three trial rides over the summer for women interested in trying out Cycling with Sarah before committing to a group ride. Monthly group rides will take place on Thursdays starting in June.

Cycling with Sarah is free to join, but those successful in getting a spot on a group ride must purchase a general non-racing membership from the Manitoba Cycling Association (MCA) for \$65 plus taxes and fees. This provides insurance and allows the cyclist to participate in the social rides that the MCA puts on.

A maximum of six will be in each group. Rose McDonald will be the ride sweep, the cyclist at the back who ensures everyone stays riding together.

Gravelle-MacKenzie said she's hoping to attract beginner and intermediate riders. People don't need a particular kind of bicycle to join, as long as their bike is in good working order.

The rides will be about 45 minutes to an hour to start, which equals about 15 to 20 kilometres.

"The pace will be a social pace. It's not going to be a fast, hard pace," Gravelle-MacKenzie said. "It's just to build women's confidence and get them back to just the simple joy of riding a bike."

The group will also stay on bike trails with hard-packed gravel rather than rough paths.

"I'm trying to eliminate any barriers for women," she said. "I want people

to feel comfortable coming out."

Through Cycling with Sarah, Gravelle-MacKenzie also plans to run bike maintenance workshops out of Bikes and Beyond to teach basic skills, such as checking tire pressure, lubricating a bike chain and adjusting your seat.

Gravelle-MacKenzie said she'd like to find someone interested in leading rides in Selkirk as part of Cycling with Sarah to further expand the program's reach. She would coordinate the rides, complete administration work and be available to come out to Selkirk to help set up the rides.

While cycling is a big part of her life now, Gravelle-MacKenzie only got into it six years ago when she retired. Before she started cycling, she'd heard people talk about the "runner's high," a concept she didn't understand at the time. But now, she says that's what cycling offers her.

"I feel so strong. I feel so positive," she said. "I can feel stressed out and things are weighing on me, and I'll jump on my bike, and I'll go off for three hours, four hours on my bike, and when I come back, I sort of resolve what was weighing on my mind, and I just feel ready to conquer the world again."

Within a year of starting to cycle, she was riding 30 to 40 kilometres at a time, working her way up to 70 to 80 kilometres and eventually 100 kilometres.

"I could not believe I had [rode 100 kilometres]," she said. "I just sort of plugged along and slowly got better and could go further, and it just sort of took hold, and I had goals I wanted to reach, so I just want to share that passion with women."

Gravelle-MacKenzie has arthritis and wears a knee brace, something she says illustrates how approachable cycling can be and something that can help her relate to other older riders.

"It's become such a passion. I didn't expect it to become such a positive thing in my life," she said. "My fitness and everything has improved."

Gravelle-MacKenzie shares about her cycling journey on her Instagram page @cyclingwithsarah. People interested in attending the Cycling with Sarah launch event, or those who can't make it but would like more information about the group, can email her at cyclingwithsarah@gmail.com.

"I know how I felt when I was trying to find a group, and I couldn't find a group. I want to be that group for women who want to try it without the pressure of having to have a certain ability or a certain type of bike," Gravelle-MacKenzie said. "I want people to start where they are and to grow and develop and have fun."

The notion that "timing is everything" is applicable in many situations, perhaps none more so than on a couple's wedding day. Many couples spend months, if not years, planning their weddings in the hopes that all that hard work will ultimately result in a day they will cherish forever.

The sheer volume of things to do on a wedding day can make couples feel overwhelmed. Those feelings can be overcome by emphasizing timing on the day of the wedding. Wedding day timelines will differ depending on variables that are unique to each couple's wedding, but the following are some factors to consider as couples organize the big day.

Venue(s): The schedule couples adhere to on their wedding day will be greatly affected by their choice of venue. Does the venue have somewhere on premises for the couple and their party to get ready? Are the ceremony

and reception being held at the same venue? Before creating a timeline, consider the location of the ceremony and reception venue(s) and the accommodations each provides. Getting to and from multiple facilities won't be an issue if couples choose a multipurpose venue where they can get ready, tie the knot and dance the night away all in one place. Couples who will be moving from venue to venue throughout the day must build the time it takes them and their party to get about into their timelines.

· Wedding party: The size of the wedding party also bears consideration when planning a wedding day timeline. Large parties will require more time to get ready, and that should be factored into couples' timelines. Large

parties also may be harder to corral and transport from place to place, so couples should build some extra time into their timelines to account for that. Small wedding parties can be easier to manage, so couples with small parties may be able to begin their timelines a little later in the day than those with large wedding parties.

Weather: Weather is the most unpredictable variable couples need to plan for on their wedding days. As the wedding day approaches, couples can monitor the day's forecast and then make any necessary changes to account for inclement weather. Getting around in a rainstorm will likely take longer than moving about on a sunny day, so some minor tweaks to the timeline may be necessary if storms or another type of inclement weather is in the forecast.

Couples can access wedding day timeline templates on various web-

sites. But it's important that couples remember that their weddings are unique, so online guidelines might not be realistic. A careful consideration of a handful of variables specific to couples' weddings can help them craft timelines that make their big day go smoothly.

Cormier named a finalist for the CJHL Top Rookie Award

The Canadian Junior Hockey League announced last Wednesday the names of the five players that have been selected finalists for its Top Rookie Award in the 2022-23 campaign.

One of those players was Selkirk Steelers' forward Carter Cormier.

The excitement is building up in Selkirk as the Cheer Manitoba Provincials are set to take place this coming Saturday, May 6. With a kick off at 10 a.m., the city will be buzzing with energy and enthusiasm throughout the day.

Get ready to witness an incredible variety of cheerleading performances that showcase both individual skill and team coordination. From highflying stunts to perfectly synchronized dance moves these athletes are sure to leave you in awe.

With athletes ranging from ages five to over thirty and 58 routines to showcase, the cheerleading communities of Manitoba and neighbouring provinces will receive their spotlight this weekend through a schedule filled with routines of pom (performance cheer), scholastic cheer, and all-star cheer.

Cheerleading as a competitive sport, rather than something on the sidelines, has gained traction and popularity in recent years thanks to shows like Netflix's "Cheer" and the work of Cheer Manitoba. The sport may even be a part of the Olympic games in the future.

Twelve out of the 58 routines are brought to the provincials by Legacy Cheerleading, a program run out of Winnipeg. Rosser's Molly Beachell, a U12 level 2 member of the club, is looking forward very excitedly to competing this Saturday. Ten-yearold Beachell is currently in her second year of cheer, having discovered her love for it when a friend of hers

They prepare by practising together for a total of five and a half hours a week, learning their stunts and routines and then pulling it all together to practise in a "full out," which is a rehearsal of the full routine accompanied by music. 

Official Notice to Control Noxious Weeds SELKIRK WEED CONTROL DISTRICT City of Selkirk, Town of Winnipeg Beach, R.M. of St. Andrews, R.M. of St. Clements

As indicated in the Noxious Weeds Act of Manitoba, (S.3(1)) a person must destroy or control Noxious Weeds that are on land that the person owns or occupies. All residential, commercial, agricultural, and public lands are subject to this Act.

If weeds are not destroyed or controlled as per the laws and regulations of the Act, particularly on SUBDIVIDED but not fully developed land (S.20(1)), and on certain vacant or unoccupied land (S.19(4)), the Weed Control District may enter upon the land and destroy or control Noxious Weeds without further notice. The cost of weed control will be charged to the property owner through the tax rolls (S.27(1)). The Weed Inspector will make systematic inspections and will enforce the provisions of the Act. Noxious Weeds discovered to be present on the forementioned lands after May 26, 2023 will be destroyed or controlled by mowing, cultivating, or application of herbicide.

Each Municipality reserves the right to levy a service fee on the affected property's tax roll in addition to the cost of weed control incurred by the Weed District.






