



## Knowing CPR saved a life in Selkirk last month

Gracy Cars Plouffe used CPR to save her husband Walter Plouffe

Walter Plouffe has been dealing with heart disease for about five years. In mid-November he had a heart attack. Luckily, his wife Gracy Cars Plouffe used the CPR training that she learned many years ago and was able to save his life.

"I got off work. I worked the night

at Safeway. I went to the basement to unwind and then all of a sudden, I heard a bang," said Cars Plouffe.

That loud sound was her husband falling on the floor above her.

After checking to see if he was breathing, Cars Plouffe dragged him to a flat area on the floor and stretched him out

"I started doing chest compressions," explained Cars Plouffe.

Luckily, Plouffe's daughter was also there and was able to help call 911 for assistance.

Cars Plouffe was able to continue to do chest compressions until the paramedics arrived and took over. Plouffe was taken to the hospital in Selkirk and is now doing well.

Cars Plouffe said that the paramedics and doctors told her that her quick thinking and application of CPR likely saved her husband's life.

"I took a course when they had Academy of Learning on the corner of Eveline and Manitoba," said Cars Plouffe.

She said that she took the course about ten years ago but that it came back to her when she needed the information and she just did the CPR.

Cars Plouffe remembers using a dummy to practise on in class.

She says that she decided to take the CPR course ten years ago because you never know when you'll need it.

"(That way) you're not standing there and you don't know what to do. You're saving someone's life. When someone needs it right away, you are able to help them," she explained.

Cars Plouffe said that her husband is doing better now.

"He's great. He's grateful. He's very grateful that I helped him right away, and he was just so happy that I saved his life," said Cars Plouffe.

The family is also very happy that they will be able to spend the holidays together again and, as a new family member is on its way, Plouffe is looking foward to a new grandchild.

Cars Plouffe encourages residents to

find a course and learn CPR because you never know when you might need it.

"It's a great thing to save someone's life because you know you're going to miss them. You did something good. You saved someone's life, and now they can celebrate Christmas with you," she said.

Residents will likely know Human from his many efforts in our community which involve his work as a Constable and Community Policing Officer as well as an incredible amount of local volunteer work.

In his member's statement, Perchotte complimented Human on his 24 years as an RCMP officer serving in Lac Du Bonnet, Thompson, Stonewall and Selkirk.

"Every public event I attend I see

Paul there engaging, informing and protecting the public," he said.

Perchotte also mentioned that Human is a Navel Reservist with 12 years of service obtaining the rank of Lieutenant as well as his volunteer work as the Commanding Officer of #77 Daerwood, providing leadership, direction and guidance to 12 to 19-yearold youths in the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps.

Perchotte then also mentioned his being in his third year of training to become a Deacon with the Roman Catholic Church.

The Selkirk Record caught up with

Human to chat with him about his experience being recognized and why he feels it's so important to serve his community.

"It's nice, especially when you're being recognized by someone from outside of the organization that you work for. Obviously, the experience of going to the legislature, I've been there a few times in my career, but when you're actually being recognized in their work area, it's really cool. I was very, very thankful," he said.

Perchotte let Human know that he wanted to recognize him in the legislative building mentioning in particular that Human is at many public events in our community and the importance of that.

"This is my job. This is what I do. I talk to people. I share my stories about the RCMP, or I make myself available so that people can ask me any question," said Human.

Some people may not know every-

volved with the START program. He also is a bass drum player for the RCMP Pipes and Drums.

"If the pipeband is needed within Manitoba, at the discretion of our commanding officer, then we're there. That means that I wear a different uniform and I play in the band that way, and that's another way for me to get around. I've been to lots of change of command ceremonies all over and I don't mind. Music's in my blood. I absolutely love it," he said.

He's, of course, very proud of his work with our local cadets saying that the kids are all incredible.

"It's an excellent program. It's led by (the cadets). We open the doors, we turn on the lights, they teach the classes. We love it," said Human.

In addition, he's a spiritual care volunteer with the hospital.

"I try to get over there once a week, and I do my little afternoon thing. Basically, what we do is we get a list of patients that would want to visit from a spiritual care volunteer, and we go hang out with them. I don't wear my uniform. Eventually, people will find out who I am, but I don't wear my uniform. I'm just, I'm Paul," he explained.

If you thought that was a busy enough schedule, you'd be right, but

Human also works as a crisis negotiator with the RCMP and, through his work, students and residents might have been to one of his presentations as he also provides community safety talks to a variety of groups in our area.

Human says that giving back to the community is something he enjoys doing.

"When you find out what you really like to do, then it's not going to be work, and it's fun," he said.

He also has some great advice for people who are inspired to help out in our community.

"If you're looking to give back to your own communities, we've always looking for volunteers at places like the Gordon Howard Centre, the Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen, we have our Selkirk Food Bank, and our schools too at the same time. If you complete, a volunteer application with our school division, they're always looking for people. It's a way to take your talents to another level and help other people out, because when we start helping other people out, we're doing the right thing," said Human.


He says that the more people that are involved with their communities the stronger that community becomes.

## St. Andrews Heritage Centre looking for artists for Community Art Show

### Submit your artwork before January 4

The St. Andrews Heritage Centre is hosting its annual Community Art Show in February and is looking for local artists to submit their work to be hung among the historical displays at the museum.

"The Community Art Show is basically a place for any local artists to come in and submit their artwork and have it shown to a wider audience. And we accept any form of media, as long as it is able to be hung and presented. So, the only media that we aren't going to be accepting is anything digital unless it is printed," said Sarah LeBlanc, museum coordinator for the St. Andrews Heritage

This is the Heritage Centre's sixth time hosting this event.

"The idea was just to bring in a wider audience to the rectory and get more people in to check everything out. We do really love art here, and we see a lot of our artifacts as art in the museum. We just are really into appreciating art as well," said LeBlanc.

She says that the museum can even be viewed as art in its own right with the architect and stonemason and other people who were directly involved in its creation putting their own touches onto the historically sig-

LeBlanc explained that the crosssection of local history and local art's culture just seems to meld together to create a great exhibit.

"A lot of the local people that come in and bring in their art, a lot of them are actually from the community. They bring their experiences into their art, and we bring that (as well with)

the museum. A lot of people submitting are from the Métis nation, and we do have a big part of that here in our museum that we like to talk about as well," she said.

If people are interested in submitting their artwork to be part of the show they should reach out to the Heritage Centre before Jan. 4, 2025.

To submit your artwork to the show, residents should go to the Heritage Centre's website at www.standrewsrectory.ca. From there, you can click the Programs/Events tab at the top of the screen, which will allow you to see a drop-down menu with an Art option. Hovering over it will lead you to the Community Art Show link. Once there, the page has information about submission guidelines, how to apply and the Google application form.

LeBlanc explained that the submission is not very complex but there are a few things people should know go-

There is a \$15 submission fee, and that includes all art pieces submitted (up to three per artist). Then when the art show is hosted at the Rectory, there will be also a community vote that allows three artists to take home a cash prize. The cash prizes include the first prize of overall excellence of \$100, the second prize which includes the best use of colour is \$75, and the third prize includes the best 3D representation. And then, following the cash prizes, there will be honourable mentions. We will also be advertising the artists and their artwork on our social media, so we'll be able to bring attention to the artists (online), as well as during the art show," said LeBlanc.

She also mentioned that the artists

will be able to use this as an opportunity to personally sell their work but that artwork that is sold will stay at the museum until the end of the show so that everyone has a chance to enjoy

LeBlanc explained that the show prioritizes local artists though it is open to all. She also wants residents



to know that they are hoping to get as many submissions as possible.

"We encourage all artists of any experience level to hurry and submit their artwork, because, we are here to just help you guys out. Especially if they want to focus on an art career and get themselves out into the public. It is a great experience to put themselves into," she said.

are so excited (to get them). But then gether. I'm so proud of them," she (I thought) 'Man, we don't need all these toys.'," she explained.

Armitstead's most active on the social media platform Instagram at @ elissa\_a22. There, she produces family-oriented content. Lately, her family has been sharing some of their favourite locations and, of course, her children have also received some holiday tovs this season.

Armitstead explained that this wasn't what she thought would come of posting on Instagram but she is glad to be able to help our commu-

"This was never a job that I even

thought I was gonna get into. I didn't even know what it was," she said.

It's actually not the first time that she's been able to give back to the community as, when the Gaynor Family Regional Library brought back programming after the CO-VID-19 pandemic, they decided to expand their Stay and Play program and Armitstead's family was able to help with some toys.

She also explained that it's not just about giving back to the community but it also benefits her children to be involved as they are learning about the needs in their community as well as about kindness.

Armitstead is happy to be able to make this donation and very glad that her kids are also on board with help-

"It makes me feel good that the

kids are completely on board with this. They're like 'We can give this to somebody that doesn't have it.' It makes me feel super proud of them,"

If you are able to, Armitstead suggests looking at ways that you can give back to our local hamper programs or community in general.

### Lighting up Gunton, local resident's outdoor display brings cheer

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas at Larry Possberg's Gunton home.

For over five years, Possberg has been lifting Gunton's spirits with his impressive light display.

With what started as a light-up and animatronic ferris wheel, his display has expanded to include over 15 moving pieces to celebrate the holiday season.

"Gunton has always been a well decorated town and I wanted to join in on the fun. I started with the ferris wheel, and the display has only grown ever since."

This year, Possberg gave the community a sneak peek of what they can expect at his display. He and his son put together a float for the Teulon Christmas Lights Drive-thru Parade using a select number of pieces that you would find at his Grunton home.

"My son suggested putting a float in the parade, so we jumped on the idea."

He said that the float was more work than he was expecting, but the duo managed to set up the animatronics over the course of two days.

"At the house, we have quite a bit more and we add a little bit to it every year."

Possberg's 2024 display is now officially set up. He explained that it usually takes ten days to assemble, wire, and display his festive animatronics.

"I do about a week's prep work in the garage getting everything put together. Then I bring out the tractor to put it out. They are all made out of steel so they are very heavy. I normally spend three days placing everything."

He has always had a passion for handy work and likes playing around in the garage. "I like to be kept busy. I will weld and build everything, and my wife does a lot of the painting and artwork."



Possberg can't even estimate how many lights he uses on the display. "The two small light up trees have over 1000 LED. I guess if I ever get bored I could try to figure out how many lights are here!"

Even picking a favourite structure poses a challenge. He receives many comments on the ferris wheel, but when people visit the display they all have a different favourite.

You can visit Possberg's light display at 78 Gunn St., and while you are there, be sure to visit the other decorated homes in the community. "It's worth a drive to see all the decorations here," added Possberg.

His yard lights up nightly from 4 to 9:30 P.M. It will be decorated until Jan. 1, when he will disassemble everything and put it in the shed to store for next year.

Filling for between layers and top: Combine in heavy saucepan

cup sugar

3 egg yolks

1/4 cup cream

1/4 cup butter

Stir over medium low heat until thick

Add: 1/3 cup coconut

1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

1 tbsp cream de cocoa

Cool and spread

### **Cinnamon Applesauce Dough Ornaments**

125 ml (1/2 cup) ground cinnamon 125 ml (1/2 cup) applesauce

Mix the two ingredients together to form a soft dough. Roll out to about 1/4 inch thick and cut with cookie cutters. Using a straw, cut holes in the ornaments so they can be hung with string later. Spread tin foil on a cookie sheet. Place ornaments on sheet. Let dry 12 hours or so. Turn them to dry other side. You need to know, don't try to roll them out too thinly or they will crack when they dry out. I used a toothpick to make hole for string as I found the straw to be too big.

You can also use these for simmering potpourri. Place a cinnamon ornament in a pretty bag with a handful of snipped dried orange peel, some allspice berries, and cloves. Add the contents and some water to a pot to simmer. It smells wonderful.

Cool completely before pouring over berries

butter. You want very fine crumbs. Stir in extract, cranberries and sugar mixture, orange zest and orange juice (optional).

Use your hands to knead the dough until it comes together and forms a ball. Work the dough until it comes together. If the dough is still crumbly, add orange juice, one tablespoon at a time until the dough comes to-

gether. Shape dough into a log about two inches in diameter and wrap in plastic wrap. Refrigerate for two hours or up to 72 hours.

Preheat oven to 325°F Cut slices of cookie dough about 1/4 inch thick.

Place about a half a cup of sugar in a bowl and coat the cookie slices with sugar.

Place cookies on baking sheet and bake for 12 to 15 minutes or just until cookies are set. Do not over bake. I remove my cookies at 12 minutes.

Let cookies cool for several minutes on baking sheet before removing to cooling rack. Let cool completely.

Store in airtight container for 3 days or



The Lieutenant Governor's Awards for Historical Preservation and Promotion are presented to those with experience in such endeavours as:


- writing of historical publications and documents;



## Province to use conservation officers, pay RCMP overtime to patrol border

Manitoba premier Wab Kinew announced he's going to deploy conservation officers (COs) to the Canada-U.S. border and pay RCMP officers overtime in order to bolster security.

The announcements came after U.S. president-elect Donald Trump threatened Canada and Mexico in late November via a social media post, saying he'll impose a 25 per cent tariff on all goods entering the U.S. on the day he takes office [Jan. 20, 2025]. Trump said the tariff is a response to what he claims is an "invasion" of drugs and illegal aliens entering America from the two countries.

Canada's federal government and provincial and territorial leaders met a few times over the past few weeks to come up with strategies to address Trump's threat, which included a show of muscle from Ontario premier Doug Ford, who doubled down on his threat to cut off energy flowing from Ontario to the U.S., and the premiers of Manitoba and Alberta announcing their plans to shore up their respective borders with additional policing resources to show the U.S. they're doing their part to strengthen security.

Kinew told media at a Christmas Cheer Board event on Dec. 6 that he'll be deploying conservation officers to the border, and last week said the government will pay overtime for federal police at the border.

Offering no further details on how many COs would work the border and what duties they'll be carrying out. Kinew said the transfer of COs would not affect other areas where they normally serve.

Conservation officers are Manitoba's third largest law enforcement agency and fall under the provincial department of Natural Resources and Indigenous Futures. COs conduct checks on anglers, commercial fishers, hunters, trappers and other resource users, police provincial parks, take part in wildfire suppression and investigate the causes of wildfires, provide enforcement to the fishing, mining and forestry sectors, deal with humanwildlife conflict, assist at watercraft inspection stations and help with search and rescue operations in backcountry regions, among other duties.

Commercial fisher and analyst Bill Buckels said Manitoba COs are a finite resource and they could potentially be pulled from monitoring the commercial and recreational fisheries to serve along the border. But he's all for Kinew's plan to have them at the border as they're better equipped than Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) staff to work outdoors in all kinds of terrain.

"The COs will have to go where the greatest need is. We're going to need every available public service officer who is savvy with terrain out there along the border," said Buckels. "CBSA officers don't know the land as well as COs know it. The COs will likely be out in the bush or on snowmobiles or quads. We're going to need extra people searching every vehicle as though it's a police checkpoint program we see every Christmas."

Buckels said Manitoba is "sadly understaffed" when it comes to CBSA

staff. Compiling and analysing data from Statistics Canada, CBSA, the Manitoba government, and the Manitoba Government and General Employees Union (MGEU), Buckels estimates that Manitoba is short 360 CBSA officers.

"The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) has only 1,208 officers in the Prairie Region, which spans Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and

Northwest the Territories and which in itself can be interpreted as a 'cruel joke' when compared proportionally to the rest of Canada since, overall, CBSA has around 16,500 employees, including more than 8,500 frontline employees,' said Buckels, who shared his concern with Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan. "When we look at how that breaks down by our population

With the help of Frankie's vet at Beausejour Animal Hospital, Dr. Brittney Derksen, she and Wallace did some research about having a prosthetic leg made. They finally connected with Dr. Susan Calverley, an Animal Orthotics and Prosthetics specialist in B.C. to have a prosthetic made.

Dr. Calverley has created prosthetics for over 500 animals, including many different species such as llamas, but now she can add a sheep to her list.

Frankie initially had a mould made of her injured leg in July, and has since waited for the prosthetic to be manufactured in both Denver, Colorado and B.C.

After what seemed like an eternity, Frankie's prosthetic finally arrived.

Dr. Derksen met with Wallace and Frankie on Nov. 25 to fit the prosthetic, and the fitting was a huge success.

"The prosthetic fits well," said Wallace. "It was a bit challenging getting it in place but that will improve over time."

Once Frankie's new leg was on, she instantly began walking and catching the interest of the other sheep.

"It was so funny how her herd buddies were checking out the limb! They seemed concerned about her!"



### Ask the money lady

Dear Money Lady,

I have just started trading in the stock market on my own (I don't have that much saved yet) and I wondered if you could give me any information about investing as new trader. Do you think I can do this myself, or should I get a bank advisor?

Sure Mike, I can give you some pointers to get started. Remember, knowledge is power!

The more you know the better!

Even if you plan to get a banker to invest for you - it is a good idea to have some idea of what is happening in the stock market and how it could affect you in the future.

The first thing I would say to get started, would be to make sure you align your personality with your investment strategy. If you've got a short attention span – you might not be good at long-term swing trades. If you plan to be a long-haul investor then just follow your strategy with or without your banker, and don't bother watching the market every day. And if you want to be a daytrader, then remember, investing is not gambling. You can't hop in and out of the market like a profit chasing junkie. The market enjoys eating up inexperienced investors every single day. To do it yourself, there's plenty of software tools out there to allow you to practice first, Mike. Not until you start making money paper trading, preferably multiple times, should you ever consider moving into a live account. You want to make sure your strategies are viable so practice them first. Of course, it won't help you with the emotional aspects of trading, so always rember your capital is everything. This goes for your banker too. Make sure you understand their strategy, rationale, and investment goals with your money, before you hire them to work with you.

Here's some other things you should know about the stock market. The 3 most popular indices for an investor to follow are the S&P 500, the Dow Jones Industrial Average, and the Nasdaq Composite. The

S&P monitors the top 500 companies in the US, the Dow covers the top 30 largest and most influential bluechip companies in the US and the Nasdaq covers all the stock traded on the Nasdaq stock exchange, (usually followed to see how technology stocks are doing). Another index to check out would be the Wilshire 5000. This is a total market index and includes all publicly traded companies in the US. Now if you're looking for Mid- or Small-Cap stock picks, you will want to check out the S&P Mid-Cap 400, the Russell Midcap or the Russell 2000. For bonds you want to check out the 10-year T-note Futures and also the 20-year Treasury bond futures.

You may be wondering why you should bother with these indices? Well, they provide an insight on the economy, give us indicators for new trends and most of all they show investor sentiment. They are also used as benchmark indices for some Exchange Traded Funds (ETFs) and Mutual Funds (MFs) that you may want to invest in for the long term.

Take it slow. Get some books on investing and you'll get it.

of 41 million on a per province basis, we are likely not getting our money's worth here in Manitoba or, indeed, in the Prairie Region. The Prairies sadly have less than half of its fair entitlement of 3,069 employees, which means that Manitoba could be approximately 360 officers short."

Conservation officers are also in short supply, with COs moving to other provinces for higher pay and successive Manitoba governments having done little to plug the drain, he said.

"In December 2024, Progressive Conservative critic [Greg Nesbitt] said Manitoba Conservation was understaffed, with only around 90 field officers instead of the 130 it should have," said Buckels. "Yet for the many years when the PCs held power, including in 2021, only 76 COs were left in the field, with only 15 employees at headquarters, and Manitoba was losing experienced COs to Saskatchewan where they earned more in entry level positions than the PCs were willing to pay. It's obvious that the situation hasn't changed no matter who gets elected."

In March 2023, before the NDP formed government later that year, NDP leader Wab Kinew said in a news release that his party obtained government documents showing that the number of vacant CO positions "has increased to 21 out of 102 total positions" and that vacancies are "rising year over year."

A spokesperson for the provincial Department of Natural Resources and Indigenous Futures was unable to share details on how many COs will be deployed to the border and what they'll be doing, but did confirm the number of Manitoba's "active" COs.

"Details on the assignments and/ or deployment of conservation officers to assist in monitoring the border with the United States are still being worked out," said the spokesperson on Dec. 13. "There are currently 78 active conservation officers working in the field ...."

The movement of fentanyl, in particular, from Canada to the U.S. is a mere fraction of what gets smuggled into the U.S. from Mexico, and Canadian politicians have offered this fact in response to Trump's assertion that there's an "invasion."

CBSA's vice president of intelligence and enforcement Aaron McCrorie told the CBC on Dec. 13 that fentanyl devastates communities, and that Canada and the U.S. have a "shared interest" and "shared responsibility" in stopping it. But Canada is not a key player in relation to its movement across the border.

Citing U.S. and Canadian agency data, McCrorie said "Canada is not a significant source of fentanyl for the United States" and that "98.8 per cent is coming from Mexico."

Between January and October, CBSA seized 4.9 kilograms of fentanyl, which was included in a total illegal drug seizure of 25,600 kilograms, according to a Dec. 9 CBSA news release. CBSA also seized 7,770 weapons, including 1,274 prohibited weapons and 750 firearms that came from the U.S. during that 10-month period. Further, CBSA identified 34,000 foreign nationals trying to enter Canada from the U.S.

Federal minister of public safety Dominic LeBlanc repeated last week that border security is a "shared responsibility.'

The federal government is expected to provide more information about border security and funding support in its fall economic statement, scheduled for release on Dec. 16.

## Gimli's Lott duo to compete at Canadian Mixed Doubles Curling Trials

### By Lana Meier

Sixteen Canadian mixed doubles curling teams are one step closer to realizing their Olympic dreams. The field for the highly anticipated 2025 Canadian Mixed Doubles Curling Trials is complete, and the countdown is on to crown the team nominated to represent Canada at the 2026 Olympic Winter Games in Italy.

The action unfolds from Dec. 30, 2024 - Jan. 4, 2025, at Queens Place Emera Centre in Liverpool, N.S.

Canada's spot in mixed doubles curling at the Olympics is not yet confirmed. The winning team will earn the right to represent Canada at the 2025 World Mixed Doubles Curling Championship in Fredericton, N.B., from April 26 to May 3. Performance at this event and results from the 2024 World Mixed Doubles Championship will determine whether Canada secures one of the eight spots available for the mixed doubles competition at the Olympics.

The final eight teams were confirmed following the last trials directentry qualifying event in Banff and Canmore, Alta., over the weekend. The top eight teams on the Canadian Mixed Doubles Rankings (CMDR) as of Dec. 9 who had not yet qualified

earned their spots. They join eight teams who previously secured berths through the 2024 Canadian Mixed Doubles Championship, the 2023-24 CMDR standings, or at one of three direct-entry qualifying events held recently.

The 16 teams vying for a Trials victory including Kadriana Lott/Colton Lott of Gimli - 2024 Canadian Mixed Doubles Championship gold medallists; Laura Walker/Kirk Muyres (Edmonton/Humboldt, Sask.) – 2024 Canadian Mixed Doubles Championship silver medallists; Jocelyn Peterman/Brett Gallant (Chestermere, Alta.) - 2024 Canadian Mixed Doubles Championship bronze medallists

Martin/Steve Laycock Nancy (Wakaw, Sask./Saskatoon) - 2023-24 CMDR; Jennifer Jones/Brent Laing (Barrie, Ont.) - 2023-24 CMDR; Brittany Tran/Rylan Kleiter (Calgary/ Saskatoon) - Canadian Mixed Doubles Qualifier (Maple Ridge); Rachel Homan/Brendan Bottcher (Beaumont, Alta./Spruce Grove, Alta.) -Canadian Mixed Doubles Qualifier (Guelph); Jennifer Armstrong/Tyrel Griffith (Rothesay, N.B./Kelowna, B.C.) - Canadian Mixed Doubles Qualifier (Banff); Riley Sandham/ Brendan Craig (Guelph, Ont.) - 2025

The 16 teams will be divided into two pools of eight for a round robin from Dec. 30 - Jan. 2. The top three teams from each pool advance to a six-team playoff, following a format similar to the Scotties Tournament of

Hearts and Montana's Brier.

Playoff action begins on Jan. 2, with the top two teams from each pool crossing over to compete for a direct spot in the Page 1v2 game. The losers drop down to play the third-placed teams in each pool for the spots in the Page 3v4 game. From there, the winner of the Page 1v2 advances to the final, while the loser will play the winner of the Page 3v4 game in the semifinal. The semifinal winner moves on to the gold-medal match on Jan. 4, where the Trials champion will be crowned.

## Selkirk's boxing prodigy eyes national gold in June

Selkirk's latest boxing prodigy is showing he's ready for another shot at a national title in a few months.

Damir Kudusov, the 16-year-old Ukrainian phenom who boxes out of Maulers Boxing won yet another fight in Regina last month on his road to the 2025 Nationals which puts him up to 8-1 in his career.

Kudusov's dismantling of 16-yearold Kade Ruckaber of Jaguar Boxing Club came by a unanimous decision at the Rumble in Regina on Nov. 30 in a fight that his coach Devin Tomko said 'he was barely touched.'

"They had fought before so we had a game plan going in that we wanted to box this time and get away from going for it and trying to beat him up," said Tomko. "He's a hard fighter to box and Damir made the adjustments he needed to out box him and score the unanimous decision easily. I don't think Damir got punched in the face the whole fight.'

The win continued a streak of wins that Kudusov has strung together this season and now he has just one more fight in January before he gets a shot at a national title in June.

For Kudusov, the nationals trip is one he will have waited an entire year for after finishing third previously in his nationals debut in 2024 when he picked up his only loss to the eventual champion Alexandr Babenko.

Since then, Kudusov's been perfect in all of his fights and in his second full year of boxing he is emerging as a favourite to win the tournament.

And with the potential of a rematch with Babenko also in play, Tomko and Kudusov believe revenge will be best served with a national gold medal on

"He's going to win the gold medal because he's put the work in and it's going to mean a lot," said Tomko.

"He's dedicated his life to this sport and his only loss now is to the defending national champion. Damir's a completely different fighter from when they fought last time when it was only Damir's third boxing match. He puts the work in, I don't got to chase him around. It makes him easy to train and I actually have to keep him out of the gym sometimes because he wants to get in."

And with Kudusov's love for the sport only growing, Tomko said it's helped him become more invested as a coach.

This year Tomko started up Maulers Boxing Fight Night's in Selkirk where he's brought in other top fighters from Canada to take on Damir and the rest of his Maulers students.

He's also helped Kudusov with his

everyday training in Selkirk from strength and conditioning to even sparring with 30-year-old boxing professionals that he wouldn't even face

Tomko said that Kudusov also has gone from knowing almost no English to knowing the language better than himself in their two years together.

"We've grown with each other a lot and he's helped me grow as a coach myself," said Tomko. "Travelling with him and what not, we really see eye

to eye and have a lot of the same goals in mind so it's really been easy to work with him. He's really a blessing and I'm

very fortunate to have him. I always say a coach is only as good as his fighter and he's a natural born fighter so he does a lot of my job for me.'

Kudusov now has the next few weeks to focus solely on training before the Brampton Cup in late Janu-

He will then return to Selkirk for additional training before Nationals from May 28 to June 1 at the University of Laval.

#### **Protect yourself from Criminals**

- Keep your car doors, any outbuildings and house doors locked.

- Keep your yard and house welllit so that you and your neighbours can look out for each other
- Consider drawing your blinds when you turn your tree lights or any other inside lights on so that people can't see into your home.
- Though there haven't been as many parcels delivered this season so far. If you do happen to have something shipped in make sure it's delivered when you are home or maybe ask a neighbour who is at home during the day if you can have items delivered to their home to pick up when you get back.




The Horrors of Luke Warm Hot Chocolate


