The Interlake WEST Centre has reopened in their new location in Selkirk at 825 Manitoba Ave. and is ready to help residents from all over the region to gain skills that are needed to both get and keep employment.

The centre, which is part of Workplace Education Manitoba, offers customized training in nine essential skills that they teach through various programs that are needed to succeed in every occupation. Those skills are reading, document use, numeracy, writing, oral communication, working with others, thinking skills, digital technology skills, and continuous learning skills.

> eryone else, had to adapt to changes due COVID-19. One of the major changes that they have made to their drop-in centre is to implement smaller class sizes for their programs, as well as shifting some programs online to accommodate more residents.

> They currently have an online fall line up that includes work-

shops on email etiquette, respectful workplaces, and problem-solving as well as 30 minute Tuesday training tidbits on effective communication, problem-solving, respectful workplaces, business writing basics, and leadership styles.

When they help businesses, they go in wanting to create individual plans that help employees get the skills they specifically need to succeed in that business's unique circumstances.

"We bring the training right into the workplace so we'll work with managers to create leadership development skills, communication, conflict management, team building and those sorts of things. We do front end training with customer service skills. If the business has production workers we'll go right in with the workers on the floor and do essential skills that are geared specifically to what they need," said Mueller.

They like to provide training to all levels within a business and one of the things that is unique about them, because they are funded by the provincial government, is that they follow up with the skills that are gained which allows for ongoing support.

House behind civic centre comes down

Property will continue to be used by city in new capacity

The house behind the Civic Centre that was previously used by the Selkirk Fire Department and as the St. Francis Place Shelter was removed last week.

The property was purchased in 2014 by the city from the previous owner. This was not the first time the city attempted to buy the property as it was close to critical infrastructure.

"The city purchased the property a number of years ago for the parking and to rearrange the space in that area because of the new fire hall," said Selkirk's CAO Duane Nicol.

The house was also used as a space for the pilot period of a homeless shelter from Nov. 2014 until Jan. 2018 when the City was approached by Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen who inquired about a space for St. Francis Place Shelter. The City approved of the use of the space with the understanding that the space would be needed by the city when the new fire hall had completed construction.

The shelter was primarily closed due to a lack of volunteers, but then chairperson of Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen, Rene Gauthier also said, in 2018 when the shelter closed, that the number of people using the shelter had declined significantly in the time

they were open.

Another way that the house was used by the community, was by the Selkirk Fire Department who used it to run scenarios that they might encounter while on the job.

"Different buildings give us different configurations within buildings. The rooms and the doors, and the windows for ventilation and that kind of thing. They're excellent things for search and rescue practices, for breaching doors and smoking it up with fake smoke and ventilating to make sure that you get the heat and gases out of the building," Fire Chief Dan Thorsteinson said.

He says that the house was a wonderful learning opportunity when it was used by the department.

"Most of the time you don't have access to different buildings like that so it's nice to use them when you can," said Thorsteinson.

The building before it's demolition did not meet current standards and was described by Nicol. as "not in good condition".

"[The new space will be] multi-functional. First of all, we'll be using the space for additional parking for the fire department as well as the medical clinic behind it, where there has been

a request for some additional spaces," said Nicol..

There is also a substantial well that

Selkirk's COVID-19 drive-thru site stays busy this fall

25 vehicles lined up on Superior Ave.

A crisp Thursday morning brought with it nearly 25 vehicles lined up along Superior Ave. in Selkirk at the city's only COVID-19 drive-thru testing site. A man, who wished not to be identified to protect his privacy, waited in his truck to be tested among the other vehicles after being informed he was a close contact of a confirmed case at his place of employment in Winnipeg.

He said while getting the news wasn't particularly concerning, he wishes the province was clearer on what the definition of "close contact" is.

"We were both wearing masks, and didn't interact for very long," he said about the possible exposure.

After unknowingly interacting with the now-infected colleague the previous Thursday, the man said he woke up the next day with mild symptoms. After staying home in bed feeling ill, his symptoms dissipated over the weekend. However, the next week brought on a new set of symptoms and he was contacted by his employer on Tuesday saying he had been identified as a close contact of a confirmed

After feeling unwell on Wednesday, he drove from his rural residence outside of Selkirk to the testing facility on Thursday to be swabbed.

Workers at the drive-thru site could be seen taking information from residents and explaining the nature of the test. A driver inching out of the garage doors could be seen wiping his runny eyes and nose, a common side effect of the mildly-invasive nose swab used to collect samples before being shipped off to be tested for a positive or negative outcome.

During the Oct. 15 press conference from public health officials, Chief Provincial Public Health Officer Dr. Brent Roussin attributed the increasing case numbers to young people aged 20-29. Roussin noted over half of the cases within that age group have an unknown source of exposure.

In one instance, a positive case from Sept. 11 resulted in 243 contacts through multiple exposures and 40 cases of the virus were identified as a result. Roussin said after cases among young adults spiked in September,

roughly one week later the numbers of positive tests in people over the age of 60 shot up as well.

"No one's risk is their own," he said.

"It won't be contained in those age groups; it will affect everyone if we see ongoing transmission of this virus."

While the cars slowly inched forward in line at the drive-thru site in Selkirk, which is open Monday - Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and can accommodate 215 people per day according to a spokesperson from Interlake-Eastern RHA, the man said while he thinks the province took the necessary steps to try and slow the spread

at the beginning of the pandemic, they may have loosened restrictions too soon.

"I know it hurts our economy. But I think we have a duty to try to prevent it from spreading to people that are more vulnerable in our society," he said.

One woman waiting in her vehicle to be tested warned a Record reporter of the dangers of coming in contact with someone who may be infected.

"Please be safe out there," she said through her mask before rolling her window back up, shielding herself from the chill of the October air.

IERHA preps for flu season

'Heightened importance for immunization'

As people continue to construct their own COVID defence mechanisms, the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority is cautioning people from letting their guard down to other common illness.

This year may be more important than ever for people to get an annual flu shot, according to the IERHA, as the organization is emphasizing its efforts to help avoid what it is calling a"twindemic."

"There will be larger numbers of people becoming ill with influenza, while the coronavirus is (still) circulating at the same time," said a press release from the IERHA.

"While the seasonal flu shot won't protect you from COVID-19, getting immunized is still important. Since everyone who is experiencing flu-like symptoms should be tested for CO-VID–19, the less people that have the flu, the better," the press release reads.

As has been the narrative since March, the flu shot is just one more proactive tool in the Manitoba's Public Health arsenal to avoid an increased demand for COVID-19 testing, as well as on the healthcare system.

The other proactive Public Health pillars include frequent hand washing and hygiene, avoiding touching one's face, social distancing, and wearing a mask in situations where social distancing is not possible.

Changes to 2020 flu shot procedure To avoid congestion and high demand for a flu shot, the IERHA said this year residents are being asked to

book an appointment.

Appointments can be booked by calling 1-877-979-9355 between 8:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., seven days a week in October, or between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday to Friday in Novem-

- Only limited walk-ins are available this year. Call 1-877-979-9355 to book an appointment;
- Some flu clinic locations may have changed due to COVID-19. Please check online listings at www. is.gd/fluclinics;

- You must wear a face mask to your appointment;
- Please practice good handwashing and social distancing;
- Do not come to your appointment if you are experiencing flu-like symptoms;
- Please come right at your appointment time to avoid congestion;
- Bring your Manitoba Health Card, and wear a short-sleeved shirt.

Socially-distant visits coming to care home

A new addition is coming to Betel Home in Selkirk to accommodate pandemic-friendly visits between residents and their loved ones.

Two shipping containers have been retrofitted into visitation shelters and are in the process of being installed to the side of the home.

The province announced in late summer the shelters would be built for many of the 127 personal care homes across the province as a way for residents to see their loved ones without putting others at risk of contracting the novel Coronavirus.

While some homes across the province have designated indoor spaces for socially-distant visits, PCL — the company awarded the contract by the province to build the outdoor shelters - consulted with care homes across the province to see if they could accommodate the outdoor shelters. Betel had room for two.

"These are going to provide that much needed visitation," said Jan Legeros, executive director of the Long Term & Continuing Care Association of Manitoba.

The 91-bed personal care home in Selkirk will see the shelters up and running by Nov. 1, according to a provincial spokesperson. The spokesperson said installation time will take two to three weeks and may be functional before the estimated date.

The all-season shelters will be fitted with one entrance for visitors to come from outside and one entrance for residents to have direct access from inside the personal care homes. The units will consist of one large space

with room for one resident and a maximum of five visitors.

Each unit will be wired with heat and air conditioning, and an HVAC system to ensure proper ventilation. The province is spending \$17.9 million on the project.

"Residents in these homes are often the most vulnerable to the virus, and we've taken steps to limit the impact," said Health, Seniors and Active Living Minister Cameron Friesen at a Sept. 15 press conference announcing the project.

Legeros said while there is still a risk associated with visitation to homes, the shelters provide a safe space for those wishing to see their loved ones.

"It's all a matter of degrees of risk," she said."It's all about mitigating risk and keeping control of each visit."

On Oct. 15 Chief Provincial Public Health Officer Dr. Brent Roussin designated all personal care homes in the Winnipeg Metropolitan Region, which includes Selkirk, to be designated critical (red level) under the province's pandemic response system. The designation came after multiple outbreaks occurred at personal care homes, totalling 13 deaths and 80 infections.

While the new restrictions mean there are to be no visitors to residents in long-term care homes under any circumstances unless deemed essential, the shelters will continue to be built for use when restrictions are

Legeros noted the importance of providing a way for care home residents to visit with loved ones to mitigate the possible effects of social iso-

"Our seniors are already suffering because of the limitations that have been placed on visiting since the pandemic began," Legeros said. "Social

isolation can manifest itself in not only psychological ways but also in physiological ways, and we need to prevent social isolation from taking hold of our seniors."

Operation Red Nose parks sleigh for 2020

Safe ride service to halt operations due to COVID-19

For the first time in 14 years, Operation Red Nose in Selkirk will not be offering their safe-ride service to the community due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In a press release from Executive Director Philippe Giroux, he said the decision did not come easy and was the result of long and careful consideration.

"The safety of our volunteers, clients, and local host organizations has always been one of our top priorities," Giroux said in the release.

The program, which operates annually during the holiday season to provide a free ride home for people in their own vehicles with requests of a donation in return aims to raise money for local youth or amateur sports projects.

Selkirk's arm of Operation Red Nose is coordinated by the Selkirk Dolphin's Swim Club with all donations going to local sports teams including hockey and gymnastics.

Leslie Hanson, program coordinator for Operation Red Nose in Selkirk, said while the service will be missed for this season it was the natural move to keep drivers and occupants safe.

"It may have even been hard to find volunteers this year," she said. "You're getting into a car in close proximity to somebody, so I think it was the right decision."

The volunteer-based service usually runs for 9 nights during December with hundreds of volunteers dedicating their evenings to getting those celebrating a safe ride home. Total donations average \$10,000 - \$12,000 every year.

While the funds raised every year will not be there to help with youth sports, Hanson said the clubs will not suffer as a result.

"It's definitely sad, but a lot of these organizations due to COVID are not operating either," she said. "They're not having the same expenses."

Hanson served as a volunteer for the swim club when her son was a

member and drove for Operation Red Nose as a result.

"It's an awesome experience," she said. "People who obviously phone in to use the service are very responsible and they're very appreciative of the service, so you get a lot of love coming at you."

As a result of the service not operating this season, the organization will

be launching an awareness campaign for the holiday season in the coming weeks to remind drivers to find a safe way home.

"We've always said, 'Always try to find a ride home'," Hanson said. "If it's not Operation Red Nose, arrange for a ride or take a taxi."

Push to eradicate polio continues in Selkirk

Selkirk Rotary Club asks community to come together to make disease history

Rotarians in Selkirk and around the world are taking action on World Polio Day to raise awareness, funds, and support to end polio, a vaccine-preventable disease that still threatens children in parts of the world today. It has often been said that this debilitating disease is only one plane flight away from us. Many will remember haunting pictures of iron lungs and children with lifelong disabilities as a result of polio.

When Rotary and its partners launched the Global Polio Eradication

Submitted by the Rotary Club of Selkirk Initiative in 1988, there were 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries every year. Since then, great progress has been made. Today, polio cases have been reduced by 99.9 per cent and just two countries continue to report cases of the virus: Afghanistan and Pakistan. We remain committed to the

> With polio nearly eradicated, Rotary and its partners must sustain this progress and continue to reach every child with the polio vaccine. Without full funding and political commitment, this paralyzing disease could

return to polio-free countries, putting children everywhere at risk. Rotary has committed to raising US\$50 million each year to support global polio eradication efforts. "The Manitoba RCMP is constantly looking for different ways to make it easier for individuals to report crime," said Superintendent Joanne Keeping, East District Commander for the Manitoba RCMP. Red River North Heritage makes videos available for residents

Red River North Heritage has made some of the videos, which are part of the exhibits in the East Beaches Heritage Wing located in Grand Marais Community Central available on their YouTube channel, so that they can be viewed from the comfort of resident's homes.

"At the moment we aren't able to open the museum because of the pandemic. It's a small space and we can't meet distancing requirements," said Gerry Miller, the Chair of the RM of St. Clements Heritage Committee.

The videos are broadcast quality having been filmed and edited professionally. The original exhibit started with a few videos but the East Beaches Heritage Wing has since expanded it's selection.

"Last year we got funding from another grant to expand the video library to create more and update some of the existing ones so that YouTube channel is basically all the videos that were produced plus some from other sources and we're constantly adding to it," said Miller.

He believes that having them in this format will allow more people to learn about the area especially with COV-

ID-19 changing the way we interact.

"It's accessible because it's on the web and videos are a good way of presenting history because you can talk to the people who were there which is what these videos are. The interviews aren't a questionnaire that they had to fill out [the people in the videos] basically talk about their own experience and what it was like to live back then." said Miller.

The YouTube channel currently has 13 videos available covering topics such as forestry, fishing, and farming but also has videos dedicated to local landmarks like the St. Andrews Lock and Dam and the St. Peter Dynevor Church.

"One of the themes of the [heritage wing] was putting food on the table so we had interviewed local people who talk about over the past many years the fishing industry, the forestry industry, the trapping industry, all of which were big industries in the area," said Miller.

Miller thinks that one of the most important things that a community can do is honour their past.

"St. Clements stretches from basically the North Perimeter all the way to the East Beaches and the East

West St. Paul residents took advantage of the RM's drive-thru tax receipting station at the end of September with more than 300 cars rolling through over a four-day period.

"We're thrilled that so many people took advantage of the drive-thru," says Mayor Cheryl Christian.

"With COVID-19 still very much a concern in our province, we wanted to offer an option for people to pay their taxes that is safe and convenient. The response by residents was fantastic."

The drive-thru allowed people to stay in their vehicles - all they had to do was pull up to the receipting station in the RM parking lot and a masked staff member took their cheque and provided a receipt.

Christian said the RM wanted residents to have as many ways as possible to pay their taxes safely. And while both online and drop box options have been available in previous years, they were heavily promoted to residents this year to ensure social distancing could be achieved in several ways.

"There are people who are comfortable paying taxes online, but there are others who aren't so having a drop box is convenient for them, and the addition of the drive-thru just gave one more way to do it," Christian said.


"I think people appreciated the opportunity to have a safe way to pay their taxes and they appreciated that there were several different ways they could do that, so there was an option that could fit into their schedule and their comfort zone."

Chief Administrative Officer Brent Olynyk said the RM is always looking to provide services to their residents in new ways.

Add a layer of flu protection this fall

Manitoba prepares for challenging 2020 flu season

As the province prepares for a flu season made more challenging by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Manitoba government is launching a new flu vaccination campaign encouraging all Manitobans to get a flu vaccine this fall to help protect themselves and their loved ones, Premier Brian Pallister announced Oct. 15.

"It has never been more important for Manitobans to get the flu shot," said Pallister. "Manitobans have a long and proud history of taking care of each other and facing our challenges together. That is what the flu vaccine does - it protects each of us, and it protects our family, friends and fellow Manitobans. I encourage all Manitobans, especially those at increased risk, their caregivers and close family and friends to get the flu shot this fall."

The annual influenza vaccination campaign has been revamped this season to take into account the current public health challenges posed by COVID-19. The tag line, 'Add a Layer This Fall', encourages Manitobans to add an extra layer of protection as the province prepares to deal with the flu season and COVID-19 at the same time.

The 2020-21 campaign will be targeted towards those most vulnerable and their caregivers, including specific outreach to the health-care sector and the public service. To protect those most at risk and to reduce the strain on the health-care system, the province has increased its vaccination order by 20 per cent.

"It is recommended that all Manitobans six months of age and older receive their influenza vaccine early in the fall each year, but even more so this year as we deal with a surge in positive COVID cases in Winnipeg and throughout the province," said Dr. Brent Roussin, Manitoba's chief provincial public health officer. "We know that simple actions and focusing on the fundamentals can help prevent the spread of disease in our communities and within our healthcare facilities. This year it is crucial that we all work together to protect each other, which can be done safely and effectively by getting your influenza vaccine, staying home when you're sick, practising good hand hygiene, covering your cough, physical distancing and wearing a mask.'

A record 26.3 per cent of Manitobans registered with Manitoba Health, Seniors and Active Living received the vaccine last flu season. Manitobans who received the vaccine last year are encouraged to get it again, as are those getting it for the first time.

In 2017, Manitoba became the first province to offer a high-dose version of the influenza vaccine and many

provinces have followed suit since then. Last year, Manitoba ordered 11,500 high-dose influenza vaccines and for the 2020-21 influenza season, the province will order up to 21,500 high-dose vaccines. Additional vaccines may be available to purchase if required.

The high-dose influenza vaccine is an injected flu vaccine formulated for people age 65 years and older. Evidence shows the high-dose influenza vaccine protects especially those seniors who are at greater risk of influenza and its complications. Previously, it was only offered to residents of long-term care facilities 65 years of age and older, clients in interim or transitional care beds, respite care clients or unimmunized residents admitted to long-term care facilities during the flu season.

This year, the high-dose influenza vaccine criteria is expanding, for the 2020-21 influenza season, to allow more seniors to get the high-dose influenza vaccine for free. In addition to those who were eligible previously, Manitobans 65 years of age and older who meet one of the following criteria are now also eligible:

- residents of supportive and assisted living housing;
- those who are newly incarcerated or transferred from other federal or out of province correctional facilities;
- those receiving home care services while on a waiting list for admission into a long-term care facility;
- those living on a First Nation or in

a remote or isolated community; and

• those living north of the 53rd parallel of latitude.

The flu vaccine and Pneu-P-23 vaccine, which helps protect against pneumococcal disease and is offered free of charge to seniors, is available anywhere flu vaccines are offered (and can be received at the same time) at local public health offices, nursing stations, doctors' offices, community clinics and Access Centres. Pharmacists can also provide immunization services to people seven years of age and older. Manitobans interested in getting the vaccine should contact providers first to ensure they are

Manitoba has already begun shipping vaccines to providers and is expected to receive the full provincial vaccine allotment over the next several weeks, barring any external supply or delivery disruptions.

Regional health authorities, with the exception of the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, will also soon begin immunization clinics. To find an influenza vaccine clinic near you, visit Manitoba's seasonal influenza website at www.manitoba.ca/health/flu/ where.html.

Investment in Lake Winnipeg monitoring

Contributions confirm government commitment to long-term sustainable management of Lake Winnipeg

Manitoba

The Manitoba government has committed \$375,000 to the Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium to upgrade research equipment and \$175,000 to Fish Futures Inc. for Lake Whitefish research, Agriculture and Resource Development Minister Blaine Pedersen announced Oct 16.

"Lake Winnipeg is one of Manitoba's most valuable resources and our government recognizes the importance of making investments that contribute to the long-term sustainability of the lake," said Pedersen. "That's why I'm happy to announce our investments in the Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium and Fish Futures Inc., two organizations that are doing excellent conservation and resource management work for Lake Winnipeg."

The Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium Inc., founded in 1998, is a charitable organization dedicated to facilitating multidisciplinary research

Submitted by the Government of on Lake Winnipeg. The organization operates a research vessel, the M.V. Namao, used to monitor conditions and conduct research on Lake Winnipeg. The Manitoba government conducts long-term monitoring of physical, chemical and biological conditions on Lake Winnipeg by participating in science cruises aboard the M.V. Namao.

> The \$375,000 will help complete repairs and maintenance to the M.V. Namao including overhauling the two main engines and the starboard generator. A portion of the funding will also be used to create a long-term strategic plan for the future operations of the Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium Inc. and the ongoing operation of the M.V. Namao.

> "The Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium has operated the M.V. Namao on Lake Winnipeg for 19 consecutive years and safety is our number one priority," said A.H. (Al) Kristofferson, president and managing director, the

Lake Winnipeg Research Consortium Inc. "Now our vessel is in need of essential maintenance that will enable us to continue to operate it well into the future. The funding announced today is essential to allow us to carry on this vital work for the benefit of all."

Fish Futures Inc., a federally incorporated registered charity dedicated to the conservation and enhancement of freshwater fisheries, will also receive funding of \$175,000 to support the establishment of the Whitefish Sampling Program Research Fund, a new co-operative effort between Fish Futures Inc. and the province. The project will monitor Lake Whitefish stocks in the north basin of Lake Winnipeg and, combined with government's annual monitoring programs, will aid in managing the Lake Winnipeg fishery to benefit fish, the fishery and all Manitobans. This data collection and analysis plays a critical role in informing government-decision making on the management of the Lake Winnipeg fishery.

"Fish Futures is delighted to assist the province with this new whitefish research project," said David Carrick, founder of Fish Futures and vicechair, (fisheries) of the Fish and Wildlife Enhancement Fund (FWEF)."This project continues the close working relationship between Fish Futures and the province that is now in its 32nd year. We also want to recognize the critical research being done by the M.V. Namao to support the sustainability of Lake Winnipeg's fisheries. Through their contributions to the FWEF as part of license sales, anglers have been supporting the consortium's research for many years."

"The 2020 speech from the throne affirmed the sustainability of Manitoba's fish and wildlife populations is critical to protect natural resource jobs and conservation traditions," said Pedersen. "These funding commitments will take steps toward protecting and conserving Lake Winnipeg and its diverse species."

a power-play goal at 12:24 of the third period. That was just over three minutes after Selkirk's Tristan Thompson tallied with the man advantage.


Ostermann gave the Steelers a 1-0 lead just 1:47 into the game before Evan Friesen tied the score early in the second.

Canada West cancels multiple sports seasons

Canada West announced last Thursday that no conference regular season, playoff, or championship events will be staged during the 2020-21 season in men's and women's basketball, volleyball, hockey, and wrestling, along with women's rugby 7s. Decisions on the staging of 2020-21 Canada West championships in curling, track & field, and swimming have been deferred to a later date.

"Despite Canada West regular season, playoff and championship events being cancelled in the aforementioned sports, conference members have been empowered to explore competitive opportunities for their student-athletes, based on the principle of regional cohort play," read a statement. "Learnings from the relaunch of fall sports will be applied,

as competitions are explored on a member-by-member basis through the remainder of the 2020-21 season, with hopes of paving a path for the full resumption of Canada West play in the fall of 2021.

A vote of the conference's 17 members formally made the cancellations and deferrals, following recommendations from the Canada West Board of Directors based on information provided by the Canada West COV-ID-19 Task Force.

The Task Force was comprised of Canada West athletic directors, along with medical professionals.

"While this decision is disappointing for our teams, we support the members' vote and decisions announced by Canada West," said Gene Muller, Director of Athletics and Recreation at the University of Manitoba on the school's website. "Our top priority is

the health and safety of everyone involved in competition and delivery of our programs. We will continue our work with Canada West, UM and government health authorities to strive for a future return to competition.

"I couldn't be more proud of our student-athletes and the character they have demonstrated through this unusual year. I am encouraged and inspired by their commitment to their studies and to each other," he contin-

All Canada West fall team competition had previously been cancelled on June 8 while the conference's

golf championship was cancelled due to travel restrictions on Sept. 22.

The decision to cancel these sports

"This isn't the outcome any of us wanted, however, it has become increasingly clear over the last few

weeks that the environment wasn't going to change sufficiently to ensure safe competition in traditional conference formats in these sports," said CW president Clint Hamilton.

"Ultimately our members saw no feasible path to staging traditional Canada West conference events during the 2020-21 season in these sports. With today's decision our members have opted to provide clarity to our stakeholders, most importantly our student-athletes. Collectively didn't take the decision to cancel fall competition lightly in June, and today's announcement is equally disappointing to everyone involved in university sport. Our members will now shift their focus to finding new ways of delivering non-conference sport competition for our student-athletes."
