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

Ruth Hooker School gets a beautiful new three sisters mural

Grand unveiling celebrated with release of monarch butterflies

On June 12,s students, staff and community members gathered at Ruth Hooker School for the unveiling of the latest Interlake Art Board mural. The school is playing host to the new mural which is called Three Sisters: Harmony in Diversity.

The unveiling ceremony started with introductions by Ruth Hooker School principal Kristine Duke. She was followed by a land acknowledgement read by an RHS student whichwas followed by words from the school's elder.

The emcee for the event, grade 4 teacher Kathleen Marsch, next explained how the school's outside space has changed over the years.

"When [the current grade five class] were in grade two with me, there was nothing over here. We got a grant to do three butterfly garden boxes where we are able to release our butterflies every year. Those grade fives painted those boxes with the butterflies on them. Then the following year, we got a grant to do another gar-

den. We planted medicine. We grow now our own sage in-house, here at Ruth Hooker School along with some yarrow and we have cedar here," said Marsch.

This year they've expanded their garden plots with a new food sovereignty garden which is actually a community garden that residents are welcome to harvest from in the summer. They also secured funding in partnership with the Interlake Arts Board from the Manitoba Art's Council Indigenous 360 program and the Arts, Culture & Sports in Community

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


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New bench acknowledges Dr. Ian Reid

fund from the Government of Manitoba for this new mural.

She was inspired to include many aspects of local wildlife and Indigenous culture inspired by her mishomis into this mural. There are blueberries and strawberries, a three-sisters garden, water and marsh plants, monarch butterflies and more.

Fontaine was helped along the way

by student artists who painted alongside her making this vision a reality.

Marsh on behalf of Justine Scrambstead, executive director of the Interlake Art Board, said, "The Three Sisters: Harmony in Diversity [mural] is a testament to the power of collaboration and the importance of celebrating diversity through art. The mural, inspired by the Indigenous agricultural tradition of planting corn, beans, and squash together symbolizes unity and mutual support mirroring the spirit of


the Selkirk community."

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Selkirk Age Friendly hosts AGM

Group discusses ways all citizens can be more involved

The Selkirk Age Friendly Committee recently met for their Annual General Meeting(AGM) as well as a session which allowed attendees to contribute to goals and ideas with the aim of making our community a more age friendly place.

The Selkirk Age Friendly Committee is a group that promotes independence, activity and health for older adults in our community by engaging with an array of organizations and people in our area with diverse backgrounds.

The aim of the AGM was to teach residents a little more about the Selkirk Age Friendly Committee and their initiatives in our community, to give residents an avenue to share their ideas and thoughts on Age Friendly priorities and to host elections for committee positions.

The meeting was opened by Selkirk Age Friendly Co-Chair Lee Hanson. Introductions took place and the AGM's agenda was approved as well as previous years's minutes.

Corrine Wiebe then took over providing an overview of the Financial Reports for 2022 and 2023.

In 2022 the committee was quite active considering that it was less than two years out from the initial declaration of the pandemic. During that time, they hosted draws on Facebook and a raffle but their largest revenue source was the 55+ Games as they ran a canteen during the event. Expenses of note that year would be their transit sponsorship as well as donations to the Alzheimer's Society.

The Committee had a more conventional year in 2023 and items of note include their hosting of a 50/50 draw as well as canteen during Holiday Al-

Hanson then presented the co-chair

"Last year in 2023, we established four priority areas. The first priority area was increasing the Age Friendly committee. It's kind of ongoing throughout the year. We're always looking for new members, we've kind of been struggling lately with getting new members, the hope is going forward we'd like to have a full committee," said Hanson.

Other priorities are ongoing and include establishing a fundraising committee, completing age friendly capital projects such as the recent installation of the bench in Queen's Park which acknowledges Dr. Ian Reid, and partnering with community groups which offer senior's programming such as the memory and aging workshop that was hosted in partnership with the Gordon Howard

"Another big thing this past year, we

had a sub-committee that did a walkabout on Eveline and Manitoba Ave. [in Selkirk] just looking at some challenges and some concerns on the new development from an age friendly lens," said Hanson.

He explained that they shared their concerns with representatives from the City of Selkirk. Since new development is expected in the city, sharing age friendy feedback is important and Hanson felt it was a productive meeting.

To end his report, Hanson reiterated

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New East Beaches Resource Centre Transportation Project/Ride Program

East Beaches Resource Centre has received funding of \$18,400 from the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Program. These funds will provide a significant portion toward a subsidized transportation program to help eligible individuals age 55+ and/or ambulatory persons with disabilities with a ride service that connects them to medical appointments, shopping trips and ac-

tivities integral to their wellness and wellbeing.

The New Horizons Program is a federal grants and contributions program whose goal is to support projects that help improve the well-being of seniors and foster social inclusion and engagement in their communities

The ride service will establish eligible drivers to provide required transportation for those individuals who meet the qualifications to accept this ride service as they age comfortably in their own homes.

James Bezan, MP for Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman has offered this statement on behalf of Service Canada

"Congratulations to the East Beaches Resource Centre team on their successful application for funding from the New Horizons for Seniors Program. I always enjoy my visits to the East Beaches, including for the East Beaches Social Scene's recent 50th anniversary. This funding to expand the Resource Centre's transportation services will be put to good use by the residents who call this beautiful area along Lake Winnipeg home. I thank the East Beaches Resource Centre for

all they do to create a sincere sense of community and encourage seniors to stay here as long as possible. It has never gone unnoticed."

Residents of East Beaches now have access to enhanced transportation services, thanks to the East Beaches Transportation Program funded by the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Program. This initiative aims to address transportation barriers faced by older adults and individuals with disabilities in rural communities, ensuring they can access essential services and maintain their independence.

the eight features of an age friendly community that the committee is focused on: transportation, outdoor spaces and buildings, housing, respect and social inclusion, social participation, communication and information, civic participation and employment opportunities, and community support and health services.

After talking about the past year, Hanson then turned focus to the future for the committee. As it would be difficult for a volunteer committee to make changes in all areas at once, the committee has decided to focus its efforts

"Out of the eight [features] that I mentioned, our committee, at our last meeting, determined that we should focus on these three – transportation, outdoor spaces and buildings, and social inclusion and respect," said Hanson

From there, attendees at the meeting were asked to vote on ideas under the three categories that they felt would have the biggest impact to our community. Selkirk Age Friendly will use this feedback to choose future projects to focus on.

Some of the ideas discussed that could take place would be working with Selkirk Transit and relaunching their age friendly business recognition program.

The meeting ended with some changes to the Selkirk Age Friendly Committee's terms of reference which were approved and the voting in of Selkirk Age Friendly board members all of whom were acclaimed.

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Specialized wheelchair donated with the help of soft drink tabs

Happy Thought School Grade 2 student Kyrie Brinkman received a life-changing gift on June 19 that will bring joy and freedom to the little girl.

Kyrie was chosen to receive a new wheelchair through the Tabs for Wheelchairs initiative.

This program involves collecting pop can tabs to assist in fundraising for wheelchairs for children with dis-

Born prematurely with cerebral palsy due to a brain injury at birth, Kyrie's mobility depends on her wheelchair. Her previous chair became too small, prompting the need for an up-

According to Kyrie's mother, Tammy Brinkman, the arrival of the new chair could not have been timed bet-

"She got her old chair when she was three and it is way too small for her," said Brinkman.

Kyrie outgrew her previous chair and used a medical stroller in the

"It's not meant for all-day use, and it didn't have much support," Brink-

The Brinkmans got to choose the Ki Mobility Little Wave Arc chair.

The new chair boasts advanced features like reclining and tilting mechanisms and enhanced support for comfort and proper posture - all in vibrant pink and purple colours selected by Kyrie herself.

The new chair perfectly fits Kyrie and has a big foam cushion.

"It has lots of supports and features to keep her in a proper condition and super comfortable," added Brinkman.

One recipient each year is selected through the Tabs for Wheelchairs program.

"We are incredibly grateful for this

Brinkman explained that their occupational therapist at the Rehabili-

tation Centre for Children recommended Kyrie to Tabs for Wheelchair co-ordinator Gwen Buccini.

Buccini gets recommendations from the Rehabilitation Centre for Children and Manitoba Possible. She then selects the lucky recipient.

Kyrie's new chair is estimated to have cost over \$7,000.

In 2024, the Tabs for Wheelchairs program collected a record number of 19 million tabs.

Tabs are collected throughout Mani-

"For every 1500 tabs, they get 60 cents when recycled," said Brinkman.

"It takes millions and millions of tabs for one wheelchair."

Happy Thought School collected tabs throughout the year, and Brinkman brought them to Trailblazers Life Choices in Winnipeg to be sorted and

Kyrie was presented with her new wheelchair at Holy Cross School in

Each June, a new recipient is selected.

This marks the 26th year of the Tabs for Wheelchair program, which has donated 61 wheelchairs so far.

All 19 million pop-can tabs were at Kyrie's presentation.

"It was really neat seeing all the tabs on display!" exclaimed Brink-

Kyrie's classmates were also able to join in the celebration.

Brinkman said they were transported by bus to

Holy Cross School to witness Kyrie receiving her new wheelchair.

Over 400 schools and businesses across Manitoba are collecting tabs for donation.

For more than 15 years, Gary Mc-Gregor from Gimli has been amassing tabs at his residence.

McGregor has collected over 2.75 million tabs for specialized wheel-

"If it helps that little girl, that's all that matters," said McGregor.

In Selkirk, Amanda Hargreaves has been donating the tabs collected at Lord Selkirk Regional Comprehensive Secondary School for two years.

Hargreaves explained that there are water jugs throughout the school to collect the tabs.

"Cafeteria, library, classrooms... there is a place for the tabs everywhere," said Hargreaves.

Tabs can also be dropped off at Trailblazers Life Choices, 1031 Autumn Dr. in Winnipeg.

Paws for a Cause walk seeking community sponsorships

Walk supports needs of cancer patients that fall through the cracks

Organizers of the annual Paws for a Cause Walk which supports the Never Alone Cancer Foundation are hoping that businesses and community members consider sponsoring this year's walk so that they can get the most out of fundraising for this great

"This event is the main fundraiser for the Never Alone Cancer Foundation to help support and bring money in to help [cancer patients and their families] throughout the year. Last year they supported over 500 families and it's more and more every year," said Nancy Rowsell, one of the volunteer organizers of Selkirk's Paws for a Cause Walk.

The Never Alone Cancer Foundation helps patients, families and caregivers affected by cancer with all kinds of needs that may not fall under traditional treatment coverage. This includes emotional, financial and informational support.

Rowsell explained that from basics like making sure people get their medication filled, to help with transportation needs or costs, to individual needs, the Never Alone Foundation has helped cancer patients in many different ways.

"Just yesterday, I did a delivery for a lady who is going through treatments. We took her a blanket. We took her a grocery gift card just to help her out a little bit. She's a mother of three and she's self-employed so she has no sick days," said Never Alone Foundation volunteer Cheryl Disbrowe.

The Paws for a Cause Walk is an event in which people in our community come together to walk bringing awareness and raising funds to support patients, families and caregivers affected by cancer. As the name suggests it's a dog-friendly walk but you don't need to have a tail-wagging companion to participate.

The event is hosted annually and starts outside Selkirk Home Hardware. The business's parking lot will host booths associated with the walk and, so far, has been getting busier every year.

For businesses who would be interested in sponsoring this event, there are three different tiers of sponsorship — gold, silver and bronze — which will provide different opportunities to get your business logo out there and know that at the same time you are making it so that this event canraise awareness and bring in even more funds for those in need.

"All that money will be given back to the community or to the foundation, but you'll be advertising your business in the community all over social media, in the Record, on the event website, and on the banner," said Rowsell.

Disbrowe explained that she got involved with the Never Alone Cancer Foundation not as a volunteer butbecause her father was a cancer patient who was helped by the foundation. She explained that having that help and support for her family was important.

"I'm not somebody who asks for help easily. When Nancy connected with Michael [Schiefer the executive director of Never Alone], they showed up at my door at the worst time for us, but they showed up in a warm blanket for my dad and food gift cards for us to have a meal together. It was just very overwhelming but that love you feel, that support you feel is pretty important," said Disbrowe.

She started to volunteer with the Never Alone Cancer Foundation so that she could share that feeling with

Rowsell and Disbrowe also encourage individuals in our community to mark their calendars and come out to the Paws for a Cause Walk.

Three local RMs participate in joint emergency preparedness exercises

Practising ways to keep our community members safe

The RMs of St. Clements, East St. Paul and West St. Paul joined forces last week in order to make sure that they are prepared should an emergency situation happen and residents need to evacuate. The emergency scenario was created by Napier Emergency Consulting and the RMs were tasked with creating a reception centre in West St. Paul's Access Centre.

"What we do is we always plan for anything related to an emergency in general — that can be preparing for an emergency itself, which can be practicing, hypothetically, if a tornado touched down, how do we respond? What does that look like or anything that would be 'live emergency' so we can train for that — this exercise, however, was geared towards opening up a reception center," said Tyler Freeman, emergency coordinator for St. Clements.

He explained that a reception centre is the place that residents coming from an emergency situation would come to for help.

The benefit of having exercises like this is that even though all of our municipalities have plans on paper about what to do in an emergency, having a mock-emergency situation allows questions like – where everyone will go, how can everyone be helped, and what a functioning reception centrelooks like to be looked at in real-time

Some considerations that people may not think of like, what to do with pets or how to handle people with big emotions, were all part of the drill.

"We set up the pet reception center outside and then we basically put the invite out to all members of the participating communities, to volunteer and play the role of a person in need, coming to a reception center. All of

the people who came in to participate were given a little description [of what to do] so each person played a role. We tried to play as many roles as we can because as you can imagine, during an evacuation and or an event like this, people are going to be in all types of mental states," said Freeman.

Circumstances where a reception centre like this could be needed are rare but do happen. Freeman explained that a flood, a fire, extreme weather that causes damage like a tornado or even an accident like a chemical truck overturning and spilling dangerous substances in our region could all prompt the need for evacuation.

Freeman says that this is the first time that he's been in a mock emergency situation in which all three municipalities teamed up to learn together bringing their emergency staff which includes councils as well as services like fire departments and police departments together along with volunteers.

He explained that it's important to practise for possible emergencies.

"We don't see these things every day but yet at the same time, if it were to happen, we're responsible to take care of our residents. We have to educate ourselves, educate our ratepayers, our residents and our staff on how, if we have to do this, what does it look like? ... the best thing to do is to run a large scale exercise and practice," said Freeman.

Something that Freeman said was something that he learned from the situation was just what a wide variety of concerns people might have who come to a reception centre.

"[People may not realize the] uncertainty about the amount of people

that may come through and the wide variety of issues that each person may or may not have. That goes back to how people are affected by an emergency. They're coming in needing help, but not everyone's going to be calm and collected, right? There are going to be people that are scared and emotional and looking for help. The challenge that

we were able to figure out was how do we make sure each person comes in there and we can help them and make them comfortable while trying to deal with the next person that's coming through the door," said Freeman.

Residents can be reassured that our local municipalities are working to make sure that they are prepared.

"That's the bread and butter at the end of the day is to ensure that everyone is safe," said Freeman.

If residents are interested in becoming volunteers and helping to drill with the municipalities for emergency situations they can contact their RMs directly and get in touch with the local programs.

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Canadian Dental Care Plan Misconceptions

The Government of Canada started implementing a \$13 billion Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP) last month. This plan represents a significant opportunity to improve oral healthcare access for Canadians without dental access to dental benefits.

Today, over two million Canadian seniors have been approved to receive dental care coverage. By next year, an estimated nine million uninsured Canadians will be eligible for the plan. This is excellent news. Yet only a small percentage of Canada's 25,000 dentists have registered to participate in the program so far.

Despite our continued advocacy for changes to **reduce** program complexity, **protecting** patient privacy, and **securing** clarity on terms and conditions, the program remains flawed. Further, issues and misconceptions about the program by the public persist.

In fact, in a survey conducted this month by the Canadian Dental Association (CDA) and the Provincial and Territorial Dental Associations (PTDAs), we learned that while many seniors require extensive dental work, 40% seniors would struggle to afford \$100 copay and 60% are not aware they will face additional costs under the CDCP.

This is a problem. Our primary concern with these troubling findings is that patients will not receive the care they need under this program. Additionally, this misunderstanding about the program is likely to add extra pressure on dentist visits.

Unless things change and the government makes a concerted effort to clearly communicate the parameters and limitations of their plan, many people in Canada will experience difficulty in accessing a dentist.

Dentists are deciding how and when they may participate. They care about their patients and their oral health and are looking for a program that can integrate efficiently with their staff and practices.

Although we acknowledge Health Minister Mark Holland's responsiveness and the progress that has been made to date to address dentists' concerns with the program, there are still some fundamental issues that directly impact patients that have been left unresolved.

Dental offices across Manitoba and Canada are faced with having difficult conversations with patients about CDCP misconceptions. In fact, recent surveys with dentists show that dental office staff spend on average 50 minutes per day explaining the federal program to patients. This creates a huge administrative burden to dental offices.

Canada has a severe shortage of skilled dental office staff, particularly dental hygienists & dental assistants. There is concern these shortages may affect dental offices' ability to participate with the CDCP.

The Manitoba Dental Association, PTDAs, and the CDA are undertaking an education initiative encouraging people who are eligible for the CDCP to **Know Before you Go**.

Based on what we're hearing from our patients and know about our profession/practice, this is what Manitobans and Canadians need to know before they go to their dentist and seek treatment under the CDCP:

"For many patients, treatments under the CDCP will not be free."

Many people are under the impression the CDCP will cover all the costs for their care. This is not the case. Patients with an adjusted net family income between \$70,000 and \$90,000 are responsible for a federal government required "co-payment" of between 40-60% of fees set out by the government. In addition, the coverage provided by the federal government for all eligible CDCP patients (regardless of family net income) is less than full cost of the dental service. The difference will be on you.

"Patients can receive CDCP covered treatments from any dentist."

Until July, patients can only see a dentist registered to participate in the program.

After July, patients can also see a dentist that will participate through the government claim-by-claim pathway. However, this non-registration pathway still requires dentists to accept the same unclear terms and conditions with patient privacy concerns and not all dentists are willing to do so. This lack of clarity will leave patients confused and, in some cases, they may be unable to find a dentist to treat them under the CDCP.

"The CDCP will cover all oral treatments today."

Currently, the CDCP offers limited coverage and treatment options. Care options like sedation, crowns, partial dentures and additional units of scaling, as needed by youth, seniors, and persons with disabilities, will need government pre-approval which does not start until November of 2024. We still don't know how long you, our patients, will need to wait for the government to approve the treatment we know you may need.

Canada's new national dental plan still has the promise of being a true game-changer for oral health, enabling expanded access to care for many Canadians, but only if done correctly. Troublesome aspects that are holding dentists back from participating have not been fully addressed. While there's still time to fix what's wrong with CDCP, the clock is ticking.

 - a. Starting after July 8, 2024, patients will no longer be restricted to Sun Life Canada-registered dentists.
 - b. Please contact your dentist to see if they are accepting the Canadian Dental Care Plan in their office.
- 2. The CDCP is not a free dental program. It is a dental benefit program administered by Health Canada.
 - a. Health Canada is not paying for the full cost of your dental care.
 - b. Patients may be required to make a payment up to 75% depending on their adjusted net family income.
- 3. Not all services are covered.
 - a. It is not a comprehensive plan, so please talk to your dentist about your oral health needs.
- 4. The Manitoba Dental Association will continue to advocate for positive changes for CDCP-eligible patients.

Shelter Movers announces expansion into Winnipeg to address rising need

Shelter Movers is a prominent charity focused on offering no-cost moving and storage assistance to those escaping abusive environments. Their latest chapter launch will take place in Winnipeg. This growth reflects their unwavering dedication to reaching areas with the highest demand for these crucial services.

Shelter Movers is a national charity that offers moving and storage services free of charge to people and families seeking refuge from abuse. In collaboration with local businesses and community organizations, their team of 900 volunteers provides a dependable and respectful means for survivors to take their possessions with them when leaving an abusive environment. Since 2016, Shelter Movers has successfully completed over 7,000 moves for primarily women and children in 6 different prov-

Thousands of women and children face abuse by intimate partners or family members, with alarming statistics revealing that, on average, a woman in Canada is killed by her intimate partner every two days (Can. Femicide Observatory, 2019).

In light of this pressing necessity, and with the backing of WAGE Canada, Shelter Movers is delighted to unveil its latest branch in Winnipeg. As the sole charitable moving organization for survivors of abuse in Canada, Shelter Movers addresses

to brag, but I was really impressed with my ability and also just the way the paint was so smooth and forgiving," said Ryhorchuk. "I was in love!" When she first started creating her


oil paintings, Ryhorchuk found the

5 unique facts about Canada

Canada Day is a federal holiday celebrated annually on July 1. Canadians have much to celebrate come the first of July, and these are five things that make the Great White North unique.

1. Canada is the second largest country in the world, with a total area of more than 9.9 million square kilometers. In fact, according to Worldometer, Canada takes up 6.1 percent of the world's land mass, making it just one of six countries across the globe to count more than 5 percent of the global land mass as its own.



2. Canadians love their maple syrup, and perhaps some love it a tad too much. The first season of the Netflix documentary series "Dirty Money" included an episode about the Great Canadian Maple Syrup Heist. That theft, during which 3,300 short tons of maple syrup valued at nearly \$18 million CAD were stolen

from a storage facility over 2011 and 2012, is the most significant heist in Canadian history. The heist was discovered during an inventory of the Federation of Quebec Maple Syrup Producers' strategic reserve. During the inspection, an investigator realized several barrels at the facility were empty, prompting a wider investigation and realization of the scope of the crime. Various individuals were ultimately found responsible for the theft and sentenced to prison.

3. Canada is surrounded by the Atlantic Ocean to the east, the Arctic Ocean to the north and the Pacific Ocean to the west. That undoubtedly contributes to Canada having the longest coastline in the world. According to the World Population Review, Canadian coastline stretches more than 202,000 kilometers, which easily bests Indonesia, which has the second longest coastline at roughly 99,000 kilometers.

4. Though it's the second largest country in the world, Canada is the twelfth least densely populated nation across the globe. Estimates indicate that Canada's population stood at around 41 million people in 2024. By comparison, the Japanese city of Tokyo is estimated to have more than 37 million people living in its metro area in 2024.

5. Roughly



two-thirds of the world's polar bears call Canada home. According to Polar Bears in Canada, the global population of polar bears is divided into 19 subpopulations, and 13 of those are managed or co-managed by Canada. All told, roughly 16,000 polar bears reside in Canada, with just 10,000 residing beyond Canadian borders.

Canada Day is an annual celebration of the Great White North and a great time to consider the many things that make this beautiful nation so unique.



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
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

final products hard to part with.

"Over time I think I've realized that I surely can't keep them all so I put my heart into them while I create them and then basically wish them well, wherever they may end up," said Ryhorchuk.

To be able to keep the paintings to herself in a different way, Ryhorchuk photographs them to create cards and prints which she can look at whenever she pleases. She can also share these photographs with others, helping to spread the work and the joy they bring farther and wider than they would go if she had just let the original go without documentation.

"My first painting that sold was through a gallery so I don't know who might have bought it, but it was my favourite," said Ryhorchuk. "I'm thankful that I have a small print of it at my cottage. I know it's not the real painting but it honestly brings me as much joy as the original."

Ryhorchuk's favourite part of painting is getting caught up in the flow of the process.

"I'd describe that feeling as when nothing else matters and I'm just painting away. This likely is not going to happen when I'm listening for the oven timer to go off or if anyone, including our dog, is bugging me."

She draws inspiration from nature, including animals, plant life, and landscapes. While painting her favourite things, she keeps her grandmother, who was an artist herself, in her heart and mind.

She became involved in the Boreal Shores Art Tour thanks to her friend and lake neighbour, Krista Gibson, who was a part of the tour last year. Ryhorchuk is very enthusiastic about sharing her art with fellow Manitobans.

'Sadie is a role model for female riders," explained Sadie Grimm Ride Event Coordinator Mary Johnson.

Although motorcycling is often seen as a male-dominated industry, Grimm's ride served as proof that women are just as capable. As stated by Johnson in regards to female riders, "women can do that."

Johnson mentioned that there has been an increase of female riders over the last few years.

Since 2017, motorcyclists from Winnipeg and surrounding communities have hit the highways to fundraise for a new covered picnic shelter in Winnipeg Beach Provincial Park.

Apart from pausing for COVID-19 in 2020, this is the seventh year for the

Johnson explained that they tried sticking as close to Grimm's original route as possible.

To celebrate the rider's arrival, Rob Barg and Headingly Reunion played live music for the motorcyclists and community members to enjoy at Winnipeg Beach's Band Stand.

Johnson was particularly excited for this year's event as she got to display

Perpetually raising the bar(bell)

Seventy-four-year-old powerlifting vanguard adds to resumé with win at World Bench Press Championships

Susan Haywood has built a legacy of raising the bar.

Breaking barriers and pushing the limits is all this 74-year-old farmer from Erinview has known.

Haywood has been the queen of the Masters divisions in the growing sport of powerlifting for the better part of three decades, winning provincial and national championships by bench pressing, squatting and deadlifting astonishing amounts of weight that would make anyone's eyebrows raise.

She added "world champion" to her resumé earlier this month at the World Bench Press Championships in Austin, Tex. when she won her weight class in the Masters 4 (70-plus) division. Haywood was later surprised to find out that her best lift of 67.5 kilograms placed her in the top three competitors for her age in the world.

However, the accolades are merely the cherry on top. These days, Haywood doing it for a bigger purpose.

"Every time I go out — and I'm not bragging — always somebody comes up to me and says, 'You're my inspiration,' Haywood said recently. "If I can encourage one person to get off the couch and make themselves healthier, I will. I'll keep doing it because that's what inspires me to keep going."

Born in England, Haywood moved to the Winnipeg neighbourhood of Charleswood at 17 years old. She later married and uprooted to St. François Xavier, about 15 minutes west of the

Haywood's story in the gym began in the early 90s, shortly after her first husband died at an early age. Grieving from her partner's passing, she moved to St. James with her three

sons and started a hairdressing busi-

Still desperate for an outlet to vent her frustration, she turned to fitness.

"I decided to get myself together, so I started going to the gym and I started bodybuilding," she said.

Years later, Haywood found herself in the thick of the fitness community at a fundraiser for powerlifting and bodybuilding. It's where she met her current husband, Brock, who was a standout in his own right in the powerlifting world.

"Of course, the first question anybody ever asks you is, 'How much can you bench?' Haywood said. Her answer floored the powerlifters, to which they coaxed the 48-year-old to try the sport.

"Back then, drugs were a big part of bodybuilding, and of course, in my 40s I wasn't going to dabble in that," Haywood said. "That was putting me off because I would train just as hard as another person beside me, but she

would go on drugs and she would beat me at the last minute.

"I'm a very competitive person, and so with bodybuilding, I didn't feel like it was me being presented to the audience, it was either the drugs or my trainer or my diet. Whereas this, it's actually me being judged, and I want t be judged by who I am and not what I look like."

Haywood became an immediate sensation in the sport, impressing audiences with incredible feats of strength as a middle-aged and now-senior woman. Her legacy has reached new peaks in recent years.

In 2018, she became Canada's first female international powerlifting referee; In 2019, she became the first Masters-4 category female lifter in the country and set a new Canadian record in the division of a 73-kg bench

Haywood will turn 80 in 2029 — she plans to break another barrier.

"They don't have a Master 5 yet and I want to be the first," she said.

Brock has been Susan's partner in life and training for the last 30 years. He said that she's been a constant source of inspiration.

"Well, she is an inspiration just by the fact that she does what she does and she's been a vanguard," said Brock. "There were women powerlifters, but in Manitoba, the women that came and went didn't stick around as long. When Susan started, she was having success and she trained and kept going and because there weren't a lot of women her age, she was winning and doing world championships and going up against other ladies from around the world.

"Back here in Canada," he continued, "people saw her there and the old story is that people don't think they can do something until they see someone like them doing it. A lot of women have approached her over the years, and she has been an influence and an inspiration for them to get into

Susan said the growth in the sport has been encouraging, with more senior female lifters joining and athletes as young as 10 years old taking to powerlifting. She knows what the sport has done for her, and she'll continue to push everyone to try it.

"This sport is for every age and for every weight class," she said. "It's not what you look like, it's how much you can do and how much you train.

"I encourage everybody to try because you don't know until you try."

This winter, the clubs made a significant change, merging into one "super team" with players from both clubs.

They combined the two names Selkirk FC and Tri S Strikeforce to form "Selkirk Strikeforce," which pays tribute to both clubs.

As they began playing in their indoor winter league this year, the newly formed club took off, winning their division championship while having a full bench of substitute players.

As play has kicked off in the MMSL's regular season, the extra few months

1997-98 Smitty's Terminators step to the plate one last time

The Smitty's Terminators were the class of Manitoba's softball scene for much of the 90s.

During a time when there were no catchments to regulate where players played, the Terminators recruited a group of standouts on the diamond that would become the team

's core and go on to dominate at the local, regional and national level for years.

"We wound up our team to be the best team we could have, and it was an amazing — literally legendary — team because we won a number of national championships," said Melanie Fernandes, the team's longtime shortstop.

The Terminators junior female squad from 1997-98 was particularly powerful. They represented Manitoba at the Canadian Junior Championships both years, winning silver on each occasion with a balanced squad that could shutout opponents from the mound or run up the score on any given occa-

There was no junior league in the province, so the team of 17-21 year-olds got their playing time in the Ladies Fastpitch League of Winnipeg, against adult teams, and travelled to play other senior squads around the country.

One of the club's highlights came in 1997 when they travelled to Saskatchewan and defeated Saskatoon's senior women's team, a dominant squad in their own right that went on to win the senior nationals later that year. That game has stuck with players decades later and was a testament to just how strong this group of girls were.

"Probably, (that) was my favourite team I ever played on," Fernandes said.

Several members of that special Terminators team took their final bow together on May 11 as they were inducted into the Manitoba Softball Hall of Fame. Also in the Class of 2024 were athletes Kevin Bartley, Shelly Bohn, Nathan Giesbrecht, Mandy Greenberg and Ron Taylor; builder Steve Mymko; all-around contributor Fran Giesbrecht; and fellow teams, the 1979-80 Brandon Westman Merchants and 1974-75 St. Vital Flocking Ducks.

Fernandes and Leanne Papineau, who was the team's catcher, were both in attendance for what was each of their fifth inductions into a softball hall of fame. The St. Andrews residents were enshrined into the Manitoba hall together as members of the 1994-96 Smitty's midget girls team in 2014, and again in 2015 into the Canadian Softball Hall of

Fernandes is also in the Manitoba Softball Hall of Fame with the 1993-97 senior women's fast pitch team and 1995-97 team, which, in 2004, become the first female softball team to be inducted into those hallowed halls.

Papineau is one of the only players from those glory years to be enshrined as a player, which came

"Junior is a really tough age group," Papineau said. "You only have two years of junior, whereas you can play senior for (years). So, with junior only having two years to really be successful is quite challenging. That is part of why we were inducted.

"The people were probably the most memorable for me" she continued. "When you're practising two to three times per week, playing two times per week and then we really only had one weekend off

in the summer from beginning of May all the way to the end of August, they become your friends, then your teammates and the before you know it, they really do become your extended family.'

Papineau, who has a laundry list of accomplishments from the diamond next to her name, grew up in Winnipeg's north end and began playing softball at 12 for the Terminators.

She was a leader on the team, guiding with her words and her actions, while having the time of her life playing the sport she loved.

"I'm just reflecting and thinking how much time and work it was, but it didn't feel like work, like at all. We had baseball every single day and before we went to nationals, for two weeks leading up to that, it was twice a day," she said.

"It was a huge commitment but the energy that the girls brought all the time, it really never felt like work. I can honestly say that it's something that I think I feel so grateful to have been a part of and to have experienced because I can bring myself back there in that moment at any time."

It was during those years that she was also introduced to her Indigenous culture. Papienau, who is Métis, explored her heritage while playing at the North American Indigenous Games, where her teams won gold in 2002, 2006, 2007 and 2009. She also won at the Canadian Native Championships in 2008 and 2009 as a member of the Northern Lights.

"The opportunities are endless... but I think one of the biggest things is just really the places that I got to see and the people that I've met," she said. "People say to me all the time, 'How do you know so many people?' And I always say, 'Well, I'm not really quiet,' but I think that softball has created such a rich experience with meeting people and

Fernandes was raised in the west end of the Manitoba capital, taking to baseball as a 10-year-old.

She was fearless on the diamond, playing with boys for a couple of years and being assigned to play high-pressure positions like pitcher and shortstop, which she loved due to it being a hub for the action on the infield.

She was quickly scouted to play at higher levels and fit in seamlessly as the competition grew.

"We thrived on the competition," Fernandes said. "We'd have lots and lots of people watching our nationals, sometimes hundreds, under the lights. That was really cool back then to play under the lights, you didn't get to do that (often) like you do nowadays."

These days, many of the players from the Terminators days remain close and still play slo-pitch together. Papineau hung up the cleats for good last year but has coached softball and remains a trusted resources for youth who are developing in the

Fernandes has also broke into the coaching ranks and recently joined softball hall of fame board of directors, a position she will begin officially this fall.

At the end of a near-30-minute conversation, Fernandes reflected on what softball has meant to her. The success on the field kept her interested, she admitted, but her love for the game has grown deeper than the wins and losses.

"I guess it's all the things that gives you all the feels: learning resilience, being taught work ethic, the hardships of winning and losing and just the climb — really having to train with intent and reach your goals," she said.

"It has so many aspects to it," she continued. "Yes, the friendships that resulted from that, but just the sport itself kind brings you in. When you're in it and playing, it's just like a euphoria."

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

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
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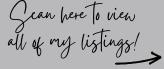
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
