

the brave people in all branches of the Canadian Armed Forces whether they are deployed or on Canadian soil.

Donations collected during the Poppy Campaign are held in Trust at the branch level to directly support veterans and their families within their community and to help ensure Canadians 'Never Forget'. The Poppy is distributed freely to all who wish to wear one, and the Legion gratefully accepts donations to the Poppy Fund.

Coumont explained that our local Poppy Campaign is run by a group of volunteers. These Volunteers take on routes throughout Selkirk so that they can deliver poppy boxes to many local businesses. They also monitor the boxes throughout the campaign period so that they can switch out boxes before they run out of poppies as this campaign is very well received by our community.

If you would like to get your poppy in person, a booth will be open and people will also be taking shifts at Selkirk's Walmart daily throughout the campaign from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. There they will also have the official black centre pins available which are the only pins that should be worn to secure poppies, though they do ask for a minimum of a \$5 donation should you want one to cover the cost of the pin. The Walmart location will also have the machine available so that residents can tap their cards to make a donation.

"There's also the stickers (that you can wear) rather than the poppies, and there'll be car poppies there," said Coumont,

If you would like to get a lawn sign to show your support, they are available at the Selkirk Legion itself.

Coumont feels it's very important that we show our whole community

that we value the contributions that veterans and active service members have made to our community.

"For what they've done, they're going to have some injuries, maybe not physical, maybe mental, they need support," he said.

The funds being used to support local veterans is also a wonderful way to support our community. In the past, the poppy campaign funds have been used to purchase equipment which veterans and community members use at some of our local care homes. In addition, equipment has been bought to benefit veterans and residents at the Selkirk Hospital. Another project that has taken place was an upgrade to the Selkirk Legion itself so that their bathrooms could be more accessible for veteran members.

Selkirk Legion Branch #42 President John Austin encourages residents to support their local veterans by taking part in the poppy campaign.

"We have to keep the whole world, not just Selkirk, Manitoba, but keep everybody aware of the past and the conflicts that are going on right now in the world. Our veterans we have to support them and never forget their sacrifices," he said.

He also encourages residents to come to the Remembrance Day Ceremony that will take place, as always at the Selkirk Recreation Complex on November 11.

"Come down and see what exactly what happens, how we pay tribute to our fallen veterans, and not just fallen veterans (all) people that sacrificed and joined the forces to protect us over the years. Once (you) come down there once, I think (you) would come every year," said Austin.



# **Project Linus Founder and coordinator Sharon Sutton steps down after 13 years**

Sutton's hard work has kept people in need snug and warm

Last month was the final month that Sharon Sutton was the coordinator for our local Project Linus group. After 13 years she's decided to pass the position on to Karen Hygaard but her volunteer work isn't over as she's still going to be involved with the local non-profit as a assistant coordinator.

Project Linus is a group that provides both a way for local knitters, crocheters, and quilters to find a crafting community and a shared goal as

these crafters come together to make blankets and quilts for children in

Our local Project Linus donates blankets to many organizations all throughout the community who pass them along to people who they know would benefit from a warm quilt made with care.

Sutton says that the beginnings of Project Linus started with her looking for a project that she could work on as she planned to retire from her work as

a nurse at the Selkirk Hospital.

"I worked as a nurse on a day surgery unit. We had a patient in, and his wife was sitting there in her corner of the room crocheting a blanket in the most horrible green colour you ever saw. 'Does that match your living room?' I asked. 'No,' she said. Then she went into her explanation about Project Linus what it was, how it had come to Manitoba. One of the girls was a snowbird, and she brought all the information back with her from one of her winter vacations and they established a group in Stonewall," said Sutton.

From there, Project Linus Selkirk turned from an idea to a reality with many of the original members being Sutton's nursing friends from the hospital. With a little bit of information from the Stonewall group, they hit the ground running.

"The idea sort of got planted, that we should have a group in Selkirk,

and the next day, the coordinator from Stonewall was at my front door with this box of information. I sort of got steered into the job. She and her assistant coordinator were a great help in getting the group going. We started in the old library building on Main Street, with maybe eight to twelve people coming to the meetings and it just gradually grew," said Sutton.

Their membership is now up to 30

members making it a much larger group, though still small enough that they are able to establish friendships with a common interest in craft. They now meet monthly at the Lutheran Church Hall in Selkirk.

Sutton said that she never thought when she was first starting out creating this group that it would ever become what it is today. So far, this year alone, they have distributed 554 blankets all made through volunteer

labour and they anticipate that they will give away at least 100 more by the end of the year.

Though she would like to continue to coordinate the group, Sutton has said that her worsening eyesight has meant that she's no longer able to do the top job. Therefore, she has passed the reigns on to Karen Hygaard.

Though the members of Project Linus volunteer their time to make these blankets the group does accept donations. In particular, they are looking for fabric and yarn that can be laundered.

"We're looking for acrylic yarn. It's got to be yarn that can be washed. So real wool you can't use that because people need to be able to wash their blankets, and cotton fabric for the quilting and then fleece is something, that we're getting back into," said Hygaard.


If anyone wants to reduce their yarn or fabric stash Project Linus is a great place to know you're donation is going to a good cause

They also accept monetary donations and appreciate the donations that they've received from local businesses as these allow them to purchase more specialty items like quilt batting that isn't a regular donation that they tend to receive.

They, of course, are also open to more people with blanket or quilt crafting skills and time to donate to creating blankets who want to join the group.

"We'd love them to come to the meetings, if they want to, once a month for a few hours. It's always nice to look at other's work right? 

# **MPI** seeks Driver Z instructors

Manitoba Public Insurance is getting in gear to recruit more instructors to teach driver education courses in rural communities.

Currently, four instructors deliver Driver Z programming in Stonewall, Selkirk and surrounding areas. Driver Z is MPI's high school driver education program delivered in communities across the province.

"The program's goal is to develop long-term safe drivers, reduce collisions and develop a proactive traffic safety culture among Manitoba's youngest licence holders," said communications manager Kristy Rydz.

"It does this using a mix of online and in-car learning that gives Driver Z students the tools, knowledge and confidence to improve their driving ability and prepare them to make responsible decisions behind the wheel."

Each year, thousands of students complete the Driver Z program to gain the skills to become safe, responsible and confident drivers.

"According to MPI's data, Driver Z students consistently score higher on the Class 5 knowledge and pass the

road test at a higher rate than the general public," Rydz added.

MPI is actively recruiting in the Interlake and hopes to add additional instructors in the future.

"MPI's ability to offer courses in rural communities depends on the availability of qualified Driver Z instructors in those communities. During the pandemic, many rural instructors left the profession, exacerbating pre-pandemic shortages," she said.

"Despite ongoing recruitment efforts and incentives to financially support new instructors, interest continues to be low in rural areas of the province."

In the months ahead, MPI will be rolling out several strategies to help boost the number of courses offered across the province and better meet the driver training needs of rural communities.

"These include reviewing compensation, training and support for instructors to attract and retain instructors, especially in areas of the province currently experiencing low or no instructor availability. Individuals who are interested in supporting their community and sharing their passion for road safety are encouraged to apply through the posting on MPI's website," Rydz said.

"Additionally, the corporation is exploring alternative delivery models for the course and a review of current catchment requirements."

And for Manitoba high school students who would like to register for the Driver Z program, they will need to complete three steps, along with their parents and guardians. First, they need to visit an Autopac agent or MPI Service Centre to get set up as an MPI customer. After that, they need to purchase a Driver Z service and register in a Driver Z course. Students need to be at least 15-and-a-half years old to register for Driver Z.

"To make the process as smooth as possible, Steps 1 and 2 can be completed before Driver Z registration day," Rydz said. "Customers who have completed these first two steps in advance can register by phone through MPI's Contact Centre or in person at an Autopac agent or MPI Service Centre when courses become available."

# MB Ag Days gives back deadline approaching

"Community grant and scholarship applications are open now! Applications are being accepted Nov. 1, and winners will be announced at the 2025 show in January.

Manitoba Ag Days has a strong tradition of investing in rural communities and agriculture education through the Ag Days Gives Back program. At the 2024 show, \$51,000 in funds were awarded, in the form of seventeen community grants, four post-secondary scholarships and support for Ag in the Classroom - Manitoba. Since the program's inception in 2013 Manitoba Ag Days Gives Back has committed \$485,377.50 to building the agriculture community.

Not-for-profit organizations eligible to apply for the \$2,000 community grants, which can cover various project components such as infrastructure, supplies, equipment, volunteers, or training. However, the total project budget cannot exceed \$50,000. To promote inclusivity and diversity, priority will be given to communities or projects that have not been previously funded within the past three years.

Post-secondary scholarships \$2,000 each are open to students in their final year of high school or to post secondary students. All agricultural related education and training

is eligible, including degree diploma, certificate and trade programs. To apply, candidates must submit a completed form and include a written or video biography that highlights their community involvement and volunteer work, career goals, and how they envision contributing to the agriculture industry.

One-hundred percent of the funds raised through the Manitoba Ag Days 50/50 are used to support K-12 ag education, post secondary ag education and community organizations throughout Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

The process of building a Habitat for Humanity home is a big one needing about a year of planning and six months or more of building with the family that will be moving into the





# Diverse crowd engaged, positive and passionate at Vital Signs town hall meeting

It's the early stages in the development of the Selkirk & District Community Foundation's second Vital Signs report, but a town hall meeting held on Oct. 5 indicates the community is once again ready to have its pulse checked.

David Thorne, Chair of the SDCF and Co-Chair of the Vital Signs Committee along with fellow board member Brandon Sutherland, said the 110 people who came out to Memorial Hall that Saturday were engaged, enthusiastic and committed to putting in the hard work necessary to complete the report.

"The town hall was successful," Thorne said, noting during the original Vital Signs town hall held in 2016, 70 people came out.

"It was a lot bigger group than last time, so we were quite happy with that. And it was a very diverse group. I think we're on the right path."

Facilitator Shirley Muir led the meeting and asked attendees for their thoughts on what improvements the communities of Selkirk, St. Andrews and St. Clements need to be the best they can be.

For Sutherland, the participation level was impressive, and the day overall was even more so.

"The day was remarkable," Sutherland said.

"It was an extremely diverse group of people from our community and it was really neat to hear the great ideas to connect the people of the Tri S area. My biggest take away was that a lot of the positive ideas, the positive changes that people want to see are going to connect the people of St. Clements, St. Andrews and Selkirk on a much more in-touch point of view.

"There was a lot of conversation on a regional bus system, there was a lot of conversation on a regional support group where people can connect an issue with a not-for-profit that already does that. That was a really

It is the goal of the Selkirk & District Community Foundation's Vital Signs 2.0 report to collect the data, hear the voices of lived experience and listen to the experts doing the heavy lifting on the ground," Thorne said.

"By sharing this important information, we hope to provide our community with a lens to see what is working in our area, and what needs some attention."

"This was my first time participating in a Vital Signs meeting. I was impressed with the diversity of the participants and their passion for our community," Ross said.

"I was able to hear about the important work of organizations and the unique needs of both the city and rural communities. I think this is an important process in helping to identify gaps in our community and the priority areas in need of action."

Sutherland said the level of engagement was off the charts and you could feel how passionate people were about bettering their community.

"When there was a larger issue that was brought to the table, say a homeless shelter for example, something that's missing in our community, there was a round of applause from people," he said.

"Everyone was feeling and thinking the same thing, how much better, how much more resourceful our commu-

# Parents Council's fundraising pays off

The Happy Thought School Parent's Council can feel proud of their fundraising efforts after their hard work and a few grant opportunities came together to bring a new Outdoor Community Gathering Space to the area between Happy Thought School and East Selkirk Middle School that the whole community will be able to enjoy.

Liz Kenyon, Happy Thought School PAC Chair explained that the parent advisory council wanted to take on a project like this that would benefit

"When we had originally sat down and we'd heard that some of these grants were available, we had the thought that we'd like to do something big for the school, the school area, and the community as a whole. And, we wanted to focus on natural materials and Manitoba local things. So after, much planning and talking and things like that, we settled on a natural climbing/gathering space," said Kenyon.

The grants that the Parent's Council received were a provincial Building Sustainable Communities grant which came out to be a little less than \$10,000 as well as a grant from the Selkirk and District Community Foundation of \$4,500. There was also a donation from the school itself's fundraising efforts which meant that the Parent's Council had to raise about \$12,000 to complete the project.

The fundraising took place through-

out the year last year with an online 50/50 draw, a Halloween Dance, a pizza fundraiser and the sale of "like a million hotdogs" proving that small

efforts really do add up.

Evergreen Custom Landscaping created the final design for the project which has places for smaller or larger groups to gather as well as a fun wooden climbing circular activity path. The design also combines aspects like local wood as well as limestone which is also available in Manitoba.

The gathering circles were put into the space last summer and Kenyon says that the Parent's Council was very proud of their efforts.

"It was a lot of work by our little volunteer committee, who were all parents of elementary-aged kids. We all have lots going on already, so it was a really good effort by the whole group and it's really nice to see," she said.

Kenyon hopes that the children and the community enjoy the new outdoor space and it seems like they are according to Happy Thought School Principal Trish Goosen.

"Students have overwhelmingly received it so positively. They are using the community gathering space with their classes. There have been differ-

ent classrooms that have utilized it in this beautiful weather for some outdoor learning activities as well as, we are using it at the end of the day for bussing. So, when students line up, we pick different groups to go and explore the area and it has been just an amazing addition to our school community," said Goosen.

In addition to its being a great way to change up their learning environment, Goosen explained that the space itself has been a learning opportunity. In grade four, there is a unit on rocks so it can be used for land-based education, it's being used to model behaviour expectations for indoor and outdoor time, and naturally, it can be incorporated into physical education

"It seems like it's been a part of our community for so long, even though it's been just a couple of months, and it is a wonderful addition, not only for both of our school communities but for our larger East Selkirk community as well," said Goosen.

"As a social studies teacher, it is my priority to engage my students in sometimes challenging, but meaningful discussions about the type of community we want to live in, and I am so happy to see the Selkirk and district community continually engage in that practice."

Ostermann said it was important to bring a youth perspective to the town

"We felt that youth are underrepresented at these events, and we wanted to help change that. It is important for all generations to get together to communicate and understand each other," she said.

Marques agreed.

"Events like these are important so the needs and ambitions of the community can be adjusted and met for everyone," she said.

For Thorne, their presence is vital to making the report complete and the committee will do more to make sure that generation has its say.

"I think it's important to capture all people within the catchment area and it's not just whoever's comfortable to speak. We definitely want to hear from the youth, so we're lining up smaller groups within the Lord Selkirk School Division, and the PASS (Promoting Aboriginal Student Success) program," Thorne said.

Beyond that, he said the committee will endeavour to meet with any group that prefers to participate in a more private way.

"I think it's important to give everybody a voice. The whole Vital Signs committee, right from the get-go, identified that as a priority and something that we didn't really do last Vital Signs," Thorne said.

"We're looking at meeting with several different groups one-on-one and in very small settings."

For over 25 years CJ Tennant has expressed her jewellery making hobby with the world. It was in 2009 when she ultimately decided to turn her hobby into a career.

"I got started because I have always liked making things and I have always loved fashion and style," said the Winnipeg-based entrepreneur.

The WAVE is a biannual makers market that has featured over 80 artists in the last 20 years.

Tennant has now participated in 26 WAVE tours and discovered the tour when she came to visit her ancestors in Winnipeg Beach.

"There are all kinds of arts and artisans," said Tennant. She explained that you will be able to find every art medium in the tour.

The WAVE is an artist led initiative meaning that all aspects of the tour are organized by the participating





artists. "You have an opportunity to learn about all other aspects and perspectives such as marketing or ads," Tennant explained.

Tennant is a self-taught jewellery maker who was inspired by her aunt. "My aunt showed me the basics and from there I am mostly self-taught

through trial and error."

She expressed that, "Sometimes you don't know the right way and end up with a more original design. I am always trying to play with colour and shape trying to

create something that is new."

Tennant using shimmering gemstones, freshwater pearls and sterling silver chains to make her jewellery. She uses these materials as they are affordable, a good quality and can easily hold up to everyday wear-andtear.

"We are all busy. It should last and be something we love."

Tennant describes her work as fresh modern designs with a touch of vintage inspiration.

She uses a cold-joining technique to mold her jewellery. This includes us-

ing wire chains and plyers to build the frame for her pearls and gems. Tennant added in that sometimes she has an idea in her head of what to create, and others she may ponder for a while.

"It is not uncommon that I will have gemstones for a number of years before I use them," explained Tennant.

Finding the perfect gemstone can be a challenge. Tennant gets her gems from gem markets, wholesalers and from a friend who collects gems from all over the world. "I like unusual stones with unique cuts and colours. Like stone that have lines and stripes in them," said Tennant. She continued to explain that the more unique a stone is, the more natural gem you have



"There was a young woman who I never met before who had her young baby with her. She kept pausing to try on pieces. I realized this was the first time she truly took for herself. She was being her own self and was not making a mom-based choice," described Tennant. When she approached the woman afterwards, she explained that she never truly had a moment to look or feel pretty. "When they are trying on the jewellery, you can see it makes them feel that they look good. It is a thing that happens in their shoulders as they settle differently."

Tennant hopes to change people's attitudes about their day. "It is important how people present themselves and feel comfortable. It's a better day all around."

# Canadian beef sector speaks out against Bill C-282

The Canadian beef sector is actively speaking out against federal Bill

The bill, brought forth by the Bloc Quebecois, essentially takes supply management off the negotiating table for future trade agreements. It first came to the House of Commons in 2021 and is now at consideration in committee in the Senate.

On Oct. 10, members of parliament (MPs) from four political parties (Liberal, Bloc Québécois, NDP, and Green parties) attended a rally on Parliament Hill in support of Bill C-282. Among the supporters was current and former federal Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, the Honourable Lawrence MacAulay — and the beef sector is speaking out.

In a joint news release on Oct. 11, the beef producer associations across Canada said the rally left many sectors, including theirs, "both surprised and disappointed." Organizations involved include the British Columbia Cattlemen's Association, the Saskatchewan Cattlemen's Association, Beef Farmers of Ontario, Nova Scotia Cattle Producers, Alberta Beef Producers, Manitoba Beef Producers, New Brunswick Cattle Producers, and Prince Edward Island Cattle Producers. They went on to say it was

"particularly disheartening" to see the minister take part in the public support of a bill that "seeks to undermine and threaten the interests of the majority of Canada's agri-food industry, as well as export-dependent sectors that fuel the Canadian economy."

Carson Callum, Manitoba Beef Producers general manager, said Bill C-282 is a huge concern for the beef sector as a "heavily reliant trade industry.'

"When you're in those negotiations, it can be give or take," he said. "If we go into these negotiations knowing supply management can't be touched, we could see increased tariffs for cattle, live or beef product. We could see tax implications that can really impede our bottom line as an industry."

Callum said Bill C-282 puts one sector in front of the other, calling it bad trade policy. The bill protects supplymanaged agriculture sectors (like dairy, eggs, chicken, and turkey) from losing any more of their domestic market share to foreign competition, but it doesn't protect the other sectors.

"We understand that there's this major defence of the supply management system, but it shouldn't occur at the expense of trade and other sectors," said Callum.

Andre Steppler has one of the largest purebred Charolais herds in Canada. At the end of May, he and four other Manitoba producers were part of a delegation that went to Ottawa to share their views on the bill as Manitoba Beef Producers to senators and MPs. He said Bill C-282 scares him in the sense that it can tie hands at the negotiation table.

"If it's passed, it just takes away the ability for our trade negotiations to be achieved at their highest level," he said. 'When we go into negotiations and already on the table, this is not something we can open and put on the books, it puts you at a direct disadvantage immediately. You don't want to have cards against you when you're walking up to the table."

In short, if Bill C-282 is passed, it could mean worse trade deals for the sectors not protected by supply management. For beef producers like Steppler, that could mean lower cattle prices and less exports of beef overall.

In a letter from the Canadian Cattle Association in 2024 on Bill C-282, the organization said the average Canadian producer earns an additional \$1,158 per animal because of the ability to sell in international markets. 2022 was the seventh year in record value for beef and cattle exports.

The organization said for the industry to continue to grow and diversify, it needs improved market access through trade negotiations, which Bill C-282 takes away.

Canadian beef producers export approximately 50 percent of their products. In the news release, the beef sector said that though Canada is "uniquely positioned to meet rising global demand for protein," Bill C-282 threatens their export potential and relationships, especially with our critical trading partners like the USA.

"Ultimately, the unwavering defence of the supply management system, which is the root of Bill C-282, should not occur at the expense of all other trade and export dependent sectors of the Canadian economy," the news release said. "Other policy tools are available to mitigate future potential threats to the supply management system, without legislating the system's protection through a bill like C-282. Amending the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development Act would be an internationally unprecedented protectionist move. Future governments can and should keep all options on the table to support the most meaningful and robust trade agreements possible."

# Wages rise for health-care support workers, union says province on track to fix health-care

Health-care support workers will be receiving a wage increase and improvements in working conditions after their respective unions negotiated a new collective agreement with the province last Friday.

The Canadian Union of Public Employees issued a news release Oct. 18, saying the deal will help solve the difficulties around recruiting and retaining health-care support workers.

The agreement affects about 19,000 health-care support workers such as home-care staff, health-care aides, laundry aides, housekeeping aides, dietary aides, ward clerks and recreation coordinators at hospitals, health care centres and personal care homes.

"Our members stuck together to get a really good deal that will help solve the healthcare staffing crises" said CUPE 4270 president Holly Chaperon in the news release. "We have built an agreement that helps recruit new members and retain the ones we have."

The agreement includes an average wage increase of 27 per cent over four years that will bring Manitoba from

the "worst paid support staff in the country to middle of the pack or better," and an increase in starting wages for "high vacancy positions," states the news release.

"This shows that this government respects healthcare support staff" said CUPE Manitoba president Gina McKay in the news release. "This is a government that is fulfilling its election commitment to fix healthcare in Manitoba."

In Manitoba CUPE represents about 37,000 members that are employed in health-care facilities, personal care homes, home care, school divisions, municipal services, social services, child care centres, public utilities, libraries and family emergency ser-

The Manitoba Government and General Employees' Union (MGEU), which also represents health-care support workers, issued a news release Oct. 18 saying its members accepted a new four-year collective agreement (effective April 1, 2024 to March 31, 2028).

"The new agreement includes significant wage increases for health care support workers in Prairie Mountain and Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority, with an average increase of 27% over the life of the agreement," states MGEU's release. "It includes improvements to sick leave, and the addition of two wellness days. In the case of home care workers and mental health proctors, there are also significant improvements to scheduling practices and mileage rates."

MGEU's bargaining committee asked the province to prioritize the processing of retroactive payments for its members to April 1. The collective agreement has yet to be signed by the province.

A spokesperson for Shared Health, which oversees provincial healthcare delivery, told the *Record* support staff are valued and the organization is pleased an agreement has been reached.

"Shared Health and other health system employers welcome the ratification of a new collective agreement for community and facility support workers represented by CUPE and MGEU," said the spokesperson. "The work of our community and facility

support staff is both important and valued and we are very pleased that a resolution has been reached for the benefit of these nearly 25,000 members of our health-care teams.'

Add sugar, garam masala, salt, paneer, mixed vegetables, fried cauliflower, fried potatoes and milk. Mix well and cook 4-5 minutes until melded together. Turn off heat.

To make saffron milk: Mix warm milk with ghee and saffron. Set aside.

# Langelaar becomes Selkirk's first professional Strongman

One of Selkirk's own won the Strongman Corporation Canada Amateur Nationals on Sunday in Moncton.

Andrew Langelaar, 27, of Iron Image Barbell Club, made a late surge up the leaderboard to win the competition, earn professional Strongman status, and receive his Circuit Hommes Fort.

He becomes one of only three professional Strongman out of Manitoba and the first ever to come out of Selkirk.

"It still hasn't sunk in," said Langelaar Thursday morning. "The competition was very intense. The guys I was competing with, they are all top-level dudes, all super strong. I knew I'd done well because I was sitting second going into the second last event then I won the last two events, the sandbag medley and the atlas stones. I won in Manitoba by winning the atlas stones so to do it again at Nationals was special. I thought I'd done enough to keep on the podium but I didn't realize that by winning the event I'd won on points total. When they called my name it was kind of

Langelaar said that the moment the event was over, his phone was already being blown up by friends and family members who were congratulating him on his accomplishment.

One of the first things he did after winning was going over to a quiet area to call his mom.

The family had been hard on his mind over his training leading up to Nationals, as his grandfather had passed away only a couple of weeks before the competition.

He said training for Nationals was the most emotional training he had done. Once he sat down after winning, he said the emotions from the last few weeks hit him.

"To win there, I kind of just finally letting myself feel everything that had been welling up over those eight weeks. I honestly just went to the back and cried. It was a pretty good feeling just all the love and outpouring from the gym and friends and the community."

Langelaar had been powerlifting for over ten years, but he began train-

ing for Strongman only seven months ago.

His friends persuaded him to start, although he was always fascinated bv it, growing up watching The World's Strongest Man Christmas.

winning his very first competition in June at Manitoba's Strongest Man & Woman in Morris to winning Nationals on Sunday.

Now, with his pro card, he is already receiving invites to the top competitions in the world, including the Arnold Strongman Classic and the Official Strongman Games.

"It makes my season a lot clearer," said Langelaar. My competition season is already booked up because of the pro status. For me it just means more opportunities. It's not about playing on the amateur anymore, it's now we're up with the big dogs. It's starting on the bottom and being in the circuit. Now I actually have to get strong."

Langelaar will continue to train out of Iron Image, where he is also a coach to other competitors.

One of his students also appeared at Nationals, 17-year-old Ryder Joy, who was the first Manitoban to qualify in the Teen Division at Nationals.

Joy finished third at the event, reaching the podium in his first nationals.

As for Langelaar, he hopes to continue competing in Strongman until age 40.

Until then, he said he would continue his daily work routine, training for three hours four days a week and then getting eight to ten hours of sleep at night.
