## NDP promise to ramp up infrastructure spending

The Manitoba NDP's promise to spend more cash on infrastructure was enough to please Selkirk's mayor.

During the provincial government's final throne speech before the spring 2016 election, Premier Greg Selinger pledged to spend \$10 billion beyond 2020 on roads, bridges and flood protection

"We've had a strong, strong relationship till now (with the provincial government) and we can only see that continuing," Mayor Larry Johannson said following Monday's throne speech."This year alone we're finishing off a fantastic year with the paving of Main Street, which was a strong partnership with the city and province."

Johannson noted recent improvements in health care in Selkirk, including the building of a new hospital and multimillion-dollar expansion at the Selkirk Mental Health Centre.

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

He added the provincial government also had a hand in the ongoing dismantling of the MS Lord Selkirk II.

"There's strong money for infrastructure, especially for municipalities," he said.

Even with an election on the horizon, the NDP delved into future plans for the next decade on Monday.

Along with upgrading infrastructure for rural communities throughout the province, the government is also promising to get working on building new roads for First Nations along the east side of Lake Winnipeg.

Shifting to the environment, Selinger said the government would work to invest in critical flood protection.

"On protecting the environment, we're going to continue that very important priority of investing in flood protection and mitigation efforts that protect Manitobans from these increasingly frequent and tense and dangerous natural disasters," Selinger said, noting the province is working with communities to rebuild the Lake Manitoba and Lake St. Martin areas that were hit hard by floods.

With aquatic invasive species like zebra mussels invading the province's waterways, Selinger said the NDP would take new action to protect wetlands and wildlife while restoring the health of Lake Winnipeg.

Calling it an "ambitious goal," Selinger said the province also wants

to create a universally accessible childcare system with 12,000 additional spaces.

"Five to seven years is what we're projecting," he said regarding the timeline.

While Selinger said there are constraints, such as making sure there are enough skilled people and facilities available, he noted Manitoba is "one of very few provinces that has a capital program for day cares."

Expansion of Manitoba's early childhood educators was another focus, but Selinger provided no hard number. He said a task force is looking into it

Selinger added customary care legislation would also be introduced to keep First Nations children in their home communities.

"The customary care provides legal support allowing children to stay close to their families in their communities with members of their extended family," Selinger said. "You know the expression it takes a village to raise a child? It's that kind of a model where the community comes together and finds ways to support children and families in distress."

Ahead of Monday's speech, Progressive Conservative leader Brian Pallister put out an alternative throne speech of his own.

Widely expected by many political pundits to be the main challengers

to the NDP in the upcoming election, Pallister and the PC's laid out their priorities.

"More than ever, we need a new government based on Manitoba val-

ues," the PC's alternative throne speech stated. "A government that reflects those values in everything it does."

Pallister's biggest priority was reducing the provincial sales tax. The PC leader criticized Selinger for raising the tax, and said if elected, the PC's will roll back the PST to seven per cent during the first term.

In another cost saving promise, they vowed to reduce the cabinet size by one-third to save millions of dollars.

Manitoba's Liberals, who are the underdogs in most early polls, also made a statement last week when leader Rana Bokhari said, if elected, the party will change provincial student loans to non-repayable grants.


"Students are graduating with a mountain of debt and on a starting salary they just can't make ends meet," Bokhari said in a release. "We want to make education more

available and more affordable.

"High debt should not be a deterrent to further education."

The provincial election is slated for April 19, 2016.

landmark,"Thorsteinson said, adding there were no injuries reported.

Crowds could be seen early Tuesday morning lining Eveline Street to watch roughly 30 fire and emergency crew members put out the flames.

Dean Peterson, general manager of the Merchant's Hotel, said this is the first fire they've experienced in the 13 years he's been there. Peterson thanked the local fire department for their swift action in putting out the


"They responded quickly and con-

tained it to the restaurant," Peterson said. "Everyone's safe and the fire alarms worked perfectly."

Peterson couldn't speculate on the amount of damage caused to the restaurant but he said an air quality test will be done at the hotel.

"At this point we do an air quality test to make sure it's safe for people to re-enter ... at that point we'll be able to go in with an insurance adjustor."

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
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## **Crew prepares for final** stage of ship's removal

The final pieces of the MS Lord Selkirk II will be removed from the slough it's been rotting in for 25 years sometime next month.

Ben Hoosier, owner of SaskSteel, a Saskatchewan based metal company hired to dismantle the ship, said he expects the project will be completed

in early December.

"We're at the tail end of it now," Hoosier said, hesitant to give a firm completion date. "The job has to be done properly.

"We've found some water on board, we've found more asbestos than we hoped, so these things have to be dealt with."

> weather The has also slowed their crew of seven down a bit he said, adding they haven't delivered as much steel to the Selkirk steel mill as they predicted.

Originally they thought the ship would weigh in at around 1,000 tonnes, but Hoosier believes it's closer to 700 now that nearly 25 tonnes of asbestos and 100 tonnes of garbage have been removed.

The province, in partnership with the City of Selkirk, is funding the ship's removal after years of debate over whose responsibility it is to dismantle it and a federal government with a hard-line stance on the issue.

The province is providing \$200,000 in funding and the city is paying the other half of the ship's \$400,000 estimated removal cost.

Hoosier's bid to decommission the ship and remove toxins beneath it beat some 20 other companies that

"I couldn't be happier that we were able to have this company do the job," Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said. "They really became part of our com-


In its prime, the MS Lord Selkirk II took Queen Elizabeth and the rest of the royal family on a cruise from Winnipeg to Selkirk during a trip in 1970.

The ship was later abandoned by its owner in 1990 after nearly two decades of sailing, and was placed in a waterway in Selkirk Park better known as the Selkirk Slough.

The boat attracted the eyes of the media after vandals lit it on fire in 2012. That same year, the city hired Global Scrap Solutions to remove the vessel, but the company faced bureaucratic hurdles and the boat stayed put.

In 2014, the coast guard was brought in to pump out dangerous liquids on the ship after a sweeping toxicologist report revealed the ship had been leaking a long list of contaminants including arsenic.

The province announced it would match the city's \$200,000 to decommission the ship in July during a press conference in Selkirk Park.

Last week I wanted to bring us a story from McArthur Falls but on my way over there I stopped for gas at a convenience store in Powerview and ran into a great friend Patsy Head.

As always I asked her if she had a good fishing story for us and as is her casual nature, she nodded toward the Pine Falls Dam saying, "why don't you run over to the dam and see people "scooping." I had gotten wind of this event before but for one reason or another had never checked it out. Well, now was as good as time as any.

I left this happy couple flushed with their success and walked to the guardrail landing beside the roaring torrents of expelling dam waters.

In the cloudy, cool afternoon, all along the rail netters swung grappling nets with 40' long handles back and forth in the churning waters catching whitefish after whitefish. You see, whitefish go upstream to spawn in late fall but since there is no fish ladder by this dam they and later the tullibee, create large held back schools that can be netted. Standing back from the crowd of netters I watched transfixed as they hoisted captured

Finally, resolved, he put his fish down and raced for his girl's rod which by now was merrily meandering downstream. Knee deep in the river he rescued the rod and as he waded back to shore, reeling the line in, two beautiful hooked walleye broke the surface. They had more than enough fish for supper that night.

If it's true that Allen lives to fish, then it is more than true that Douglas Tritthart, a tall thin chap from Ashern, is totally consumed by our sport.

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## Main Street construction set to wrap up this week

Construction along a 1.5 kilometre stretch of Main Street is nearing completion, making way for a much smoother ride for motorists.

"All I've had is really, really good comments from everybody," Selkirk Mayor Larry Johannson said, adding crews did their best to not disturb nearby businesses or motorists by keeping one lane of traffic on each side open at all times."We were very, very fortunate that the weather cooperated with us."

Johannson said crews are focusing on clean up now and the project should be completed near the end of this week.

The roughly \$723,000 project, which saw two inches of surface material milled off the top of Main Street from Strathnaver to Manitoba avenues and replaced with new asphalt, is being cost shared between the province and us," he said.

The province is contributing just over \$500,000 and the city's share, which will come from reserve funds, is \$215,000.

Although it's referred to as Main Street, the majority of the road is part of Highway 9 and is managed by the

The entire street surface, including two lanes in each direction, as well as parking lanes

and turning lanes have all been resurfaced.

Johannson said getting this project done is a highlight of the year for Selkirk and area residents.

## School division's public forums see low turnout

The turnout for three of the Lord Selkirk School Division's four community forums have been disappointing, school board chair Jean Oliver said.

The forums, being held in four different communities, were meant as a way to boost turnout for this year's public budget forum, but the process hasn't gone to plan.

"Our first forum was at Walter Whyte School in Grand Marais and we only have five people attend," Oliver said. "Our next one was up at St. Andrews, which has a huge population that covers from almost West St. Paul right through to Netley, and we had nine people show up."

During their most recent forum in East Selkirk last Thursday, attendance was up to roughly 20 people.

Although the turnouts have been "discouraging," Oliver said those who did attend offered up several good suggestions. One of those suggestions was improved communications, particularly on social media.

"I think communication is one (suggestion) that came out loud and clear," she said. "We need to get more on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram. Lots of younger people are getting all of their news on some type of social media.

Oliver added hiring a social media person was something the board would look at when they start deliberating a bud-

The last community forum will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 24 at 7 p.m. at the Comp for the Selkirk area.

Once all four forums concluded, Oliver said the board will be getting together before Christmas to discuss what they've heard from the public.

"We will be going over everything that we have taken from the four community forums and prioritizing things," she said. "If everybody has agreed on one thing, then that's certainly going to be one of our top things to look at."

Oliver added the public would be kept up to date in the post-forum process as well.

When Ben Hoosier started building a Remembrance Day monument out of a single rusty metal piece of the MS Lord Selkirk II, he never imagined the amount of attention it would receive.

"I just made it out of respect and that's kind of become a big deal," said Hoosier, owner of SaskSteel, the Saskatchewan-based company tasked with dismantling the abandoned cruise ship, which has been rotting in a slough in Selkirk Park for 25 years. "I just picked out a piece of steel and came up with it."

The 12 by eight-in-a-half foot structure made out of a single piece of metal with the word "remember" etched

into includes a large red poppy at the top. Hoosier said it was made out of metal from the side of the ship including part of its ballroom floor.

"It's all cut out from a single piece, no welding," he said.

Hoosier and his crew members unveiled the monument last Tuesday ahead of Remembrance Day when several motorists could be seen stopping along Eveline Street to take pictures and get a closer look.

The monument was moved to the Selkirk Legion grounds last Friday where it will remain until members decide where it will be placed permanently.

## Push for Dufferin Gang monument continues

### Province presents plaque with all 31 members to Selkirk Legion

A plaque outlining all 31 members of Selkirk's famous Dufferin Gang will hang inside the city's legion while the push for a permanent monument commemorating the Second World War veterans continues.

"I look it at as the first step," Lorne Canvin said. "And it's good for the families to see something concrete that's going to lead to something

Selkirk MLA and Finance Minister Greg Dewar presented the plaque to family members of the Dufferin Gang at the Selkirk Legion following Remembrance Day ceremonies last Wednesday.

"We thought we'd do this now as we work towards the longer term goal of approving a monument on the legion grounds," Dewar said standing inside the legion last Wednesday."We hoped to have something completed by now but unfortunately we weren't able to accomplish this."

For nearly three years, Canvin and others have been pushing for a monument to recognize the gang members who lived between Main and Jemina streets on Dufferin Avenue in Selkirk and drifted overseas together to serve in the Second World War. The group believes the Dufferin Gang, which has been likened to Winnipeg's three Valour Road heroes, is the highest concentration of men and women from one street block who fought or served during the Second World War.

Those involved have spent years compiling and fact-checking a list of names which has now reached 31 members. Canvin said they have now collected all 31 names, have confirmed where they lived on the street and can now continue moving forward with plans for a monument.

So far the local legion along with private donations have raised nearly \$13,000 for the project and the province has previously committed

"We're still going to continue fundraising and hopefully get this project up and running in the early part of the new year," Canvin said, adding their goal is to have something built on the legion grounds as well as a permanent monument along Dufferin Avenue. "We want to have a monument built on the street so it might be something on the boulevard near Main and Duf-

ferin Avenue, said the plaque they received last week will be hung somewhere the legion where visitors can see it, read about it and become more aware of it.

"The municipality has named streets after all of our veterans and we have the names of the First World War and Second World War veterans' names on the plaques in our municipal hall so people can read them," Bragg said, adding the ceremony gets bigger and bigger each year. "I believe veterans need to be recognized, especially the veterans who were born in West St. Paul and lived in West St. Paul."

For Bragg, Remembrance Day holds a special place near and dear to her heart. Besides her two uncles, Robert Anderson and Archibald Fyfe service in the Second World War, Fyfe was born on November 11 before it was a day of remembrance.

"Robert Anderson served in Belgium and England during the Second World War," Bragg said, "and

Archibald Fyfe went to Holland and when it was vacated he helped restore it after the war in 1945."

While there were no veterans on hand for the ceremony, there were still tributes to those who served in both World Wars. Mayor and council read out the names of every local West St. Paul resident who served in the wars.

There were also mini exhibits created in honour of the local veterans, including streets named after them in the RM. Ironically enough, Holland Road, which is where the Sunova Centre is located, was named after a local veteran.

Bragg, who also spoke to the silent crowd of about 40, talked about West St. Paul's interesting history when it came to the Second World War.

Bragg says roughly 500 German prisoners of war spent the duration of the war living in West St. Paul.

And Rivercrest, an area inside of West St. Paul, was born out of the war. When soldiers returned to Canada, they were given the piece of land that

is now know as the Rivercrest area.

She added the large contingent of young people at the ceremony was really important to her, because the local history and stories need to be passed down to another generation.

"It's very important that we pass on to our children and grandchildren the information of what our relatives served for in the war and how important it was to keep Canada free country," she said.

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## Speakers encourage students to make a difference

Two notable speakers set out to inspire local students during a special assembly last Friday at the Comp.

Arvid Loewen, who is best known for holding the Guinness World Record for fastest cycle across Canada, at 13 days, six hours and 13 minutes to be exact, and Spencer West, who lost his legs from the pelvis down at age five only to climb Mount Kilimanjaro in his wheelchair, made a stop in Selkirk to talk about making a difference.

"To me, speaking is an opportunity to simply say what is in my heart and also to get the young people to understand there is much more we can do, even with the perceived limits of the human body," Loewen said. "Over the course of time with what I do – the ultra marathon cycling - I've learned when I reach the bottom of the barrel, as we call it, that's when you understand what life's all about.

"I'm trying to create that inspiration in the kids."

Loewen, who calls himself a "damaged soccer player," turned to cycling when he could no longer play. He's now been doing long distance cycling for 20 years, but the last 10 years he's been busy creating awareness for orphaned and abandoned children in Africa.

"Cycling was the only thing I could physically still do and it was too late in my life to get into the racing type of stuff because I started riding when I was 36 or 37," Loewen explained. "So ultra marathon cycling is about the mental toughness and to me those are the life lessons you can apply in real

Since he started biking for charity, Loewen has raised \$3-million for Mully Children's Family in Kenya, which is a non-profit Christian organization in Africa that rescues abandoned babies, orphans of HIV and AIDS, boys forced into child labour, young mothers and girls forced into the sex trade.

"For me my slogan is 'the things we do for ourselves will be forgotten when we're gone, but the things we do for others will live on,"he told stu-


When West made his way to the stage, he told his story of climbing Mount Kilimanjaro.

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## Afghan war vets deserve better recognition, retired solider says

Aging Selkirk veterans received a roar of applause as they left a Remembrance Day ceremony at the Selkirk Recreation Complex last Wednesday. But a retired Afghan war vet wonders why the same commemoration isn't given to veterans who fought in Canada's 12-year war in Afghanistan – a battle he left only two years ago.

Cpl. Tyler Liebenau, 29, said much

of Canada's role in Afghanistan remains a mystery to the public, mainly because many Afghan vets don't want to talk about the war.

He said while most of the public knows about soldiers who were killed in Afghanistan, many have returned home have had their stories left untold.

"They don't know

what soldiers have seen, what soldiers have done, what the soldiers have smelt, and how they've eaten and how they've lived,"Liebenau said.

"Nobody cares about us anymore because nobody's dying in Afghanistan anymore."

Liebenau, who lives in Selkirk and is now a father, said he lived under constant fear of dying when he was

"There were times where I held my breath over every single culvert, every single pothole in Afghanistan, because I had no idea if it was the last

second of my life," he said. "You feared everybody.

feared man, "You woman, and child every day, every second."

Liebenau lost two of his fellow comrades in Afghanistan.

A roadside bomb killed Pte. Garrett Chidlev. 21. and Liebenau's best friend, Master Cpl. William Elliot, took his

own life after returning home.

"He suffered from PTSD for whoever knows how long,"Liebenau said. Elliot is one of at least 54 Canadian

soldiers that have taken their own lives since returning home, an investigation by the *Globe and Mail* revealed

Liebenau said the federal government has left Afghan vets suffering and without the proper resources they need.

"I know of one guy (and) every year he has to prove that he lost his leg," he said. "These are the guys who laid the ultimate sacrifice for their country and right now they're getting the

Liebenau said the Forces did little to support him when he was at his breaking point after his cousin died in a motorcycle crash in 2013.

"They said 'you want to go home? It's on your own dime, and you're not coming back," he said. "I had no support from my military, my chain of command whatsoever."

Liebenau wants Afghan vets to start getting the same public commemoration Second World War vets receive.

Selkirk Legion president Lorne Thorvaldson said he hopes legions like his can start to attract younger veterans, but stressed the importance of honouring the older ones.

"It's important now to show our support for them, because they are aging," Thorvaldson said. "Soon we won't have them."

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



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## **Hall of Honour** unveiled at Manitoba legislature

A Hall of Honour has been officially unveiled inside the Manitoba legislature building in Winnipeg.

Premier Greg Selinger and Deanne Crothers, special envoy for military affairs, officially opened the Hall of Honour last Tuesday by unveiling a complete listing of all First World War (the Great War) regiments that were based out of Manitoba and announced the Legislative Building will introduce a daily ceremony for the 'turning of the pages' for the Books of Remembrance.

The Books of Remembrance have, until recently, always been housed in the Manitoba Room, located on the second floor of the Legislature building, but were largely inaccessible to the general public. The Hall of Honour, located in the southwest corridor on the main floor of the building also displays plaques honouring various military regiments and will now feature a complete listing of Manitoba regiments that served Canada in the First World War.

"It is important the public has access to this material to serve as reminder that we should never forget the courage and sacrifice that has been made on our behalf," Selinger said.

Crothers added the ceremony to turn the pages for the five Books of Remembrance will be done daily at exactly 11 a.m. each day of the year.

"The books honour casualties of war from the Boer War, the Great War, the Second World War, the Korean War and the Merchant Navy," Crothers said.

Selinger also said the government is planning additions to the Hall of Honour to include dedications to Lt.-Col. William 'Billy' Barker of Dauphin, the most decorated serviceman in Canadian history, and Sgt. Tommy Prince of Winnipeg, Canada's most decorated First Nations soldier.

The Hall of Honour will be accessible to the public during all regular operating hours of the Legislative Building from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.



## East Beaches honours veterans at memorial garden

The 11th minute of the 11th hour of the 11th day is signified by 60 seconds of silence. Ninety-seven years following "the war to end all wars," Gloria Juvonen, principal of Walter Whyte School, led this year's Remembrance Day service, marking the first memorial held at the new Cenotaph and Veterans Memorial Garden in East

The site is located near the entrance to the Grand Marais Community Central building on Highway 12 in the village of Grand Marais. On any day, one can find here a quiet spot to meditate with the memorial stone, four flags gently flapping in the wind from the lake and three sturdy and inviting benches.

This Remembrance Day, it was standing room only for the more than 60 community members who came to honour those who serve or formerly served in Canada's military.

It is significant that this tranquil spot is on land originally owned by a Grand Marais veteran. For many years, Martin Spreen owned 160 acres in Grand Marais. A chunk of that property is where Grand Marais Community Central, the R.V. Park and the new Cenotaph and Veterans Memorial Garden are now located.

Spreen served overseas during the Second World War with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, Western Canada's oldest Infantry Regiment. Spreen was wounded before returning to his young family in Grand Marais.

In Grand Marais he kept a store, first on his own and then later with his older daughters. His son Henry was not born until the '50s but he remembers that his father never told stories of the war and rarely mentioned the

shrapnel that Henry knew was lodged permanently inside his father.

Juvonen reminded those in attendance last Wednesday that "November 11th is not a holiday."

"Today we mark the end of the First World War," she said. "It is a time to honour and celebrate the courage that was integral to service in past wars and to give thanks to those who serve today to keep Canadians safe."

Juvonen referenced "the ultimate sacrifice during two world wars, the battles in the Pacific, peace keeping on behalf of the United Nations in Palestine, Syria, Africa and in Iraq and Afghanistan."

She also asked those in attendance to continue to respect the work of our present day soldiers who are always

on hand to address issues and disasters here in Canada.

Betty Cross of Lakeshore Heights recited the iconic poem "In Flanders Fields"by John McCrea who wrote the piece on May 3, 100 years ago on the day following the death of his friend.

McCrea, a Canadian, was serving as a physician in Belgium before losing his own life in January 1918, 10 months before the Armistice.

Ken Avery, on behalf of East Beaches lead the ceremonial procession to the cenotaph. Wreaths were settled in front of the memorial stone by Andy Papko who served on the English Channel in the engine room of the destroyer ship H.M.C.S. Saskatchewan from 1944 to 1946 and by Marty Neil

who served from 1949 to 1953 with the Royal Canadian Engineers, 6th Field in Winnipeg.

Every person present at the Grand Marais service knew somebody, loved somebody and many had lost somebody to the travesty of war and discontent that plagues world peace.

Many remembered well the years they spent with parents or relatives who did return home to attempt a new start with their families and their communities. Fresh on the minds and mouths of those gathered were memories of Tony Jensen who was on hand, dressed in his regalia, to dedicate the East Beaches cenotaph in June but who passed away in October.



## Province expands geothermal heating to 6 First Nations

The province will provide \$150,000 in support for Aki Energy, allowing it to expand its geothermal energy program to a total of six Manitoba First Nations.

"Bringing clean, green energy to First Nations communities is an urgent need, both from an environmental and an economic perspective," Premier Greg Selinger said in a release last Friday."We'd like to see this model expanded to all First Nations, helping with green job creation, renewable and clean energy, and climate-change leadership."

Currently there are 350 houses on four First Nations that have been

retrofitted with geothermal systems which cut space heating costs by more than 40 per cent, according to the province. The cost of converting a home to geothermal is about \$17,500 and these costs are financed by Manitoba Hydro. A portion of the savings are used to pay Hydro back over time. The savings in utility bills outweigh the financing costs, meaning that utility bills for the rate payers are lower, the premier said.

"This important investment will allow Aki Energy to connect two additional First Nations with Manitoba Hydro's Pay As You Save program, for a total of six communities," said Darcy Wood, Aki Energy executive director. "We'll begin the consultation, selection, community engagement and training process right away so we are ready for the 2016 construction sea-

Aki Energy will also work with up to three other communities to install two biomass projects and a pilot project for roof-top solar energy. Sagkeeng First Nation and Long Plain First Nation both started geothermal operations this year, completing a combined total of 30 geothermal installations.

"We are excited to be installing geothermal equipment, so that 18 families can benefit from significantly reduced utility bills this year," Long Plain First Nation Chief Dennis Meeches said.

"Involving local crews in the installation means creating green jobs in our community."

The Power Smart Pay As You Save (PAYS) financing program provides Manitoba Hydro residential customers with a convenient option for completing energy efficient upgrades to their homes while keeping upfront costs and future monthly finance payments as small as possible.

This new funding supports TomorrowNow, which is Manitoba's Green Plan, an eight-year plan that supports environmental protection while ensuring sustainable prosperity for future generations.


The Bisons' roster also includes East Selkirk's Allison Alcock and East St. Paul's Courtney Kowk.







Gradually stir in milk and cook until mixture boils. Reduce heat to low. Stir in sour cream and cheese. Cook on low until cheese is melted, stirring constantly. Layer half of potatoes in baking dish. Pour half

the sauce over potatoes. Repeat with remaining potatoes and sauce. Sprinkle potatoes with paprika. Bake for 30–35 minutes or until bubbly and top starts to brown.

**Preparation Time** 45 minutes Serves 14






