Manitoba's first MADD roadside memorial sign unveiled in WSP

The clouds cleared and the sun started to shine as Manitoba's first MADD Canada roadside memorial sign in memory of Brett Yasinsky was unveiled in West St. Paul last Wednesday.

The memorial sign, which hangs at the southwest corner of McPhillips Street (Highway 8) and Grassmere Rd. where Brett was killed by an impaired driver, includes Brett's name and MADD Canada's red ribbon, to serve as a powerful symbol of the tragic impact of impaired driving.

Brett, a West St. Paul resident who attended school in the community, was on his way to pick up his girlfriend on Nov. 10, 2010 when the 22-year-old's car was hit by an impaired driver just minutes from his home. He died at the scene.

More than 100 friends, family and community members as well as local dignitaries gathered outside the Grassmere Family Restaurant last

Wednesday afternoon for the sign's unveiling.

Brett's aunt, Melody Bodnarchuk, said since his death the family has

been working with MADD Canada (Mothers Against Drunk Driving) to help honour his life while reminding others about the implications of im-

paired driving.

"This roadside marker that has been unveiled today means Brett been has not forgotten, never be forgotten," Melody said addresswhile ing the crowd last Wednesday. "It is a reminder that drinking and driving kills. That it devastates and destroys families and it's also a reminder of the support that these victims receive from MADD."

Melody also took the time to thank MADD Canada "for their never ending support" over the years.

"When someone you love is killed in this senseless manner, a piece of you and, in fact, your entire community dies with them," Brett's uncle, Wayne Bodnarchuk, stated in a release last week.

West St. Paul Mayor Bruce Henley said he had the opportunity to know Brett for many years as he grew up with his oldest son. Henley said Brett was always happy, had a great sense of humour and loved spending time with family and friends.

"Brett was a great friend to our family ... we watched Brett grow from a young boy into an intelligent, ambitious young man," Henley said during his address to the crowd. "Brett, like everyone here, had goals and dreams and at 22-year's-old Brett was becoming very focused on achieving his goals. One of his goals was to be hired by Winnipeg Transit ... and he had an ultimate goal of becoming a Winnipeg police officer.

"Unfortunately Brett wasn't able to achieve those goals."

Crashes involving alcohol and/or drugs are a leading criminal cause of death in Canada, according to MADD Canada's website. Every day, on average, nearly three-in-a-half Canadians are killed in alcohol and/or drug-related motor vehicle crashes on public roads

Farmers finding new ways to connect with consumers

If someone asked you the difference between hens and roosters, could you answer?

Hens are the ladies. Roosters are the gents.

To some, this is basic information, but that's not the case for everyone, something Andrea Taite from Broken Tree Farmstead noticed.

"I lived in the city for a while, and I found a lot of people didn't understand the basics — things farm kids really take for granted and understand,"Taite said.

Taite, 26, and her husband bought their 80-acre property in Komarno in 2014. They use 40 acres for oat production and the other 40 for pastureland. They have pigs, chickens, sheep, rabbits, cows, horses and bees. Her husband is from Winnipeg, and she's from Kenora. Growing up, Taite, who is Métis, spent a lot of time outdoors hunting, fishing and trapping.

Taite said she sees a disconnect between consumers and the food industry, especially among her generation, millennials. Taite shares her farming lifestyle on Instagram (@brokentreefarmstead) to bridge the gap between farmers and consumers, educating people — about hens versus roosters and so on — by showing where their food comes from.

"Food heals you," Taite said. "It's so important to understand what you're putting into your body."

But the disconnect between farm and table goes two ways, said farmer Will Bergmann from Bergmann Bros. in Glenlea. Not only does the urban population not understand where their food comes from, but also farmers don't know much about the people eating their food.

Bergmann, 35, shares about his farm lifestyle on Instagram (@will_bergmann). He also connects with people by speaking at events and through Winnipeg's culinary scene. He pro-

vides vegetables to a number of restaurants in the city, including Oxbow on Osborne Street, which he's a part-

"I'm definitely trying to bring a little bit of the city to the farm, and bring a little bit of the farm to the city."

Bergmann also said it's important to share accurate information about the agricultural industry to correct any spreading misinformation.

Social media makes the world a little smaller, he said, since it connects people, whether they know each other or not. This helps farmers reach consumers, and vice versa.

"It's a really short chain that can be in place," he said. "That's why it's important for me to share my story."

Social media may come naturally to today's modern millennial farmer, but more and more farmers from older generations are looking to connect with people online too, said Taite. Farmers have approached her to help set up profiles focused on their farm.

Taite makes sure she doesn't post only the "romanticized" version of farming. Though you'll see lots of photos of cute animals and beautiful landscapes on her account, she also

shares the not-sopretty stuff, like having to bandage a pig's injured leg.

Though days can be long, especially since she and her husband both have jobs outside of farming, she enjoys it, so farming doesn't even feel like work.

"It's like a hobby," she says, "but on a larger scale."







Environment minister stops in Selkirk to talk climate change

Federal Minister of Environment and Climate Change, Catherine McKenna, visited Selkirk last week to learn to learn more about the city's approach to reducing greenhouse gas emissions and integrating a concern for the environment into its everyday practices.

McKenna stopped in Selkirk last Thursday afternoon after announcing that \$3.8 million in funding will be doled out over the next four years to help save Lake Winnipeg and its surrounding ecosystems. A total of 23 projects aimed at preserving water quality and health of nearby wetlands will receive the money from the five-year Lake Winnipeg Basin Program. The Manitoba Habitat Heritage Corporation and the Lake Winnipeg Foundation are among the 23 funding

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson says council and administration are learning how to become more environmentally responsible and how to be better global citizens.

"We take that role seriously, and I'm proud of the effort that everyone here at the city puts into becoming more educated, more responsible and innovative in our thinking about our city and our planet," Johannson stated in a release last week.

McKenna spent one hour in Selkirk, and toured the Gaynor Family Regional Library, a green building, while learning about several city initiatives that helped Selkirk become one of 16 communities across the country selected to participate in the first phase of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities Capital and Asset Management Network (CAMN).

CAMN combines peer-learning opportunities, training, and funding to help Canadian municipalities integrate climate change and sustainability goals systematically into decisionmaking about infrastructure assets, such as roads, buildings, and water

and sanitation systems.

Selkirk was the only Manitoba community selected for CAMN and is the smallest of all chosen to participate.

McKenna said she was impressed with the city's dedication to protecting the environment and fighting back against climate change.

"It's great to see the City of Selkirk, in partnership with the Prairie Climate Centre, doing incredible work to protect our environment and strengthen the local economy," McKenna stated in a release.

Selkirk received a \$50,560 grant from the Federal Government, through FCM, to integrate climate change goals into its Capital Asset Management Plan (CAMP) and have been

working towards that with Winnipeg's Prairie Climate Centre.

McKenna was directed to Selkirk by Dr. Ian Mauro, Co-director of Prairie Climate Centre (PCC), which has teamed with the city to help staff understand the specific impacts climate change has on Selkirk and develop an adaptation strategy to deal with those impacts. PCC recently launched climateatlas.ca, which combines climate science, mapping and storytelling to bring the global issue of climate change closer to home for Canadians.

"The City of Selkirk is at the forefront of preparing for climate change. They are demonstrating - and increasingly recognized - for reducing their greenhouse gas emissions while making their community more resilient and livable," Mauro said. "We're excited by our emerging partnership".

McKenna applauded the partnership

and the efforts to make climate change knowl-

edge accessible to all Canadians. McKenna learned about the city's decision to heat the new wastewater treatment plant without the use of fossil fuels, instead repatriating waste heat and using electric heat with the long-term ability to connect solar panels and generate its own electricity.

At the city's water treatment plant, an older section that uses natural gas for heat is being updated with an innovative geothermal system; no new wells will be drilled, the city will use raw water to either take heat out of or deposit heat in to either heat or cool the building.

Solar panels that are being placed at the Rec Complex, the city's Transit service, its 'hydration station', which has eliminated 10,222 single use plastic bottles since its inception three years ago and the city's active transportation network were also brought to the minister's attention.







Community organizations team up to beautify city

Two community organizations have teamed up to help beautify a piece of land behind a popular dollar store in Selkirk.

Selkirk's Communities in Bloom Committee joined forces with Community Networks, Selkirk's Fine Options Program, to help clean up and spruce up the area behind Big Dollar, which is located along Main Street.

"We're just trying to marry basically organizations within the community with local businesses and people that need help trying to beautify Selkirk, clean it up, make it a tidy, nice place for everyone to enjoy," said Communities in Bloom member Taylor Gyselinck.

She added the space behind Big Dollar had been overgrown with weeds for several months and was identified as an area that needed to be cleaned up.

"There's a sense of pride to it, helping out the community," said Waylon
Bruce who was busy weed whacking
the area on July 26.

The 29-year-old Selkirk resident said he was doing the work to help pay off a fine through the Fine Option Program. He also helped with garbage pick up and mowing the grass.

The Fine Option Program, which is offered through Manitoba Justice, allows a person who has been charged with a fine and unable to pay to perform unpaid community work equal to the value of the fine instead of go-

ing to jail. It is also possible to pay part of a fine and work off the rest through fine option. Offences under the Provincial Offence Act, Highway Traffic Act, parking offences and surcharges are not eligible for the fine option program, according to the government's website.

Jeannie Red Eagle, the program's co-ordinator in Selkirk, said they have been working with various community organizations to help local residents pay off their fines.

"Sometimes it's elders who need help, if their yard is just out of control and they don't have the ability to take care of it we can come in and help them," she said.

Minister of Infrastructure and MLA for St. Paul Ron Schuler said the government is in the process of modernizing legislation to introduce stricter penalties for impaired and distracted driving.

"Drivers convicted of these criminal offences will be automatically subjected to provincial tiered license suspensions," Schuler said while addressing those in attendance last Wednesday. "One day we want to see zero fatalities and we believe this campaign adds to that vision for the future.

"These are preventable deaths, very simply, please don't drink and drive."

MADD Canada also thanked Brett's family for their courage along with the Government of Manitoba and the RM of West St.

Paul for their leadership in establishing the roadside memorial.

"This roadside memorial sign is a way to pay tribute to an innocent life lost, and also a powerful symbol about the devastating and permanent consequences of impaired driving," MADD Canada CEO Andrew Murie stated in a release last week. "We hope it motivates people to make safe, responsible decisions and never drive impaired."

Local residents team up to collect school supplies for students

A small group of friends have turned their weekly potluck gathering into a donation drive with hopes of giving some children everything they need to go back to school in style.

Larry Treloar and Marilee Mollard are raising money to help eight children get the supplies they need to go to class. So far, they've raised enough money for six students, and the money will help purchase supplies, sneakers, and backpacks for Growing Years Family Resource Centre.

Treloar said it's important that children feel good about themselves when they attend school.

"When I started this, originally I thought 'well I want (the students he's donating too) to have sneakers on top of supplies.' Because that's what kids are more sensitive about, more so than markers," Treloar said. "That's my own little passion, that they should look and feel good when they go to school. I think that dignity is what it's all about."

The donation drive began at one of Treloar's summer barbecues at his home in Matlock. He asked everyone in attendance if they could spare a couple of dollars towards buying

school supplies. He went looking for something to hold the donations, and found a small chest with eight compartments, which he continues to use to this day. He only expected to raise enough money for three students, but he's almost filled all eight compartments, and continues to receive support from his friends and family.

Mollard said this small act of kindness will go a long way.

"What started as a group of friends, who had a lot of passion and interest, and they turned it into a way to help the community," Mollard said. "From what we know from (Growing Years) there's a large number of parents, single moms, who are trying to outfit their kids for school ... We hope this encourages other cottage groups to do something good for the community."

"School supplies must be a struggle for people who live on a monthly budget,"Treloar added.

Mollard said they don't have a set amount they're looking to raise, but they've been aiming for roughly \$120 per child. The pair plans to meet with Keystone Source For Sports to see what they can purchase with the money.

Services available to agriculture producers affected by dry conditions

Manitoba Agriculture is reminding agricultural producers affected by dry conditions of the programs and services available to livestock producers to manage forage shortages.

To date, low levels of precipitation and soil moisture have affected the growth of pastures and forage crops in parts of Manitoba.

Manitoba Agriculture provides a number of tools and resources for producers to manage the impact of lower forage supplies. These include:

- alternative feeding strategies such as straw and feed grain rations, greenfeed and utilizing other crop products as feed sources;
- the Manitoba Hay Listing Service, which allows producers to list hay, pasture or alternative feed that is either available or wanted;
- forage and pasture management;
- livestock production.

Producers with AgriInsurance contracts who intend to put their crop to alternate use are required to contact the Manitoba Agricultural Services Corporation for a field appraisal prior

to harvesting the crop. Crop producers managing crop residue should consider making crop residue available to livestock producers as an alternative to burning this residue.

Child contracts first human case of West Nile Virus this year

Manitoba Health, Seniors and Active Living has identified the first human case of West Nile Virus (WNV) of 2018.

The individual is a child under 10 from the Southern Health – Santé Sud region, who experienced neurological symptoms and was hospitalized. The child was likely exposed in early July. The investigation is ongoing.

Manitobans are reminded that the warm and dry conditions to date have been ideal for Culex tarsalis, a carrier of West Nile Virus (WNV). Culex tarsalis typically feeds between dusk and dawn and often goes unnoticed when biting.

While mosquito numbers are low in most communities, surveillance shows the numbers of infected Culex tarsalis continue to increase throughout southern Manitoba. It only takes one bite from an infected Culex tarsalis mosquito to be exposed to WNV. The risk for potential human exposure to WNV is high at present and will likely remain so for the next few weeks.

Manitobans can reduce their risk of mosquito bites and potential WNV exposure by:

- reducing the amount of time spent outdoors during peak mosquito hours (between dusk and dawn);
- using appropriate mosquito repel-
- wearing light-coloured, loose-fitting clothing; and
- maintaining door and window screens so they fit tightly and are free of holes

Manitobans can reduce the number of mosquitoes around their homes by eliminating standing water. To prevent the development of Culex tarsalis mosquitoes, homeowners can:

- clean eaves troughs and regularly empty bird baths and other items that might collect water;
- ensure rain barrels are covered with mosquito screening or are tightly sealed around the downspout;
- clear yards of old tires or other items that collect water; and
- improve landscaping to prevent standing water around the home.

Gun Amnesty Program nets hundreds of unwanted firearms

The Manitoba Association of Chiefs of Police Gun Amnesty Program wrapped up on June 30, 2018. Manitobans answered the call and turned in a variety of unwanted firearms and ammunition. Police agencies also received notable items such as an explosives shell and a cannon ball. In total, among the 13 police agencies, almost 700 firearms were handed in and more than 22,000 rounds of ammunition.

Turning in unwanted firearms removes potential hazards from the community, making everyone safer. The Gun Amnesty Program ensured that charges would not be laid against someone turning in a weapon, unless it was used to commit a crime or was stolen. No charges resulted from anything turned in during the month of June.

"Manitobans really joined the cause during our Gun Amnesty Program," said RCMP Commanding Officer Assistant Commissioner Scott Kolody, president of the Manitoba Association of Chiefs of Police. "This program was a great success! We exceeded our previous provincial amnesty totals. These are weapons that are now off the street and unable to be used in the offence of any crime or to hurt any citizen. We thank the public for realizing the importance of this initiative and participating wholeheartedly."

The majority of the firearms and ammunition surrendered during the amnesty will be destroyed. A very small number will be retained for historical, educational, or training purposes.

Smartphones and tablets appear to have staying power. The Pew Research Center confirms that smartphone penetration has surpassed the 50 percent mark among mobile subscribers. Many others are routinely using tablets to access books, television shows, movies, and magazines. In multi-screen homes, televisions are still king. According to a 2012 Nielsen report, the average American over the age of two spends more than 34 hours a week, or more than 4 hours per day, watching live television. Those findings should raise an eyebrow, as health experts warn that excessive screen time can be hazardous to one's health.

A sedentary lifestyle spent in front of computers and video game consoles contributes to poor health. Of the leading industrialized countries, the United States has the highest obesity statistics, and Canada is not far behind. Obesity can impact cholesterol, cardiovascular health, risk for type 2 diabetes, and risk for stroke. Excessive screen time can lead to sleep and eating disorders, interfere with a person's ability to focus and negatively affect a person's performance at school or work. Getting a family active and reducing time spent in front of a screen can have profound effects, and reducing screen time doesn't have to be difficult.

* Gradually implement changes. Families immersed in electronic devices can cut down on screen time slowly and over the course of several weeks rather than tuning out cold turkey. Start by reducing time spent watching television or playing video games by one hour per week, and gradually reduce time spent devoted to such activities in the ensuing weeks.

* Hide devices. The mantra, "out of sight, out of mind" can work with respect to digital devices. If tablets or smartphones are tucked away, family members may feel less inclined to reach for them at any given time. Just as you wouldn't stock your pantry full of fattening foods while trying to lose weight, don't make digital devices readily available throughout the day.

* Keep televisions out of the bedroom. Children who have televisions in their bedrooms tend to watch an additional 90 minutes of programming per day than those who do not have televisions in their room. Keep the television in a shared area of the house so that time spent watching the TV can be monitored and adjusted.

Establish guidelines. Set firm limits on how much screen time will be allowed per day and stick with it. Adults can lead by ex-

Plan more family activities. Boredom can easily give way to time spent fooling around on the Internet or channel surfing. Parents should have a cache of ideas at the ready that promote active family time. Neighborhood walks or tossing around a baseball in the yard are enjoyable activities that cut back on time spent being sedentary. Encourage indoor activities, such as puzzles or board games, if the weather is not cooperating.

Be steadfast. Do not throw in the towel too soon. Families should stand their ground when attempting to decrease their screen time in favor of healthier activities.

Ask People What They Think Don't Assume

Next time you find yourself getting upset at how another thinks, stop, reflect, and then check it out. Ask your question, then really listen. Don't argue, just listen. You will likely find you are not as far apart on the issue as you thought, and you will quickly see the benefits of this communication skill.


