# Petersfield comes together to renew Mallard statue

Local monument comes back from the duck-tor good as new

The Mallard statue in Peterfield's Mallard Park was a bit under the feather, so the Petersfield Community Club created the Mallard Duck Fundraising Committee and, with some help from the community, they fundraised enough to be able to repair the rusty spots and give the duck a nice new paint job.

"We want to thank the Petersfield volunteers ... This community is one of the most generous with their time and effort. Now we're able to get projects like this done. A couple of months ago, this duck did not look all that great. But today, it's a huge improvement," said Gary Alexander, head of the Mallard Duck Fundraising Committee, at the unveiling.

The duck statue was put up in Mallard Park in 1996 and represents the community's history of duck hunting and the great number of mallards in particular in the marsh.

"People have been coming here hunting and fishing, American hunters came out in the 50s and 60s, and the Marsh was loaded with ducks at that time," said Alexander

The damage to the duck which included rust stains was noticed a few years ago.

"It was quite concerning at the time because we worried about the rust and the infrastructure because of the fibreglass and there's rebar in there," said Alexander

The final repair was done by local artist Frank Megyesi, who is the same artist who did the restoration of the statue 17 years ago.

"It wasn't waterlogged but there was water in it. We drained it. We fixed it then we had to paint," said Megyesi.

He believes that these art pieces represent the people and their coming together.

Megyesi hopes that this repair will last at least as long as the last one.

The Mallard Duck Monument is not just important to people in Petersfield. It also has historical significance being listed by the Manitoba Historical Society under their Historic Sites of Manitoba. It is also part of several

public sculptures made by local artist Wayne Arthur. His work can also be found at the Forks National Historic Site. The statue is not only a historically resonant symbol in the community, however, but it also represents a com-Continued on page 5

# Long-term care residents enjoy cuddles from a happy dog

It takes a very special dog to have the personality to come into a longterm care home and instantly connect with residents there and luckily for the residents of Tudor House Personal Care Home local dog Bella is the perfect fit.

Bella's owner Dave Friesen said that Bella is this talented at just four years old

"We got her when she was two and a half. She is a golden doodle. Her mother was a standard black poodle, all black and her dad was a golden retriever, more on the reddish side, like some of her highlights," he said.

Bella got the gig volunteering at Tudor House when a family member of one of the residents, knowing that her own dog was a big hit at the home, connected Friesen and the staff at Tudor House as they believed that Bella's personality would be a great fit for a setting like this.

"I came down and had a visit with [Melanie Thomas, social worker at Tudor House] and Denise [Smith, Tudor House's Recreation Facilitator] and the rest is kind of history. We come here every Thursday for about an hour," said Friesen.

Smith feels that there is definite value for residents to be able to see a dog

for a visit at the home.

"Residents get excited when Thursday comes; knowing that Bella and Dave will be arriving after breakfast. They hurry back to their rooms in anticipation of Bella arriving at their door. When they see her, their faces light up with huge smiles. Some Residents are prepared with treats. Bella brings back memories of dogs they once had," explained Smith.

Friesen said that everyone loved Bella from the first visit.

"The folks have amazing stories. So many people over the years have had a pet of some kind, whether it was a cat or a dog or whatever. Bella brings back so many great memories for a lot of these folks. They'll tell me stories about the dogs that they had, some really cool stories. And, we just have a really good time. They love petting her and being around her," said Friesen.

He explained that Bella's calm personality and want of attention are also an asset when it comes to coming into a setting like this.

"We head down the hallways, some of the interactions are in the

# **RCMP** Report: Help make our community safer

Selkirk and area RCMP have been kept busy responding to a multitude of calls for service throughout the first half of July 2024. From July 1 to the 15, local Mounties responded to 787 calls for service. This number of calls come from the City of Selkirk, the RM of St. Andrews, the RM of St. Clements, Brokenhead Ojibway First Nation, Grand Marais, the RM of East St. Paul and RM of West St. Paul.

Included in this large variety of calls for service were: seven Break and Enters, six Mischiefs, 15 Assaults and nine Impaired operation of a motor vehicle investigations. There is a huge number of calls that will not be mentioned in this report due to their sensitive nature. But here are some that you may be able to help out with:

On July 1, a black Ford F250 truck was stolen from a business on Walker Ave. in the City of Selkirk. Investigation is still ongoing for this matter and the vehicle has not been recovered.

On July 10, a white Ford F250 truck was stolen from a location of Hall Road in the RM of St. Andrews. The vehicle was later recovered in Winnipeg. At this time, no suspects or witnesses of this crime have been brought to light.

On July 12, a white Ford F150 was stolen from a residence on

Stanley Ave. in the City of Selkirk. The vehicle has not been recovered and the matter is still under investigation by police.

On July 13, a black Dodge Ram ½ ton was stolen of off Highway 59 near Gull Lake, Manitoba. This vehicle has not yet been recovered and has no suspects or witnesses.



# Province issues heat-health advisory for outdoor workers

#### Submitted by the government of Manitoba

Last week, Manitoba Health, Seniors and Long-Term Care advised that hot and humid conditions are forecasted to continue for most parts of Mani-

Everyone is at risk for the effects of heat. People who work or exercise in heat are at greater risk.

Workers in outdoor workplaces are advised to take necessary precautions including

- drink cold water regularly to stay hydrated, avoid consuming too much caffeine and sugary drinks;
- take breaks in ventilated, cool, and shady areas;
- wear breathable, lightweight, loose and light-coloured cloth-
- apply water-resistant SPF30 or higher sunscreen and reapply every two hours;
- recognize and address symptoms of heat-related illnesses in yourself and your colleagues;
- be aware that certain medications, recreational drugs or preexisting conditions may lower your ability to feel heat and/or sweat:

- wear wide-brim hats or similar hats;
- start outdoor work early and do indoor tasks during the hottest times of day if possible;
- acclimatize to heat by gradually increasing your working hours in the heat over a period of days;
- work in spaces with air flow, add fans if you can;
- mist yourself regularly with water; and
- eat cool foods such as fruits.

Employers are also advised to take precautions including:

- develop a heat stress exposure control plan, provide emergency procedures and appropriate first aid materials;
- modify the environment and processes to reduce heat exposure such as providing shade, drinking water and fans;
- prevent employees from working alone as much as possible, and have communication systems in place if working alone is unavoidable;
- adjust and rotate work/rest cycles and job tasks to keep

- employees cool, schedule hard physical activities for the coolest part of the day;
- educate workers to recognize and address heat-related illness-
- practise acclimatizing employees to working in the heat by slowly increasing the number of working hours in the heat over a period of days.

# Selkirk RCMP respond to fatal collision

On July 23, 2024, around 7:45 p.m., Selkirk RCMP were notified of a lone car accident on Chalet Beach Road, approximately three kilometres east of Highway 9 in the RM of St. Andrews. A driver passing by discovered a vehicle partially submerged in the ditch along a gravel path.

Officers attended the scene. The local fire department and Emergency Medical Services were also on scene. A 69-year-old woman from the RM of Rockwood was located deceased inside the vehicle. She was the only occupant of the vehicle.

It appears the vehicle she was driving lost control on the gravel and went into the ditch, rolling onto its roof. There was approximately three feet of water in the ditch at the time of

the collision.

The deceased was wearing a seatbelt and alcohol does not appear to be a factor in the collision.

The investigation continues with the assistance of an RCMP Forensic Collision Reconstructionist.

The Gwen Fox Gallery is hosting its All Members show this month. This is a great time to see many different styles of art by regional artists as all members of the gallery have the chance to participate in this show. There will be woodworking, pottery, beadwork, fabric art, fibre art, and of course paintings in all different types of mediums to enjoy.

Because it would be impossible to feature everyone from the show the *Selkirk Record* caught up with three of the exhibit's artists Melanie Shumilak, Drew Perry and Ida MacKenzie.

#### Ida MacKenzie

MacKenzie has brought two of her acrylic pieces to the gallery this month but this accomplished artist is multi-disciplinary working in many different mediums to create paintings as well as being an accomplished potter and a wood carver.

"I paint what I see in nature and that tells me a story that I hope that people that come in to see my art in the gallery can relate to their stories," said MacKenzie.

The two pieces that MacKenzie has in this month's show are both acrylic landscapes with a fantastical edge.

"They're both from the Birds Hill Park area. I do a lot of walking in Birds Hill Park. I live in Oakbank and it's beautiful there all the time wherever you walk. I take a lot of pictures and then I go home and I think from there. These are the stories of my walks in Birds Hill Park, one in the fall in the winter," said MacKenzie.

MacKenzie says that much of her inspiration comes from nature. She spends time in northwestern Ontario in addition to Manitoba and captures our beautiful landscape.

"It's just totally nature wherever I go it's to nature. And when I carved, I carved birds and ducks and that kind of thing, too. So that all relates back to nature, and how much I enjoy it," said MacKenzie.

Her art journey began when her parents decided to enrol her in art classes when she was young.

"There were eight of us in there and we all had our little tables and we painted in oil and I still have those paintings," she said.

MacKenzie has been a creative person for her entire life but for people who want to start on their creative journey, she suggests that they not be afraid.

"Paint as much as you want. I have a grand-daughter that I know is going to be way better than I ever was. I

can just see it and she's always [creating] and I just keep supplying her with supplies and she just keeps doing it. I just think practice, if you really want to do it. this month's exhibit each show how very beautiful this region of the province really is.

"Photography is a way of seeing the world differently. It enables me to see things that I wouldn't see otherwise and share them with other people and then also to retain special moments. Memories fade and photographs last. I like to have that for myself, but also to share," said Perry.

He said that he was honoured to have his two pieces in this month's exhibit.

"I've got one that is called Floodway in the Fall, which is not often how people see the floodway. It's a shallow stream going through it and I came across it by accident and the light was wonderful, a bit of haze in the sky from the summer's forest fires," said Perry.

His other piece is a second landscape this one taken in St. Andrews and is aptly named Haybales in St. Andrews.

"It's just on River Road and was from last fall. Haybales with a light dusting of frost on them gathered around a mature tree in a field and the sun was going down and so the sky was shining," said Perry.

Though Perry lives in Winnipeg he has a unique connection to our area having worked at Lower Fort Garry at one time. From there, he has maintained friends in the area and so the Gwen Fox Gallery was on his radar.

Perry's artistic journey began well before that, however, as he comes from an artistic family.

"Photography was part of my growing up. My dad loved to take photographs and had an artistic side, we did watercolours and oils, and so I was exposed to it at a young age. He passed on his father's camera to me when I was about 17 and I began taking pictures with a camera that you were able to adjust properly, not just on auto," said Perry.

He says that his inspiration comes from landscapes, of course, but he's also attracted to taking picture of people and having a wife who is a gardener brought forth a passion for taking photos of her flowers.

His advice for people who want to

pick up a camera and get started is that you don't need anything fancy.

"The quality of cameras in phones is extraordinary. So, that's a good place to start or a small entry-level digital camera, if you want to be able to expand the number of photos you take to save them for the future. Then I just think begin shooting. Shoot anything that catches your eye and learn to refine your vision based on that on what appeals to you," he said.

Perry also encourages everyone to visit the gallery saying that he's been impressed by the variety and quality of art that he's seen on display.

"I think it deserves to be seen and enjoyed by many," he said.

#### Melanie Shumilak

Selkirk Residents will know Shumilak from her work as director of Selkirk United Church's Dessert Theater productions or her spot as visual arts coordinator for the Selkirk & District Arts Festival but something that they may not realize is that her creativity transcends genres as she has two pottery pieces in this month's art gallery.

"It's pottery. It's 3d. It's a little bit creative. It's functional which is the unique part of it," said Shumilak.

Her first piece is a wall hanging that Shumilak explained could also be used as a chatutery board plate. It's called La Fleur and features a lily of the valley. The second piece is a plate which is titled Blue Lace because of the delicate blue lace pattern that has been put on it.

Shumilak is a recent addition to the Gwen Fox Gallery with classes being her gateway into the community.

"I started with pottery lessons back in June and joined with my daughter and her husband. And now my grandchildren are taking pottery lessons. And I've been coming to the additional classes drop-in classes on Tuesdays," she said.

Shumilak said that her journey into creation came later in life. Coming from a family that didn't do art she picked up a paintbrush when she retired and has since also tried her hand

# Asham Stompers perform at Levee on the Lawn

After a successful first round of reaching jigging in St. Laurent, Eva Kerbrat has done anything but slow down.

The locally raised dancer is fresh off nine weeks of jigging classes, having taught more than 13 locals how to improve on or start their jigging. Kerbrat said the classes went well, and everyone improved considerably from the first class to the last one. She taught children under 15 in one class, and right after, she taught adults.

Having danced since she was five, Kerbrat is no stranger to busy schedules. Though her dance classes just finished, she hasn't. Kerbrat dances with the Asham Stompers, a well-known jigging group of about a dozen dancers, give or take. Her younger sister, Vanessa Kerbrat, recently developed an interest in jigging, and having learned from one of the best, she too started dancing more often and more seriously, eventually joining the Asham Stompers as well.

The traditional Red River Métis jigging group was invited to perform for 40 minutes by the King's representative in Manitoba, Lt.-Gov. Anita Neville, on the grounds of Government House on June 22. This was the Lieutenant Governor's first-ever Levee on the Lawn, and the Asham Stompers adorned their new costumes for the event. The Kerbrat sisters like the bright new outfits, their dresses shining red, blue, and white as they spin.

"It was a really good show," said

Eva Kerbrat, adding eight of them performed that day, four women and four men dancing in pairs.

Before the Levee on the Lawn, though, the Asham Stompers made the trek to Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, to partake in the country's largest folkloric festival, The Festival Vallarta Azteca (FESTVA). The 18th annual festival featured free performances from dance groups worldwide, one of which was the Asham Stompers from Manitoba, Canada. From April 28 to May 5, they danced along the Malecon, Puerto Vallarta's famous boardwalk, amid people, lights, food, and décor.

The shows the Asham Stompers performed in Mexico were around 30 minutes each, and they danced more than once. As the Kerbrats go to Mexico often, the culture wasn't anything new to them, and they fully enjoyed the experience.

"It was more of learning and experiencing the different cultures," said Vanessa Kerbrat.

The Kerbrats don't know what's next, but Eva Kerbrat is hoping to offer more jigging lessons to the community in the fall. She has yet to determine if they'll be in St. Laurent, Stonewall, or both, but she knows it will happen.

"Just being with everybody, the energy the people," she said. "It's fun. Everybody's smiling and clapping and us, the dancers, we're smiling and laughing and clapping."

# Cross-country event to make a difference for nature

The Big Backyard BioBlitz runs this August long weekend

Ready, set, snap! The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) is calling on people across Canada to get outside this August long weekend to document the nature around them, in the name of science.

The non-profit's fourth annual Big Backyard BioBlitz aims to create a snapshot of nature in Canada, by encouraging people of all ages to observe and document the nature around them.

People can participate solo or with a group, and as often as they want, over the first weekend in August. The Big Backyard BioBlitz is a family-friendly activity that's engaging for all ages, no matter a person's level of knowledge about nature. Every observation can help conservation groups and scientists understand the state of local biodiversity, track at-risk species and even tackle invasive ones.

People can use their smartphones, tablets or digital cameras to snap photos or record audio of birds, insects, plants and other species wherever they happen to be, and then upload them to the event's online database

By documenting the wild species in their neighbourhoods, including plants, birds, insects, mammals, reptiles, amphibians, lichen and fungi, participants help scientists map species and monitor changes over time. Big Backyard BioBlitz participants have recorded over 147,000 observations over the last four events, documenting over 7,700 species, including many that are at-risk or even endangered. In the face of climate change and biodiversity loss, people's observations can help inform solutions.

"The Big Backyard BioBlitz is a great way to connect with the outdoors, while contributing to a national community science project," says Christine Chilton, NCC's community relations manager in Manitoba. "From invasive to endangered species, everyone's observations help protect the nature we love."

People can visit backyardbioblitz. ca to learn more and register. Once registered, they'll receive step-bystep instructions on how to participate, tips for taking great shots, fact sheets about nature near them, and be entered into a draw for a Big Backyard BioBlitz prize pack. Participants can also download learning activi-



ties from the website's Kids' Corner, such as scavenger hunt bingo, word searches, colouring pages and other activities for kids.

# Manitoba government enhancing and expanding recreational trails

## Funding supports 33 trails across Manitoba

#### By the Government of Manitoba

The Manitoba government along with Trails Manitoba is investing more than \$880,000 to support 33 recreational trails across the province, Environment and Climate Change Minister Tracy Schmidt announced earlier this month.

"Manitobans love to enjoy the outdoors and our province is home to unique networks of trails that support healthy living and offer great social opportunities," said Schmidt. "Adding new trails and ensuring our existing trails are well-maintained helps guarantee Manitobans can continue to enjoy the great outdoors for generations to come."

The 2024 Trails Manitoba grant program will support the development of new and improved trails across the province, with \$697,365 for trails outside Winnipeg and \$190,000 for trails within Winnipeg.

In all, these projects will add 36 kilometres of trails to Manitoba's network

while maintaining and upgrading more than 600 kilometres of existing trails, the minister noted.

"The Trails Manitoba grant program is creating pathways to health and quality of life for all Manitobans," said Jeana Manning, board president, Trails Manitoba. "We honour the volunteer trail builders and the construction teams and supporting partners who have brought this funding to life, creating connections to Manitoba's stunning landscapes. We look forward to strengthening our ongoing partnerships with the Manitoba government, private funders and all our collaborators, supporting exceptional trails for generations to come."
















# The last dance: Smith brothers making final push for MJBL championship

Last season, the Elmwood Giants advanced to the MJBL championship but lost to the St. Boniface Legion-


Now, the two are one series win away from winning a league championship together in Tyler's final year of MJBL eligibility.

The Pirates won game one of the series 2-1 and game two the following evening 3-0 to advance to the city championship.


Then, the Pirates and Winnipeg South split Games One and Two of the series.


