# Marine Museum hopes new exhibits will bring more visitors aboard

Marine Museum of Manitoba supporters and "passengers" were given a sneak peek of the new exhibits at the Selkirk museum during a wine and cheese fundraiser last week.

The new installations involve showcasing the stories behind the history, featuring first hand accounts of some crew members, who lived their lives on the Red River. The museum also celebrated the grand-opening of its latest project, the Keenora Passenger Deck Exhibits, during last Tuesday's after hours event.

Over the past two years, museum staff and its exhibit committee have updated, refreshed and created new exhibits and displays.

Duane Nicol, chair of the Marine Museum of Manitoba Board of Directors, said the board felt it was time for a change.

"In the past few years we've been doing well. We're in the black again, which is better than being in the red," Nicol said. "We've been hearing feedback, people were saying that they've seen everything in the museum already.

One of the new exhibits includes a diver suit on the main floor. The exhibit features an old diving suit, taken apart and labeled, with a video interview with one of those divers, describing his first time underwater.

The museum is inviting community and area members to come check out their exhibits during a free admission day on Tuesday, Aug. 21.

# Teach for Canada looks to expand into Manitoba First Nations

Program helps prepare teachers to work, live in isolated communities

#### **By Lindsey Enns**

Liz Halina says helping prepare teachers for the challenges they may face while teaching in isolated northern First Nations communities is her way of giving back.

"You see students that are happy to be in the classroom and that are smiling and are enjoying learning," Halina said during a telephone interview from her home in Thunder Bay, Ont. "You see teachers that are connecting with community members to bring language and land-based learning and culture into the classroom ... it makes me happy that we're on the right path to developing reconciliation in Canada."

After spending two years as a police officer in northern Manitoba, Halina began her teaching career 17 years ago in a remote fly-in community in the Northwest Territories on the shores of Great Bear Lake.

Halina, who is a member of Sagkeeng First Nation and grew up in Selkirk, is currently the director of teacher development with Teach for Canada, a non-



profit organization which aims to help fill the education gap between First Nations and non-First Nations communities by helping recruit, prepare, and support teachers interested in teaching in remote First Nations.

Halina said they are in the "very early stages" of expanding into First Nations in Manitoba with hopes of offering programming to interested teachers in the fall of 2019.

"Several communities from Manitoba have reached out to us to start to explore a potential working relationships together so we're just in the beginning stages of looking at potentially expanding into Manitoba from North-

> western Ontario," Halina said. "We want to help communities find really good teachers and we want those teachers to stay and have great working relationships with students, parents, the leadership in communities and community members as a whole."

Teach for Canada's biggest group of teachers to date

started an intensive three-week program on July 16 to prepare for teaching in northern Ontario First Nations this September.

The group of 94 teachers from across Canada and countries as diverse as Siberia, Jamaica, the Philippines, and Nigeria, ranging in age from 22 to 73, and with an average of seven years of experience, will teach in 18 fly-in and drive-in First Nations communities in 2018-19.

During the three-week program these teachers participate in a program focused on First Nations histories, cultures, languages, culturally-responsive pedagogies, and outdoor education, as well as strategies for success in the North.

Halina said some of the challenges these teachers will face include isolation, being far away from family and friends, not having Internet access, the high price of food in the fly-in communities as well as culture shock.

"You add all of those things together and it can become quite overwhelming," she said.

But that's where Teach for Canada comes in. Halina said their program is specifically designed to help prepare teachers from all kinds of backgrounds to succeed in these communities.

"We want our teachers to understand First Nations history, First Nations culture," she said.

Halina admits recruiting teachers has been a challenge.

"It is a little bit more challenging, however, we're still able to find really good, phenomenal teachers to go North," she said.

Some of the stops along the way included the City of Selkirk's new wastewater treatment plant location, the Selkirk Rec Complex's soccer and baseball fields, the Selkirk Mental Health Centre grounds, the Gaynor Family Regional Library, Red Feather Farm, the Marine Museum of Manitoba as well as the new Pollinator Park located along the edge of Selkirk Park.

Banash said one of the highlights for her was the one-hour tour of the Selkirk Regional Health Centre.

"It's the sustainable planting, the perennials, they're breath taking," the East Selkirk resident said."And how it benefits the patients and the staff."

Banash said she also liked how the hospital's grounds are open to the public to explore.

Kelley Liebzeit, a first time judge for Communities in Bloom Manitoba, said she really enjoyed the experi-

"I'm enjoying seeing all the different levels of community ... all those working together and sitting down, that is really awesome to see," the Lac du Bonnet resident said.

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said he wanted to thank the local Communities in Bloom committee, the volunteers and sponsors for all they do to make the city a better place.

"Selkirk is a smaller city but it's a unique city in that there's a lot of pride to it," Johannson said during a luncheon for the Communities in Bloom tour at the Gordon Howard Centre last Thursday. "We're being looked at by other communities as leaders and

that in itself is very heartwarming for us on council."

Banash also wanted to stress that Communities in Bloom isn't just about gardening and landscaping.

"It's all about community and working together," she said.

During their visit, Communities in Bloom judges look at things such as community involvement, community engagement, floral displays, land-

scaping, heritage preservation, environmental action and overall tidiness. The scores are then tallied up to yield a bloom rating out of five.

Last year, Selkirk received it's second five bloom rating during the 19th annual Manitoba Communities in Bloom Conference and Awards ceremony for a second consecutive year.

This year's scores will be unveiled during the 20th annual conference and awards on Sept. 7 and Sept. 8 in the Town of Morris.

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# Community Living Selkirk looking to make their spaces more accessible

Community Living Selkirk is taking steps to make their spaces more accessible to everyone, but they need your support.

The organization is moving into the first phase of their renovation project, where they will add things like accessible ramps and washrooms to their Community Threads store in Selkirk. The upgrades will allow them to accommodate 17 more clients as well as open the space up to residents and visitors with mobility issues.

Executive Director Maria Freeman says the improvements would benefit everyone in the city.

"We have two ladies, who are part of our skill learning workshops, that can't enter the building. Some of our (clients) have mobility issues, so they can't attend a class if it's in the basement," Freeman said. "These improvements will make it better for everyone checking out the store, we believe all of our locations should be accessible, so we can assist the most people we possibly can."

Phase 1 involves adding ramps to the Community Threads entrance as well as widening the doorway to fit baby strollers or wheelchairs. They will also be looking to widen the store itself, allowing for more space between the isles, and adding accessible washrooms that will be available to the public.

The project will mostly be funded through grants or fundraising efforts, as the organization only receives funding towards its programs, not to improve its buildings. They will also be looking for support from other organizations, such as Homes for the Holidays.

Merilee Mollard, Homes for the Holidays co-chair, said Community Living is an important organization for Selkirk, and the need for it is always growing.

"I think we all have someone in our lives who has mobility issues. Until you face those issues yourself, you take it for granted," Mollard said. "The need for the program continues to grow, and when people donate, they know it produces a positive effect in the community."

Currently, the program has a wait list of around 25 people. Phase 2 of the project would add an elevator leading to the second floor of the building, and Phase 3 involves creating acces-



sible housing for disabled residents in Selkirk. All of which has to be funded by grants or fundraising initiatives.

# Safe boating council launches Operation Dry Water

With summer boating season in high gear and the August long weekend right around the corner, the Canadian Safe Boating Council (CSBC) wants to remind you that boating and drinking don't mix.

While drinking and boating accounts for approximately 40 per cent of boating-related fatalities on Canadian waterways, in Manitoba the number is 64 per cent. In 2018, the CSBC along with their enforcement and search and rescue agencies are also concerned about the potential impact of legalization of recreational marijuana and the increase in use and abuse of prescription narcotics on boating incidents and fatalities.

To raise awareness and reduce impairment-related deaths, the CSBC is launching year six of an initiative called "Operation Dry Water" with its goal of stressing the importance of boating sober.

Combined with sun, wind, waves and the rocking motion of the boat, the effects of alcohol and drugs on the water can be greatly increased.

"Each year I look at the new drowning reports, a common trend appears; Boating is a significant contributor to drownings, and the majority had alcohol as a factor in those deaths," Lifesaving Society - Mb Branch Acting CEO Kevin Tordiffe stated in a release on Monday. "Please, this year let's all make an effort to reduce these numbers; boat sober, wear a lifejacket and maybe this year, if you see someone boating and drinking, don't stay

"Summer is all about having fun, and being out on the water is one great way to do that," RCMP Sgt. Bob Chabot added. "However, that fun can come to a crashing halt if someone gets seriously injured or dies because of a decision to boat while impaired. The RCMP will be out on the water during Operation Dry Water to help keep it safe, which will keep it fun."

Federal statutes dictate that boaters can be charged with Impaired Operation of a Vessel under the Criminal Code of Canada if they are found to be impaired. Under current and proposed legislation, human-powered

craft are not excluded from the definition of a vessel and, so, are subject to the same penalties. Some provinces have enacted legislation where impaired boating can affect your automobile driving privileges.

Operation Dry Water is aimed at reducing the number of impairmentrelated accidents and fatalities on the water while fostering a stronger and more visible deterrent to alcohol and drug use while boating. The end goal? To achieve safer and more enjoyable recreational boating.

Lisa Goetz, a Selkirk resident who plays baseball with Aiden's parents, knew the struggles that Kushner went through, and decided to help him raise money for other children.

"We were listening to QX104 last year, and there was a commercial

for (the slow-pitch tournament). We knew Aiden's wish was just granted, so we felt that this was a great tournament to attend," Goetz said. "We saw how happy Aiden was after getting his wish granted, so we would love to see many more children feel as happy

Kushner was born with multiple heart complications, including a hole in his heart, and required extensive surgery to live. He was able to go to Disney World and participate in Jedi Training, thanks to the Children's Wish Foundation. Goetz, along with her husband Rod, entered the tournament with Kushner in 2017.

Last year, the teams had to raise a minimum of \$1,000. This year, Team Aiden is looking to raise \$1,500.

Rod Goetz said going to Disney World made Kushner feel better about his surgery.

"It was amazing for him. Aiden was very happy that his family was able to join him on this journey. Ever since he came back, he became more comfortable with his (surgery scars) and wasn't embarrassed for other people to see (them)," Rod said.

This year's Slo-Pitch 4 A Wish event will once again be held at John Blumberg Softball Complex on Sept. 14 to 16. The event will be hosted by the OX104 staff and will include Slo-Pitch action, a kid zone, celebrity game and a Saturday night concert featuring Doc Walker, The Washboard Union, David James, Jojo Mason, Petric and Leanne Pearson.

## Manitoba launches crime reduction incentive program for police agencies

The Manitoba government is seeking innovative proposals through a provincial incentive program to invest \$500,000 from the proceeds of crime fund for police agencies to reduce crime across the province, Justice Minister Heather Stefanson announced last week.

"Our government is taking a proactive approach to reducing crime in our communities," said Stefanson. "This competition is designed to get new ideas from the experts in crime reduction - our front-line police offi-

The fund is comprised of forfeited funds from federally-prosecuted Criminal Code offences. While the general criteria for the fund is much broader, the program announced today will focus on police agencies with innovative ideas to address Manitoba's historically high crime rates, said Stefanson.

To support the advancement of these ideas, a working group will develop the guidelines, application process and evaluation criteria. The application period is expected to open later this summer.

Modelled after the recent Transformation Capital Fund competition within the civil service, all proposals must provide a realistic return on investment by showing how they will reduce crime. This approach focuses public service investments on initiatives that drive outcomes, the minister

This \$500,000 crime reduction incentive program complements additional investments of nearly \$100,000 this year from the federal proceeds of crime fund on initiatives designed to make Manitobans safer, including nearly \$30,000 for a province-wide gun amnesty in June.

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# Reeling in some summer fishing stories

Shuffling through the drifts of Zebra Mussel shells along the shore of Grand Marais I could see a family sitting in chairs by the water with their long fishing rods pointed to the sky. Lake Winnipeg was placid and low, very low. I noticed they had cast their baited hooks far out for deeper water as I approached them. "Hi," I called out to a chap who seemed to be the father. His short, curly light brown hair was streaked with white, his quick and light hearted manner spoke of a man at one with his surroundings. He rose from his chair extending his hand saying, "Rory Jones; you're Arnie, how's it going?" We shook hands as he introduced me to his fiancée, Wendy and daughters Angela and Emily who greeted me with warm smiles. "Well," I said, "it would be going really great if you had a story for your fishing brothers and sisters." I could tell he was thinking as we commenced idle conversation about playing around water when we were kids. Then his eyes lit up. He told of a time when he was about 10 years old, he and a school buddy used to go to the local store and buy loose knit cheesecloth then wade into the water knee deep and holding the cloth between them would walk forward catching minnows for bait. Other times he said, when friends and family needed more minnows, they would get longer lengths of the cloth and with a number of folks holding the netting under water in the shape of a big horseshoe with the "legs" toward shore; others would walk into the water between the "legs" slapping the surface scaring the minnows into the net. Then the net handlers would drag it to shore full of jumping minnows.

I thanked Rory for his stories and on my way home stopped at Lockport where I met Ray Lester from Winnipeg. He was bending over the guard

rail reeling up a nice bass as I arrived. When I asked him if Lockport was his favorite place to fish his sense of humor kicked in as he said, "It is now!"

Last Friday I had the pleasure of meeting a couple of good sports on the Hecla village pier. The warm sun washed the smooth light grey deck of the pier as I strode toward a guy and gal in chairs, their fishing rods in holders. I called out, "I don't see a string over the side of the pier holding some fish.""No, nothing," the guy with well developed muscles, a rugged face and grey mustache returned. Soon at their side I handed them my card. He looked at it smiling,"I guess you want a story. We've got one and it's kind of about fishing. I'm Rick Buffie and

this is my wife Janet. We're from Selkirk." His ready, casual way of talking made it easy to listen to him. There was something about him though, he moved and talked like an athlete. I also couldn't help catching a familiar knowing glance he cast across the water at Black Island occasionally. He went into their story as Janet, his wife, a pleasant lady with light brown hair sat by his side offering extra bits of their experience. Rick began. Years ago when they were about to be married he bought two raffle tickets for prizes at a local store in Selkirk. Rick, being a considerate fellow, made out one ticket for Janet with her soon to be married last name on it. She won! They got a call to come pick up her prize of a boat, motor and trailer! That's right, hers! They were beside themselves with joy. They drove to the store and before them in the parking lot stood a beautiful new gleaming white trailer carrying a sparkling blue and white boat with a shiny black motor perched on the back of the boat. I stood beside Rick and Janet watching the warmth in their eyes as they went back in their minds to that wonderful moment. Again I noticed Rick looking out at Black Island with that faint smile on his face. He returned to their story laughing as he exclaimed that for thirty years, every time he wanted to take the boat to go fishing, he had to ask Janet for permission! I couldn't hold my curiosity back any longer. "Rick," I implored, "what is it about Black Island that seems important to you?""Well, you see Arnie"he explained, "when I was a kid I worked at the silicon plant in Selkirk and that sand came from Black Island over there. It was my job to handle these big bags for fill-up as the sand came down a chute. If you didn't pull the chutes closing trap door at the right second you got a face full of sand dust! # **Options For Youth Program forced to** close due to lack of funding source

The Options For Youth Program in Selkirk will shut its doors this Friday for good following the federal government's decision now to renew funding for the program.

The program provided job skills and work opportunities to youth who faced barriers in the workplace, such as people who struggled in school.

Todd Launder, who has been running the program for 17 years, said he wonders who else will give these young adults a chance.

"Where are they going to go? There are some real issues in this community, there's people with addiction, mental health issues, many of whom find stable work through this program," Launder said. "Who's going to employ someone like that? How are they going to get that chance?"

Launder added some youth face a lot of challenges when entering the workplace. Some of his clients come from northern communities, where it's hard to verify someone's work history. The program also helps single mothers, who have large gaps in their work history from raising children.

Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman James Bezan said he's disappointed the federal government decided not to continue funding the program.

"Providing structured opportunities for work experience and skill development in entry level trade, construction and retail positions is critical in the promotion of a strong economy in (Selkirk)," Bezan said in a state-

ment. "These work placements are vital in assisting our youth to successfully gain employment and encourage them to purse educational opportuni-

Kildonan-St.Paul MP MaryAnn Mihychuk said they were not able to fund every applicant this year.

"This year, as in previous years, applications for Youth Employment Strategy funding were competitive and those that best met national and local priorities were selected," Mihychuk said in an emailed statement.

She added since being elected, the Liberal government has approved 500 Skills Link projects.

"This means over 35,000 vulnerable youth across the country are getting the opportunity to develop their skills and gain valuable work experience," she said. "Each year, the Government invests more than \$330 million through the Youth Employment Strategy to help young people gain the skills and experience they need to find and keep good jobs."

According to Launder, he found out that the funding for the local program would be discontinued in 2016, but he was holding out hope that they would find another source of income. He said applying for federal funding used to be done through a provincial administrator, but now it's decided by a federal administrator.

With more competition from programs in other provinces, Launder said it was harder for him to find

# **Gamble re-elected as mayor of Dunnottar**

"It's sort of a plan we had working groups made up of residents put forward their hopes for the future of the community," Gamble said, adding it will be a first for the community.


Gamble said it's still too early to tell if he plans to seek a sixth term as may-

However, the health and fitness of Lake Winnipeg has declined significantly over the years, and will continue to do so unless changes are made," he says. "In tackling my endurance challenge, I hope that others reflect on their own health and fitness and what can be done to maintain and improve it. I also want to increase the awareness

# **RCMP** traffic stops leads to largest marijuana seizure in Canada

A traffic stop along a busy highway in Westhawk, Man. lead to the largest marijuana seizure in Canada last month.

On July 22 a RCMP officer on traffic patrol stopped a commercial semitrailer on the Trans-Canada Highway at Westhawk. The stop was initiated to conduct a regulatory inspection of the driver's paperwork.

When the officer stopped this vehicle and checked the driver's paperwork, several discrepancies were discovered. The load was then examined by several officers in order to try and resolve those discrepancies. When the officers opened the trailer, they

found 925 pounds of vacuum-packaged marijuana as well as 75 pounds of cannabis shatter, oils, and edibles hidden among the legitimate load of food products. The driver of the vehicle was arrested; the drugs and the semi-trailer were seized.

Claudiu Huber, 46, from Agassiz, BC, is charged with Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking and Trafficking a Controlled Substance. He has been released pending a future court date.

The semi-trailer load originated in lower mainland, BC, and was destined for southern Ontario.

This seizure is the largest marijuana seizure through a traffic stop in Canada since 2015.

# RCMP warn of email extortion scam

RCMP in Manitoba have started to receive reports of a cyber-extortion where suspects are sending emails to victims that reference a real password.

The email states the suspect has infected the victim's computer with a virus that has allowed the suspect to control the webcam. The suspect threatens to release a video of the victim taken while they were watching pornography to the victim's contact list. If the victim

pays a certain amount in Bitcoin, then the suspect will not release the video. This is a scam that has been around for a while. The suspects do not have video of the victims, and victims should not be afraid to report this crime to the police.

If you have received this email, or any similar emails, DO NOT PAY and make sure you report it to the police so we are aware of the scams targeting our communities. Also report the incident to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre.

# Service in Brokenhead Ojibway Nation helps honour veteran's mother

After years of struggle and hardship, Melvin Swan has finally been able to honour his mother.

Swan, who served with the Canadian Armed Forces for 12 years, held a memorial service for his mother, Mary Emma Jane Swan, on July 13 in Brokenhead First Nation. Swan's mother died in 2007, but he didn't have the means to conduct the service until now.

Swan said the service was not just a way to honour his mother's life, but also a way to help him move on.

"My mother gave me life, as I look in the mirror every day, I see a reflection of my mother, and also my father," Swan said. "To reflect on my life and career today, is to see her hard work, their compassion, the pride and

dignity that I possess came from my mother.

"It's part of my healing journey, we have come full circle in life. In a way, when I'm honouring her, I'm also honouring myself. My job is done."

Swan said he originally planned a service for his mother in 2007, but some of his friends who were helping him organize it ran off with his money.

Swan said it was important that the service included Christian practices, to honour his mother's way of life.

"She was loving, kind, and she always made me feel like a little kid," Swan said. "I feel peaceful, because I know her spirit lives on through me."

Swan said his mother's heading Memorials located in West

# Canada's new \$10 bill sheds light on history of historic human rights story

Canada's upcoming \$10 bank note, which depicts social justice defender Viola Desmond, tells a story of human rights.

The new note, which will be issued in late 2018, is the first in Canada to have a vertical design and features images and symbols that represent the country's ongoing pursuit of rights and freedoms.

At the heart of the note is portrait subject Viola Desmond, the first Canadian woman to be featured on a regularly circulating bank note. Desmond, a successful Black businesswoman, was jailed, convicted and fined for defiantly refusing to leave a whites-only area of a movie theatre in 1946. Her court case is one of the first known legal challenges against racial segregation brought forth by a Black woman in Canada. Desmond is also

the first portrait subject to be nominated by Canadians, following an open call in 2016 to identify an iconic Canadian woman to appear on the next redesigned bank note. She was ultimately selected by Finance Minister Bill Morneau for her courageous stand for equality and justice.

Next to Desmond's portrait is an artistic rendering of a map of the historic North End of Halifax, the community where she lived and owned and operated her beauty school and salon. The community served as a source of invaluable support as Desmond challenged her criminal conviction.

The back of the upcoming bank note carries Desmond's story into the present with an image of the Canadian Museum for Human Rights—the first museum in the world solely dedicated to the evolution, celebration and future of human rights. The museum,



which opened in Winnipeg, Manitoba, in 2014, houses a permanent exhibit dedicated to Viola Desmond's story.

The bank note also features the Museum's iconic ramps that appear to criss-cross each other, symbolizing the history of human rights in Canada and in the world—a history full of setbacks and contradictions, but characterized nonetheless by strength and

Also appearing on the back of the note is an eagle feather to illustrate the ongoing journey toward recognizing rights and freedoms for Indigenous Peoples in Canada. For many First Nations peoples in Canada, the eagle is believed to fly higher and see further than any other bird, and an eagle feather symbolizes ideals such as truth, power and freedom. The colour-shifting feather is one of several enhanced security features included on this new note.

As with the previous series of polymer bank notes, the new \$10 note features a large transparent window as a key security feature. The window showcases a metallic rendering of the vaulted dome ceiling of the Library of Parliament in Ottawa. Capped by arched windows that flood the room with natural light, the Library of Parliament is a stunning example of Gothic Revival architecture and acts as a storehouse of knowledge to help shape Canada's laws.

Completing the new note's human rights and social justice theme is a laurel leaf pattern, an ancient symbol of justice, found in the bottom right corner on the back of the note.



"The loss wasn't the end of the world," Smith insisted. "We actually had the winning run at the plate. One hit would have tied it."



Goodbrandson scored a shorthanded goal in the first period to open the game's scoring.


Plowman earned the win in goal although the shots on goal weren't listed on the tournament website.

Bandura's second round Tuesday, along with several other golfers, had not been completed at press time



Rounds two and three will be played Wednesday and Thursday while the final round is slated for Friday.

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


