Six local authors team up for author event at library

Gaynor Family Library hosts multi-author event

Local authors Matt Abra, Chelsey Fay, Luna Kayne, Scarlett Koll, Nettie Marie Magnan, and Mitchell Toews will be teaming up to bring local writing to the spotlight. The six authors will be at the Gaynor Family Regional Library on Sept. 28 for readings and discussion of their work.

Nettie Marie Magnan is one of the organizers of the event and was the person who first started contacting local authors to see if they wanted to take part.

"I did reach out online to find other authors and booked the room at the library. When I told the library what I was organizing, they were interested in helping," explained Magnan.

The event will take place at 1 p.m. on Sept. 28 in the theatre at the library.

"We're going to have a total of [six] authors, and what we're going to have is essentially it's going to be set up as a panel. We're going to have the [six] writers sitting together, up on this stage at one time, and the authors are each going to take their opportu-

nity to introduce themselves and offer a reading of an excerpt of their work," said Magnan.

From there the authors will answer some questions that will be composed by the library to get the q and a section of the program going and, from there, the audience will have their chance to ask questions and learn all about these local authors.

The authors, though all from our area, have books that range in subject matter so there will likely be a little something for everyone explained Magnan.

"It's going to be mixed genre. My work is more, I would say literary fiction. We're going to have two romance novelists, and we're going to have [two] fantasy fiction novelists and then finally, there's one who will be promoting a book of short stories about small-town Mennonite life," she said.

She says that this is a great opportunity for local authors to connect with our community. It's also a great chance for people interested in one of

the local authors to learn about more authors in our community or people who've never heard about these authors but want to learn more in a convenient and fun way.

"I wanted to be part of a book event that was a reading and signing that involved multiple local authors, where we can support one another's work and all be on stage at the same time, instead of up there all alone and where we can support one another's work, regardless of genre. It's also a networking opportunity and I also look at it as a cross-promotional thing, because the people who are coming to see me give a reading are people who might not have known about these other writers. It's exposure for all of us and I wanted to create a really supportive environment for local writers," explained Magnan.

She explained that there will be an opportunity to get your books signed and you can also purchase a book if you find something that you'd like to read more of.

Magnan says that everybody and anybody is welcome to attend. Attendees should note that these books are general audience reads.

"It's for anyone who loves to mingle with other writers and other readers and get to know their local authors and also and to just be part of a fun Q&A session and talk about the writing process," she said.

Attendees should also note that Brew and Bake will be open during this event should they want to purchase a sweet treat or coffee.





Local man warns residents to be safe when helping others after assault

RCMP gives tips for personal safety when you find yourself in an unknown situation

A local man, who prefers to remain anonymous, wanted to share his recent experience with residents after he was assaulted when trying to help a resident who appeared to be in distress. He wants residents to know that their safety is important to consider as well when responding to others in

"I was heading East down Strathnaver Ave. coming from work and there was a fellow laying in the middle of the street down near Sophia St.," said the resident.

After driving around the person on the street, he then realized that the person had thrown something at his vehicle breaking one of the windows in. The resident then stopped his vehicle and approached the man laying in the street who then told the resident that he had been shot. The resident didn't see any blood or anything to indicate the laying down person had been shot.

"He then proceeded to jump up and attack me. I got a cut above my eye, a concussion, a bruise on the side of my head, cuts on my leg, my chest was all sore, cuts on my arms and cuts on my feet," said the resident.

The resident then said that the person layed back on the ground again and luckily a friend of his drove by at that point and stopped to find out what was going on.

"[My friend] asked what was going on and he said, 'Come on. Let's get out of here.' I had the keys from my [vehicle] in my pocket. I got up and I went towards my friend's car. The guy gets up again, grabs a big stick out of a garbage can, and proceeds to come after me. I hopped in my

friend's car, we drove down the street a bit and then I was on the phone calling the cops. We turned around, and we saw the fella inside my [vehicle]," said the resident.

Luckily, the police were able to come to the scene and the person was lying on the ground again. The resident came back to explain what happened from his perspective and everyone was taken to the hospital to be looked over and have appropriate medical care administred.

This incident occurred late at night.

The resident would like residents in our community to know that though situations like this are not likely to take place, they should keep themselves safe.

"Now that I look back, with my window smashed, I wasn't cut from the window, I should have just kept on driving and called the cops as I was

driving," said the resident.

The Selkirk Record contacted local community policing officer Cst. Paul Human, and though he can't comment on any specific situation in our community, he did have some tips that he was willing to share with residents in order to keep themselves as safe as possible.

His advice for people who come upon someone who appears to be in distress is to rely on your senses.

"What do you see or hear? Then ask yourself — with the information you have — is this a dangerous or unknown situation? If I involve myself, will I be harmed physically or mentally? Do I have the training or the tools to assist?" said Human.

He says that if you see something suspicious in our community where you are unsure if someone is in need of aid or not you should call for help.

"The quicker you can get the emergency folks on their way the better. If something looks suspicious, call and report it. Not all smoke is a fire until it is," said Human.

It's important, for both the person in distress and the person who came upon the situation, that first responders are called right away when something appears to be an emergency.

"[By calling,] trained help is on the way. You can communicate this as well if you feel it will help the situation. Plus, you are providing a valuable time record of when and where this is happening. This will be important for first responders on the scene," explained Human.

He also wants residents to know that it's ok to call for help and wait if you feel uncomfortable helping in

"If you do feel you can't help this situation, calling for trained help is the best option," said Human.

His best tip for personal safety is again to be aware.

On Sept. 6, at 2:40 p.m., a 22-year-old male, from Selkirk, was struck by a grey colored pickup truck as he was crossing the street in the 300 block of Sophia Street. The pickup truck then fled the scene.

The victim, located a short time after the collision by a passerby, was transported by ambulance to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries where he was treated and released.

Interlake FASD Coalition hosts annual event highlighting need for FASD awareness

Local mother speaks to experience parenting child with FASD

The Interlake FASD Coalition hosted their annual awarenes event where they bring to light the effects of alcohol on developing fetuses and advocate for more awareness of the needs of people with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) in our community. This year they had a FASD advocate and mother, who's child has FASD, discuss FASD and child and youth sexual exploitation.

Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder is a diagnostic term that describes the range of effects that can occur in an individual who was exposed to alcohol prenatally. FASD is a lifelong neurodevelopmental disorder that can impact a person's learning, physical, cognitive, behaviour and develop-

The meeting started with a land acknowledgement followed by Sherisse Picklyk Dear, who is one of the cochairs of the Interlake FASD Committee acknowledging the hard work that people in Selkirk have done to bring more awareness to FASD and explaining what would be discussed at the event which took place at Selkirk United Church on Sept 13.

"We are eternally grateful for Selkirk's support of our committee's work and the events we have put on over the years, and we are grateful for the many agencies and organizations that support, partner and promote us and that are here for our community fair. The goal of our FASD Awareness Day event today is to explore the intersectionality between child abuse, sexual exploitation and FASD," she

She went on to talk about the Interlake Sexual Exploitation Educators as a group that brings knowledge about sexual exploitation to our community and let attendees know about this great resource that is available locally.

Next, a local mother with a child with FASD came to the stage to present her story about trying to help her child navigate living with FASD in a

world where there are pathways that can lead to exploitation. This caregiver has asked that her name not be printed in order to keep the identity of her child, who is now a young adult, private.

"I'm going to use my child's profile behaviours to talk about why and how individuals with FASD are more vulnerable to sexual exploitation, and the pathways into that in our experience. I'm going to highlight the limitations of caregiver's reach into the public sphere. I certainly have my role as a caregiver but then when things move into the public sphere, things get a little bit trickier, and I'll talk about some of our experiences within the service sector and how everyone in the community can play a part," said the mother.

She explained that many aspects of her child's brain have been affected by FASD and that everyone with FASD is different so knowing what FASD is doesn't mean that that person understands what FASD means for each individual.

In her child's case, the mother explained that they have an IQ that correlates with their age which means that her child presents so well that difficulties in other areas can be masked.

"Often [they] present like a really delinquent teenager who has never had any boundaries put in place and probably doesn't have any parents supporting [them]. That is really what the behaviours present as, which really makes it tricky for people to un-derstand what's going on," said the

She explained that characteristics of FASD such as difficulties with impulse control, difficulties with social skills, a disconnected self-image, and an increased fight or flight response have likely contributed to her child ending up in exploitative situations.

In this family's case, the loss of a member of the child's birth family created a traumatic situation and connected them with some people who have been negative influences. The exploitation that her child has experienced since has been an additional source of trauma.

'We really have this sense in society that good parents produce, good kids. We really don't have a story for when good parents have kids with complex needs and high-level vulnerabilities that demonstrate these behaviours in a public sphere," said the mother.

She explained that her child comes from a stable two-parent family with a stable extended family and a stable living environment.

Unfortunately, in the service sector, this mother has experienced a great deal of judgement and has found that there are many services that are not used to having a parent involved because of the above idea that a child in these situations must have inattentive parents.

"Our main intervention is grounded in relationship and I protect that relationship at all costs. Since [they] joined our family at 10 months, we've been modelling and teaching healthy relationships, healthy coping strategies, healthy substance use, healthy sexuality and consent," said the mother.

She said that with this disease it does really take a village to raise a child.

"With FASD, it doesn't matter how competent the family is. Variables from FASD complicate life for everyone involved — the individuals, the caregivers, the family service sectors, health, education, criminal justice, employment, social services, all of it. In my years of experience, I've tried to access, or have accessed almost every single service sector. Because of my limited reach into that public sphere, I need community and other service providers on my team," she said.

CanFASD is Canada's source for evidence-based information on Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder and this year their FASD awareness day message "Everyone plays a part" reflects what she's saying.

Some areas that the mother says in her experience there need to be improvements are: services connecting better with each other, the criteria for help being limited and location de-Continued on page 8

One RCMP officer takes multiple impaired drivers off the road

Busy weekend shift for officer dealing with impaired drivers

A constable with Manitoba RCMP Eastman Traffic Services began a weekend shift out of the East St. Paul RCMP Detachment on Sept, 6. The officer began patrolling on Wenzel Street in East St. Paul and at 4:42 p.m., a vehicle was seen travelling at 75 kilometres per hour in a 50 kilometre per hour zone. The vehicle was stopped. Mandatory Alcohol Screening was completed, and the 64-yearold male registered two warnings. A ticket for \$378 was issued for speeding, the male's driver's licence was suspended, and his vehicle was impounded.

On Sept. 8, the constable was again patrolling in the East St. Paul area. At 5:50 p.m., the officer was on Highway 59 and observed a southbound vehicle going extremely fast. The radar showed the vehicle at 155 kilometres per hour in a 100 kilometre per hour zone. The officer initiated a traffic stop and administered the Mandatory Alcohol Screening test, which registered two warning readings. A ticket for \$770 was issued for speeding, the 47-year-old male's driver's licence was suspended, he received a serious offence notice, and his vehicle was impounded.

Later that evening, at 8:14 p.m., while patrolling on Garven Road, the officer conducted a traffic stop as a result of information from the automated licence plate reader in the police vehicle. The registered owner of the vehicle was a passenger, and a male was driving. The driver provided a false and expired driver's licence. When the officer asked him to provide valid and proper identification, the male finally did, which showed the 23-year-old was suspended from

A Mandatory Alcohol Screening test was administered and alcohol was detected. However, the amount of alcohol did not exceed the legal limit. The driver received a ticket for \$672 for Driving while Disqualified, and a ticket for making false statement, also for \$672. The vehicle was impounded.

At 11:29 p.m. the same evening, the officer was patrolling Highway 59 when a vehicle came up behind the police vehicle going 138 kilometres per hour in a 100 kilometre per hour zone. The 30-year-old male driver was stopped and provided a Mandatory Alcohol Screening reading of fail. He was issued an immediate roadside prohibition, his driver's licence was suspended, a speeding ticket was issued for \$548, and the vehicle was impounded. The registered owner of the vehicle was the passenger.

On Sept. 9, at 6:32 p.m., the same officer was patrolling on Garven Road when a vehicle was observed travelling 132 kilometres per hour in an 80 kilometre per hour zone. The vehicle was stopped. The 24-year-old male driver was given a Mandatory Alcohol Screening test and provided a fail reading. He was issued a speeding ticket for \$731, a serious offence notice requiring a hearing with Manitoba Public Insurance (MPI), his driver's licence was suspended, and his vehicle was impounded.

That same day, at 9:41 p.m., while patrolling, the officer observed a vehicle turn from Garven Road south onto Highway 59 with four-way flashers activated and driving under the speed limit. The officer stopped the vehicle to see if the driver needed assistance. The 51-year-old male driver indicated that he had his spare tire on as he had got a flat tire, so he was driving slowly for safety. A Mandatory Alcohol Screening Test was administered and the driver failed. The driver received an immediate roadside prohibition and his vehicle was impounded.

"This is not a typical weekend for a Traffic Services officer," said Inspector Michael Gagliardi, Officer in Charge of Manitoba RCMP Traffic Services. "However, it shows that impaired driving is still happening and that Mandatory Alcohol Screening is an invaluable tool to help us get impaired drivers off the road.

"Every driver stopped by a Manitoba RCMP Traffic Services officer is required to receive the test," Inspector Gagliardi continued. "As we see from this past weekend, it helps us to remove these dangerous drivers from the road. When drivers are impaired, they make bad decisions, and those decisions can have deadly consequences. The excellent work done by this officer over the weekend very well could have saved lives. Our officers will continue to patrol Manitoba communities in our efforts to get all Manitobans home safely."

pendant, the rotation of staff causing the family to have to tell their story to many people again and again, and communication challenges in general.

"The only thing I can do at this point is maintain the relationship with [my child], and keep any door open for [them] when [they're] ready to walk through," said the mother.

She finished her discussion by highlighting the need for a resiliency and a family-centred approach to care because the whole family is affected by situations like this.

The FASD awareness event concluded with a question and answer session and attendees were invited to tape red covers on their shoes for the day to show their support for FASD awareness in our community.

Experience Slavic Tales at Birds Hill Park Sept. 22-28

Sept. 22-28 is National Forest Week (NFW) hosted by the Canadian Institute of Forestry (CIF) to celebrate, educate and raise awareness about Canada's forest heritage.


"During NFW, Canadians are invited to learn more about Canada's forest heritage and to raise awareness about this valuable and renewable resource. Forests are fundamental to our economy, culture, traditions and history - and to our future," explained Rachel Brown, Communications Manager of CIF.

NFW was established in 1920 as Forest Fire Prevention Week to increase public awareness about Canadian forests. During NFW's debut, Brown explained that the only threat to forests was from fires, primarily caused by humans.

"Since then, National Forest Week, as it was renamed in 1967, has evolved to encompass the many and varied human and environmental aspects of Canada's forest resources," said Brown. She added that NFW's goal is to educate Canadians on the value of forest heritage and gain recognition of the valuable resources that forests provide.

In honour of NFW, CIF will host two public events at Bird's Hill Provincial Park (BHPP) related to the NFW 2024 theme, Two-Eyed Seeing.

"Originally introduced by Mi'kmaq Elder Albert Marshall, 'Etuaptmumk' is a Mi'kmaw word meaning 'Two-Eyed Seeing.' This teaching suggests that with one eye, we observe the world through Indigenous ways of knowing, while with the other, we look through Eurocentric viewpoints," Brown explained.



The CIF will be hosting two Slavic storytelling events at Birds Hill Provincial Park Sept. 22 and 27, hosted by local arborist Guy Shelemy.


Two-Eyed Seeing combines traditional knowledge and Western Science to create intercultural collabora-

"Two-Eyed Seeing offers us the gift of multiple viewpoints," Brown added. When integrating multiple points of view, there is a higher chance of achieving a positive outcome.

NFW will specifically focus on the Two-Eyed Seeing knowledge of sustaining forestry.

"Through mutual respect and collaboration, we can learn how to implement Indigenous knowledge and traditions with Western science to sustain healthy forests for future generations," Brown said. She added that through collaboration, we can better fight forest challenges like wildfires

The Forest Encounters are supposed to be both educational and entertaining and are best suited for individuals six years of age or older.

On Sept. 22, from 1-2:30 p.m., the first event will take place at the Kudlowich Homestead titled — Forest Encounters: The Seen and Unseen Worlds of Slavic Living Nature.

In this theatrical experience, discover what the Last Rural Forester finds in both the seen and unseen world of the Slavic living nature.

From the event's description, "Living nature is a constant drama of interdependent relationships within the

Slavic wisdom is typically shared through oral tradition. You can be one of the first people to hear the Last Rural Forester's story of his family's origins in a village that was lost to war. The story claims it may change your perception of the forest.

For the Sept. 22 event, Brown asks that able residents park along South Drive as the parking lot near Kudlowich Homestead is reserved for those with mobility issues, and expect a few-minute walk to reach the site.

The second event to NFW BHPP's interpretation series is Slavic Campfire Tales: An Evening Encounter with the Unseen Forest

on Sept. 27 from 7-8:30 p.m. at the Campfire Amphitheatre.

Sit back and try to relax as you listen to the eerie tales provided by the Last Forester. Brown warns you that you may see Lysovik, the Guardian of the Forest Realm, peering in on your campfire session.

"[Lysovik] embodies the energetic balance and harmony of the forest ecosystem. Given the pervasive presence of forests in the lives of the early Slavic populations, their protector played a significant role in folklore. Hunters, warriors, woodsmen, and travellers have often led astray or bewildered by sounds in the woods, leading to the emergence of the Lysovik as a central figure in these narratives," Brown explained.

For Friday evening, Brown encourages you to bring a flashlight, as you will be required to walk along a dimly lit gravel path. Parking is available at the Campground Store or along the road near the Amphitheatre.

Brown also recommends bringing a lawn chair to both of NFW's events as limited pre-built seating options will be available.

Local arborist and CIF Manitoba Member Guy Shelemy will lead both of the BHPP NFW sessions.

Shelemy explained that Slavic mythology typically lacks primary sources due to its oral tradition roots.


'My perception of Slavic forest wisdom has been shaped by my grandfather who emigrated from a [similar] region of Ukraine and time period as Lesya Ukrainka. As my research of forest ecology increases and I'm researching Slavic Archives for my book on Rural Forestry, patterns and similarities have become clearer," said Shelemy.





SDCF grant helps LSEC program fix bikes, promote a healthy lifestyle and develop community

A grant from the Selkirk & District Community Foundation helped the Lord Selkirk Education Centre's (LSEC) 10-year-old Bike Program get back on track last year, after being derailed by COVID-19.

Under the program, older students learn how to repair and maintain bikes and then go to Grade 5 and 6 classes in the Lord Selkirk School Division and teach younger kids how to do the same.

Teacher Tyler Farrand, who started the program with colleague Stephen Grahame, says the grant allowed them to buy tools and hire experts from WRENCH to instruct the older mentors.

"The students from LSEC become masters and they get to go and show younger kids in their community how to fix a flat tire and tune up their own bike," Farrand said.

"And if the young kids don't have a bicycle, we'll find a bike for them and they fix it up together."

The Foundation is accepting applications for this year's grants until Sept. 30.

The students no doubt learn how to fix bikes, but they get much more out of the program. They learn work skills, problem-solving skills, how to ask for help and how to work together.

Farrand says it's been a successful

"It builds the idea of independence,

and mastery and generosity," Farrand

'The students are proud, they've got this mechanic's shirt with their name on it and they're going to go and teach their skills to someone younger in the community."

Esther Van De Walle, director of LSEC's Youth Program, said students gain so much from the program.

They benefit from the learning and how to apply the knowledge. They learn how to fix a bike and then they can show other people how to fix a bike and that gives them a sense of pride," Van De Walle said.

"They also have the ability to fix up their own bike in the future and for a lot of our students bikes are freedom, it's a way to get around, a way to get to a job, a way to get to school. Having the skills to take care of and maintain your own bike is helpful."

Van De Walle says it's a lifelong skill and as the students become adults, they'll pass along their bike skills to their own kids.

Bev Clegg, executive director with the SDCF, says the power of granting is demonstrated every year through recipients like the Bike Program.

"We love to tell the stories of the groups that receive grants because, without fail, they are positive stories," Clegg said.

"In the case of the LSEC Bike Program, well that's one that warms everyone's hearts. To know that older

Nutrient targets introduced in 2020 by Conservatives approved by NDP in 2024

Critic says provincial government passing on bad nutrient targets that won't help Lake Winnipeg

The provincial NDP government announced at the end of August that it had set the first-ever nutrient reduction targets for improving water quality after officially passing a regulation this summer.

The regulation had initially been introduced by the former provincial Conservative government during the pandemic, and the targets that government had set for phosphorus and nitrogen loading to Lake Winnipeg and four rivers have now been implemented.

NDP environment and climate change minister Tracy Schmidt announced at the end of August the adoption of the nutrient targets, saying they're a "major step forward" to protecting water quality.

"This regulation for Lake Winnipeg and its tributaries sets the first-ever formal nutrient reduction target for improving water quality in Manitoba's history," said Schmidt in an Aug. 27 news release. "Establishing nutrient targets for our cherished rivers and lakes is essential in protecting those waterways for generations to come."

The Nutrient Targets Regulation falls under the Water Protection Act and includes Lake Winnipeg, the Red Riv-

er, the Saskatchewan River, the Winnipeg River and the Dauphin River.

"It commits Manitoba to report regularly on progress towards implementing the targets and actions underway to reduce nutrient levels in waterbodies in Manitoba," said Schmidt. "This provides a clear, measurable benchmark with the goal of effecting real change in the protection of Manitoba's waterways."

Because there were no phosphorus and nitrogen target numbers provided in the news release, the *Record* reached out to the department to find out whether it had made any changes to the targets for Lake Winnipeg (the Conservative government had proposed a total phosphorus target of .05 mg/L and a total nitrogen target of .75 mg/L.)

A spokesperson said the total phosphorus for Lake Winnipeg is now of-

ficially set at .05 mg/L and total nitrogen at .75 mg/L.

Total phosphorus load targets in rivers are as follows: the Red River at

Selkirk is set at 2,800 tonnes per year. For the Saskatchewan River at Grand Rapids, the total is 340 tonnes per Continued on page 15

year. The Winnipeg River at Pine Falls has a total load target of 1,050 tonnes per year. And the Dauphin River midway between Anama Bay and Gypsumville has a total load of 60 tonnes

Total nitrogen load targets in rivers are as follows: the Red River at Selkirk is set at 19,050 tonnes per year. The Saskatchewan River at Grand Rapids has a target of 8,960 tonnes per year. The Winnipeg River at Pine Falls has a target of 19,450 tonnes per year. And the Dauphin River midway between Anama Bay and Gypsumville has a total nitrogen load of 4,550 tonnes per year.

While the government says these targets will improve water quality in Lake Winnipeg, as well as in the four rivers that carry nutrients to the lake, Lake Winnipeg commercial fisher and analyst Bill Buckels says they'll do nothing to protect Lake Winnipeg. And the province's news release, with its lack of detail, obfuscates harms being done to the lake.

Buckels has been hit by severe and extensive algal blooms in the Hecla-Grindstone region where he fishes in the fall. He has also found himself awash in fecal matter that swirls

around for weeks in the currents. In 2018 Buckels had samples of brown-coloured lake water tested by a Winnipeg laboratory, and it confirmed the water contained feces. Last year several communities along the west shore of Lake Winnipeg were hit by algal blooms and they were also accompanied by masses of dead fish. The province's beach advisory for mid-August noted blue-green algae or cyanobacteria being above recreational water quality objectives at Victoria Beach (Red Cross Dock and Sunset Beach) on the east side of Lake Winnipeg and at Caddy Lake Beach in Whiteshell Provincial Park. The last provincial advisory issued on Sept. 6 noted that E. coli counts were "briefly" above the recreational water quality objective at Sandy Bar (east of Riverton) on Lake Winnipeg in early September, and above the objective at Lester, West Grand and Patricia beaches on Lake Winnipeg.

In 2021 Buckels had raised concern about the Conservative government's proposed nutrient targets, saying nutrient enrichment will keep the lake in the eutrophic range, a condition which produces algal blooms and kills fish (see the Feb 4, 2021, edition

of the Record, story titled "Province's proposed regulation on nutrient targets for Lake Winnipeg misses the

Eutrophication of water bodies is a serious environmental threat that's occurring around the world. Excessive nutrients - phosphorus and nitrogen from agricultural fertilizers and animal waste, municipal wastewater, raw sewage and industrial processes - lead to an overabundance of plant growth in waterbodies. Decaying

plants then kill fish and other organisms through oxygen depletion. Algal blooms also pose threats to drinking

Lake Winnipeg receives water from U.S. states such as North Dakota and Minnesota, and from Canadian provinces such as Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta. That water carries phosphorus and nitrogen and other pollutants to the lake.

students are sharing their knowledge with younger ones, developing that big brother or sister type of relationship is huge and then there's the aspect that we're getting kids outside and riding bikes, it's a fantastic program and the Foundation is proud to play a part in its success."

Farrand says the mentors definitely build a relationship with the mentees, "They make that connection in the community, the kids say, 'Oh, that's the guy that taught me how to fix my bike. I've seen that happen. It's really cool,'."

Over the years they've amassed a number of bikes through donations from the community. If there are kids without bikes, the program donates to them.

"Part of the idea is, how do we make the community more active?"

"Selkirk is really progressive in its active transportation system...and as someone who lives in the community I want to see the community become more healthy and better."

Applicants for an SDCF grant must be a non-profit organization or registered charity with the Canada Revenue Agency, providing services within the City of Selkirk, RM of St. Andrews or St. Clements.
















I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change musical coming to Selkirk

"We try and partner with community groups who might want to make a few bucks," explained Obach.



Manitoba's new chief veterinary officer announced

Earlier this month, Agriculture Minister Ron Kostyshyn announced that Dr. Glen Duizer has been selected as the new chief veterinary officer for the Manitoba government. In this role, Dr. Duizer will oversee the province's initiatives pertaining to animal health, disease prevention, and response.

Kostyshyn expressed that the chief veterinary officer is a prominent figure who plays a key role in bridging Manitoba's agricultural and agri-processing industries with animal and human well-being.

"Dr. Duizer's extensive experience and expertise in animal health, emergency planning and response and epidemiology and his strong relationships with livestock and poultry stakeholders and veterinarians will help guide our work protecting animal and human health, and we are excited to welcome him to this role."

Dr. Duizer graduated as a doctor of veterinary medicine from the University of Prince Edward Island in 1995 and obtained a master of science in epidemiology in 2015. Since 2005, he

has been a member of Manitoba Agriculture and has an additional decade of experience working as a clinical veterinarian in both food animal and mixed animal practices.

Manitoba's chief veterinarian, chief veterinary office, provincial veterinarian for animal welfare and other stakeholders work together to protect animals, food and people. The chief veterinary office is responsible for:

- leading disease planning, prevention, surveillance and response activities
 - supporting biosecurity

forts,

- collaborating in veterinary public health issues,
- overseeing Manitoba's veterinary diagnostic services laboratory,
- maintaining traceability and premises identification systems, and
- connecting farmers, processors and others with information and resources on these issues.

Buckels said the former Conservative government failed to stand up to the International Joint Commission, which is a Canada-U.S. body that manages shared waters and resolves transboundary water disputes. That failure resulted in nutrient targets being set too high to protect Lake Winnipeg. The target for phosphorus, for example, should have been set at .02 mg/L, which corresponds to the meso-eutrophic range.

"The nutrient targets were improperly set by the [provincial] Conservatives in 2020. The International Joint Commission shoved those nutrient targets down the throats of Canadians," said Buckels last week as he prepared for the opening of the fall commercial fishing season. "The targets were set too high because they want to send dirty water north. The Province of Manitoba didn't stand up against them, they embraced them. They said, 'OK, let's accept your dirty water,' then they increased the nutrient targets to double what they should be on Lake Winnipeg so that we could accommodate all their pollutants, not to mention all of ours, too."

Never one to shy away from making the government aware of what's happening to Lake Winnipeg, Buckels said he collected samples of filthy water and delivered them to the current natural resources minister Jamie Moses and to environment minister Tracy Schmidt.

"I told Tracy Schmidt that the nutrient targets had been set too high by the previous government, but she didn't seem to care," said Buckels. "I see there were no numbers provided about those targets in the NDP's August news release, no meaningful content and no links to other information. They probably don't want the public to know they've simply gone ahead and recycled the Conservatives' bad nutrient targets, which will do nothing to protect Lake Winnipeg.'

Buckels said pollution in the lake is getting worse. It's getting worse because the government is not "fixing the problem, only talking about it." And various programs such as the Lake Winnipeg Basin Initiative to address water quality were created as a diversion to ongoing environmental damage; talking about water quality "costs 10 per cent of the money required to fix the problem."

The Record asked the province whether it will have real-time monitoring stations on tributaries to measure phosphorus and nitrogen levels, whether it has cooperation from upstream nutrient polluters to reduce nutrient loading to the lake and rivers that are part of the regulation, what kind of enforcement provisions the government has for those exceeding the nutrient targets, whether the government will be reducing the numbers of hogs and cattle that contribute to nutrient overloading and what timelines are in place to achieve the nutrient targets.

A departmental spokesperson said the phosphorus and nitrogen targets are intended to turn the condition of the lake back to what it was in the early 1990s and the government is working with agricultural producers to reduce nutrient loading.

He added that the government recognizes that collaboration with upstream jurisdictions is critical, but doesn't say whether those polluters have taken action to reduce their nutrient contributions.


"The targets are based on the best available science on Lake Winnipeg and its watershed and are intended to improve water quality and reduce algal blooms to conditions similar to those observed in the early 1990s," said the spokesperson. "The Manitoba government is working alongside producers and other agricultural stakeholders to reduce nutrient loads in Lake Winnipeg and its tributaries. Many of these stakeholders have expressed their support for these regulations. Collaboration with upstream jurisdictions is critical component for improving water quality in the Lake Winnipeg watershed."

Regarding enforcement provisions, the spokesperson said that environmental regulation and enforcement for nutrient-contributing activities within the Lake Winnipeg watershed are subject to "their own regulatory

and enforcement regimes."

It will take time to reverse the nutrient levels in Lake Winnipeg.

"Manitoba's nutrient reduction targets are intended to guide future nutrient reduction activities and track progress and outcomes over time," the spokesperson said. "Increases in nutrient loading occurred over decades in Manitoba, and reductions in nutrient concentrations in Lake Winnipeg to reach these targets will also take time."

Baseball is a family affair for the Zebinskis, and they said they are fortunate to enjoy the game within their larger baseball family – the Springfield Senior Braves.

From Selkirk, Ty Zebinski joined the Braves in 2000. After taking a few years off to start a family, he returned in 2017 and is still going strong.

"I turned 50 this year, and I don't feel like I've slowed down any," Zebinski said. "I might as well keep going because the family enjoys coming out."

The Zebinski clan includes wife Vanessa and twins, daughter Addison and son Jacoby (12), who is named after Jacoby Ellsbury, who starred on the family's favourite team, the Boston Red Sox. Ty's parents are also fixtures at the Dugald diamond. They seldom miss a game.

Everyone's involved. Addison plays infield and pitches for the Selkirk Mariners. Vanessa shares the role of provincial coordinator for Manitoba Challenge Baseball, a program offering athletes of all abilities the opportunity to play modified baseball. Jacoby is an eight-year veteran of that program. He was born with spastic cerebral palsy, a disorder that affects all four limbs and forces him to use a wheelchair.

"It's a great way to bring out kids who enjoy sports and a way for them to socially interact and meet new friends because the disability community can be isolating for some of our kids," Vanessa explained. "Jacoby's made some great friends since he joined in 2016. "It's a great way to promote the game of baseball so everybody can play."

Jacoby is a passionate baseball fan. He follows the Toronto Blue Jays and Minnesota Twins, with his favourite player Twin Byron Buxton. Jacoby knows all the Winnipeg Senior Baseball League players. Sometimes, he takes the lineup card to home plate.

"He's watching the game just like everybody else," Ty said. "He watches the balls and strikes and chirps like anybody else. He knows all the umps by first name, and he's very critical of some of them, which I was at one point."

A few years back, Ty began taking Jacoby for a lap around the bases after every game. Soon, the Braves lined up along the baseline to high-five him as he rolled by. The other team, and even the umps, quickly followed.

"It's become part of the fabric of our league; every team embraces it," Ty said. They all line up on the baselines, and we go around the bases. Everyone's cheering, even the umps."

"Jacoby wanted to be part of the game."

Sports provide unique opportunities to forge deep relationships through the shared experience of pursuing a common goal. In special circumstances, those relationships go further.

"We've become a family," Ty said of the Braves. "I've known Boomer (manager Gerry Palidwor) for almost 25 years."

At first, it was only Ty. Then he married Vanessa. Soon after, Jacoby and Addison came along. Ever since, the entire clan has been to almost every game, travelling to tournaments in Brandon, Neepawa and Wawanesa.

"It's been quite a journey and a lot of fun," Vanessa said. "I wouldn't trade it for anything. We're quite a baseball family. Ty's parents fixtures are fixtures still too."

"That's the icing on the cake for me," Ty said. "When I look up and see them watching and enjoying the game, it's pretty special."

That family extends to the Braves organization. It begins with Palidwor, who looks beyond typical baseball skills as he builds his roster.

"We always say this is the Braves family," Palidwor explained. "A lot of times you see teams where guys show up for the game, and 10 minutes after, they're gone. We have many guys who've been here for 20 years. They get it. They embrace it."

The WSBL does too. In 2019, the Braves were on their way to a provincial crown. Near the end of the championship game, a league official approached Palidwor.

"The organizers came up to me and said to make sure those two little kids line up when we receive our medals," he recalled. "They each got one too."

There are more special memories. In

2019, Jacoby won the Jason Krestanowich Memorial Trophy, given annually to someone who shows a heart for the game. In the small baseball world, this particular award was extra-special for Zebinski, who once played under its namesake.

"The fact he won the award named after the guy who brought me into the league was extra special," Ty said.

Another time, the Braves were selling Grey Cup tickets, with the Zebinskis selling plenty. At the team windup, the team presented them with a lift to help load Jacoby's wheelchair into the van.

"It's something that will stick with me forever," Vanessa said. "This is a special group of people. That's what families do. We look after one another."

Baseball is a special game. As much as the Zebinskis have given to it, they've received far more in return.

"That we've been blessed as a family to be able to play this great game for such a long time, and with a great group of people is really special," Ty said.
