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Family of murdered paraplegic relieved killer denied bail

The family of a disabled single mother killed by a bomb disguised as a Christmas gift was relieved to find out the man convicted of killing her will stay behind bars, at least for now.

An Alberta Court of Appeal judge denied convicted murderer Brian Malley, 57, bail pending a fall appeal last month.

Malley was found guilty of firstdegree murder in relation to the 2011 killing of Victoria Shachtay in February.

The disabled single mom was killed after opening a pipe bomb disguised as a Christmas gift left on her Innisfail, Alta. doorstep in 2011. She was 23.

Shachtay's father Victor was visiting family north of Selkirk in Libau when he heard the news.

He said the murder of his daughter was a senseless tragedy, and he is glad Malley will stay behind bars.

"That piece of scum should never be let out of jail as far as I'm concerned," he said.

Court of Appeal Justice Jean Côté said Malley has good reason to skip bail.

The former Alberta financial adviser is currently facing an \$80 million class-action lawsuit from clients who allege he lost an estimated \$50 million in their retirement savings. The allegations have not been proven.

At Malley's murder trial, court heard Shachtay had entrusted him with more than \$500,000 she received in a settlement from a car crash that left

her wheelchair bound.

The Crown successfully argued Malley killed Shachtay to cut his losses.



Victor said his life has never returned to normal since losing his daughter, but he's learned to deal with the loss. "I can sleep at night," he said." I came to terms with it, because of the experience before hand when she got into the accident and almost lost her life."

He remembers the day of his daughter's bombing well. He was at his home in Didsbury, Alta. when he learned of the death from his other daughter.

"She told me that they killed her," he recalls.

Victor said Victoria's daughter Destiny, who was seven years old at the time of her mother's killing, was her life.

"She was a very loving and caring mother," he said. "That's what she wanted. That's what her whole life was about."

Victoria's grandfather John Shachtay was also pleased with the result of Malley's bail hearing.

He said he wants to remind the public not to open any strange packages they may receive.

Victor said bombs serve as horrible murder weapons since they can kill anything they come in contact with.

"There's no way of telling who a bomb's going to kill," he said. "Bombs have no eyes, no compassion for anybody or anything."

When his daughter was killed, her live-in caregiver was home at the time of the bombing, but was not injured from the explosion. Destiny was not home when the explosion took her mother's life.

Malley's appeal is scheduled to be heard by a Calgary court in September.

Dauphin RCMP 'very pleased' with this year's Countryfest crowd

Dauphin RCMP say they are "very pleased" with this year's Dauphin Countryfest crowd.

In total, police laid 23 traffic violation charges, four liquor control act charges, two Criminal Code Breach of Probation charges and suspended one driver.

"Whether you like singer songwriters or you want to dance around to fiddles and banjos we can offer something for everybody," the festival's executive director Lynne Skromeda said. "We're a true family event, we've got a huge kids area ... it's a real sort of something for everyone kind of thing."

The Mariachi Ghost will open the festival on the main stage on Thurs-

Zebra mussel inspection sites set up shop in local waters

A hunt for zebra mussels took place in Selkirk over the weekend.

Manitoba Conservation and Water Stewardship had watercraft inspection stations with decontamination units set up in Selkirk and in Pine Falls over the weekend and into Monday as part of ongoing efforts to deal with the invasive species.

Roving watercraft inspection teams were also moving between boat launches at St. Vital Park in Winnipeg, Gimli, Winnipeg Beach, Silver/Arnes harbours and at Hnausa in the South Basin of Lake Winnipeg.

The mussels were discovered at a dock near Selkirk Park in May, and last Friday the province said it had evidence of zebra mussel larvae in the Red River near Emerson.

It's believed to be the first time the

species have been found in that portion of the Red River.

Conservation officials had been monitoring water in the Red River at Emerson since the discovery of adult zebra mussels in Pelican Lake, Minn., which is part of the Red River basin, in 2009.

The province vowed it would do everything it could to keep the species out of the Red River, but lost its fight in May.

Officials are now asking everyone to do their part to keep them from spreading further.

Boaters are being encouraged to clean and remove any visible aquatic plants, or mud from their watercrafts and trailers, and drain all water from motor, bilge, bait buckets and boat compartments.

All water-related equipment is to be

dried and watercraft compartments that may be hard to dry should be taken care of with a dry towel or sponge.

Unwanted bait and worms are also recommended to be disposed in the trash.

Zebra mussels spawn in warm waters and can spread easily across waterways by clinging onto boats going from one lake to

another. The species likes to cling onto hard

surfaces, damage engines, clog water systems, and can even cause buoys to sink.

They also pose a threat to lake ecology and threaten fish populations. To report a zebra mussel or any other AIS from a location, take pictures and visit the website at manitoba.ca/ stopais.ca or call 1-87-STOP AIS-0 (1-877-867-2470).

The province says increased awareness is what led to the reporting of zebra mussels when they were spotted on a dock near Selkirk Park this year.





Craft sales helping girl raise money for CancerCare

One woman's battle with cancer has inspired her granddaughter to raise hundreds towards finding a cure by selling various handmade crafts and accepting donations in her grandmother's honour.

Ten-year-old Janna Simko started selling craft items such as bracelets and key chains with the universal breast cancer awareness symbol, along with cuddle pillows, bookmarks and some baked goods after her grandmother Alberdina Anderson was diagnosed with small cell lung cancer in October 2014.

The young girl of East Selkirk recently donated \$865 from craft sales and donations to CancerCare Manitoba, something her proud 70-year-old grandmother was able to see before she lost her battle with cancer last Friday.

"She's just really proud that I'm doing this and happy with how much money I've raised," Simko said in between visits with her grandmother at Selkirk and District General Hospital last Wednesday. "When I started this I thought I was going to get around \$200 but now ... I just want to keep going."

Janna's mother Lynda Anderson-Simko said word of mouth throughout the community has helped raised

donations that the family hopes will go towards lung cancer research.

"I'm so proud of her, we all are, but really it's her way of kind of dealing with our situation," Anderson-Simko said."She just does this on her own ... I helped a little bit with a few things but for the most part she's driven."

Lung cancer remains the leading cause of cancer related deaths among both men and women in Manitoba and across Canada, according to the Canadian Cancer Society.

In Manitoba, an estimated 890 new cases of lung cancer will be diagnosed this year and 710 people will die of lung cancer.

Canadian Cancer Statistics 2015, a report released in May by the Canadi-

an Cancer Society in partnership with the Public Health Agency of Canada and Statistics Canada estimates that 277,000 Canadians will be diagnosed with cancer by 2030, up from about 200,000 this year and 155,000 just a decade ago.

The report states a growing aging population is to blame for the increase in expected cases.

In Manitoba, the number of new cancer cases will grow at the slowest rate in all of Canada. By 2032 there are expected to be 8,255 cancer diagnosis annually. Of the newly diagnosed cancers, more than half – 51 per cent – will be prostate, breast, lung and colorectal.

However, the report also states that progress is being made thanks to efforts to prevent cancer, research into early detection and treatment as well as screening programs.

The cancer death rate in Canada continues to decline and survival rate – at 63 per cent – continues to increase. Janna has been selling her crafts and various items at craft sales in Selkirk. Those interested in donating or making a purchase can watch for Janna's crafts at upcoming local farmers markets throughout the summer.

"When my grandma got diagnosed I donated my hair as well," Janna said, adding she feels this is her way of helping her family through a difficult time. "Every year I've just sold random crafts but this year I made a bunch of bracelets.

"I've been working really hard and we're going to write another cheque later on because we got more donations."

The family also plans to take part in this year's Relay for Life in Selkirk this September in memory of Anderson.


how generous he was but also how willing he was to help students today that are graduating to learn a little bit more about Selkirk's history," Long said. "It was powerful to explain to the grads."

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Hundreds of volunteer firefighters to benefit from tax credit

Meeting 200-hour requirement could be tough for smaller stations, local fire chief points out

A new provincial tax credit will see volunteer firefighters and other search and rescue personnel save up to \$324 come tax season early next year, but less than half of the volunteers are expected to qualify for the program.

The province announced new tax credits for volunteers back in April when the provincial budget was unveiled, and Finance Minister Greg Dewar reaffirmed the announcement at a press conference in Selkirk last Friday.

"Every year, hundreds of communities across the province rely on friends and neighbours who volunteer their time as firefighters or on search and rescue missions to help keep Manitobans safe," Dewar said in a press release. "This new tax credit will help offset some of the financial costs these brave Manitobans face as part of their service."

In order to qualify for the tax credit,

volunteers must give 200 hours in either search and rescue or firefighting services.

There are approximately 3,500 volunteer firefighters in Manitoba across 240 different departments, but only 1,600 volunteers are expected to benefit from the credit, which is modeled after a similar program offered by the federal government that allows volunteers to claim up to \$3,000 in credits.

Clandeboye Deputy Fire Chief Kim Henderson said it might be hard for smaller stations like his to meet the 200-hour requirement.

"I think it's quite a stretch to get that amount," Henderson said. "You have to be a busy hall for that."

Henderson estimates Clandeboye Fire Department responds to around 50 or 60 calls a year, but most are short, lasting usually under three hours.

Selkirk Fire Chief Dan Thorsteinson welcomed the announcement and said the timing couldn't be better as

the number of volunteer firefighters is on the decline.

"It's an excellent thing," Thorsteinson said.

Thorsteinson said he doesn't anticipate any members of the Selkirk Fire Department will have a hard time meeting the 200-hour quota.

"There may be some very small communities that would probably have a hard time with that, but 200 hours, it can be done,"Thorsteinson said.

Manitoba Association of Fire Chiefs president Martin Haller also welcomed the new credit.

"The volunteer firefighter tax credit is an important tool to help retain the membership of fire departments in rural communities, which is one of the priorities of our association," Haller said in a press release.

Historic Lower Fort Garry to receive \$13.9M in upgrades, repairs

A popular historical site just south of Selkirk is receiving \$13.9 million in federal funding for much needed repairs and improvements. Selkirk-Interlake MP James Bezan made the announcement on behalf of Environment Minister and the Minister responsible for Parks Canada Leona Aglukkag at Lower Fort Garry

last Thursday.

"The site as you look around needs repair to the historic limestone perimeter walls ... investments from our government will allow Parks

Canada to restore those walls so that they're not only in good condition but also remain historically accurate to the way they were back in 1850," Bezan told the small crowd in attendance. "Our government recognizes the importance of stimulating economic growth through essential infrastructure investments at national historic sites."

At Lower Fort Garry, \$5.9 million will go towards repairing the perimeter limestone walls, \$3.4 million will go towards insulation and heat for the Fur Loft, improving accessibility to the Big House and improving and upgrading fire protection and electrical systems for the Big House, Fur Loft and Men's House, and \$4.6 million will also go towards replacing the site's water and wastewater system which is currently nearing the end of its service life.

No date has been set as of yet regarding when these repairs and improvements will begin.

Included in Thursday's infrastructure announcement totalling \$14.3 million for several Parks Canada sites across Manitoba is restoration work at the heritage railway station that is home to Parks Canada Visitor Centre in Churchill as well as repair work at Cape Merry Battery, which is part of Prince of Wales Fort National Historic Site in Churchill.

Rehabilitation efforts to the Big House at Lower Fort Garry will mean the site's central historic building will be able to welcome visitors safely, Bezan added.

The local historic site, which is where Treaty No. 1 was signed and where the original Selkirk Settlers came for supplies, welcomes more than 35,000 visitors each year.

Across Canada, more than 21 million visits are made annually to Canada's national parks, historical sites and marine and conservation areas.



Weather fails to dampen spirits at horse show for cancer

Schott tearfully explained her husband's three-year struggle with cancer, and how he wouldn't let it interfere with his four kids' lives.

"Through all of that he continued to

let the girls show," Schott said. Schott was overwhelmed with the amount of support her family received during this year's show.

She said her late husband would

have been deeply moved to see the show.

"I think he'd be pretty proud," Schott said. "I've just got so many volunteers."

She gave special thanks to Stonewall Equine 4-H club, Steeltown Ford and the St. Andrews and St. Clements Agriculture Society for letting the show take place on Selkirk Park's rodeo grounds.

"Without them none of this would be at all possible," she said.

Stony Mountain resident Linda Park came out to the show for the first time with her three kids and loved it.

"It's great," Park said. "It's an excellent show for the kids especially for beginners."

All proceeds from Saturday are going to the CancerCare Manitoba Foundation and the Brain Tumour Foundation of Canada.

Schott didn't have a fundraising goal for Saturday, but said to date almost \$25,000 has been raised for the two organizations.

Money raised from Saturday's show will help families with loved ones battling cancer pay for unexpected costs associated with treatment like hotel stays and parking fees.

Schott said when she took her husband to Winnipeg from Warren for cancer treatments costs added up quickly.

"A lot of times I couldn't even take my kids with me, because I couldn't afford to take them and feed them," Schott said.

Mountie back at work after pleading guilty to Grand Beach assault

A Manitoba Mountie who admitted to assaulting a man outside a Grand Beach area bar will continue to serve on the police force.

The *Winnipeg Free Press* has reported Cpl. Jeffrey Thomas Moyse, 46, pleaded guilty to assault last month ending a lengthy legal battle that has gone on for almost seven years.

Moyse was given an absolute discharge from the Crown, which means he will maintain a clean criminal record and continue to serve as an **RCMP** officer.

He was convicted of assault after a

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2011 trial and given a four-month jail sentence. His partner, Const. Trevor Ens, was also convicted of assault and given a four-month conditional sentence. But the Manitoba Court of Appeal overruled that decision and ordered a new trial after questions were raised over the credibility of the victim and a blurry video used as evidence at the trial. Moyse entered a guilty plea

punched in both the face and stomach, and thrown around by Ens and Movse outside a hydro station the officers had driven him to after he was arrested outside the Birchwood Motor Hotel parking lot in 2008.

was kicked in the head and throat,

The accused denied Papineau's claims, but admitted they questioned the man who they suspected was attempting to drive impaired.

A judge during the original trial concluded the officers had no grounds to arrest the man and said the officers committed a serious breach of trust.

The guilty plea Moyse entered is now only regarding Papineau being shoved to the ground.

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Gov't spends nearly \$1M on Steady Growth ads, signs in 2014

Manitoba taxpayers are on the hook for the almost \$1 million the Manitoba government spent on signs and advertisements for its Steady Growth, Good Jobs campaign.

The Canadian Press reported last month \$665,474 was spent on radio, TV, and newspaper ads in the last fiscal year that ended March 31.

The information was obtained by the news agency through a freedom of information request.

The province also spent \$327,261 on a program that sees signs displaying the words "Steady Growth" and "Good Jobs" installed at road construction sites, public housing renovations, and other locations where infrastructure work has occurred.

There are several of the signs throughout the Interlake including Selkirk at the construction site of the city's new hospital.

The province's signs are similar to ones erected by the federal government, which promote the Harper government's economic action plan.

Opposition leader Brian Pallister wants the auditor general to investigate the provincial government's campaign for any partisan messaging. He said the Steady Growth, Good Jobs campaign is a misuse of taxpayer

money.

Government spokeswoman Rachel Morgan dismissed Pallister's call and said the province is proud of the campaign.

"We're providing good jobs for Manitobans and critical investments to our aging infrastructure," Morgan told the Record via email.

Morgan said Manitobans want to know how their tax dollars are being spent and the government is focused on letting citizens know about

advertises programs and services supported by their individual budgets.

Morgan added it was the NDP who brought in the Elections Financing Act, which places an advertising blackout 90 days before an election to create what she called an even playing field for all parties prior to voters going to the polls.

The provincial law left an information chill across the province earlier this year when a byelection in The Pas was called.

At the time, government officials refused to respond to a wide range of media inquires including ones made by the Record regarding Selkirk's new hospital.

The Steady Growth, Good Jobs Campaign was launched in 2013 after the province raised the provincial sales tax by one per cent.

It is meant to show taxpayers that money from the hike is being used on infrastructure projects.

Co-op nursery hoping to help reopen after school program

A before and after school program in Clandeboye slated to close its doors for good last week may reopen under new management this September.

Interlake Co-op Nursery plans on taking over the childcare program at William S. Patterson School and is already accepting registration forms from parents hoping to enroll their children.

The nursery's director Cheryl Longley said the organization still has some red tape to cut through, but if all goes well, the program will be up and running by the first day of school in September.

The organization already has a nursery school on Highway 8 and had been considering taking over the before and after school program ever since the YMCA announced it was pulling the plug on the program.

Longley said since preschoolers who go to the nursery school will eventually attend William S. Patterson it only makes sense for the group to take over the program.

She said the group is trying to keep the YMCA's program intact and parents should notice little difference this fall.

"We're trying not to make too many changes to it so you know hopefully it'll just be business as usual come September," Longley said.

Under the current government subsidized program, as many as 15 students from kindergarten to Grade 6 can come for two hours before school

and stay for three hours in the evening.

Longley said in September the program could welcome as many as 20 children.

The YMCA announced earlier this year it was closing the program indefinitely due to it being no longer financially viable for the organization to keep running.

The announcement came after the Y stopped allowing kindergarten students into the program, a move highly criticized by some parents.

William S. Patterson parent council chair Vivian Desjarlais said it was discouraging to see the only licensed childcare program in the area shut down.

"It was removing a very important staple of our community," Desjarlais said.

The school's principal Glen Jede shared the same sentiment.

"We were quite concerned as there were a number of kids that do use that program," Jede said.

Longley said the Lord Selkirk School Division has been very supportive of takeover plans and a lease has already been signed.

"We're just so thankful that they've come along ... because it is a valuable program that a lot of our families really rely upon," Jede said.

Longley said once Interlake Coop Nursery hires an early childhood educator and gets through some red tape with the province, the program should resume.

Although this is her last year as principal of the school, she said the song about belonging and what makes the



Ashton faces flood of controversy over dam purchases

Embattled Infrastructure and Transportation Minister Steve Ashton faced calls for his resignation from the Manitoba Tories last week after revelations a \$5 million purchase of flood-fighting equipment wasn't tendered.

Opposition leader Brian Pallister demanded Premier Greg Selinger remove Ashton from cabinet after allegations the minister committed to \$5-million in spending for flood protection equipment while being in a potential conflict with the supplier of the gear.

The demand comes just weeks after a sweeping report in the *Winnipeg Free Press* revealed the controversial purchase helped trigger an internal caucus revolt last fall that saw five cabinet ministers resign in protest of Selinger as premier.

The \$5-million was for Tiger Dam flood tubes purchased last July for the Interlake Tribal Council, which was to use the gear for several flood-prone First Nations including Peguis.

Peter Ginakes is the distributor of the equipment in Manitoba and has close ties to Ashton, which have come under fire from the Tories, who have accused the minister of giving flood money to his friend.

The federal government paid for the equipment, but the province handled

the transaction with Ashton playing a key role in the deal.

Pallister said Ashton is in a conflict since Ginakes has given him political donations dating as far back as 2009.

"What we have here is an undeclared conflict that has created extreme doubts in the minds of many," Pallister said at a press conference last Tuesday.

The provincial ombudsman's office has said the allegations while unproven are serious enough to be considered a "wrongdoing" under the Public Disclosure Act.

The office launched an investigation into a whistleblower's complaint late last year over the mater, but never finished the investigation.

Both Ashton and Selinger have said they welcome the reopening of the whistleblower's complaint by the ombudsman, as it will clear the embattled minister of any wrongdoing.

But Pallister demanded Selinger remove Ashton from his position in cabinet.

"It is essential that he take immediate action to remove this minister," he said.

Pallister said the tendering process with the Tiger Dams was questionable and raises concern for businesses that are interested in responding to provincial tenders.

The Free Press report also cited unnamed sources as saying the purchasing of the Tiger Dams led to calls Selinger should resign as leader from five rebel ministers.

The whistleblower claimed attempts were made to dodge the funding approval process at the provincial treasury board, which is responsible for government spending.

Jennifer Howard chaired the board at the time of the deal, and is one of the five ministers who later resigned from cabinet and called for Selinger's resignation.

Former Jobs and Economy Minister Theresa Oswald and Municipal Government Minister Stan Struthers were also on the board at the time of the deal and later resigned from their positions.

Ashton retains he has done nothing wrong and denies allegations the deal helped trigger the internal caucus revolt last fall.

Major improvements to Birds Hill Park lake, beach now complete

Sun seekers are sure to notice some big changes at Birds Hill Provincial Park now that facility improvements and a major expansion of the lake and beach area have now been completed.

"Birds Hill Park is one of our busiest provincial parks, and we know Manitoba families and visitors to our province will enjoy these improvements," Premier Greg Selinger said in a release on Monday. "From expanded beach space to a larger swimming area and improved water quality, this is a park all us can be proud of."

The improvements are part of Building the Park Province: Manitoba's Parks Strategy, an eight-year commitment to invest \$100 million into park infrastructure by 2020.

The lake and beachfront project involved a number of key improvements including:

• removing concrete barriers between the three existing beaches for improved swimmer safety and shoreline accessibility;

improving walking paths from the east and west parking lots to the lake;
adding trees, volleyball courts,

a playground and new furniture to beautify the park;

• greatly improved water quality through enhancements to the lake bottom including the removal of vegetation; and

• adding 15,000 square metres of area to the lake, increasing the swimming area by 20 per cent.

Beach safety will be enhanced through the addition of two extra beach safety officers during the offpeak season and four more officers on

staff during the peak time of July and August. During peak times there will be up to 20 officers on staff, making this the largest beach safety program in the provincial

park system. 5 Selinger also 6 announced the province is com-1 mitting \$4.8 mil-1 lion for future 6 projects including 1 improvements to



the campground, the west gate, and water and waste-water systems to be completed over the next four years.



Digital mammography will speed up detection: Blady

A provincial system for digital mammography will help reduce diagnostic wait times and introduce new technology to breast cancer detection services, Health Minister Sharon Blady announced last week.

"As part of our goal to bring even better care closer to home, Manitobans across the province will have access to digital mammography," Blady said in a release last Friday. "Images captured in one region will be available to radiologists working in another, helping speed up turnaround times and diagnoses that may lead to faster treatment if needed."

Blady added contributions from the

CancerCare Manitoba Foundation are helping support the purchase of the new mobile screening vehicles.

With digital mammography, images are viewed on a workstation monitor and stored electronically rather than transferred to film.

"Digital mammography is a significant advancement in our technology

for the detection of breast cancer," said Dr. Sri Navaratnam, president and chief executive officer, CancerCare Manitoba. "It's a major improvement in system efficiency that will benefit Manitobans."

Breast cancer is one of the most common forms of cancer among women in Manitoba with almost 900 diagnosed each year. About 90,000 Manitobans have a mammogram every year. Approximately 50,000 are screening mammograms through the CancerCare Manitoba's BreastCheck program.

Following negotiations, the timeframe for full provincewide digital mammography operations is approximately 10 months, Blady said. She noted the first provincial site to receive a digital mammography system will be the Brandon Regional Health Centre in September 2015, adding that other sites will receive digital mammography between October 2015 and April 2016.

Blady said the strategic investments in breast cancer diagnosis and treatment will build on Manitoba's broader \$40-million strategy to improve the cancer patient journey, first announced in June 2011. The goal of this initiative is to shorten the journey from suspicion of cancer as a diagnosis to treatment in under 60 days.



Fence etiquette prevents disputes

People fortunate enough to own their own plots of land often choose to fence in their pieces of paradise. Fences serve many purposes: to designate property boundaries, keep pets or children contained in a safe environment, corral livestock, offer privacy or add aesthetic appeal.

Although installing a fence may seem like the right idea for you, going about it the wrong way may lead to problems among neighbors, particularly if you live where the houses are relatively close to one another. Some homeowners find fences become the final point of contention among disagreeable neighbors or create tension with a neighbor with whom you previously had a good relationship. Being courteous with fence plans is the way to avoid any animosity along the way.

There are certain things you must

do and should do if you plan to erect a fence. Most people find neighbors appreciate being informed of any decisions you are thinking of making to the property that can affect their views or their adjoining property. Before drawing up fence plans with a contractor, talk to the neighbors on either side of your home and gauge their receptiveness to a fence. At this point, you may want to consider offering to make the fencing project a joint deal to save money should the neighbors decide to install a fence as well. Contractors will often discount if they have several customers doing an installation at the same time. Property owners can save by splitting the costs of the shared walls of the fence where their property lines meet.

Explain your case for the fence. Most neighbors are receptive to the idea if



they know the reasoning -- especially if the desire for a fence is not to keep them at bay. It's hard to protest a fence that is a safety precaution for children. If your neighbor already has a fence, you must ask whether you can connect your fence panels into the support post on your shared side.

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Once you notify your neighbors as a courtesy, there are certain steps to take that will prevent any legal disputes down the road. Even the most easygoing neighbor could grow aggravat-

ed if the fence is put up carelessly or ends up partially on his property. The best way to prevent this is to apply for a new, professional property survey and have property lines indicated with paint or wood markers.

Each town or city has different regulations with regard to fencing, so it is important to learn the ropes or hire a contractor who is familiar with the rules. It might be illegal to install fences directly on the property line. The law might require the fence be installed a few inches inward. There also may be rules about how high fences can be in the front of the home, sides and back. Corner lot properties may have added regulations depending on whether the fence could prove a visual obstruction to drivers.

Once all the details are checked, you may have to apply for a fence permit. This way the construction of the fence and finished product will meet safety standards, and the area in which you live can provide consistent quality control. If the fence is installed by code, there is little chance it will have to be torn down or changed in the near future. Also, doing it by the book means that a neighbor can be unhappy about a fence but not have legal recourse to ask you to remove it.

As an added form of courtesy, it is proper fence etiquette to put the "good" side of the fence facing the neighbors' yards. That means the side of the fence that doesn't show the support panels and posts. Remember, it is your fence so you are also responsible for all maintenance of the fence -- on all sides. Just because your neighbor also will be benefitting from your fence, doesn't mean he will have to care for it.

Stir in ricotta, spinach, 1 cup (250 mL) of the mozzarella and pepper; combine well. Toss with cooked pasta (don't worry if pasta tears).

Spread 1-1/3 cups (325 mL) pasta sauce into each of two 9-inch (23 cm) deep-dish glass pie plates; layer with pasta mixture. Spread remaining pasta sauce over top of each; sprinkle each with Parmesan and remaining mozzarella. (Can be covered and refrigerated or frozen.) Cover loosely with foil and bake in 350° F (180° C) oven for 30

in 1 1/2-quart casserole. Stir in pasta.

Bake at 400°F 20 minutes or until hot.



minutes. Uncover and bake for 5 minutes. Let stand for 5 minutes before cutting to serve.
