"The Big Hearts Hamper Initiative has been proud to bring our values to life right here in Selkirk and the Interlake area. The holiday season is a time for kindness, general generosity, and community. So, each December, we come together to make sure that no family goes without a meal, a few special treats, and the joy of the season," said Wendy Meger, Board Member at the Big-Hearts Tri-S Community Foundation and General Manager of Selkirk Home Hardware.

Last year, the hamper program gave to just under 500 families in our region, and this year they are expecting that number to increase to somewhere between the 500 and 600 mark, as Meger explained, people need help now more than ever before.

"The only way we can do that is with the help of the community and the businesses," said Meger.

There are many reasons that might make it so that a family needs a hamper this year, but that doesn't really matter. If you or your family are in need and in our area, the Big Hearts Hamper Program tries to help.

your name, contact info, the number of people and their ages, so that they can make sure to pack the hamper with enough food and gifts that the family will enjoy.

The hamper program was established seven years ago by Christiansen when he realized that there was a lack of this needed service in the com-

"It's tight all year long, but people want to partake in the holiday season.

And so, especially with kids, you want to make it special for them. So, you do whatever you can, and you don't want to sacrifice not paying your rent or bills to provide food and toys for your kids. If we can help lighten it a little bit, that's what we want to do," said Meger.

As part of this hamper program, residents don't just get the fixings for a holiday meal but food to help create other meals which aim to help when other nutrition programs, specifically those run out of our schools, are on pause because school is not in session.

"We provide enough stuff for a Christmas

meal, so you'll get a chicken or a turkey, potatoes, veggies, stuffing, and gravy. Then day-to-day stuff. There'll be cereal, there'll be peanut butter, spaghetti, and soups. It varies year to year depending on what the donations are," said Meger.

Each member of the family will also get a gift to help make the holidays a little brighter.

Donating to this cause is quite flexible, so that it's easier for people to find the way that fits them best.

"Big Hearts is partnering with Sel-

kirk Home Hardware to collect and deliver donations. You can support the hamper drive in many ways. You can donate monetary gifts, non-perishable food, new clothing, toys or gift cards. You can also, at your business, host a donation bin so businesses can serve as collection points. We provide the bins and arrange pickup. (Residents) can also, if they want to do cheques, they can make them payable to Big-Hearts Tri-S Community

> Foundation. And, at Home Hardware, we are also accepting cash donations at the till," Meger said.

Financial donations can also be made at the Selkirk Army Navy & Air Force Veterans Unit 151 and the Selkirk MB Legion, Branch #42.

Financial donations are always the most versatile and helpful donations because Big Hearts can turn them into any items that they need. However, if you have an overflow of cereals, peanut butter, pancake mix, syrup, soup or anything else non-perishable, those are the types of items that really help to fill in

the gaps.

"Every tin, toy, and dollar counts. So, anything anybody could give, even if it's a small can of soup, it adds up to something extraordinary," explained Meger.

Donations are being accepted now, and they ask that all donations come in by Dec. 9, as they intend to deliver the hampers on Dec. 12 and 13 so that the families have them in plenty of time for the holidays.

Some other ways that residents can donate are at the Dec. 5 Selkirk Steelers game, as Big Hearts volunteers will be there with a table. And a fun way to support while including your family or furry friend is to bring them to Home Hardware Selkirk on Dec. 6 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., as they will be hosting Santa and doing Santa photos with all proceeds going towards the hamper drive.

Meger encourages anyone with the means to help to support families in our community this holiday season.

"It's amazing what can grow from simple acts of kindness. This program began years ago in Kevin Christiansen's basement, believe it or not. It was a few hampers packed with care and a big heart. Now, it's blossomed into this community-wide effort that touches hundreds of families across Selkirk and in the Interlake every Christmas. So, let's keep the Big Hearts tradition alive," said Meger.







Holiday Jingle local market returning to Selkirk this year

If you want to support local makers then this market may be for you

there it continues.

With many markets taking place this holiday season, don't miss out on the Holiday Jingle, which connects handmade products and local makers to people looking to support local with their gift giving.

Christina Barr and Tennille Frost have been the founders and coordinators for this event since it started in 2018.

"Our goal has always been to do strictly hand-made markets," said Barr.

"We're creating a vibe. We want it to feel like Christmas magic when you walk in," said Frost. They start with holiday lights and a Christmas tree set up in the entrance to create the holiday atmosphere right from the beginning, and from

"We always see people meeting up with each other there and giving hugs. It's like a reunion atmosphere. It's nice to have local handmade crafters and an old school market," said Barr.

They say that vendors span a variety of categories, including sewing, bath and body, woodworking and more and that vendors are mostly from the Interlake, and there are a few people from Winnipeg, but that Manitoba-made is very important to them.

Barr and Frost explained that they started this market in 2018 because they wanted the cozy feel of a Christmas market, along with supporting local makers, as many other markets are available in our region, but many don't have strictly local products.

"We wanted it to be like the Christmas craft sales that we went to when we were kids. I remember shopping with my mom, and we would always pick out a hand-painted ornament every Christmas. We just couldn't find anything to shop at or to feature our own wares in that had that same atmosphere," said Barr.

She explained that, in addition to being a way for local people to find local craftspeople, this market also benefits these makers. "Some of the bigger markets, like Scattered Seeds(an annual market in Winnipeg) and ones like that, it's really priced a lot of crafters out of their markets. So, we try to keep it reasonable. We never charge an admission fee, because we want shoppers to spend those hard-earned dollars on the crafters and their wares and support them. We do usually have a tin for the bin set up for the soup kitchen and the food bank, so people can bring a tin for the bin, but it's not required for admittance. It's free to shop," said Barr.

Frost agreed, saying, "It's an awesome opportunity for local people to support local makers. The Rec. Center is a nice big hall, so we are able to have 40 makers."

In addition, Age Friendly will be running the canteen this year.

And on top of that, local gold medal-winning athlete Teagen Purvis has had her booth donated so that she can sell her art, a beautiful winter scene, on cards and gift tags. She is fundraising for her return to the Special Olympics. Purvis is not a stranger to representing Manitoba, as she created a new Canada Games record last summer while winning the the 50m freestyle swim. She also won gold in the 100m backstroke and 50m backstroke.

They say that they will have a little something for everyone, from kids' stuff to baking and more.

The market takes place on Nov. 29 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Barr says that her favourite part is the atmosphere of the event.

"It's always just a great kick off to the holiday season. Just having the lights and the atmosphere and everyone is so friendly and warm, it just really always feels like the beginning of Christmas to me," she said.

Province launches midwifery services in Interlake-Eastern region

The Manitoba government is expanding access to prenatal and family health care with the launch of midwifery services in the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA).

Premier Wab Kinew and Health, Seniors and Long-Term Care Minister Uzoma Asagwara were in Selkirk this week to announce the new program, which will operate out of the Interlake-Eastern Health Services building at 100 Easton Dr.

"Our government is committed to making sure every Manitoban can access the health care they need, closer to home," Kinew said. "We are fixing our health-care system by staffing up and expanding services like this mid-

wifery program to support pregnant people and new families provincewide. This launch in the IERHA is a great step forward in delivering better care and better support for families in rural and northern Manitoba."

The program will begin with two full-time midwives who will provide a full spectrum of care, including prenatal visits, labour and birth support, newborn care, postpartum follow-up and reproductive sexual health services. The program is fully integrated with the region's existing primary care and obstetrical teams.

"Midwives offer personalized support, expertise and care that will greatly benefit pregnant people and new parents in IERHA," Asagwara said. "By integrating midwifery into primary and obstetrical services, we are creating a more seamless and supportive experience for families throughout pregnancy, birth and the postpartum period."

For the first time in 25 years, families in the Interlake and eastern regions will have access to midwifery services, noted Sarah Harpe, president of the Midwives Association of

"This announcement is momentous," Harpe said. "We are hopeful for a future where Manitoba families can receive equitable access to excellent sexual, reproductive and newborn midwifery services close to home."

The new service is designed to sup-

port those who face barriers to prenatal care, said Beckie Wood, the IERHA's midwifery access and coordination lead.

"Midwifery services work with each pregnant person and their family to identify their unique physical, social and emotional needs, and to support them in having their needs met," Wood said.

Pregnant women in the IERHA can access prenatal intake by speaking with their family doctor or nurse practitioner. Self-referrals are also accepted by calling 204-482-2150 or prenatalintake@ierha.ca. The IERHA will connect all callers or referrals to either a midwife or family doctor for prenatal care.

Knox Church to host Jamaica Night fundraiser to help those affected by hurricane

Hurricane Melissa created great losses in Jamaica, and local church hoping to help

After the recent destruction left in the wake of Hurricane Melissa, Knox Presbyterian Church in Selkirk has decided to host a Jamaican-themed night, which will share Jamaican culture as well as other fundraising events to help those who no longer have what they need.

"Currently, we're having a clothes and school supply donation for people to drop off items at the church. Also, people can make a donation to Knox Presbyterian Church for hurricane relief, and they can get a tax receipt for that, and that's ongoing. And, we're also asking people to pray for the situation in Jamaica, which is just terrible," said Naggie Sterling, the minister at Knox Presbyterian Church in Selkirk.

Sterling is from Jamaica himself, and so, in addition to these fundraising drives, he's decided to share parts of Jamaican culture with a Jamaica Night where residents who attend will learn about the music, food and other unique aspects of the country.

"Jamaican Night on November 28 here at the church, starting at 6 p.m. It's on our Facebook. The idea is we'll have music and stories about Jamaica, and some Jamaican food for a contribution of \$20," he said.

"We're creating a connection with Jamaica, not just with what is happening, but with Jamaica as a whole. And that will be done through the Jamaican music, Bob Marley is known worldwide, and stories about Ja-

maica. We've done that since we've been here in other settings (but it will be) stories about Jamaica (including) what makes it beautiful. It's not beautiful right now, but stories about the before and then after and some of the stories that have come through since the disaster. And, while that is happening, we will serve (and bring together) a taste of Jamaica in its music, in its food and through its stories," said Sterling.

Some of the tastings that they will have on offer are Jamaican Jerk Chicken, and a dish called rice and peas, which is actually made with, not what Canadians would call peas, but what we refer to as kidney beans mixed with Jamaican traditional spices to create its signature taste.

They do ask that people who wish to attend call and let the church know that they are coming in advance so that they can prepare enough food for everyone.

Sterling explained that Jamaica is not unaccustomed to hurricanes, but this one was particularly devastating

because of a series of unfortunate circumstances

"We've had hurricanes, very strong hurricanes and not so strong ones. We are more or less aware of how to prepare for hurricanes. The danger about this last one was that not only was it a very strong, the strongest since record, but it was moving at a snail's pace, which meant it was going to be sitting on the island for a long time. That's what caused a lot of the damage. It wasn't moving very fast. It came with a lot of water, and the winds were 300 kilometres an hour. It was just crazy, unimaginable. So, that had us worried. And I think being so far away makes the worry even more, because you feel very helpless," said Sterling.

He explained that as of his conversation with *Record* staff, he still wasn't able to reach certain friends and family members of his.

"We still have not heard from most of them because communications and

roads have been wiped out, but thankfully, we've heard from a couple of them, and they have managed, over time, to get word on to others. Some of them have lost their homes, but thankfully, they are still alive," he said.

The Jamaican Night event starts at 6 p.m. on Nov. 28, and they expect it to be a fun time, but only to run for about an hour and a half, so that people aren't out too late at this time of

Sterling encourages people who would like to learn more about Jamaican culture or who want to give a little to those in need to attend this event and check out their other fund-

"More and more these natural disasters are just making us understand how small the world is, and that one person's action on one side of the world affects people on the other side of the world, which is one of the reasons storms are becoming so fierce and global warming is a present danger," he said in conclusion.

IIU investigating officer-involved shooting in Brokenhead Ojibway Nation

The Independent Investigation Unit of Manitoba (IIU) is investigating an officer-involved shooting in Brokenhead Ojibway Nation.

On Nov. 15, the Manitoba First Nations Police Service (MFNPS) notified the IIU of an incident that occurred earlier that day at approximately 2:30 p.m. MFNPS officers were executing a warrant at a residence on the First Nation when they encountered a large, aggressive dog. One officer attempted to shoot the dog, resulting in the second officer being inadvertently shot.

The injured officer was later transported to Health Sciences Centre Winnipeg, where he underwent surgery to remove a bullet from his foot.

As this incident involved serious injuries as defined under the IIU regulation, the IIU is mandated to investigate.

Witnesses or individuals who have information or video footage that may assist this investigation are asked to contact the IIU toll-free at 1-844-667-

Connections to Employment employees in Selkirk show MLA Perchotte around

Dylan Niven, Jared Rhodey, and Kayla Kiers give tours of McDonald's and Safeway

Three area residents who used Connections to Employment to help find their jobs, Dylan Niven, Jared Rhodey, and Kayla Kiers, recently took our local MLA Richard Perchotte around their workplaces to show him the value of this program in our community and also how having businesses willing to accommodate the needs of their employees makes for stronger workplaces.

Connections to Employment is a supported employment program that supports anyone with any type of disability. They operate under the umbrella of Inclusion Selkirk but are separate from Inclusion.

"We help anyone with any type of disability. You can self-refer, and there's a variety of referral sources. Essentially, we like to work individually with each of our clients to help them in relationship building, getting to know what their personal goals are, their past work history, if any, and what skill sets they might have. We help with pre-employment prepping including, resume writing, interview skills, and job searching, where we want to find the right fit. We can do some skill assessments. We also work with local businesses by building relationships so that we know what the jobs entail. We talk in advance, wherever possible, about inclusive employment and what accommodations might be necessary," explained Cheryle Bacon, Director of Community Development, Connections to Em-

Annually, this program helps 55 to 75 people find employment in our community, and it has been operating for six years.

Bacon explained that this not only helps unemployed or underemployed people find the right fit for them, but also helps businesses.

"The benefit of our program is just being there as a liaison and helping, and overall, businesses want to do it better, too. They're just not sure how to or what they can do. And that little bit of extra support

plaining how items were organized and stored and how the two worked in that area. The three then moved to the food preparation area, where Perchotte learned the secret of how the fries are made.

He also learned about the employees themselves. Rhodey had previously worked at Skinner's Restaurant as well as the cafeteria in the high school, which meant that he already had some of the skills needed to transfer into another food service environment.

Niven's job hunt started almost ten years ago with a reverse job fair where employers looking to hire came to the library to meet people looking for work. Niven started out at Geller's Landscaping initially and was also employed at Safeway in Selkirk. He juggled those two jobs for a few years, and then when COVID hit, because of the need for frontline workers in our community, he elected to give up the landscaping job in favour of working more at Safeway. When things slowed down after COVID, Niven still wanted to work two jobs and so set out again on his job search and now works both at Safeway and at McDonald's in Selkirk.

Caldwell explained that from a business perspective, it's been great to have Niven and Rhodey in their positions because they are some of the most consistent employees she's ever had.

"These are some of my hardest-working employees. They bust their tails every day. Always coming in with a positive attitude," said Caldwell.

For their parts, Rhodey and Niven say they are glad to have the work.

"I'm just happy to have a job. Just have fun with people I can actually finally talk to," said Rhodey.

"I can be happy and positive in this workplace," said Niven.

Niven and Perchotte then headed over to the Safeway to talk about his role there and meet up with Kiers, Store Manager Jocelyne Chaddock, and Assistant Store Manager Rose McGimpsey.

The Safeway tour started at the front of the store in the aisles, where the group met up with Kiers as she was doing some shelving of fresh-cut fruit. From there, Kiers led the way to her station, doing food prep at the back of the store. After Kiers, Perchotte once again had Niven showing him around, starting at the back of the store, where everything is organized, unloaded, and the stocking is done from. The tour ended with an explanation of how the cashier station works.

Kiers works in the preparation of fresh foods area, including fruits, at Safeway and is versed in proper food handling procedures and the use of the PPE needed for the job. Her schedule is very regular, and with a recent shift to more independence in her personal life, that regular schedule is what works for her.

Niven, in his position at Safeway, is currently working stocking the store but has been learning new skills with hopes of moving to a role with more responsibility in the future. This is something that he's supported in doing by Safeway's management.

Kiers said that her favourite part of her job is everything. She also enjoys the social aspect of her job and her fellow employees.

Chaddock also spoke about the reliability of her Connections to Employment employees and had some positive things to say about them integrating into the workplace and everyone being better for it.

"We all have something to contribute, and it's really nice for all of us to see. When we've got someone

from a program like Inclusion or someone with different abilities, it really knocks down a lot of those preconceived notions, right? We think we know what people are capable or not capable of, and it really shows us that we're wrong. It also is really great for other community members who may have different abilities to come in and say, 'Hey, maybe I can do that,' or 'Maybe my kid can come and work here'," she said.

Overall, it was a very successful tour of both businesses, and Perchotte was very impressed by the workers and the employers.

"What I witnessed today was a clear sense of belonging in both of the institutions that I went to. McDonald's and Safeway go out of their way to open an area for people to come in and just feel like they belong in the workplace," he said.

Being a business owner himself, Perchotte knows how important good employees are to a workplace.

"When you have people that show up to work because they want to be at the job, it's not so much the role, but the environment that they're in, and then they'll help you be a better company," he explained.

He felt that the employees he chatted with were passionate about their positions and was glad to see this program working so well. Perchotte also encourages other business owners who are interested in Connections to Employment to learn more and see if it's the right fit for them.

Hearthstone supports families with inclusive programs and care

Hearthstone Community Group strives to be an accepting place for clients, staff and families, and according to general manager Lori Zdebiak, it's one of Selkirk's "best kept secrets."

Hearthstone is a community living and social program for adults and youth with intellectual disabilities. It offers day program services, beforeand after-school care, and residential housing for those needing full-time support. "We are here for our participants, our staff and our families," Zdebiak said.

The organization first opened in 1992 and now supports nearly 60 individuals while employing almost 100 staff members. Zdebiak says Hearthstone is proud of the day program they've developed, which runs extended hours — from as early as 6 a.m. to as late as 6 p.m. — to accommodate families' schedules. Activities include crafts, games and social outings to places like the grocery store, zoo, bowling alley or movies. The facility includes a kitchen, salon, laundry, music room, quiet rooms, movie theatre and fitness room. Spots are currently available, and Zdebiak says getting started is simple: "If you are eligible for Community Living Disability Services (CLDS), you can get day programming."

Their before- and after-school program is available for youth ages 14 and older, operating out of the day program facility to provide care outside of school hours. Applying for residential services takes more time, as placements are determined by the government and there is often a waitlist for homes.

Hearthstone holds Imagine Canada and Gentle Teaching accreditation — two programs Zdebiak considers the organization's foundation. As a mom to an adult with an intellectual disability, she knows how influential these services are. "I was once told my daughter would go through 600 support workers in her lifetime," she said. "Gentle Teaching reframes that. It means she'll have 600 people who love and care about her."

Gentle Teaching is based on four principles: safe, loved, loving and engaged. All staff complete biannual Gentle Teaching training sessions and receive one of three certification levels. "If you cannot Gentle Teach, you cannot be successful here," Zdebiak said. "It's the core of the organiza-

Imagine Canada, meanwhile, ensures Hearthstone maintains strong financial, HR and fundraising standards. Of 86 similar organizations

operating in Manitoba, only one other program has Imagine Canada accreditation — "and I think that's pretty neat for us," Zdebiak added.

Currently, about 30 individuals participate in daytime programming, while 29 individuals live in one of Hearthstone's nine homes. "We are sustainable," Zdebiak said. "Families can rely on us to be here for years to

Other features unique to Hearthstone include its internal transportation system, medical support — such as tube feeding and medication administration — and end-of-life care. The organization operates five vehicles, including accessible vans and buses, and allows individuals to age in their care. A memorial tree in their facility honours those they've supported to the end. "It will never be our goal to cease support to people that are dying," Zdebiak noted.

Hearthstone has also helped launch the careers of new Manitoba doctors by employing immigrants as they worked toward medical certification. Over the last decade, the organization has doubled its staffing numbers, providing meaningful careers for individuals from both near and far.

Another recent accomplishment was opening their community garden at the West Vaughan location earlier this year, offering something for the entire community to enjoy. "It's just something to show the community who we are," Zdebiak added.

Looking ahead, Hearthstone hopes to recruit more board members and gain the City of Selkirk's support to complete their parking lot. "We want people to know we are good stewards of employment, and our staff deserve

a safe place to park," she said. "We want enough presence that people understand that this is a quality organization and they should consider board membership.'

They are also seeking a motivated volunteer to lead Gentle Pets — a program that allows participants to

interact with volunteer dogs. "I'm looking for someone that wants to be a champion of the program. I'm looking for somebody that's really into dogs, or a groomer, perhaps, because we have a dog washing station and everything set up down there — we just need somebody to enliven this program again."

They are offering a free grooming space to a partner who can help keep the program running. Zdebiak says seeing everyone interact with the dogs is a reward in itself. Hearthstone participants even bake and sell

treats for the dogs in-house.

"You should see their faces light up when they get to be with the dogs,' she added.

Free seminar helps grieving individuals to navigate the holidays

The holidays can be challenging for those who are experiencing grief.

An upcoming GriefShare seminar aims to provide encouragement, support and tools to help grieving individuals to navigate the holiday season. The Nov. 30 event at New Life Church in Stonewall will be a twohour dessert night with a 40-minute video as well as some time for shar-

"Surviving the Holidays is a onetime GriefShare event. Whether this is the first, second or 10th holiday after your loved one's death, the emotions that may arise in the days ahead can blindside you," said Allison Emmer of Heroic Family Mission.

"Surviving the Holidays is meant to guide you through the rough patches and curves of the holiday season by providing support and direction to navigate the holidays in a healthy way.'

The Nov. 30 event is geared for those who have been bereaved or who are supporting someone who has experienced this type of loss.

Emmer said her friend Shirley Thiessen, who wrote Little Black Funeral Dress: 5 Things I Wish I Knew About Grief, explained that holidays are difficult because intact families are gathering yet some families are missing a loved one — and the gap they leave behind is bigger than anticipated. Friends are often silent or unsure if they should acknowledge the loss.

For those who are supporting others, Emmer points to Thiessen's website https://cornerbend.com for some useful resources. She also suggests several strategies to help people cope.

"While everyone is different and we grieve differently, for some coping means skipping the 'normal' things that are done on a holiday — maybe going on a trip instead of being at home," Emmer said.

She said Thiessen skipped Christmas the first year after she lost her son. The second year, she found comfort in adding ornaments to the tree that represented her son, while also lighting a candle and talking about him.

Yet for Emmer, the path looked different after the loss of her husband Paul, who died in December 2023 after a three-vear cancer battle.

"Unlike Shirley, as my family has navigated a few holidays without Paul, I have found it helpful to do similar things to what we used to do. We love to celebrate in ways that Paul would have enjoyed," she said.



"The goal of Surviving the Holidays is to give a variety of ideas so each participant can figure out what might work best for them where they are at."

If you're unsure how to support a grieving friend, Emmer suggests a few options.

"Choose to invite them to Christmas gatherings. Don't say their 'no' for them. Grief needs to be dosed with some social interaction. Give the griever freedom to arrive late and leave early or not attend at all. Remove expectations. Say the name of their loved one who died. Give the gift of sharing a story, a picture or memory of their person. Remind your grieving friend that they are loved and their person will not be forgotten," she said.

"Be patiently present. Offer to do the Christmas baking, shovel the driveway all December, string the house lights or buy gifts. Ultimately, being sensitive means not ignoring their sorrow or pretending their loss didn't happen."

Surviving the Holidays runs from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 30 at New Life Church (6106E Highway 67, Stonewall). The event is free but preregistration is encouraged so that the organizers can prepare. Registration can be done online at GriefShare.org or by calling the church office at 204-

Intense solar activity brings bright auroras to Interlake

Manitobans are witnessing an unusually active stretch of solar weather this week, creating widespread displays of northern lights and prompting renewed attention to a rare spaceweather phenomenon.

A cluster of powerful solar storms has reached Earth over the past several days, the result of multiple coronal mass ejections (CMEs) erupting from the sun. When these charged particles interact with Earth's magnetic field, they generate geomagnetic

storms strong enough to push auroras far beyond their typical northern range. This week, the lights have been visible across southern Manitoba, including areas where sightings are far less common.


Remarkably, the same solar event has caused auroras to appear much farther south than usual in the United States. Meteorologists report that residents in Florida were able to glimpse

~ Anchoring Hope

Every year, Manitoba Substance Use and Addictions Awareness Week provides an opportunity for Manitobans from all walks of life to engage in meaningful discussions and explore solutions for addressing the harms caused by substance use and addictions.

In 2025 the Manitoba Substance Use and Addictions Awareness Week runs from Nov. 16-22 and the theme is Anchoring Hope.Working in the substance use health field and addressing its challenges can result in different experiences, ideas and opinions for individuals, families and communities. At times, it can be challenging to agree on the best ways to address these issues in Canada. Hope is an optimistic state of mind that holds expectations for positive outcomes.

Exploring and discussing substance use health can lead to positive outcomes such as connections and growth. Yet the challenges and grief in the field cannot be unstated. In recent years, tens of thousands of people from across Canada died because of the unpredidrug supply. We need effe holistic, whole-of-governmen community action that is root evidence and compassion. We to work together to identify reach common goals. And than anything else, we need - hope for a brighter future improved health and wellness people living in Canada.

Finding help for addiction

Anyone thinking about seeking help for addiction should know that they are not alone. The 2022 United States National Survey on Drug Use and Health indicates 46.8 million Americans age 12 and older battled a substance use disorder in the previous 12 months. In addition, 10.5 percent of Americans 12 and older had an alcohol use disorder in the past year.

Alcohol is the most commonly abused drug in Canada, followed by nicotine/ tobacco and cannabis. An estimated 3 percent of Canadians have used one of five illegal drugs in the past year, and that rate increases to 4 percent among youths between the ages of 15 and 19.

Substance abuse is not only expensive, but also dangerous. Addiction can cause health problems and damage relationships. Use of illicit substances and alcohol also can cause death. Taking the first step to enter treatment is seldom easy, but it can prove beneficial in the long run. Here's how to start the journey to recovery.

· Be honest with yourself. The first step to recovering from a substance use disorder is to recognize you have a problem. You are not alone in this battle, and it can take great courage

to admit your missteps. Be proud of yourself for wanting to get help, even if you haven't quit just yet.

Reach out to friends and family. WebMD says a close family member or friend can be one of your biggest supporters as you take steps to recover. Although you cannot be entirely sure how they will react to the news, family and close friends may already suspect a substance abuse problem.

· Be receptive to an intervention. Sometimes it takes the collective efforts of friends and family to help addicts realize they have people in their corner willing to help them recover. Sometimes interventions are surprises, other times they are not. Listen to what others have to say and how they may be willing to help you change patterns that lead to continued substance abuse.

Work with an addiction professional. The Mayo Clinic says an addiction professional is usually a licensed alcohol and drug counselor, social worker, psychologist, or psychiatrist. Medical experts have realized that addiction is an illness and not just a matter of bolstering one's willpower. Therefore, enlisting a professional to suggest the

the northern lights during the early-morning hours of one recent night. The sun is currently approaching the peak of Solar Cycle 25, an 11year cycle marked by increased sunspots, flares and eruptions. Scientists note that while solar maximums occur regularly, the intensity and frequency of this week's activity make the current stretch particularly unusual. Several CMEs have arrived in rapid succession, amplifying geomagnetic effects and contributing to brighter, more widespread auroral displays.

In addition to the colourful skies, solar storms can influence technology and infrastructure. Strong geomagnetic activity has the potential to affect radio communications, GPS accuracy and, in severe cases, electrical grids. Manitoba Hydro has been monitoring conditions throughout the week, though no disruptions have been reported.

Clear evening skies across much of the province have given residents ideal viewing conditions for the phenomenon. Rural areas with minimal light pollution have seen especially vivid colours, with greens, purples and reds appearing shortly after nightfall.

The heightened solar activity is expected to continue as long as sunspot regions remain active. Forecasters suggest there may be additional opportunities to view auroras over the coming days when skies

For many Manitobans, the rare stretch of solar activity has offered a striking reminder of the province's northern location and the natural forces at work far beyond Earth's atmosphere.

MPI helps Manitobans navigate snow and ice with Winter Tire Program

"MPI is committed to safety and affordability, and our Winter Tire Program addresses both of these issues," said Maria Campos, Vice President & Chief Customer and Product Officer. "Winter tires reduce collisions by 6.3% and vehicles with winter tires may experience less damage severity in crashes. Winter tires are a simple step Manitobans can take to be safer on the road in winter months. Since the program started in 2014, we have given out 272,000 loans amounting to \$362.9 million."

Investing in a set of winter tires can be expensive, which MPI aims to make more affordable for Manitobans through the Winter Tire Program. Customers can get started by visiting any of the 655 participating tire retailers across the province to apply for the program. Financing terms are between one and four years. The retailer will confirm eligibility and begin the loan authorization process. Manitobans can check their eligibility and learn more about the program at mpi.mb.ca/winter-tire-program.

Winter tires should be installed when temperatures stay below +7°C. They are made with flexible rubber compounds for better grip in winter

conditions, and they have better traction at -30°C or - 40°C than all-season tires.

Many Manitobans believe that all-season tires are sufficient, but tests show a full set of winter tires stop much faster on ice. All-wheel drive (AWD) and four-wheel drive (4WD) vehicles should also be equipped with winter tires, as the AWD and 4WD helps with acceleration, not braking or turning corners.

MPI is dedicated to making roads safer during winter months and offers free 45-minute presentations to help licensed drivers brush up on winter driving skills. These presentations can assist anyone, whether they are new to winter in Manitoba or have lived here their entire life and are looking to be more confident behind the wheel. Interested groups or organizations with 10 or more participants can visit mpi.mb.ca/communityrelations to request an in-person or virtual presentation this season.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

BEFORE YOU DRIVE:

- Clear snow, ice, and frost from your vehicle BEFORE you drive. This includes the hood, trunk, and roof. You want to see and be seen.
- Ensure your wheel wells are clear of any snow build-up as that can affect your ability to steer the vehicle.
- Make sure your windshield washer fluid is topped up and rated for winter use to keep your windows clear of snow and ice and your line of vision clear.
- Plan ahead. Before you leave, check weather and road conditions by calling 511. If

Churchill port expansion strengthened by joint funding

Prime Minister Mark Carney and Manitoba Premier Wab Kinew said Ottawa and Manitoba are deepening their partnership to advance major economic projects, with a particular focus on the Port of Churchill and related northern infrastructure.

In a joint statement on Nov. 16, the two leaders said they are aligned on expanding Canada's trade capacity through new "nation-building" infrastructure — including ports, mines and northern trade corridors — and emphasized the importance of involving Indigenous communities early in project development.

Manitoba's proposed Crown-Indigenous Corporation (MCIC), which aims to ensure Indigenous participation and leadership in major projects, fits squarely within those goals, they said.

The Port of Churchill Plus initiative is one of seven national "transformative strategies" identified by the federal Major Projects Office. Both governments say expanded export capacity through Hudson Bay will strengthen links between Churchill and the rest of Canada, while opening new pathways for trade with Europe

road conditions are unfavourable, the safest strategy is to avoid driving. If you must head out, give yourself extra time to get to your destination safely and advise someone of the route you are taking as well as your estimated arrival time.

While driving:

- Slow down. Posted speed limits are for ideal travel conditions. Ice is common on winter roads, especially on bridges and overpasses. Slowing down helps maintain traction and decrease your stopping distance.
- Do not use cruise control. On winter roads, you want to maintain full control of your vehicle.
- Leave more space. Following distance should be increased on winter roads, especially when travelling at higher speeds or in poor visibility. Traction is reduced when roads are slippery, which means an increase in the time it takes to come to a complete stop.
- Be aware. Watch for pedestrians, as snowbanks can reduce lines of sight and make it difficult to see a pedestrian step onto the roadway. Snow can also impede your vision at intersections. Advance cautiously and lean forward to improve your view.

and other global partners.

Since the strategy was added to the federal list on Sept. 11, Manitoba and Ottawa have been working on a project charter and business case to move the file forward. Once the MCIC board is established, the corporation will become a full partner in planning and development.

Carney and Kinew said the work is advancing quickly, with governments reviewing business cases for infrastructure needed to support private-

sector investment, competitive economic development and long-term national interests.

As part of the joint effort, the federal government will fund a feasibility study by the Arctic Research Foundation on the future use of specialized icebreakers, ice tugs and research vessels at Churchill.

Kinew also announced \$51 million for the Arctic Gateway Group to upgrade the Hudson

Bay rail line and

build a new critical-minerals storage facility at the port. The province has now committed \$87.5 million to Churchill-related projects. Combined with federal dollars — including \$175 million announced in March — the total joint investment over five years is \$262.5 million.

Carney and Kinew said they plan to release the full strategy and plan for Churchill in the spring of 2026.

Linear Grain purchases Fannystelle grain elevator from Bunge

A long-time local grain company has expanded its footprint in southern Manitoba with the acquisition of the Fannystelle grain elevator.

Linear Grain Inc., based in Carman, confirmed this week it has purchased the elevator from Bunge. The transaction closed Nov. 5 and operations are already underway under Linear Grain ownership, with both existing employees retained to ensure continuity of service.

President and merchandising manager Ryan McKnight said the acquisition aligns with the company's long-term growth plans and strengthens delivery and marketing options for producers.

"We have been wanting to expand our storage capacity over the past few years in Carman and have plans to do so in the future," McKnight said. "When this opportunity came up, we were very interested. We have also been looking to get on the CPKC rail line for many years, and this gave us that opportunity. This will add additional marketing options for us and for the customers we purchase grain from."

Linear Grain currently ships on the CN through Central Manitoba Railway and also has access to BNSF. McKnight said adding CPKC broadens the company's ability to reach new markets and offer additional program flexibility.

The Fannystelle location will work closely with the company's Carman facility.

"This location being close to Carman will allow us to share company resources, equipment and staff very easily," McKnight said. "The catchment area will allow us to purchase from further north and along Highway 2 from new customers we are currently either not working with or seldom working with. We'll leverage each facility's advantages,

including which commodities are handled where, and offer flexibility and farm pickup options to keep grain

Both staff members previously employed at the elevator have been retained, including the new facility operations manager who brings 24 years of experience in the grain industry and 10 years working at Fannystelle. Linear Grain expects to add an additional employee as operations ramp up.

"The elevator is currently in good shape and we will repair, maintain and replace equipment as needed," McKnight added. "We will likely add storage capacity and look at increasing receiving and shipping capacity. There

is room on the site for expansion."

McKnight emphasized that local ownership remains central to Linear Grain's identity and approach.

"Local service means the owners and decision makers live and work here and care deeply about our communities," he said. "My family has deep roots in this region going back six generations. When you do business with a company like Linear Grain, you can get hold of the decision makers and build working relationships that you might not be able to with a larger or foreign corporation. If our company continues to be successful, we are investing money back into our business locally, donating to community causes and keeping jobs and economic benefits in the region."

McKnight said maintaining a competitive grain handling sector means ensuring space for privately owned Manitoba companies.

"The agricultural commodities business is dominated by large multinational organizations," he said. "To continue to have a vibrant and competitive marketplace, it's important that local entrepreneurs can compete and add value — rather than the industry continuing to consolidate."

For McKnight, the move also comes with personal connection to the community.

"We have many customers in the Fannystelle area that we have purchased grain from for many years. We look forward to cultivating more business in the area and have an additional tool with the Fannystelle elevator to meet their needs," he said.







Steelers return to winning ways ahead of four-game road trip

No Manitoba Junior Hockey League team needed a big week more than the Selkirk Steelers.

Battling illness, a shortened lineup and a sputtering offence, the Steelers faced a stretch of three games in four nights — and entered the week on a five-game losing skid. They snapped that slide immediately with a 5-3 win over the Winnipeg Blues on home ice Wednesday.

Landon Jamieson scored twice, while Dawson Madden, Carter Haney and Ayden Collins added singles. Netminder Hudson Hunnie made 23 saves as Selkirk hit the five-goal mark for the first time in November.

Two nights later, the Steelers' offence stayed hot with a 7-4 victory over the Northern Manitoba Blizzard, giving Selkirk its second straight win. Madden led the way with a hat trick, Landon Pue scored twice, and Jayton Frederick and Ty Mistelbacher added singles — the latter marking his first MJHL goal. Ethan Sawyer turned aside 25 shots for the win.

Selkirk nearly completed a perfect week but fell just short in a 4-2 loss to the Dauphin Kings on Saturday. Haney and Evan Mayer each scored, but the Steelers' late push wasn't enough. Selkirk now sits at 14-8-1 and has climbed to third place in the MGEU East Division.

"To get that win against the Blues and against the Blizzard was huge, and we gave ourselves a chance against Dauphin too," said head coach Hudson Friesen. "We had a very short lineup, and I think every guy that was playing in that game was very much under the weather, so we gave it our

all and we're definitely pleased with the week.'

The Steelers will look to rest and recover ahead of a two-game week against the Virden Oil Capitals and Winnipeg Blues — and they hope their offence remains sharp.


"The line of Dawson Madden, Landon Pue, and Evan Mayer has really been driving the offence for us of late," Friesen said. "They stepped up in a big way in both those wins and really came through for us. And having Landon Jamieson back is huge. He's having an immediate impact for our group five-on-five and on the power play."

Tuesday's matchup with Virden will close out a four-game homestand before the Steelers begin a four-game road swing on Saturday in Winnipeg.

Selkirk has been among the MJHL's strongest road teams this season, boasting a 7-2-1 record away from home and averaging more than four goals per game.

"The guys have a good routine on the road, and there's a good level of focus coming off the bus," Friesen said. "We've outlined some important things — especially on the longer trips — about how to get your body and mind ready. Whatever it is, our guys seem to play our game, play loose and raise that level of compete on the road."

The upcoming trip will take Selkirk to the Hockey For All Centre before heading west to face Waywayseecappo, Dauphin and Virden. The Steelers return home Dec. 5 for a rematch with Waywayseecappo.
