

# Missing West St. Paul boy found safe in Ontario

The parents of a West St. Paul autistic teen who went missing last week were exhausted but relieved to have their son return home safely on Sunday.

Nicholas Read, 16, went missing after his father dropped him off at West Kildonan Collegiate in Winnipeg last Wednesday.

Read's parents didn't see or hear from their son until Saturday afternoon when Ontario Provincial Police spotted the boy in Pickering, Ont.

"We're exhausted as you can imagine," Nicholas' father Rob Read said Sunday evening. "It's been honestly a three-ring circus with us being the centre ring for the last four days."

Read said he and his wife were still coming to terms with the whole ordeal Sunday evening, having only been reunited with their son for several hours.

# **RCMP seek suspects in Mercy Street apartment fire**

A second attempt to light an apartment complex under construction along Mercy Street on fire was enough to burn it to the ground and now Selkirk RCMP are trying to track down the culprits behind the crime.

The apartment complex's owner, Dale Place, said the unoccupied building at the time is now a complete loss and the fire caused roughly \$2 million in damage.

"I'm losing money everyday ... insurance is great but it still doesn't cover what the real loss is," Place said, adding crews have already started the difficult task of rebuilding the complex, which was nearing completion before it went up in flames. "It's horrible ... it's discouraging as a developer."

Cheryl Kovich, who lives in the neighbouring building which was also damaged during the fire, said she credits her neighbour for helping get her and her two-year-old son out safely.

"I happened to look and all I see are the flames shooting up straight across the second floor," Kovich said. "It was a really scary morning."

Selkirk RCMP was called to the fire on June 16 just after 5 a.m. When officers arrived on scene, the apartment building was fully engulfed and local fire crews were trying to keep the blaze from spreading to the adjacent apartment complex.

"The adjacent building sustained minimal damage and residents were permitted back inside the building later that morning," according to an RCMP release issued last week. "Nobody was injured."

sage to CRIMES (274637). Although the cause of the fire is still under investigation, Place said it's being investigated as suspected arson.

"There's no wiring in the building so there's not really any way it could have been an accidental fire," Place said, adding he hopes officers are able to track down


those responsible. "If they don't catch them it's not going to stop, they're going to keep doing it to other places."

An RCMP spokesperson said Monday afternoon via email they had no further updates and they are still investigating the cause of the fire.











# East Selkirk students help brighten up local seniors centre

The ink wasn't dry yet, but a new mural outside the Gordon Howard Centre on Eveline Street had the building looking a whole lot brighter last week.

Grade 9 art students from East Selkirk Middle School were painting the building and were expected to have the finishing touches done by Tuesday.

The mural, featuring pictures of music notes, birds and seniors knitting, is the third to be done in the city by art teacher Rita Procyshyn and her students.

Students started generating ideas for the project back at the start of the school year in September, and said it felt great to finally be able to put paint to the wall last week.

"It's good," said first-time painter

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Chris Yeo. "It was fun."

A group of about 10 students came out to help with the project during half-day work sessions last week, and Procyshyn said the project was entirely a student effort.

"They generated all of the ideas based on the activities that go on in Gordon Howard," Procyshyn said.

Students drew what they wanted outside the centre and Procyshyn made the sketches to scale before they began painting.

Gordon Howard Centre program coordinator Elin MacLeod asked Procyshyn if she would paint the building a couple of years ago after seeing a mural outside the Army Navy building on Clandeboye Avenue.

She added she was impressed with the quality of work done by students

Nicholas spent Saturday night in Ontario with police and arrived in Winnipeg on a flight Sunday morning.

"It was just relief," Read said. "He's found, he's safe, everything like that."

Read said his son had no injuries when he came home, but was exhausted and hungry.

He added he believes stress associated with exams at school is what triggered his son to runaway.

The family had yet to have a proper debrief with authorities Sunday evening, but Read said Nicholas told him he walked to a truck stop in Headingley after leaving school and then he hitched a ride with a truck driver to Ontario.

"He jumped into a semi with a truck driver who seemed to think that taking an underage kid with no luggage for a trip across the country was a good idea," he said.

The Grade 9 student has run away before, but has always returned home, and despite having autism, his father says he's highly functioning.

"Most people if they didn't know wouldn't," Read said, noting his son is independent and doesn't have an educational assistant at school.

Read believes Nicholas was on route to Toronto, which is just more than half an hour away from Pickering, Ont. where he was found.

"He just said he heard about Toronto and want-

ed to go see it."


Read said support started pouring in right after the announcement Nicholas was missing, and the family thanked everyone who spread the message and kept an eye out for their son.

"The message got right across the country and the awareness was so huge."



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
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# **St. Clements Church to host Forever Run July 4**

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# Senator Johnson pays back nearly \$23K following probe

Manitoba Senator Janis Johnson has repaid almost \$23,000 in expenses deemed questionable by a much-anticipated probe into Senate spending released earlier this month, but still insists she did nothing wrong.

The long-serving upper house Tory made the announcement in a post on her website last week.

"I have decided to repay all of the amounts identified by the Auditor General in my case even though I remain firmly convinced they were all properly incurred and submitted," Johnson said.

Auditors deemed seven Senate-paid trips Johnson took from April 2011 to March 2013 questionable.

The trips, totalling \$22,706, were deemed unsuitable by auditor general Michael Ferguson, who alleged Johnson was travelling mainly for personal

## **Province expands** protection of plants, animals at risk

The province is taking steps to protect five animal and plant species and two ecosystems by designating them threatened or endangered.

"Manitoba is known for its diverse wildlife and ecosystems, and our government is taking bold, pioneering action to protect them," Conservation and Water Stewardship Minister Tom Nevakshonoff said in a release last week."By protecting precious species and ecosystems, we ensure a healthier environment for future generations of Manitobans."

Under amendments to the Endangered Species and Ecosystems Act, the following species will be declared threatened or endangered:

- olive sided flycatcher threatened;
- little brown bat endangered;

• northern long-eared bat - endangered;

• Gastony's cliffbrake - endangered;

• Canada warbler - downgraded from endangered to threatened.

Nevakshonoff added Manitoba will also be the first province in Canada to designate ecosystems as endangered under the act, a change that will protect at-risk species that rely on the habitat found in such ecosystems. The two ecosystems now designated as threatened or endangered is the tall grass prairie and alvar, a plant community based on soil over limestone found in the Interlake region.

and not parliamentary reasons.

Auditors combed through years of expenses and flagged the trips after finding Johnson travelled frequently between Winnipeg and Vancouver on paid trips, but only had one or two short appointments relating to Senate

business.

Johnson is one of 30 senators found to have claimed incorrect expenses that Ferguson wants repaid.

Her case wasn't initially among the group of nine senators who had been referred to the RCMP, but The Toronto Star reported last week Mounties will now investigate all 30 senators.

Police have yet to confirm a formal investigation and all are presumed innocent.

Johnson retained her stance that business can be mixed with pleasure on Senate-paid trips, since nothing prohibits it, and government business was always at the crux of her trips with personal affairs coming second.

She has indicated she will be taking her case to the independent arbitrator who has been hired to handle disputes senators have with the auditor's findings.

"I am adamant that all of my expenses were properly incurred and were in complete compliance with Senate polices on travel," Johnson's latest online post said.

Johnson said she paid back the expenses because it's in the best interest of the Senate, which has been tarnished in recent years

"It is hoped that by doing so, it will in some small measure contribute to the process of restoring honour to the Senate," Johnson said.

Johnson is the longest serving Conservative member of Canada's upper chamber and is the chair of the Gimli Film Festival.

She has served in the Senate since 1990

Requests for an interview with Johnson were not returned.

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

## Janice Filmon officially installed as Manitoba's 25th lieutenant-governor

Janice Filmon has been installed as Manitoba's new lieutenant-governor, making her the 25th in the province's history and only the second woman

#### named to the post.

Filmon, the wife of former Manitoba premier Gary Filmon, was installed last Friday, taking over for Philip Lee, who held the position since 2009.

"Mrs. Filmon ... has a long and proud history of giving back to the people of Manitoba and she will serve our province well in her new role," premier Greg Selinger said in a statement last week.

#### APPLICATION:

- Final approval of Primary Gas, Supplemental Gas, Transportation (to Centra) and Distribution (to Customers) sales rates effective August 1, 2013, which were approved on an interim basis in Order 89/13;
- 5) Final approval of Transportation (to Centra) and Distribution (to Customers) sales rates effective August 1, 2014, reflecting the removal of non-Primary Gas rate riders expiring on July 31, 2014, which were approved on an interim basis in Order 85/14;
- 6) Final approval of the Transportation (to Centra), and Distribution (to Customers) Sales and Transportation rates, reflecting the implementation of new non-Primary Gas Rate Riders on November 1, 2014, which were approved on an interim basis in Order 123/14;
- Final approval of Distribution (to Customers) Sales rates, reflecting the implementation of new non-Primary Gas Rate Riders on February 1, 2015;
- Final approval of actual gas costs for the 2012/13 and 2013/14 gas years;
- 9) Final approval of Primary Gas Sales Rates and Franchise Application interim ex-parte orders as outlined in the Application; and,
- 10) Final approval of any other interim ex-parte orders issued by the PUB prior to the conclusion of the public review process for this application.

#### **BILL IMPACTS**

The impact of this Application is an increase of approximately 3.2% or \$26 on the annual bill for a typical residential customer. Annual Bills for customers in the Large General Service (LGS), High Volume Firm, Mainline, and Interruptible Customer Classes range from decreases of 1.4% to increases of 7.3%.

It is Centra's intention to update the Application with updated forward market prices prior to the public hearing. The Board will publish a subsequent Notice indicating the approximate bill impacts for the November 1, 2015 rate change, by customer class, once this information is available.


The Gimli Film Festival is hoping to add a few more volunteers to their list willing to help out with their 15th annual event.

# Inquest calls for secure wards to house violent patients

The judge who led a provincial inquest into the death of a vulnerable elderly man who died in his personal care home after receiving a blow to the head is calling for secure wards to house patients with violent and aggressive tendencies.

Judge Michel Chartier released his report on the inquest into the death of Frank Alexander on May 26.

Chartier wants wait times for beds dedicated to violent and aggressive patients reduced to 60 days and is recommending a "substantial" increase to the number of beds throughout the province. He also recommends violent patients be placed in locked wards so individuals don't have the ability to wander.

"If every (personal care home) provided a unit dedicated to these patients, there would be a significantly greater chance that these individuals would be properly cared for and that the system would be safer for all, including the residents and the staff," Chartier wrote in his report.

Currently, violent patients in Manitoba can wait up to a year before they are placed in a bed, Chartier said.

Alexander died in March 2011 at Parkview Place in Winnipeg after receiving a blow to the head from falling backwards. Joe McLeod, a fellow resident living with Alzheimer's disease, and a history of violent behaviour pushed him.

McLeod died at the Selkirk Mental Health Centre in April. He was 74.

Chartier said the provincial inquest into Alexander's death raised revelations on how elderly individuals living with mental health issues in personal care homes are cared for.

"It is evident that there is a clear under appreciation of the degrees of complexities when dealing with persons with dementia generally and Alzheimer's disease specifically," Chartier said. "There are more than 500,000 people living in Canada with Alzheimer's disease. By 2030, there will be more than 1.1 million people in Canada affected by this disease and the number of persons in long term care in our country will have increased tenfold."

Chartier said McLeod was lost in the health care system.

"No one really seemed to know what to do with him, nor did they obtain relevant and apparently available information regarding his circumstances."

McLeod's daughter Faye Jashyn, tried to get her father help as his Alzheimer's worsened, but McLeod declined.

Chartier is recommending any requests for home care by family members be left open and re-examined by health care professionals to prevent future tragedy.

"We cannot lose sight of the fact that this is a disease which progresses rapidly," Chartier said.

Health Minister Sharon Blady said no family should ever have to go through what the Alexander and McLeod families did.

She said the province is working on a plan to address Chartier's recommendations.

"I am committed to implementing the recommendations that are in Judge Chartier's report," Blady said in a press release.

# Manitoba apologizes to aboriginal adoptees for '60s scoop

The Manitoba government has taken the historic step of recognizing the pain and suffering of thousands of Indigenous youth who were removed from their homes and stripped of their culture in what is commonly known as 'the '60s scoop.'

"By recognizing the existence of these tragic events in the legislature, the Manitoba government has taken a small step toward healing," Premier Greg Selinger said in a release last Thursday."Today, I would like to apologize on behalf of the province for the imposition of this practice. I am deeply sorry for the harm it caused and continues to cause for survivors, their families and descendants."

The '60s Scoop refers to the practice in the 1960s and beyond of placing First Nation, Métis and Inuit chil-

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dren of Canada up for adoption in non-Indigenous homes. All too frequently, children were taken from their families and placed for adoption, sometimes far from their home communities, sometimes in other provinces, the United States or overseas, Selinger said.

Also present in the legislature last Thursday were '60s Scoop adoptees Coleen Rajotte and Marlene Orgeron, who experienced first-hand the legacy of being removed from their families.

"Like survivors of residential schools, the '60s Scoop has caused intergenerational trauma that continues to impact In-

digenous families and communities today," Rajotte said."Many adoptees struggle with

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
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post traumatic stress disorder, addiction and night terrors similar to what is experienced by residential school survivors."

Selinger added this statement follows the efforts of Aboriginal and Northern Affairs Minister Eric Robinson, who last year hosted a two-day round-

table with '60s Scoop survivors to discuss their



stories and put forward an action plan. This roundtable was the first such gathering in Canada hosted by a provincial government.

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# St. Clements seeks input on East Selkirk concept plan

The RM of St. Clements is inviting community members to help shape future growth and development in East Selkirk.

During an open house held last Thursday in East Selkirk, residents were lead through proposed plans for future development along Colville Road between Highway 59 and Frank Street and were later asked to submit their own questions and comments.

A summary of the input received is being compiled this summer and will be incorporated into a concept plan for Colville East, which will later be presented to council. said St. Clements CAO D.J. Sigmundson.

"It's about planning, it's about looking to the future and not making mistakes that we can't reverse later," Sigmundson said.

A local developer, Dale Place of Kinetic Ventures, is seeking approval from council to rezone an 11-acre parcel of land adjacent to Colville Road to build a new subdivision.

Key aspects of the proposed subdivision include approximately 25 lots for singlefamily homes, plus one doublewide lot that will accommodate two small, lowrise multi-family units, each with 12 suites. Although the lot

sizes will be wider than lots in newer Selkirk subdivisions to preserve the open property feel, some area residents are concerned it will increase traffic and change the entire landscape of their area.

Place attended last week's open house and said it was an opportunity to clear up any misconceptions about the project to area residents.

Katherine White and her husband Edward Gutwein said they attended the open house because they wanted to learn more about future plans for

their community.

The couple, which recently moved to the area, said they are in favour of future development.

"We came out here because it was more open ... there's always going to be changes and I think in this rural area it will be good," White said. "It needs to grow to help the community survive and I think it's a positive thing."

Although they live a few blocks away from the proposed housing development, Gutwein said he worries it will increase traffic.

"We moved out of the city to get away from that kind of development," he said.

Reactions to the housing project vary depending on who you talk to, Sigmundson said.

"People closer to the development have certain concerns about multi residential and some other people further away have concerns about safety and traffic," he said, adding there will be a hearing this fall regarding the subdivision and its specifics. "We're built for growth here and we can manage growth in an environmentally friendly fashion."

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# Narol man fatally run over by his own vehicle: RCMP

A Narol man is dead following an apparent freak accident that saw him run over by his own truck.

RCMP and EMS were called to the parking lot at Corpus Christi Roman Catholic Church in St. Clements sometime around 11 a.m. last Tuesday.

Police believe the 86-year-old man exited his Chevy pickup truck while it was still in gear and was hit.

The man was pronounced dead on the scene.

Alex Siepman lives next door to the parking lot and called 911 sometime around 10:30 a.m.

Siepman said the man was lying on the ground in the lot next to the church several feet away from community mailboxes that an older Chevy pickup truck had wedged into.

He said it's not uncommon for people to park in the middle of the parking lot instead of directly beside the mailboxes where the victim's truck was found.

The elderly man was alive when he arrived but was severely injured, and

had blood around the back of his head and nose.

"He had pulse, he was moving," Siepman said.

He added, once EMS arrived, the man was unconscious, and several attempts to bring him back to life through chest compressions failed.

RCMP had the parking lot sealed off

for several hours and a forensic collision reconstructionist could be seen working from Henderson Highway, where the church is located.

The driver's side of the truck was damaged and two newspaper boxes that appeared to be hit from it were seen tipped over and out of their usual place underneath postboxes.

A tow truck eventually came and took away the truck and RCMP reopened the parking lot to the public. RCMP continue to investigate with the help of the collision reconstructionist.

Police are not releasing the name of the victim.

# Garden party set in 1915 to showcase Stuart House

It's been derelict and boarded up for years, but a former Selkirk mansion is about to come alive next Sunday.

A re-enactment of a 1915 garden party will take place in front of Stuart House on Eveline Street equipped with tea, crumpets, and lemonade.

Actors playing the role of 19th century Selkirk politicians will give speeches and highlight the historical significance of Stuart House.

"We're going to invite a whole bunch of dead people to speak," said Rob Sarginson, chair of the Red River North Regional Heritage Group.

The public is also being encouraged to dress up in Victorian fashion that would have been popular during the time Stuart House was built in 1904.

In preparation for the party, Sarginson and Antonio Cesari were fixing up a kicked-down railing at the front of the home last week.

Vandals have frequented the former mansion in recent years, tagging it with graffiti and destroying other parts of the home's exterior.

"There's no reason that it should be sitting there like a dump when we have very few of these old mansions left," Sarginson said. "We got to show that people care about this building."

The home was built by James Stuart, the manager of the former Selkirk Electric Light Company, and was situ-

ated in front of an electricity station in what is now Selkirk Park, Sarginson said.

Sarginson added three generations of Stuart's lived in the home before it was turned into a rental unit and later becoming derelict.

The goal of the party is to start garnering support for the restoration of the home.

"It's something that can be very attractive to people," Cesari said.

Stuart House has been a designated heritage building for years and is owned by the city, but it has been boarded up and closed to the public due to safety concerns and high repair costs.

No one will be able to go inside the house at the party, but Sarginson hopes that will change over the next few years.

"Let's just get the public aware that we have a treasure here, if we preserve it, because they don't make 110-yearold buildings anymore," Sarginson said.

He added he's fearful vandals could further damage the home noting the next door abandoned Lord Selkirk MS II boat was set on fire in 2012.

"I don't want that to happen to this." The garden party takes place next Sunday, July 5 from 2-4 p.m. at 478 **Eveline Street.**

# City one step closer to removing rotting ship

## Mayor hopes province will kick in \$250K to cover cleanup costs

The City of Selkirk says its one step closer to having the rotting MS Lord Selkirk II removed from the city's slough for good.

It awarded tender for the ship's removal last month, but still faces a major funding hurdle though Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson hints a special announcement could be coming soon.

Johannson said crews could start cutting the ship up as early as July.

"It will be as soon as we have all our ducks in a row and we're getting close," Johannson said. "It's going to be a major event."

The city has set aside roughly half of the estimated \$500,000 cleanup cost, and is banking on the province to fund the remainder.

"We're waiting on a little help," Johannson said, noting he has had discussions with Finance Minister Greg Dewar about the ship's removal.

A provincial spokesperson confirmed the province has been working with the city on the issue, and also hinted an announcement regarding the ship could be coming soon.

"The province is aware of the situation and has had productive discussions with the City of Selkirk," read an email from the spokesperson. "A positive outcome that will address this safety issue is anticipated, and more details should be available in the near future."

The MS Lord Selkirk II has been in the Selkirk Slough since 1990, but this isn't the first time the city's tried to remove the ship.

Johannson has been relentless in pushing for the ship's removal in re-

cent years. In an interview last week, he admitted the boat wasn't on his list of priorities when he came into office two terms ago, but said that changed after vandals set in on fire in 2012 leaving behind an even greater eyesore for nearby residents.

In 2012, the city hired Global Scrap Solutions to remove the vessel, but the company faced bureaucratic hurdles and the boat stayed rotting.

Then last year, the coast guard was

brought in to pump out dangerous liquids on the ship after a sweeping toxicologist report revealed the ship had been leaking a long list of contaminants including arsenic.

When asked what the city would do if the province doesn't come through with funding Johannson replied, "I got a plan b but I'm hoping I don't have to open that envelope."

"This has been 26 years in the making," he said. "The administration has worked very hard on this."

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

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# No Superstore for Selkirk anytime soon, Loblaws says

There's some bad news for those wanting another grocery store in Selkirk.

Loblaws, the parent company of the Real Canadian Superstore, says it has no immediate plans to build a Superstore in the city.

The company announced this March it was investing more than \$1.2 billion in the construction of 50 new stores across the country and renovations to more than 100 existing locations.

But Selkirk isn't on the list of cities the grocery giant is mulling — at least for now.

A Loblaws spokesperson told the Record via email, construction of a new store wouldn't be happening any time soon.

"There are no immediate plans for a Real Canadian Superstore in Selkirk at this time," read the statement from the company.

The store has long been rumoured to be coming to the city.

Empty land sitting across from Walmart at Selkirk Crossing could serve as space for the grocery giant, which already owns Extra Foods on Main Street.

Shindico owns the land at Selkirk Crossing and across the street where the new Canalta Hotel was built.

Shindico developer John Pearson said there are plans for a grocery store

to go on its land, but he couldn't say which store could be setting up shop.

However, he said residents could expect a grocer to start construction on the land within the next two years.

"We've got lots of room for additional retailers to compliment the ones that are there," Pearson said.

He added Shindico expects new restaurants to be built in front of the Canalta.

There has been a spur of activity at Selkirk Crossing and the neighbouring land owned by Canadian Tire across the street in recent years.

The Canalta and a Noventis Credit Union opened on Shindico land earlier this year, Mark's Work Wearhouse is expanding, and council just gave the green light to a new Sport Chek store.

# **Riley racing to raise autism awareness**

## Toronto teen tells Lockport students to chase their dreams

Racing at high speeds in his go-kart is when Austin Riley feels the most comfortable.

"We're on the same race team and ... I haven't seen him since last August at nationals so today we're reunited," she said with a smile.

"It's amazing how he can't really use his motor skills ... but he can race them."

Brody Russell said the fact that Riley races at such high speeds and has come second in Canada is "amazing." "I find that so inspiring that he can

do that," the Grade 8 student said. "I think a lot of kids can learn from him and more kids might want to race because of him."

Riley officially finished off his tour in Gimli on June 14 after a couple rounds on the racetrack.


