## **Sexual assault crisis intervention program seeks volunteers**

A sexual assault crisis intervention program is hoping to offer its services in Selkirk early next year with help from some local volunteers.

The SARAH Program provides services through regional hospital emergency departments, RCMP detachments and the Survivor's Hope Crisis Centre office, which is based in Pinawa.

The program offers a victim of sexualized violence support, information and referrals to help with the recovery process. The program has worked with upwards of 200 victims of sexual assault since its launch in 2003.

"We help them look at the resources that are available to them and we can make referrals to other systems if they would like us to do that," said Holly Parcey, Survivor's Hope Crisis Centre executive director. "Our contact with them is pretty intense over several hours and then we step away and

are looking to train around 10 to 20 new volunteers so they can offer the program out of the new Selkirk Re-

gional Health Centre.

They are also looking for new volunteers to join the support program in Beausejour, Pinawa as well as Pine Falls, which is where they receive the highest call volumes, Parcey said.

"We anticipate that our call out rates in Selkirk will be even higher than what we have in Pine Falls," she said, adding studies have shown that this type of program is needed in Selkirk. "We know that if we put up barriers to service provision people tend to fall between the cracks.

"We decided that this was a problem that needed to be addressed."

According to a Statistics Canada's Uniform Crime Reporting Survey, there were 1,356 police-reported sexual assaults in Manitoba in 2015. a rate of more than 104 sexual violence victims for every 100,000 people. The national rate is approximately 59 victims per 100,000 people. Statistics Canada's 2014 General Social Survey on Victimization also shows that 95 per cent of sexual assaults nationally are not reported to police.

Parcey said they have been working closely with the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority and the immediate services their volunteers provide are "very important."

"Just the way society kind of views sexual assault or sexual violence, the blame often ends up on the shoulders of the victim ... when in fact we know they aren't responsible," she said. "If we can lesson the blame and shame the victim feels they're more likely to go and seek help."

Those interested in volunteering will be invited to participate in a Sexual Assault Crisis Intervention training. All regional applicants will train together to complete 40 hours of training over three Saturdays, two Sundays and two evenings.

Training will be offered in Selkirk on Oct. 21 and 22 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Oct. 28 and 29 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and in Winnipeg on Nov. 4 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. There are also two evening training sessions from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m., in either Beausejour on Oct. 18 and 26 or Pine Falls on Oct. 19 and 25. A trainee must attend and complete all training sessions before being invited to join the program as a volunteer.

The application process involves completing an application form, attending an in-person interview and providing two reference checks.

## **Demolition of abandoned Lockport water park gets underway**

The former Skinner's Wet 'n Wild water park is being demolished, 12 years after it hosted its last swimmer.

The park, which is located behind Skinner's Restaurant in Lockport, saw its demolition start earlier this week, with parts of the slide being cut off and torn down.

Thomas McDougall was driving to Lockport from Winnipeg to visit his family on Monday. He stopped by the old water park to take one last look at it.

"I'm kind of sad to see it go. My dad would take me here all the time, I had so much fun," McDougall said. "I'm hoping that (the developers) can replace it with something nice."

St. Andrews Mayor George Pike said that after years of working with the previous owners, work to demolish the large structure has officially begun.

"This was a priority for residents. They wanted the water slides to go down. (St. Andrew's city council) has been working for some time on this," Pike said. "Finally, we're working with the new owners, they've started taking down the slide, and they hope to have it done by the end of the month."

The current owners of the land, Santa Fe Developments, are planning to build housing on the land. According to their website, the area from River Road to Highway 9 will be developed

into single family, multi-family, and commercial buildings.

Pike said that the water park presented quite a few safety concerns, as kids would play in the abandoned park during the summer months. There was one instance where a young adult was injured in the park. Safety is the municipality's top concern.

The park was formerly owned by Al and Louise Thompson, who owned Skinner's Restaurant in Lockport. It was closed down in the early 2000s when the owners realized it was no longer profitable.

Family Fulltime RV Adventure," is to travel across North America and see as much of it as they can. Their current tour is touching 18 states and three provinces, including Manitoba.

From there, they will return to Texas for some family time - and a few doctor and dentist appointments - before heading back on the road for their eastern tour later this winter.

Valerie had been floating around the idea of selling their home and beginning a new life in an RV.

"It just seemed there was never enough time to see the amazingness of North America, and we also figured out we bought too much house,"Tom said."Valerie had been doing research, and I worked from home, so she said, 'technically, you could work from the moon if there was wifi there.""

To make a long story short, the RV was purchased and the family headed out on the road.

As drastic a change as it might seem, the Kosa's have made the most of their new life on the open road.

"I'm a big believer that we can be as evil as Satan or as good as angels, humans are very adaptable creatures and you really don't know what you're capable of until you choose to go through a journey," he said. "For us, having down-sized, it's shown us that you don't need 5,000 square feet to show status and awesomeness. We use less space, less clothing, less energy and we spend more of our time outside. We spend most of our time reconnecting with family and seeing what these countries have to offer."

But it's not all driving down the road for the family. Tom, who works in IT, is working for the weekend from Monday to Thursday so he puts in enough time during those four days to have Friday through Sunday off. During the time Tom is working, Valerie, a former school teacher, home schools her children.

"Those three days we have off, that time has been officially renamed family weekends," he said.

The Kosa's plan to return to Manitoba in the near future, this time bypassing Selkirk for a trip up to Churchill to see the polar bears.

## **'Truly a community facility**

## Hundreds gather for Selkirk Regional Health Centre's official grand opening

The sounds of a drum circle led by Peguis First Nation members filled the room and helped kick off the official grand opening of the new Selkirk Regional Health Centre last Thursday.

Hundreds of community members as well as local and area dignitaries packed the front foyer of the hospital to help open Manitoba's newest regional health centre.

"This is a beautiful building ... and it is a remarkable testament to the input of community members, support of community members, and those who are working in the health care system, you really helped to build and design this building," said Health, Seniors and Active Living Minister Kelvin Goertzen during his address to the crowd. "Today we celebrate a building but more than that we celebrate the hearts that are within that building because it will be those things that will truly make a difference and will be remembered for many, many years.

"I want to pay special tribute to those who will work in this building with their healing hands and kind compassion for all Manitobans when they need it most."

Goertzen said the new health centre reflects the region's history and culture and is an instrumental part of efforts to recruit new care providers to the area.



At 180,506 square feet, the new regional health centre is more than two times larger than Selkirk's old hospital. There are an additional 12 beds in the new facility including 53 medical/ surgical beds, eight obstetrical beds and four special care beds.

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said the hospital is "truly a community facility ... for our community."

"This is truly remarkable in so many ways," Johannson said during his address to the crowd.

## Active transportation pathway coming to Selkirk in 2018

The City of Selkirk has received a total of \$158,333 in provincial and federal funding towards the construction of a new active transportation pathway.

The project will see the creation of an active transportation pathway starting at the far west access point at the Canalta Hotel off Manitoba Avenue to Mercy Street in Selkirk.

Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said the project will be completed sometime next year.

"It will provide a safe location for our citizens to engage in most every form of active transportation including roller blades and strollers along with joggers, walkers and wheelchairs, as well as cycling," Johannson said during an announcement outside the Canalta Hotel last Friday morning."The pathway will be open and maintained year-round.

"I would like to thank the Manitoba Avenue task force, our city administration and all of our partners for their participation and foresight in helping make this wonderful project a reality."

Johannson was joined by Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan and Selkirk MLA Alan Lagimodiere during Friday's announcement.

"Anything we as a government can do to help Manitobans lead healthier lives is an option worth investing in," Lagimodiere said. "This active transportation pathway helps to connect the western section of Manitoba Avenue with residents who want to walk or ride bicycles to this area."

Every commercial fisher I have ever met had a stand out character and late last week another one, young, full of fun, Jason Donald from Selkirk crossed my path. Along with his short brown hair and beard, a perpetual smile and a slight squint from being in the outdoors a lot, he had a knack for telling stories including this one he had for us. A few years ago he, his dad Richard and a friend, Steve, were late winter fishing off the western shore of Lake Winnipeg. They had finished lifting nets and Jason led for home on his sled while dad and Steve followed in their bombardier. Jason bounced along for a while then stopped and turning on his seat could not see the bombardier. Concerned, he spun around and retraced his snow tracks. It didn't take that long before he saw what looked like a dark bulge on the horizon. The closer he got, he realized it was the bombardier with its nose in the air and the rear end half submerged in water having broken through the ice."I didn't know we could bail out of that rig so fast, we're dry," dad proclaimed to Jason as he stepped off his sled. The men walked around the bombardier looking for a way to free it. The auger on the back of the unit had caught the ice and was holding it up. Richard knew a friend on shore and sent Jason to get help. The friend brought a big old Alpine snowmobile and in the darkening cooling afternoon pulled them out. Days later Jason learned that the first thing dad did when he got home was to go buy two survival suits for himself and Steve. Jason never said much but always wondered why dad never bought him one too.

It was a pure pleasure being on the Victoria pier last week visiting with anglers in the sunny hazy afternoon. One fellow George Borgesen who lives close by at Hillside caught my

attention. He didn't talk much at first but when his love of fishing took over, in his firm voice and little bursts of humor, he shared a couple of stories that gave cause to chuckle! He has this "ocean going kayak" with an electric motor and has had some peculiar fishing experiences with it in the bay here. Ŏne time he caught a huge carp. That thing towed him back and forth across the bay for a half an hour with George screaming unkind damnations at it before it finally slipped the

hook. Another time he caught a monster jackfish and fought it working his motor and keel keeping the fish ahead of him until he felt the fish was weakening. He reeled it in broadside hoping to get a photo and release it but it took off around the backside of the kayak. The line got caught in the prop dragging the fish in and in George's words,"the motor killed it!"

On the pier at Lockport last Tuesday I met a most engaging guy Lenny Giacomin from Grand Marais. He was a big wisecracking chap with a full, wholesome clean shaven face and head who when he told a story everybody crowded around. Lenny said he was fishing here a while back when a neighboring angler caught something very heavy. It pulled downstream hard bending the guys rod so far over he grabbed the line and began bringing in whatever was on bare handed. Suddenly in the splashing rumbling turbulent current of the locks' waters a string of fish rolled to the surface. The white bellies of the strung bass tumbled together with the one most forward having taken the anglers baited hook! Everybody moved to the edge of the pier exclaiming loudly at the spectacle. Then they rushed to help, flopping down on their stomachs side by side with their nets. They worked in tandem and pinching the string of fish between their nets, the anglers landed the writhing bunch. It was obvious some boat angler in the middle of the Red had lost the string of fish and looking at them they were too far gone to release so the guy who first tagged them took them home. As he wiped the slime and smell of fish off his hands and packed up he tossed a little joke to his newfound fishing gang saying, "This has to be a record for the most bass caught with one cast!" Come on by next week won't you?

Local faith and spiritual leaders came together for a special dedication ceremony for the Selkirk Regional Health Centre's Spiritual Care Centre last Thursday morning.

Leaders from various local churches took the time to offer a blessing or prayer for the centre, which is located on the second level of the hospital.

"In this space we're gathered here and are invited to centre our souls," said Ron Janzen, the Selkirk Regional Health Centre's chief operating officer and vice-president of corporate services. "This is a space where people will gather to nurture their souls ... and to strengthen their community and build their hope."

Dr. Dan Lindsay, the Selkirk Regional Health Centre's chief of staff, said the spiritual centre provides health care beyond the physical aspects.

"This facility gives us the opportunity to work with people ... all in the context of spirituality." A Cavapoo by the name of Cassy also accompanies the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority's spiritual health co-ordinator Marion Magnusson during her patient rounds to attend to their spiritual health and care needs.

The Spiritual Care Centre is open to individuals of all religious traditions and spiritual expression.

Honouring symbolism in many faith traditions, the centre is circular in shape and oriented to the east. The space is also designed to make everyone feel welcome and that they are not alone.

Not far from the centre and the palliative care family room is a second floor terrace with doors large enough to accommodate a hospital bed so bedridden patients can enjoy the outdoors if they so wish.

The centre is also equipped to accommodate smudging thanks to a donation province by the construction community.

"Clearly an exceptional amount of planning and detail went into the making of this centre.

"It promotes the wellbeing of the patients, the family, the staff and the communities involved."

Johannson added the city is also looking forward to the addition of a training and teaching facility within the hospital that they hope will soon be in place.

"Our hope is to train the practitioners of tomorrow here in our community today," he said.

"New and improved opportunities for care in our regional health centre benefit all residents across the Interlake-Eastern region," said Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority CEO Ron Van Denakker."This facility is a focal point in our work with communities across the region to establish a clinical teaching unit that will see us educating future health-care professionals. Teaching units like this are key to attracting new graduates to the region as well as health-care professionals who want to be mentors."

Van Denakker also took the time to thank the community and staff members who worked with the design team to develop the new centre.

The hospital's grand opening ceremony was followed by an official ribbon cutting and public tours of the new centre.

Construction of the new \$111 million health centre began in spring 2014 and the first patients moved in on June 25.



The Canadian Cancer Society and other organizations in Canada and



## Selkirk school's breakfast program receives \$1K grant

Selkirk's Ruth Hooker School recently received a nice boost towards their breakfast program.

The kindergarten to Grade 6 school was one of several across the country to receive a \$1,000 grant from Farm Credit Canada, which will go toward helping fund the breakfast program in the school, which has 111 children.

"We're going to buy fruits and vegetables with it," said Lucille McGillivray, principal at Ruth Hooker School. "They can be expensive and it's hard to always have them around and we want the kids to be able to have access to that."

The breakfast program, run by volunteers and dependent on contributions and grants, runs five days a week from 8:15 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. and students are able to grab a nutritious breakfast free of charge.

McGillivray said on average 20 students use the program per day, and they find the program is the busiest between the months of January and March. A daily meal varies from eggs and toast to cereal to oatmeal.

The school also has a snack program that they fund as well.

"It was something they reached out to us for, we never applied for it," Lord Selkirk School Division Supt. Michele Polinuk said regarding the grant. "We submitted a name, Ruth Hooker School, and they approved our choice."

Polinuk said that most of the schools in the LSSD have similar programs.

The school has partnered with several organizations, including the Children Nutrition Council of Manitoba, The Upper Crust Bakery, Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen and Show Kids You Care.

The program helps the school partner with parents and the community to promote healthy eating practices.

"Part of it is the nutrition piece and

the other part of it is just having something to eat, whether it's rushing out, sleeping in or various other reasons why kids don't come to school fully nourished," Polinuk said. "One or two of these started a number of years ago and it just gradually increased due to need, to the point where it is now in our high schools."

On top of the breakfast program, the school offers the sale of white milk,

100 per cent juices and water to students and doesn't sell soft drinks and encourages students and parents to make healthy choices for their children when it comes to their meals.

Their policy was developed to help students become more aware of healthy food choices as well as to offer a fun and balanced approach to nutrition that is relevant to students.

Even though chimneys do not require daily upkeep, regular maintenance efforts help chimneys operate safely and prevent deaths and injuries while protecting homes from fire.



Various problems can arise when chimneys are not well maintained. Such problems include chimney fires, carbon monoxide poisoning and early failure of the chimney and heating sources that the chimney vents.

Carbon monoxide can be scary, as it is virtually invisible without a proper detector. The National Vital Statistics System says that, in 2015, 393 deaths resulted from unintentional carbon monoxide poisoning in the United States. When carbon monoxide is breathed in, it builds up quickly and combines with the blood, reducing the blood's ability to carry oxygen. The Canada Safety Council says that body tissue and cells can't function without oxygen.

Chimney fires are another potential byproduct of poor chimney maintenance. The Chimney Safety Institute of America notes that chimneys expel the byproducts of combustion, including smoke, water vapor, gases, unburned wood particles, hydrocarbon, tar fog, and assorted minerals,

which can condense on the inside of the chimney flue. The residue, called creosote, is highly combustible. With the right conditions, a chimney fire can occur.

To avoid chimney fires and other

risks, take these precautions, courtesy of CSIA, HomeAdvisor and Popular Mechanics.

• Have chimneys inspected annually and properly cleaned by a professional chimney technician.





• Make sure tree branches and other obstacles are cleared away from the top of the chimney.

• Use seasoned hardwoods that have been split for several months to a year. "Green" wood creates more creosote.

•The top-down method of building a fire produces less smoke. This means using larger pieces of wood on the bottom and the smallest twigs and kindling at the top. The fire will burn from the top and down, igniting the wood beneath as it goes.

 $\cdot$  Put a cap on the chimney to keep out rain, snow and small animals.

 $\cdot$  Keep fires small; otherwise, the in-

tense heat may damage bricks and mortar in the chimney. Repair any damage promptly before lighting another fire.

• Open the damper and fireplace doors so that air supply flows freely and can vent the smoke promptly, reducing residence time in the flue; otherwise, creosote can form.

• Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms throughout the home and routinely check the batteries.

## Winnipeg couple reeling in catfish, raising cash for ALS

When Dan and Eileen Coates set out this past spring, they had a radical idea and some lofty goals.

The husband and wife team of Winnipeg wanted to raise money for ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease, after the illness claimed Eileen's father years ago. To do so, they were going to fish – and fish a lot – trying to cast enough lines to catch 10,000 pounds of catfish on the Red River and raise \$100,000 in the process.

The idea set in motion "Catfish Buy the Pound" and the couple has spent well over 200 hours this summer catching as many fish as they can, with the current tally being somewhere in the 250 region - some 4,000 pounds pulled overboard with the end of the season drawing near.

Not bad for some amateur anglers who have now pulled in several master angler catches during their journev.

And while their goals may not be reached before the cold weather forces them off the river, don't think for a second they're disappointed with what they've accomplished.

"Absolutely not," Dan said this past week. "If we brought ALS awareness to one person, we were successful. If we raised \$1 for ALS, we were successful. All of this wouldn't have happened unless we did this."

Dan works for Valley Fashions in Winnipeg, a company that designs and supplies fishing jerseys and market display products for boat companies.

"Through those connections, we've introduced so many to awareness of the disease," he said. "Our Facebook page has had 23,000 to 24,000 reaches. This is what we felt we needed to do and we feel that we accomplished that. We're not disappointed at all. Did we set goals? Yes. Did we set lofty goals? Of course. You have to set lofty goals. One of Eileen's favourite expressions is, 'failure is not trying.'"

And try they

have. The fishing season this year has been a challenge, to say the least.

"We've had a lot of pros tell us this has been one of the toughest years they can remember for catching fish, they've said we've done exceptionally well," Dan said. "The low water on the river has been a big challenge. It's been crazy, crazy low. There's rock popping up on the river that people didn't even know existed. Some of the places are starting to get dangerous."

The couple is thankful also for all the help they've received along the way.

Dan and Eileen have had a nice new boat to use for the season courtesy of MirroCraft, a truck to drive it around, thanks to Chudd's in Gimli (that a

couple purchased for themselves) and a motor to get it up and down the Red from Suzuki. Olympic Building Centre has covered their fuel for the season as well.

The duo is aiming to be back on the water later this week, with a weekend full of fishing to come.

"We're still chasing hard," Dan said, figuring they'll surpass the \$5,000mark before the season is through.

## Selkirk's Adams receives Order of the Buffalo

Selkirk's Zachary Adams was bestowed with the province's highest honour last week.

Adams was presented with the Order of the Buffalo at the Legislative Building in Winnipeg. He was also recognized by the City of Selkirk.

"I really didn't expect (to be honoured)," said Adams. "I thought I was just going there for the reception and have a little bit of food and drink.

"But it was quite the honour to receive it from all of all of the political heads."

Manitoba Premier Brian Pallister, Winnipeg Mayor Brian Bowman and Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson recognized the athletes who won medals at the 2017 Canada Summer Games by co-hosting the ceremony.

Adams won a bronze medal for Manitoba in the canoe/kayak K4 200-metre sprint. He was presented with a certificate for being honoured with the prestigious Order of the Buffalo.

"It was such a huge honour to receive this," Adams said proudly.

Manitoba athletes won 42 medals at the 2017 Canada Summer Games, a new record for the province with 10 gold, 15 silver and 17 bronze medals.

Manitoba received the Centennial Cup as the most improved team from the previous Canada Summer Games in 2013. Manitoba also won the Centennial Cup in 2013 with 35 medals and is now the only jurisdiction to win back-to-back Centennial Cups.

"Team Manitoba athletes who participated in this summer's Canada Summer Games represented the province with pride and Manitoba will honour all medal-winning athletes by inducting them into the prestigious Order of the Buffalo Hunt," said Manitoba Premier Brian Pallister in a media release.

"Manitoba athletes won more medals at these Canada Summer Games than any of our teams before them and that achievement deserves to be recognized."

Manitoba's Order of the Buffalo Hunt was established in 1957. The honour is bestowed by the province on individuals who demonstrate outstanding skills in the areas of leadership, service and community commitment.

Other prominent Order of the Buffalo Hunt inductees include former U.S. President Jimmy Carter (1993), Desmond Tutu (2004) and Mother Teresa (1982).

"This summer, we were all inspired by the fantastic performance of our athletes who did an amazing job of






