## Man dead after police-involved shooting in East Selkirk

### Independent Investigation Unit to probe incident

Manitoba's newly-minted Independent Investigation Unit will probe a late-night police shooting that left a 44-year-old man dead in East Selkirk Sunday night.

Winnipeg police shot the man in his white cargo van after following him from Transcona to Highway 59 at Kirkness Road in East Selkirk. Police and investigators remained on scene for much of Monday as they combed the area for evidence.

Police said the shooting happened at around 10:30 p.m. and witnesses say they saw as many as 10 to 15 police cruisers race down Highway 59.

STARS air ambulance was called just before 11 p.m., but was told to stand down, and never went airborne, said spokesperson Cam Heke.

East Selkirk resident Monica Janusz lives on Penny Lane across from Highway 59 and said she heard sirens followed by at least three gunshots



around 10:45 p.m.

"I looked out our window and there were tons of cop cars and a white van," Janusz said.

The van was wedged in between two unmarked, black police SUVs, and remained on the highway with a broken window Monday morning.

RCMP forensic officers outfitted in white suits were gathering evidence and the northbound lanes on Highway 59 were closed to all traffic until about 2 p.m. Monday.

of Manitoba civilian director Zane Tessler confirmed police shot the man through the van's windshield, but couldn't say how many officers

opened fire on the driver or what caused the incident.

## Selkirk's Terry Fox Run raises over \$17K for foundation

Nearly 200 participants and 71 volunteers laced up and helped raise more than \$17,000 during Selkirk's 23rd annual Terry Fox Run.

"It's so awesome to see so many people coming out," Selkirk's Terry Fox Run chairperson Jana Pringle said under sunny skies on Sunday before the run kicked off. "Couldn't have asked for better weather today."

Terry Fox's father, Rolly, also made an appearance at this year's run. Pringle said it was a first for Selkirk.

"We're really honoured to have him here," Pringle said. "We do know he has some family ties to our community, but the fact that he is able to make the journey out here on this particular day, of all places to be in Canada, he is willing to be with us in Selkirk.

"We are thrilled."

Rolly told those in attendance that he was "very happy" to be in Selkirk to mark the city's 23rd annual run.

"I have family here ... and I just want to say thank you," Rolly said.

This year's run took place in Selkirk Park and all proceeds raised, which are expected to increase once the online donations are tallied, will go to

### 2 pilots, 6 passengers survive plane crash near Thompson

Keystone Air Service says wrong fuel may have caused crash

Six passengers and two pilots managed to escape serious injury when a Keystone Air Service flight crashed into trees near Thompson.

According to Keystone Air Service, based in St. Andrews, Keystone Flight 208 was returning to the Thompson Airport shortly after takeoff when it crashed near the runway last Tuesday evening around 6:45 p.m.

"I am pleased to be able to report that all six passengers were apparently able to exit the aircraft on their own," the air service's president Cliff Arlt said via email. "The company understands that its pilots suffered injuries ... however, none are believed to be life threatening."

Arlt added they have learned the

aircraft, a Navajo Chieftain, may have been fuelled with jet fuel in error by aircraft refuellers and the Transportation Safety Board of Canada is investigating the exact cause.

According to a Transport Canada incident report, the pilot had radioed in shortly after takeoff about an electrical problem and said they would be returning to Thompson. The flight was destined for Winnipeg and all six passengers were provincial employees.

"The pilot also advised the Flight Service Station they did not require any assistance," the TSB report states.

RCMP said the plane crashed near Burntwood River, approximately one kilometre north of Thompson Airport, shortly after takeoff.

"No major injuries reported but all were transported to hospital for treatment,"RCMP spokesman Sgt. Bert Paquet told the *Selkirk Record* via email. "The scene was secured by officers pending arrival of Transport Safety Board investigators who are leading the investigation."

There was no visible blood from the highway, however, a handgun could

be seen lying on the ground, but it wasn't clear if it belonged to an officer or the man.

Evidence markers were placed next to the gun, a pair of sunglasses, and what looked like a black knife, but police wouldn't confirm what weapons were found.

Tessler said an investigation into the shooting by the investigation unit is mandatory under new provincial legislation and a conclusion by his office will be made after a full review into the shooting is completed.

"Right now our mandate is to investigate the incident," Tessler said. "Wherever the evidence takes us, we'll follow it."

The Independent Investigation Unit, launched in June, investigates all serious incidents involving police officers in Manitoba. Sunday's shooting is the first officer-involved fatality the unit will investigate since starting work in June.

There were conflicting reports from Winnipeg news outlets Monday night as to the intent of the driver.

One report said he was suicidal, while another said he was on his way to harm a person he thought had sexually assaulted a family member.

Tessler said he was unsure if the officer(s) involved in the shooting had been placed on leave or not.

A spokesperson for the Winnipeg Police Service refused to comment on the incident before press time on Monday.

### **Argyle museum to host** auditions for World War theatrical production

A museum in Argyle plans to release a history book and put on a theatrical production with help from \$21,330 in funding from the World War Community Commemorative Fund.

Settlers, Rails and Trails Inc. recently acquired the funding from the department of Canadian Heritage and plan to release a 200page history book entitled "Veterans of the Brant-Argyle Region," launching free theatrical productions in Stonewall, Teulon, Domain, Selkirk and Argyle. They also plan to produce a professionally studio-filmed version of the production that will later be distributed to local schools free of charge.

Once the production is over, the uniforms will be on display in the Argyle museum's ongoing exhibit at the Argyle Community Hall until Sept. 2016.

"At this point we are look-

ing to audition interested actors to participate in the production's seven performances," Shayne Campbell, the museum's president and executive director told the *Record* via email.

Auditions are being held at Ecole Selkirk Junior High on Monday, Sept. 28 at 7 p.m. No experience is necessary.

"We are looking for seven actors: WWI Soldier, Sailor, Nurse and WWII Pilot, War Bride, Farmer, student Cadet. Costumes will be provided, a two minute monologue is to be memorized, and transportation to two rehearsals, DVD recording and each performance is to be supplied by the actors," Campbell said. "All events will take place on Saturdays and evenings."

Specific dates of performances, rehearsals, studio recording and all other information will be provided by the museum and at the audition

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## **Community says farewell to MS Lord Selkirk II**

#### SaskSteel crew decorates ship as part of last minute tribute

A ship that has sat in the dark for the last 25 years came to life Saturday evening, but feelings were mixed as community members said their goodbyes to the MS Lord Selkirk II.

The abandoned ship was lit up with Christmas lights as part of a lastminute tribute and final goodbye that SaskSteel, the company dismantling the vessel, wanted it to have.

SaskSteel owner Ben Hoosier said the lights were meant to give the shop "a proper pay off."

Hoosier and a small crew decorated the ship with lights on Saturday afternoon, and although it was last minute, word of the ship being lit quickly spread online and by word of mouth.

Many came out to say their goodbyes including Selkirk resident Danielle Kennedy and her family.

"That is sad," said Kennedy, who like many have been following the story of the abandoned vessel for years.

One man, who asked only to be identified as John, echoed Kennedy's sentiment.

"It's kind of sad," he said while trying to take a photo of the illuminated boat with a dark night sky above. "I think they could have done something better with the boat."

The boat is still sitting in Selkirk Park, however, "major" demolition work be-

gan Sunday afternoon, and Hoosier said it wouldn't be long before the ship begins to look very different as it gets cut up piece by piece and scraps are taken to the Selkirk steel mill.

By Notice of Public Hearing dated June 16, 2015, the public was advised that Centra Gas Manitoba Inc. . ("Centra") has applied to the Public Utilities Board ("Board") of Manitoba for approval of new Supplemental Gas, Transportation (to Centra), and Distribution (to Customers) Rates.

On September 11, 2015, Centra updated its original Application to provide its current estimate of non-Primary Gas costs, based on future market prices as of July 31, 2015. Centra's updated Application requests approval of the following:

- 1) Approval of Supplemental Gas, Transportation (to Centra), and Distribution (to Customers) Sales and Transportation rates, effective November 1, 2015;
- 2) Approval of the recovery through rate riders effective November 1, 2015 of a net outlook balance in the prior period non-Primary Gas deferral accounts of \$36.1 million:
- 3) Approval of the continuation of the current temporary rate rider treatment for Interruptible customers that migrate to Firm Service and customers that migrate to or from Transportation Service ("T-Service") on or after May 1, 2014;
- 4) Final approval of the Primary Gas, Supplemental Gas, Transportation (to Centra) and Distribution (to Customers) sales rates effective August 1, 2013, which were approved on an interim basis in Order 89/13;
- 5) Final approval of Transportation (to Centra) and Distribution (to Customers) sales rates effective August 1, 2014, reflecting the removal of non-Primary Gas rate riders expiring on July 31, 2014, which were approved on an interim basis in Order 85/14;
- 6) Final approval of the Transportation (to Centra), and Distribution (to Customers) Sales and Transportation rates, reflecting the implementation of new non-Primary Gas Rate Riders on November 1, 2014, which were approved on an interim basis in Order 123/14;
- 7) Final approval of Distribution (to Customers) Sales rates, reflecting the implementation of new non-Primary Gas Rate Riders on February 1, 2015;
- 8) Final approval of actual gas costs for the 2012/13 and 2013/14 gas years;

- 9) Final approval of Primary Gas Sales Rates and Franchise Application interimex-parte orders as outlined in the Application; and,
- 10) Final approval of any other interim ex-parte orders issued by the PUB prior to the conclusion of the public review process for this application.

#### **BILL IMPACTS**

If approved by the Board, Centra's updated rates will result in an increase of approximately 3.8% or \$30 on the annual bill for a typical residential customer. Annual Bills for customers in the Large General Service High Volume Firm, Mainline, and Interruptible Customer Classes range from decreases of 0.7% to increases of 8.8% depending on the customers' consumption and load characteristics.

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## Board to decide fate of Pittsburg Ave. paving project

Whether or not Selkirk's Pittsburg Avenue road reconstruction and paving project is given the green light will depend on a Manitoba Municipal Board's ruling in upcoming weeks.

The project includes road reconstruction, paving as well as a utility connection installation and natural gas line extension along a stretch of Pittsburg Avenue from Main Street to Sophia Street.

The road will be rebuilt to meet industrial standards, making it more suitable for heavy truck traffic. However, adjacent property owners, including the City of Selkirk, could be on the hook to cover the costs of the estimated \$431,500 project.

The current gravel road, according to the city's CAO Duane Nicol, is negatively impacting surrounding businesses including True North Motors.

"It is having a negative impact on their operations with the dust on their vehicles and so forth so they have the right to make that request," Nicol said.

Representatives from True North Motors originally appeared before council requesting the removal of a zoning bylaw that requires them to pave their parking lot, given that Pittsburg Avenue wasn't paved. Council, however, declined their request and True North then requested the city pave the street. According to information obtained during a municipal board meeting in Selkirk earlier this month, council referred True North's request to their 2014 budget deliberations but it wasn't approved and administration was asked to investigate potential options for the road for their 2015 budget.

During those deliberations, city administration investigated the potential to pave Pittsburg Avenue under a local improvement plan. A 40-year net financial impact analysis was done and council gave the project the green light. Following budget approval, the city started their search for potential developers of the lots on the north

side of Pittsburg Avenue and began the local improvement process.

"This project has been given substantial thought and consideration," Nicol said. "We have worked hard to ensure the project is fair, transparent and in the best interests of all city taxpayers today and into the future."

Janet Smith, part property owner and office manager of E.J. Smith Memorials located at 49 Main Street, said they don't mind paying the extra property taxes to up date the road.

"We're a city ... and you don't tend to have gravel roads. We're willing to invest in the city to come into the 21st century," Smith said. "Yes, it's going to cost us more taxes but we are willing to pay that amount."

Although it's difficult to evaluate

whether the road's current condition has harmed their business, which opened in the spring of 1974, traffic has increased, she said.

"Over the years, the volume of traffic and the weight of the traffic using the road has pounded it to dust," she said. "The road is inadequate for its usage."

However, not everyone is in favour of covering the cost.

Peter Mandryk, vice president of United Steelworkers Local 5442, said the roughly 365 steelworkers the union represent's at the steel mill "don't see a benefit to it."

"We never complained about the gravel road, we never complained about the dust," Mandryk said. "We didn't ask for any of it."

Mandryk added it's not just heavy trucks that use the road.

"The thing that frustrates us more than anything else is ... I don't think the city did their homework," he said. "My office is there, I drive up and down there everyday and people do use that road."

Nicol said the city hosted a public hearing earlier this year so people could express their views.

"Paving's not cheap ... so obviously you don't want to pay additional amounts," he said. "From the city's perspective ... if the road is improved, that's a benefit to all adjacent property owners."

Depending on the amount of frontage each property owner owns, they could be looking at \$247.15 per foot or \$24.01 annually if they decide to finance the cost, all of which has been made public information.

"If we get favourable quotes at the time of construction, as we did this year, and interest rates remain low when the debenture is finalized, then the actual costs to property owners would be lower," Nicol said.

Nicol added the municipal board should have a final decision regarding the project in four to six weeks.

Established under the Municipal Board Act, one of the board's duties is to receive and resolve property assessment appeals.

### Petersfield truck driver wins National Grand Champion award

Truck driving is more than just a career for Ken Wiebe. Once a year it becomes a competitive sport and he has proved himself to be serious competition.

At the annual National Professional Truck Driving Championships, seasoned veterans from across Canada test their knowledge and skills of the industry.

Wiebe, a Petersfield resident since 2001, was one of five competitors representing Manitoba after winning the provincial competition and earlier this month he earned the title of National Grand Champion.

"I get lots of congratulations," Wiebe said."All the customers I haul to, they are pretty excited about it too."

Despite the fact it was his 11th time heading to nationals, Wiebe is never calm going into the competition.

"Every time you're a ball of nerves. You get into the competition and your heart is jumping out of your chest. I thought maybe it might go away after a while, but it doesn't,"Wiebe said with a laugh.

The competition starts with a timed written test consisting of 50 questions on driver safety and general knowledge of trucking. Next, the competitors hit the road course where they conduct a pre-trip inspection of their vehicles to find the five planted defects within eight minutes. Lastly, they attempt to maneuver their ve-

hicle cleanly through a tight obstacle course.

Any bump, scrape, defect missed, or wrong question counts against a competitor's point score used to decide the winners in the five vehicle categories.

"It's really good for the industry," Wiebe said." I think it gives the truckers a chance to show what they do in every day work and the challenges

they go through.

"It gives them a chance to show off their expertise and what they learn."

Wiebe has taken first place in the nationals five times now, but this was his first time earning the National Grand Champion award, which goes to the contestant with the highest point differential between their scores and the category average.

The national championship is hosted

by a different province every year. This year it took place in Regina and was hosted by the Saskatchewan Trucking Association. Wiebe was happy to take home some trophies and a nice gold watch for his efforts, although he said one of the biggest things for him is just being at the nationals.

"It was done on a really professional level and a lot of people put effort into putting it all together, and it got a lot of great sponsors. It all helps," Wiebe said.

Everyone involved in the competition stays for the weekend for a Friday night gala and is given a tour of some of the attractions of the host province. This year they visited the RCMP Heritage Centre, known as the "Depot."

To enter the competition a driver has to have been completely accident free for the 12 months prior. When asked for any tips for those who want to succeed in the competition in the future, Wiebe said "just have fun with it and try to relax."

Last year, between 80 to 100 people dropped by their dairy farm, which is home to about 150 cows in total, including 50 for milking. This year, he seemed on track to reach the same totals. Visitors had the chance to see a milking demonstration and to meet the family's other pets, including nine goats, two dogs and a horse named Nike.

"It's a good opportunity for people to come out and see the farm," Porteous said. "A lot of people are out and they never get to see that.

"Grandparents bring grandkids. Maybe they were on a farm or had family on a farm, but their grandkids have never seen it."

Porteous recently took over the operation, and his four children -aged 16, 14, 12 and 10 — mark the sixth generation on the farm.

"It's what I like to do and the kids enjoy it too," he said. "My kids also enjoy Open Farm Day.

"They love showing the farm off to other people and taking all these other kids that don't see these things around to tour the farm and to see all the different animals."

The Porteous kids also invited visitors to enjoy tasty treats of milk, choc-

Those hoping to fuel up at Mohawk in Lockport are now officially out of luck.

The gas station, owned by Husky Energy and located at the corner of Highway 9 and Highway 44 in Lockport, has been closed down and demolished.

"Husky has made the decision to close this location and will be returning the site to the landlord," Husky Energy media relations co-ordinator, Kim Guttormson told the *Record* via email last week. "We will work with the appropriate authorities to ensure the site closure meets all regulatory standards."

Crews began demolishing the for-

mer gas station sometime earlier this month and were still seen cleaning up the site late last week.

RM of St. Andrews Mayor George Pike said whenever a business closes it's a loss for a community.

"They've been there for quite a while, they've changed different companies or different ownerships but yes it's a concern for the community," Pike said, adding he's unaware of future plans for the property. "I think it was just a business decision.

"I have no information on ... why or how or anything."

The Red River Planning District confirmed on Monday that they received the proper permits to take down the gas station's canopy and tanks.

### **Province reaffirms** its support for Shoal Lake Freedom Road

The government has once again confirmed its support for Shoal Lake's Freedom Road by reaffirming its \$10 million commitment to the project.

"The provincial government remains steadfast in its commitment to share in building this road," Premier Greg Selinger said in a release earlier this month."I recently spoke with Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne, who also expressed our shared concern with the people from Shoal Lake 40.

"They deserve to see this project move forward as quickly as possible."

Community members marched in Winnipeg on Sept. 12 with hope of bringing attention to the fact Shoal Lake has been without clean, potable drinking water for almost two decades and over the years, many residents of Shoal Lake have died crossing the lake.

"We share in the frustration of the residents of Shoal Lake 40, and the people of Winnipeg who have benefited from a clean, reliable source of drinking water for decades, while the people of Shoal Lake 40 have struggled with dangerous ice conditions

and one of the longest boil water advisories in Canada," Municipal Government Minister Drew Caldwell said. "We have allocated specific funds for this project and we expect the Canadian government to contribute equally to 'Freedom Road,' and to cost-share

the timely construction of the project with Manitoba and Winnipeg.

Manitoba, Winnipeg and Shoal Lake First Nations signed a 60-year, tripartite agreement in 1989 that established a \$6 million trust fund for the First nation, funded equally by the Manitoba and Winnipeg. The agreement committed the parties to maintain highquality drinking water for Winnipeg and promote economic development opportunities for the First Nation.

However, the lack of road access from the First Nation to Winnipeg has long been identified as a key barrier to economic opportunity and causing high costs, which have prevented the construction of key community infrastructure, including a water treatment plant.

In April 2014, Manitoba, Winnipeg and Canada cost-shared \$3 million toward the detailed design of the allweather road. While both Manitoba and Winnipeg have committed in principle to the construction of the all-weather road on completion of the design, the federal government has still not made a firm commitment to the sharing of the cost, Caldwell noted.

## All-in-one ID card 'a step above any fraud,' MPI says

A proposed new identification card that would be available to all Manitobans could keep your wallet a little lighter while keeping crimes, including identity theft, at bay.

The joint effort by Manitoba Health, Healthy Living and Seniors and Manitoba Public Insurance proposes one piece of identification, which would include a person's driver's license, photo identification as well as their health card and, if they so choose, travel card.

The new card, MPI and the province hopes, will eliminate the need for more than one piece of ID and provide an added layer of protection when it comes to crimes against one's identity.

"The health card right now doesn't have a photo on it," said Brian Smiley, MPI media relations co-ordinator. "If someone steals another's health card, they can go and try to get medical services and drugs.

"The new card has a picture on it, it has robust features. It's a step above

any fraud."

Those robust features, according to MPI, would include highly secure one-piece card construction, laser engraved photo and signature which can't be altered without damaging the card, embedded patterns, which are difficult to counterfeit, as well as photo ID for quick and easy verification of cardholder by health service providers.

MPI said it anticipates that prescription drug abuse could be curbed in the event a card is stolen and misused.

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MPI added no personal health information would be shared within its walls while also saying no driver licensing information would be shared with Manitoba Health.

The new piece of identification, meanwhile, would make it so those without residence would be able to get a piece of photo ID, free.

Seniors aged 65 and up as well as qualifying low-income and homeless individuals would be able to get a card at no charge, allowing those most vulnerable to access vital health care.

MPI just finished up an eight-town tour where they set up displays and asked for the public's feedback on the new proposal.

Smiley said MPI hopes to be able to forward that information to the government in November. He also said the feedback, so far, has been nothing short of positive.

"I've been to four locations now and the feedback has been extremely positive," he said." People like the idea of having one card, eliminating the health card. There's no photo on that card, it's not a piece of ID you can really use."

4. Backyard Care -Save your property from potential damage by trimming overgrown trees and shrubs to prevent ice-laden branches from thrashing against electrical wires and your exterior. home's Drain/shut off any exterior faucets and sprinkler systems to prevent freezing. Ensure rain or snow drains away from the house to avoid foundation problems.

5. Roof and Gutters - Inspect your roof for shingles that are warped, damaged or even missing to prevent a future leak. Use roofing cement and a caulking gun to seal joints where water could penetrate, such as around the chimney, skylights or vent pipes. ### **Starodub looking to improve offensive numbers this season**

Dallas Starodub has experienced quite a bit in his three years in the Manitoba Junior Hockey League with the Selkirk Steelers.

He was part of the Steelers' team in 2012-13 that lost 14 games in a row and missed the playoffs. The next season, he was a member of the Steelers' squad that posted an incredible 49-4-0-3 record during the regular season – which included a franchise record 20 consecutive victories - but then was upset by the eventual-champion Winnipeg Blues in the playoffs.

Starodub is a local player and a fan favourite in Selkirk. He raved about being able to play junior hockey in his hometown.

"I love playing in town, people are always talking to you and you know everyone," said Starodub, who played Bantam "AAA" hockey with the Winnipeg Hawks."It's awesome (playing here)...and little kids will come up to you and say, 'Hey, that's Dallas.'

"Playing for the fans is one of the biggest reasons I like playing here."

Starodub has always been a solid, hard-nosed player who isn't afraid to take the body or drop the gloves. He had five fights in his rookie season and three more last year.

But he also has an offensive side to his game. After scoring four goals in his rookie year with limited ice time, Starobub then netted 13 and 18 goals in his next two seasons.

His numbers expect to go up even further this season.

"As a 19 year old, you want to try to get a scholarship if you can," said the veteran forward."I'm look-
