Chuck the Channel Cat recognized on the national stage

Chuck named as one of Canada's best and biggest roadside attractions

Chuck the Channel Cat has finally gotten the recognition that he deserves. The Globe and Mail put out an article on Aug. 3 naming Canada's best and biggest roadside attractions, and Chuck was amongst the 16 land-

Selkirk resident Dave Wilkinson nominated Chuck for this honour after he saw that *The Globe and Mail* was asking Canadians to send in photos of the best local landmarks from their region.

He said that he was pleased when the article came out and he saw that Chuck had hooked the article writer's

"I thought, why not add Chuck to the mix and see if he would make the cut? And frankly, I was a little surprised that he actually wound up as part of the article," said Wilkinson.

The nomination process was pretty simple.

"It started out as a piece in *The Globe* and Mail celebrating attractions, like Chuck across Canada, and there was an invitation to submit a picture. So, I went and took a photo of Chuck and sent it off with a bit of history. And, I guess that got their attention," said Wilkinson.

Residents in our region know that Chuck is the large catfish attraction on Main St. in Selkirk and will likely have seen him on the City of Selkirk's merchandise. A little more elusive is the Chuck mascot, who comes out at some of our region's community events. Something people might not realize, however, is the number of ways that Chuck is incorporated into other elements of our community. For example, events like the Strong-

mania competition that took place last month even had a special event dedicated to Chuck called the Chuck

The History of Chuck the Channel Cat is an interesting one. He was named after Chuck Norquay, a legend in our fishing community. Noquay was not just famous as a local fisherman but is the reason that Selkirk has the title of "Catfish Capital of North America". In the 1980s, Norquay put Selkirk on the map, taking the host ofthe TV show Good Fishing, Babe Winkelman, on the Red and reeling in over 200lbs of catfish in one day. The show tuned the rest of the world on to what Selkirkians always knew, that there's good fishing in the Red. And so, when the time came to name the large catfish statue that was unveiled in 1986, the name Chuck made sense.

Chuck, the statue, was unique among the 16 attractions as he was the only representative from Manitoba.

Larry Johannson, the mayor of Selkirk, said that he was tickled pink to find out about Chuck's inclusion on the list.

"It was fantastic (to find out). To be the only Manitoba attraction mentioned, and we're in great company there also," he said.

Johannson thinks that Chuck is more than just a symbol for the community because he represents a connection to our history. Selkirk was a fishing village for much of its history, and our waterfront, which now hosts community celebrations, was a fishing port. We can even see the importance of our waterway in the historic ships that used to traverse the Red, which

are now preserved at the Marine Museum.

"We've always been a fishing community, and to have Chuck the Catfish statue here just really cements that. 

Lockport Community Church closing its doors but congregation continues

The building does not make the church

The congregation of Lockport Community Church (P.C.C.) are inviting residents to share their memories of the church and how it was part of their lives at their final services that will take place later this month.

Rev. Martha McDowell, who has been the church's Reverand for a little over a year, explained that the church is not closing because of a lack of support from the congregation but because of the maintenance of the building.

"We'd love to keep in the building, but the building needs lots of help, the shingles blow off, and the furnace needs this, and the water needs that, and our folks are trying hard to keep up with it, but they came to a decision at least two or two and a half years ago that they just couldn't keep up with it," she explained.

The congregation now consists of about 15 or so people, with more who come on holidays like Easter and Christmas. The group is quite tight-knit knit and McDowell enjoys her time with them.

"What I love about this congregation is they're very welcoming. Out of the 42 years (that I've been ordained), I have a lot of experience to tell you that," she said.

She explained that though it was decided that they would meet every second Sunday for services, the services

are more than just a place to connect with God. They are also a chance to connect with each other as everyone brings a little something, and the group shares a meal together after the service.

McDowell also said that the group has been wonderful about her taking over as Reverand and has been very accepting of her sermons.

She was even completely surprised when the congregation, who on her recent 70th birthday, brought in cake, food, and gifts.

"I've never had a congregation do that," said McDowell.

The Lockport Community Church was established in 1986 when the two congregations of Kirkness Church and MacKenzie Church came together. Though McDowell explained that the congregation's numbers, like any church, have waxed and waned over the years, the current group is planning to stick together after the end of this month, even without a permanent building.

"That's not the end of us worshiping together at all, and we want people to know that we're not just walking off into the sunset," said McDowell.

Going forward, the congregation will continue to gather in the homes of local members.

As for the final services in the building, McDowell is hoping to use the opportunity to share memories and

important moments that took place in the building.

"(We're looking for the stories like) my parents were married in that church, or I was baptized in that church, or my grandmother's memorial service was there, so we can include all those memories in our last services," she said.

The next worship service will take place on April 17 at 10 a.m., and it will be the final one that McDowell herself will be taking on. The final service at the church will take place on August 24 at 7 p.m. McDowell invites past pa-

rishioners, area residents and anyone who would like to attend to gather with them on these Sundays.

As for her final service, she plans to talk about how this is the end of a chapter, but the story of the church will continue.

"I'm going to be talking about how the church is not the building. The church isn't the steeple. It isn't the chairs. The church will continue. And, this is kind of an overused phrase, but Jesus said, 'Wherever two or three are gathered, I'm there also.' I'm going

Keeping disease outside the barn

It surprises many people when I tell them they must shower before entering a hog barn, and that their outdoor shoes are nowhere near clean enough to be worn next to pigs — but both statements are true. Strict biosecurity is a critical component of animal care and welfare.

Biosecurity protocols help farmers keep production diseases like Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea (PED) and Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS) out of their barns. Biosecurity is also essential in preventing foreign animal diseases like African Swine Fever (ASF) from entering Canada. Good biosecurity helps keep animals safe and healthy.

The last major PED outbreak in Manitoba, which began in the fall of 2021 and lasted through the spring of 2023, is estimated to have cost the province more than \$100 million. Current estimates suggest PRRS is costing the U.S. industry \$1.65 billion annually.

Manitoba's hog and pork producers learned some key lessons from the last PED outbreak. The first is that the entire sector must work together to effectively protect the health of the animals under our care. The second is more difficult: at times, parts of the value chain need to take actions that are not in their short-term financial interest, but serve the long-term good of the industry. This collaboration shows the industry's willingness to do the right thing, even when it comes at a cost. The result of this teamwork is Manitoba's PED Elimination Plan, which has been effective in stopping the spread of disease.

Farmers sometimes express frustration when outside experts are quick to tell them how to farm, but slow to recognize the results of their efforts. That should not be the case here. Farmers and industry stakeholders should be recognized and commended for their collaboration on biosecurity, disease

prevention and containment.

Stringent biosecurity requirements are also why producers are concerned about unauthorized people entering their farms or coming into contact with their animals. If someone breaches biosecurity protocols, the ef-

fort to prevent the spread of disease could be undone. This is a key reason why farmers support anti-trespass legislation.

For farmers, doing the right thing goes beyond keeping disease out of the barn. Producers also work daily to safeguard the welfare of their animals. Hog farmers across Canada are guided by the 105 requirements in the Code of Practice for

the Care and Handling of Pigs. Backing up the code is legislation such as Manitoba's Animal Care Act.

Confirming compliance with high standards for animal care also requires verification. The Canadian Pork Excellence (CPE) program is a national platform for producers to demonstrate adherence to food safety, animal care and traceability standards. Program registration is required to ship animals to federally inspected processors. Under these programs, animal care is assessed regularly, including visits from herd veterinarians.

The Code of Practice is not a public relations tool created by industry. It is the result of a rigorous development process that draws on the best available science on pig health and welfare, compiled through an independent, peer-reviewed process. The Code Development Committee includes independent scientists, representatives from animal welfare organizations, veterinarians, government officials, consumer-facing members — and farmers.

Doing the right thing also includes continuous improvement in environmental sustainability. For example, the modernization of agriculture has revolutionized nutrient management. Previous generations did not have access to the research or tools avail-

> able today to minimize manure runoff. Now, over 90 per cent of hog manure in Manitoba is either injected below the surface or incorporated into the soil after application. This prevents leaching into waterways and places valuable nutrients near the seed, where they benefit crops most.

> Technological advances are making manure application more precise.

Modern equipment uses near-infrared technology to test flow rates in real time and adjust application rates accordingly. Farmers also use GPS, ultrasonic speed sensors and radar to ensure manure is applied in the right place and at the right rate. This technology helps maximize the benefits of natural fertilizer while reducing the risk of nutrient leaching.

Compliance with modern regulations also supports sustainability. Before applying manure, farmers must submit manure management plans to the provincial government. These nutrient plans are tailored to specific crops and include soil sampling to prevent over-application of nutrients.

The environmental and animal care record of modern Manitoba hog farmers is one they take pride in. It is also a record all Manitobans can take pride in. Nutritious, high-quality pork from Manitoba's farmers is raised in a sustainable way — supporting the longterm viability of the industry and contributing to our economy and local communities.

Selkirk's Nova House has received a generous donation from local dealerships

The second annual Battle of the Brands event from Selkirk GM, Steeltown Ford, and Selkirk Chrysler had our community win big. During the sale, \$200 from every vehicle sold went towards a donation to Nova House. The sale was a great success, and in the end \$15,000 was donated, \$5,000 from each dealership.

"We were absolutely thrilled that they have supported us in such a way. That all three dealerships gave us such a generous donation, I was just elated. We were just thrilled," said Viktoria Westgate, Executive Director of Nova House.

Nova House is a 24-hour, seven days a week emergency and transitional shelter for individuals with or without children experiencing Intimate Partner (domestic violence) and/or Family Violence. In addition, they provide individual counselling, life skills, coaching, and educational workshops to help residents in our community get out of difficult situations in whatever way is best for them.

This donation will be put towards their essential work.

"In the last two years, we have been expanding our services to include more transitional and long-term housing options for the individuals who stay with us and families that stay with us. Because there is definitely a housing shortage, especially in Selkirk, if someone comes into the emergency program and needs to relocate to a new home, the waitlist for Manitoba Housing is quite long. The private housing market is fairly expensive, so it takes a long time for them to then leave shelter," explained Westgate.

Because of the changes in the housing availability in the community over the years, Nova House has had to adapt to provide what the people they are helping need.

"In the last couple of years, one of our strategic objectives is to expand our services to help provide safe, stable and affordable housing. So, in 2023, we purchased our first house, and in the last year, we purchased three more. So, this money that we just received will be going towards renovating those homes," she said.

Renovations include changing the homes so that instead of only being able to house one family, each home has two units.

Being able to provide safer places to live is very important to the work of an organization like Nova House.

"When families leave their abuser, first of all, it's a very brave and scary decision for them to make. They often leave with nothing but the clothes on their back, and so they have to start completely over. A lot of times, families have nothing, not even furniture, no beds, no backpacks for school. When the kids go back to school, they have nothing. They just leave. So, we have to start all over, and the first thing that they need is housing," said Westgate.

In these situations, every little bit helps, and a large donation like those received from Selkirk GM, Steeltown Ford, and Selkirk Chrysler is going to help a lot.

"Financial donations, of course, go a long way. For example, to renovate these houses that we received, we have to split them, which means we have to turn one single home into two, and that requires two separate furnaces. We have to replace all of the drywall so it's fire-rated because you have to have two separate entrances. Just to split the furnaces alone in one house is over \$10,000, right? So, it costs a lot and that's just one step. Then you have to make a whole suite—kitchen, bathroom, bedrooms. We want to do this because then you turn four homes into eight suites, and so you can help more families. Financial donations go a long way in helping us to achieve those goals," said Westgate.

They are still accepting donations from the community on their website, should anyone want to give to this project. Currently, two of the homes have residents on the main floors, so they have six units yet to complete.

Representatives from the three dealerships were happy to be able to support Nova House.

"We are very proud to support an amazing cause right here in our community. We have been honoured to support them during the Christmas season every year and will continue

Stepping back into early beach life at the new Winnipeg Beach Museum

A beloved lakeside town is preserving its past with a new museum dedicated to capturing the spirit of early cottage and beach life.

The Winnipeg Beach Historical Society Museum officially opened its doors on July 26 at 30 Robinson Ave., the former home of Candies and Curiosities. Operated by the Winnipeg Beach Historical Society, the museum features a range of artifacts, including a rare town diorama from the 1940s, furniture from the Empress Hotel, and a growing collection of vintage photos and oral histories.

"It is this beautiful 12-by-8-foot display that captures what the town looked like 80 years ago," said Wendy Peters, president of the historical society. "The details on it are magnificent and we are proud to be able to share it with visitors."

The museum is housed in a building owned by co-historical society leader Donna Ferguson and has already become a hub for local heritage enthusiasts.

Peters founded the historical society after purchasing a historic cottage in the community and becoming frustrated by the lack of publicly accessible information.

"This heavily concerned me at the time because there is a lot of history to be shared in Winnipeg Beach," she said. "I was shocked that no one had ever taken the time to start something that would benefit the community by collecting the history."

Since then, residents have contributed hundreds of historical photos and more than 40 hours of recorded stories, which Peters described as "a treasure trove of information that needed to be shared."

A new exhibit on vintage bathing

suits and beach culture is currently in the works. Peters is encouraging the public to donate items from the 1920s, '30s and '40s that reflect early beach and cottage life.

"We are particularly looking for vintage bathing suits, children's beach toys, kitchenware from summer cottages, and memorabilia related to the CP Rail system—which all played a vital role in shaping the town," Peters said. "Our main goal is to make this a place where people can come and learn about the history of Winnipeg Beach."

Looking ahead, Peters also hopes to launch guided walking tours of the community. A 36-stop self-guided version is already available at www. winnipegbeachhistory.com.

"Winnipeg Beach has a very rich history and it is fun to go around and explore all these interesting artifacts," she said.

The museum's hours vary as it is currently volunteer-run. Plans are underway to hire students next year to offer more consistent access. Visitors are encouraged to email winnipegbeachhistory@gmail.com in advance to confirm weekend availability. Admission is by donation, with proceeds going toward new exhibits and restoring a 1940s caboose donated by CP Rail.

Peters hopes the refurbished caboose will serve as a welcome centre and candy store, tapping into the beach's sweet past.

"A big nostalgia about the beach is the stores used to sell penny candy," she said. "We are looking to bring this back to the town to give them something that reminds them of the earlier days."



In total, 11 MS Bike events are taking place across Canada over a four-month period, including one in Gimli on Aug. 23 and 24. The local event has a \$215,000 fundraising goal, with more than \$91,000 raised to date.

Depending on the route riders choose, they

can cycle either 81.4 kilometres or 40 kilometres over the two-day event. The ride starts and finishes at the Gimli Rec Centre, while also traversing along the scenic shores of Lake Winnipeg.

For cyclist John Wanke, who has participated in the Gimli ride for 11 years, it's a cause that's close to his heart. He was diagnosed with MS in 2012 after experiencing numbness in his feet.

"It's very unpredictable. There are so many

different symptoms. A lot of people get fatigue and then problems with balance weakness, sensory changes such as tingling and numbness or vision problems. Everyone's a different case and everyone has different symptoms," said Wanke, who lives at Falcon Lake.

"After I was diagnosed, I moped around for a couple years, just feeling sorry for

myself. But you learn to live with it. My balance is not as good as it used to be, but I keep active."

He started off by buying a mountain bike from his neighbour's son and began to train by cycling on the TransCanada Trail from Falcon Lake to West Hawk.

This year, he's looking forward to reuniting with friends he's made over the years at the Gimli ride, while also trying out a new gravel bike.

"It's an amazing event," he said. "The best part is when you're almost finished and people are in their driveways cheering you on with bells and signs."

In fact, he liked one sign so much that he got the message tattooed on his calf: "Don't limit your challenges. Challenge your limits."

He encourages others to get involved, either as participants or volunteers.

"I look forward to this weekend every year. We make it into a little mini holiday," he said. "There are so many people that I see at this event every year and we keep in touch during the off-season. It's like a big family, and it's all for a good cause."

Paige Perron, coordinator of community fundraising for MS Canada, said Canada has one of the highest rates of MS in the world.

"Over 90,000 Canadians live with the disease, and every two hours, someone in Canada is diagnosed with MS. That's why community support for MS Bike-Gimli is so meaningful," she said.

"Every kilometre you ride brings us closer to a world free of MS, and the funds raised help improve the lives of people affected by MS across Canada, through critical support programs, groundbreaking research and advocacy."

Volunteers are essential to ensure the event runs smoothly. Organizers are looking for volunteers to support key areas of the event as well as to help at the Gimli Rec Centre. Anyone interested can sign-up and view volunteer opportunities at mscanada.ca/volunteer-opportunities.

The Gimli event, which has been going strong since 1989, will include an outdoor beer garden, music, lawn games, food and more. A cocktail hour for top fundraisers will be hosted on Saturday, Aug. 23 from 4 to 5:30 p.m., followed by a dinner for all participants and evening ceremonies at 6 p.m.

On Sunday, Aug. 24, a barbecue lunch, music, games and team photos will take place at the finish line.

Experience historic modes of travel at Lower Fort Garry's Transpo Expo Aug. 16

Morning commutes weren't always as easy as hopping into a vehicle, and visitors to Lower Fort Garry's Transpo Expo will get to explore how people travelled since the late 1800s.

On Saturday, Aug. 16, from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Parks Canada, in collaboration with the Friends of Lower Fort Garry (FoLFG), will transport guests back in time to see, experience and learn about early-day transportation methods — from ox carts and canoes to cars and commuter buses.

"This year — based off participant feedback — we are really excited to call this a true Transpo Expo by shifting our focus to create learning opportunities about the history of transportation in Western Canada, specifically in Manitoba," said Ben Gillies, FoLFG vice-president.

This is the third year for the expo and the biggest yet, featuring interactive presentations, historic displays and children's activities, before capping off the day with a parade around the Fort at 3:30 p.m.

"Without transportation, a lot of things that helped us grow in the past couldn't have happened," Gillies said. "We think it is a really important part of our history and the Transpo Expo is such a neat way to celebrate it."

The expo is special to Lower Fort Garry, which was home to the Motor Country Club from 1913 to 1962. Many cars similar to those once found at the club will be on display during the day with the All-British Car Show.

This year, the Manitoba Transit Heritage Association — an organization devoted to sharing the history of buses and public transit — will have three historic buses on display, including one from 1937, the oldest in its fleet. This bus impacted the lives of many former Selkirk residents as the first commuter bus chartered to and

from Winnipeg and Selkirk. It passed by Lower Fort Garry daily and even came near the property, as a service road once ran next to the Fort.

"We think it is so exciting that we are able to bring that piece of history back to the site for one day," Gillies said. "People will be able to see and board the buses, giving them a true insight into what people used to take before personal vehicles took over."

Manitoba Public Insurance will also have historic bicycles on display.

In addition, Armand Jerome, a Métis

Red River cart builder, will be demonstrating how to build a cart from 12 to 3 p.m. Jerome has built more than 60 carts in his lifetime and taken them on trail rides through Manitoba and Saskatchewan. As part of Parks Canada's Knowledge Sharing Series, he will share the history of the carts, explain how they are made and reminisce about his carting adventures.

Mark Blieske, an expert birch-bark

canoe and paddle maker, will also be sharing his talents all day. With more than 10,000 hours of canoe and paddle-making experience, he has mentored more than 3,000 Canadian students on how to make paddles of their own. On Saturday, he will demonstrate how to make canoes and paddles from start to finish, much like the Indigenous Peoples did early on. Younger history fans can take

part in the Ultimate Voyageur Obstacle Course — a kid-friendly event to show how people moved around in the past. There will be a variety of kid-sized transportation modes, including small ox carts with fur bales to pull and tumplines (a leather strap used for carrying loads with the head).

All Transpo Expo activities — including regular Lower Fort Garry

programs and building access — are free to attend and included with the Canada Strong Pass. The restaurant and gift shop, located in the reception building, will also be open with food, beverages and souvenirs for purchase.

"All that to say, we hope it will be a fun day out at Lower Fort Garry, made all the better because the site is free for this season," Gillies said.

New tax credit saves Manitobans up to \$1,500 on property tax

Manitobans may notice a new property tax credit on their bills this year.

The Homeowners Affordability Tax Credit (HATC) has replaced the Education Property Tax Credit (EPTC) and will offer homeowners — including condominium and mobile home owners — a rebate equal to the lesser of \$1,500 or the gross school taxes on their principal residence.

That means if a property's gross school taxes are less than \$1,500, the credit will match that lower amount. If they are higher, the homeowner will receive the full \$1,500.

A provincial spokesperson said the change focuses on providing additional school tax relief for homes with lower and mid-range assessed values. The HATC was implemented in early 2025, benefiting Manitobans for the upcoming property tax year.

If homeowners already received the EPTC, they will automatically receive the HATC — assuming they have not moved. The HATC was or will be applied to the tax statement depending on when each municipality mails them out.

"Regardless of whether a homeowner has received their tax statement already or not, there is still an opportunity to claim the HATC for the current year," added the provincial

Homeowners needing to declare their principal residence — including those who have recently moved — can apply within their municipality by Nov. 15, 2025, to receive the credit for the year. If the tax statement has already been sent out, eligible applicants will receive an adjustment to their tax owing or a refund cheque. Homeowners can also claim the HATC on their personal income tax return if they did not receive the credit on their property tax statement or as a credit on their account.

If a homeowner owns more than one residence, they cannot claim the credit twice. Only one owner can claim the credit if two owners live on the same property. Renters are not eligible for the HATC but can claim the Renters Affordability Tax Credit.

The Province of Manitoba has been communicating with residents about the HATC through municipal news and provincial bulletins, striving to inform as many eligible property owners as possible.



What frequency works best for muscle development?

Often, clients come to me confused by all the conflicting information out there when it comes to exercise and nutrition. One of the most common questions I get on the workout side is: How often should I train to maximize muscle gains without overtraining?

It's a great question — but there's no quick, one-size-fits-all answer.

The first thing to consider is your current fitness level. If you're a beginner who has been training for less than six months, then hitting each muscle group once per week is likely enough to see strength improvements. The key is allowing your muscles time to recover fully between sessions. A good rule of thumb: avoid training the same muscle group if you're still feeling sore in that area.

For example, if you're coming back to leg day and your glutes are still aching from Monday's squats, you'd benefit more from light cardio followed by stretching. This will aid recovery and reduce the risk of injury.

However, if you're more of an experienced lifter — and perhaps using supplements to speed up the recovery process — then designing a workout split that targets the same muscle group more than once a week is a great way to break through frustrating training plateaus. Adapting your routine this way also allows for a more complete workout, since you can incorporate a wider variety of exercises that focus on your trouble

Research shows that increasing training frequency can result in greater muscle growth.

Sometimes, a small change — like doubling your shoulder workouts can lead to faster results. That kind of progress can boost motivation and strengthen the mind-muscle connection, which is crucial to longterm success in fitness.

Offroad Adventures Family Campground opens in Gir

Families looking to camp under the stars without leaving town now have a new destination in Gimli.

Offroad Adventures Family Campground, a 66-lot fullservice site nestled in the trees off Loni Beach Road, officially opened this summer—offering a rustic, nature-connected getaway just minutes from the heart of town.

Located at 59 Loni Beach Road, the 44-acre campground features lots serviced with water, sewage, and either 30- or 50-amp power.

"We are a camping family and we wanted to give our kids and other Gimli families another space to get away. We knew Gimli needed it, so we turned it into a little family project over the last 10 years," said Laura Leger.

She owns the campground with her husband, Dennis. Both were born and raised in Gimli but had been living in Alberta. Laura and their three children moved back to Gimli in 2020, while Dennis commutes back and forth between his two jobs.

"It's a lot being apart from him so often, but we both knew we wanted the kids' roots to be back in Gimli," she added.

The Legers always knew they wanted to develop a campground, buying the land from the municipality in 2015. The property has potential for 200 lots, with both seasonal and nightly options available.

Over the past decade, the couple worked on the campground during their off time from their Alberta-based businesses: Offroad Industries Ltd., Offroad Excavation Ltd., and now Offroad Adventures Family Campground.

"This campground was a little side project that quickly turned into something big. We didn't necessarily know what we were getting ourselves into each year—taking on one big project annually—but we were excited to see where things went."

They opened the first 66 sites over the May long weekend—something that happened sooner than expected.

"There was so much demand. We had to push the opening forward because so many people wanted a site. We didn't promote the campground in any way—it just travelled by word of mouth. So, we set up a temporary office and we've been near capacity since we opened."

Offroad Adventures Campground has welcomed visitors from across Canada, along with a few American guests. At the moment, most employees are family members.

"From our parents to our children-it's a true family venture," said Leger. "Our children have been involved since day one. From the planning stages, to development and now daily upkeep... our kids have been a huge part of this process."


The campground also employs four students to maintain and clean the grounds.

Leger said many campers make the most of their stay by shopping and exploring Gimli's local shops, restaurants, and activities.

When developing the campground, the family worked with local and provincial governments to ensure all standards were met. Nature preservation was also a priority. They aimed to maintain a "wilderness feel" by keeping as many trees as possible for wildlife—especially deer—to roam freely.

They are already developing Phase 2, which includes 33 additional sites set to open next

From being involved with research, to presenting to crowds, and being honoured for her work, Bayluk is bringing stroke information to our community and beyond

Local Selkirk stroke health advocate Shannon Bayluk has had a very busy time recently advocating for cardiovascular health research and spreading the word about how important it is to keep stroke health top of mind.

Her recent adventures include working with the Heart & Stroke Foundation as a presenter, spreading the word about things that people need to know in order to be stroke smart and giving interviews during Stroke Awareness Month.

"I also participated in a webinar to raise awareness for vascular cognitive impairment. It was with two really prominent doctors out of Calgary, and I was their guest, which was just phenomenal to me, that I was the guest. There were al-

most 1000 people on the webinar. It was just incredible that that many people were on, it was family physicians and people who have had experiences themselves," she said.


Bayluk herself had her first stroke in 2020. She was working from home at her cottage in Lac du Bonnet and was planning to head into the office later that day. She described her experience when it happened as making a call with a headphone in her ear and then feeling like it had fallen out, then going to reach for it and nothing happening. She didn't know what was going on but was concerned enough that she called her neighbour for help. They went through

the FAST acronym, which stands for face droopiness, arm weakness, speech difficulty, and time is time to call 911, as the thought that it might be a stroke crossed her mind. Unfortunately, though she was experiencing numbness and tingling on her left side at that point, she didn't know that you need to hold your arms up for a while to make sure to test for one-sided weakness and hadn't started exhibiting the other symptoms yet. Because of that, she assumed that she had pinched something, and her neighbour went home so that she could rest. Luckily, Bayluk couldn't get the feeling that something might be

wrong out of her head and called Healthlinks. The Healthlinks nurse on the phone recognized the signs that something was wrong and called an ambulance for Bayluk.

Bayluk was 46 when her stroke happened, and, as a younger person, a stroke might not have been the first thought to come to mind, but strokes do happen in younger people and Bayluk advocates for resources for all ages of stroke sur-

"I love to be a part of that kind of good— spreading information and telling the story from my perspective. The doctors speak, but sometimes it's tough for people to really take in the numbers and stuff like that, right? It's (important) to get the personal side, and often that's where my piece comes in and wraps things in a different light," she said.

The interviews that she gave during Stroke Awareness Month, like the webinar, went well.

"I always make sure that when I'm giving information outward, that along with my story, I point out that I didn't present as a typical stroke patient, right? Forty-six years old, healthy, and I didn't have the stroke symptoms," she explained.

Bayluk also makes sure that she emphasizes the acronym FAST face droopiness, arm weakness, speech difficulty, and time is time to call 911 because time is very important when it comes to treating strokes. The sooner that people can get to the hospital, the better, as the medications that help to treat strokes need to be given as soon as possible to work best.

"I always say that no two strokes are the same, and if you're unsure, you should always attend an ER.

The other thing I often reference is the fact that strokes in young adults are often misdiagnosed or it's just dismissed, which is, in my view, a tragedy, because I know a couple of people from my stroke survival group, from my own personal group of friends, that have had people attend a hospital with migraines and they have been sent home," she continued.

She feels that it's important that she take on this role as an advocate and spreads this information.

"We don't know what we don't know. A lot of the (presenting) that I try to do is on pre-(stroke information), but also a lot of the (info) is on post-(stroke information) because the post-stroke is where you really find out what you need to do and where the struggles can start. I'm working with a team in Calgary right now. I'm part of a project there, and it is to help patients, survivors, and their caregivers to assist them in what are the next steps? What are the needs of a survivor and the care that they need? It's not just in Alberta, it's Canada-wide. We're having participants from everywhere provide input so that this information can be disseminated everywhere," said Bayluk.

The name of the research project that she's involved with is the strokePro research group, and she is on the board as a representative of Manitoba. If other stroke survivors from our region would like to participate in the group, they can contact Bayluk by email at shannon.bayluk@icloud.com for more

Bayluk also recently had the honour of receiving a King Charles III Coronation Medal. She was nominated for this honour by Heart & Stoke in recognition of her outstanding contributions to the foun-



dation and their collective efforts to advance heart and brain health in Canada.

She described feeling gobsmacked when she found out that she was going to be presented with this honour.

"There really was no way for me to put into words how it made me feel. I received it in May. There were 22 recipients here in Manitoba (at that presentation), and it ranged from doctors, scientists, philanthropists, Heart and Stroke members, board members, to lowly old me, and some other survivors. It was just incredible people sitting there. It was just a very, very surreal moment to be surrounded by these amazing people," said Bayluk.

An advocate's work is never done, however, and she said that in addition to the honour, she was able to make some more connections at the event that she hopes to build on in the future.

As for her near future plans, she'll be presenting at an event called, 'The Heart's Truth Shannon's Story' on Aug. 21 in Winnipeg. This event is a fundraiser for the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada and those who might like to go and hear Bayluk speak can learn more at https://heartandstroke.crowdchange.ca/112901.

MJBL MVP nod a full-circle moment for Giants' Duguay

Dylan Duguay of the Elmwood Jr. Giants had a summer to remember — and now he's getting the recognition he deserves.

The 21-year-old from Lockport entered the 2025 Manitoba Junior Baseball League season as one of the league's top veterans in his final year of junior ball.

He'd spent the past six seasons with the Giants, fine-tuning his game, and had recently finished his college career with South Suburban College in South Holland, Ill.

Duguay came into this summer ready to put on one final act with the Giants.

On July 28, Duguay's success came full circle when he was named the recipient of the Carey Candy Award as the 2025 MJBL's Most Valuable Player and the All-Star Second Baseman.

"The one thing that I did was just to go out there and have fun, because before in the past sometimes, pressure got to me a little bit, but this year I decided I'm just going to trust my talent and just go out there and have fun and have no pressure behind my back," said Duguay.

This summer, Duguay led the MJBL with six home runs and 55 quality at-bats, while batting .413 with 24 runs batted in.

He had succeeded in past seasons, but this year he did it all — from playing multiple positions when needed to staying calm under pressure when games got tense.

Duguay credited his experience throughout his baseball career for those abilities. His journey has taken him to several countries, but possibly his favourite place to play has been back home with his Giants crew.

"Baseball could be the hardest sport to play, so playing the game a long time really got me comfortable with it with all the travelling I've done around the country, even in the States, around the world," said Duguay. "That's probably one of the main reasons. Another reason is at the end of the day, it's just a game. It doesn't matter on or off the field if you do good or bad, or if you're having a tough day at the plate, or if you have a good day — every day's a new day, so

that's handling pressure. Some people, it's hard for them to handle, but the way I handle that is I just say it's a game. Nothing's going to affect you personally, so you kind of just leave it on the field and whatever happens there, there's a new day the next day."

That mentality led to plenty of team success for the Giants this summer as they finished the regular season second behind only the Carillon Sultans, who they later met in the MJBL finals.

The Giants dropped games one and two of the series before forcing a game four with a 10-9 win in game three on July 29.

The following evening, the Sultans ultimately closed out the series with a 2-1 win at Koskie Field


Duguay, however, won't let the loss take away from his time in the league.

"The competition, the guys I play with, my team, and even the other teams. Since I've been growing up, I've been playing these guys since I was young, like my whole life, so I know the other guys well and even off the field we're friends, but on the field it's always competition. I always liked that about the MJBL—it's always fun. There's no really sugar-coating anything. It's always to the grind, you're always working to get better, and that's probably the most fun—probably the competition."

Duguay now has to decide where he will play in future seasons, whether it will be the Winnipeg Senior Baseball League, competitive slopitch, or somewhere completely different.

Regardless of where he goes, he has proven to be a player most any team would want in their clubhouse.

East St. Paul Skating Club summer camp in midst of record year

The East St. Paul Skating Club continues to reach new heights on the ice.

Now in its ninth year of running summer figure skating camps out of Seven Oaks Sportsplex, the club has once again set a record for participation, with 48 skaters registered so far this year.

This summer's camp began July 2 and runs until Aug. 14, and program coordinator Tanya Pilat expects even more registrations before it wraps up.

"You want your programs to be growing and the kids to be excited to come back year after year," said Pilat. "What's really encouraging, too, is the skaters who come for one week and then decide they want to skate more, so they add weeks as they go. That's really encouraging—when they want to keep coming back."

Pilat, 51, has been coaching since she was 14. She grew up in rural Manitoba, where she received an exemption to begin coaching two years early. A quadruple gold-level skater, she is also a two-time recipient of the Sport Manitoba Female Coach of the Year Award

The East St. Paul Skating Club also received national recognition this

past spring, winning the National Club/Skating School Award.

After decades of coaching in Winnipeg, Pilat wanted to create a summer skating opportunity for youth and adults in the north end of the city and surrounding areas, including Selkirk, East St. Paul and West St. Paul.

When Seven Oaks Sportsplex was preparing to open its doors a decade ago, Pilat connected with the planning committee and was invited to start the club's summer camp the following year.

The program has grown steadily since, thanks to the club's high-end offerings.

There are multiple on-ice and off-ice training options, no age limits, and a team of 11 coaches who help skaters build their skills.

This year's participants range in age from six to 39, including one skater who has travelled from Iowa for the past two summers.

"It's really good—especially the seniors—just because they've been around a lot longer," Pilat said. "A lot of them are much more familiar. I've probably worked with most of the skaters at some point. Even if I haven't been their primary coach,

I've often given them lessons when requested by their coach. So the kids know me quite well.

"It's really great when they ask, 'Are you doing the program again next year? How many weeks are you doing?' They're asking those questions already because they're excited to come back."

Pilat also focuses on the little things—such as posting daily motivational messages for participants—to enhance the experience.


