# **Rural family medicine residency program expands to IERHA**

Selkirk will serve as one of the sites of a new family medicine residency program coming to the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA) next year.

The announcement was made at the Selkirk Regional Health Centre last Wednesday afternoon. The province says the new program aims to support physician training in rural Manitoba communities while encouraging doctor recruitment and retention efforts.

"Other regions hosting family medicine residency programs have been able to successfully recruit doctors from the trainee program to remain and practise in rural communities once their studies are complete," Health, Seniors and Active Living Minister Cameron Friesen stated in a release last week. "This formal residency program will allow medical residents to experience working in a rural community, helping them

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## 'Painkiller' doc sheds light on the dark horrors of Canada's opioid crisis

A Canadian documentary released earlier this month aims to shed some light on the country's opioid crisis.

Painkiller: Inside the Opioid Crisis, a TELUS Originals documentary directed by Matthew Embry, focuses on the heartbreaking, untold stories of those who have survived opioid addictions and the families of those who didn't. Frontline responders, border services and addictions specialists also share their perspective on the underlying problem of the ongoing opioid crisis, which is affecting communities across Canada.

Lainee Walker, a member of the Selkirk Bear Clan Patrol, has seen firsthand how opioids can destroy a community.

"Just last week, we drummed out-

side of (an apartment block in Selkirk), who were dealing with drug problems. People are scared, they don't feel safe, because there's so many drug problems in the area," Walker said. "Meth is pretty bad here in Selkirk, people take it to stay awake so they can find a warm place to sleep. But opioids are everywhere. It's kind of closeted, it's not as obvious."

The documentary dives into how the opioiod crisis began. Around the 1980s, there was a big push for doctors to treat pain, and pharmaceutical companies pushed opioids as a miracle drug, while also down playing how addictive they could be. According to some studies, Canadians can become addicted to opioids in five to seven days, depending on what they're taking. Embry says we need to rethink how we treat addiction.

"The data has shown us the war on drugs was an absolute failure. It's not treating the root causes of addiction. The bottom line is people are dying," Embry said. "These people are just like you and me, they have families. What we're trying to get across is that the average person can do something. They can start by being more compassionate towards people with addictions."

Several experts also say in the documentary that the current system of punishing addicts with jail time isn't working. Walker says addicts need help, not jail time.

"For some of them, it's a coping issue. They're using drugs to treat depression, anxiety, they're trying to



cope with a lot of stuff," Walker said. "We don't have a lot of resources here in (Selkirk), these people have nowhere to go for support. Someone needs to give them the tools to cope with mental illness, and to learn that using drugs to cope is not good."

Embry said Canada should decriminalize all drugs, so that the country can create safe-injection centres, where addicts can use drugs safely, and without fear of being arrested.

*Painkiller: Inside The Opioid Crisis* is available online and on TELUS Optik TV on Demand. For each view, TELUS will give \$5 (up to \$50,000) to organizations providing critical care through the Mobile Health Clinics, powered by TELUS Health. ### **Manitoba Hydro** 2019/20 Electric Rate Application

Manitoba Hydro has applied to the Public Utilities Board (Board) for a 3.5 per cent increase to all electricity rates on April 1, 2019.

For a residential customer not on electric heat (using an average of 1,000 kilowatthours (kWh) per month), the impact of this rate increase is an additional \$3.30 per month.

For a residential customer that has electric heat (using an average of 2,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) per month), the impact of this rate increase is an additional \$6.30 per month.

# Holiday memories made around the ice hole

Season's greetings my friends. To a young Steve Morovek the tall pines and spruce trees around the shore of Lake Eleanor were mountainous as were the huge round rock outcroppings. Now, thinking back, he remembered his father "Big Steve" standing beside him along with other boys and their fathers when they went up there to the Winnipeg Transit's lodge each year for ice fishing just before Christmas. They stood admiring the sun gleaming off the pure white snow field of the lake when they first arrived then piled into the lodge, the men making a fire in the wood stove and heaters and the boys fought over which bunk would be theirs for their stay.

The wood burning in the stove warmed the lodge as the men filled the air with the smells and cracklings of hamburgers, eggs and toast being cooked. Dishes rattled, and the tables that had stood silent for so long now held mounds of food. Laughter and loud joking mixed with the sounds of men young and old eating together seemingly brought the old lodge back to life. Afterward, at dusk, with the fire in the stove slowly going down and cloaked in the dim soft orange light of lanterns, the men sat talking in hushed tones as the boys lay half asleep on the floor. The men put the boys to bed then sat around the stove laughing as they recalled their Christmas experiences here when they were kids.

Young Steve awoke at dawn and padding across the main room to the windows facing the frozen lake saw his dad not far from shore making holes in the ice with a chisel. He watched his dad raise the dark rod high then plunge it into the ice time after time making ice hole after ice hole. The young Steve could hear others rising, making muffled sounds then hustling outdoors dressed only in underwear

and heavy boots to find the outhouse. Soon, the sun rose blazing through the large windows drawing the excited boys eagerly to the ice. They hastily made short work of toast, bacon and eggs, threw on their clothes and ran skipping and screaming carefree across the ice to the holes.

It was Steve's joy to show his boy and the others how to work the homemade pop-ups he had built. He could not contain his laughter as one of the pop-ups flag sprung up signifying a fish had been caught and the young lads dashing for it"pounding the heck out of each other" to claim the fish! This great Christmas fishing story we have just enjoyed was shared by Steve when I met him a few weeks ago. It's easy to see by his picture holding a fair sized fish that he is just as taken with fishing today as he was so many years ago at the lodge. Thank you Steve!

Last week on the Reds ice upstream of Selkirk I ran into a couple of guys

tailgate fishing. I pulled up to them and slipping out of "old red" asking them if they had caught anything. They both held up a pickerel with pleased looks on their faces. The younger chap had a short white beard, dark eyebrows and a ready smile under a bright yellow touque, while the elder had a magnificent mustache that flowed down to the sides of his chin. His eyes seemed serious which proved to be the opposite of his character. When I asked the elder Jules Du Puis of Winnipeg for a fishing story he thought for a minute then broke into a smile saying as he looked at Al Trudeau, his buddy, "yeah, remember when a boat took off by itself!"

Apparently Jules and Al along with twenty other guys went up to Grand Rapids and Cedar Lake and a little too much eating and "coffee" drinking got in the way of fishing the first day out. The next overcast windy morning they were a little slow in getting moving. They were standing around on the shore talking, pan frying a breakfast of bacon, potatoes and coffee on their portable barbeque when Jules looking out to the water saw one of their boats happily gliding past them with the wind out to open water. Everybody stared at it in silence until an American in the party blurted out, "hey that's my boat!" He and a buddy ran down shore where the boats were tied up, jumped into one and took off after the escaping craft. The group watched as they sped away after the errant boat. It took a while before they got back with both boats. They tied them up and as they joined the gang they saw all the breakfast food was eaten."Couldn't you have saved some for us?" they cried out. "Next time tie your boat up properly," Jules teased them, as he produced two full plates he had been hiding!

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# U of M students unveil plan to make Selkirk more age-friendly

A group of University of Manitoba students has developed a plan to make Selkirk a better place for seniors.

Students from the university's Planning Department held an open house, hosted by the Selkirk Age-friendly Committee, at the Gaynor Family Regional Library last Wednesday. The students have compiled an assessment of the age-friendliness of Selkirk in several categories outlined by the World Health Organization's Global Age-Friendly Cities.

An age-friendly city is a city that is adapting to meet the needs of an ageing population. Age-friendly cities provide better means for safety, accessibility, transport, and a variety of other functions that fulfill everyday life. They are also accessible by children, young adults, and older adults.

Simon Lacoste, a city planning student at the U of M, said Selkirk is very age-friendly, but there is still room for improvement.

"Selkirk, when compared to other (cities) of the same size, it's very good. You have a recreation centre for older adults, a transit system, you provide free passes for people who meet specific requirements, there's a lot of pos-

itives,"Lacoste said."It was sometimes hard to come up with suggestions. But we do have a few ideas on how we can make the city even better."

Lacoste said some of their suggestions include creating more affordable and accessible housing for seniors and adding more green space to help make walking around downtown Selkirk easier. Lacoste said seniors need affordable, single level housing, that they can live in for the rest of their lives.

This study comes on the heels of the "silver wave," a term for Selkirk's rapidly aging population.

According to the study, 23 per cent of Selkirk residents are aged 65 and up. This is part of a larger demographic change across Manitoba. The senior population is rapidly growing, and RMs across the Interlake are struggling to accommodate that. Selkirk MLA Alan Lagimodiere, says

Selkirk MLA Alan Lagimodiere, says the study is a good start.

"The biggest concern is the safety of seniors. We're trying to look at all the angles, what can we do to make (seniors) safer? How can we make them feel more active?" Lagimodiere said. "There's a lot of areas we have to be looking at, and if we wait till the issue arises, we've missed the boat. This study gives us a great place to start."

The study was conducted by using an age-friendly document provided by the World Health Organization. The students visited Selkirk between five to 10 times, walking around the city, taking photos, and rating the city based on four criteria: Housing, transportation, open spacing, and social participation.

The housing category looked at all the different housing options, whether they were affordable and accessible. Transportation rated the public transit options. Open spaces reviewed how open and accessible it is to walk around and social participation looked at how much seniors are involved with the community, and whether or not seniors get out and attend events.

# Get home safe this holiday with Operation Red Nose

Operation Red Nose Selkirk volunteers are doing their part to keep those participating in a little extra cheer off the roads this holiday season.

The aim of the service, which has entered its 13th year, is to reduce the number of impaired drivers on the road, an initiative that seems to be catching on with younger drivers.

Leslie Hanson, one of the co-ordinators for Selkirk and area's Operation Red Nose chapter, says they are noticing more young adults calling for safe rides home.

"There's been a change in the age of people who use the service. (Thirteen years ago), it was mostly used by the moms, dads, uncles of the volunteers. Now, a lot of younger people use it," Hanson said, while manning the phone lines last Friday night. "I have four kids, in that 19 to 27 range. Their friends ask them 'has red nose started?' They'll even tweet it out, it's great." seeing an increase in calls this holiday season. On Saturday, Dec. 8, Operation Red Nose drove around 60 people home. Hansen said they couldn't even keep up with all the requests, as almost all of their teams were consistently busy that evening.

Courtney Kowalchuk of Selkirk decided to use the service to get home from the Selkirk Legion last Friday. She said it's important not to drink and drive.

"I had a friend who got pulled over for a DUI. They made a really bad choice, and I won't make that same mistake,"Kowalchuk said."It's a smart thing to do. You get to have a good time, but also get home safely."

The Manitoba government unveiled it's plan to implement tougher penalties for impaired driving at the end of November. Under the proposed new law, drivers under the influence of alcohol who register a 'warn' on an approved screening device would face a new monetary penalty of at least \$200 for a first offence, escalating to at least

\$400 for a third subsequent or offence. They would also face a vehicle impoundment of between three days for a first offence and 30 days for a third or subsequent offence. Those drivers caught a third subsequent or time would also be required to drive with an ignition interlock for a year. These new sanctions

would be on top of existing licence suspensions and other sanctions for 'warn' range drivers.

Adding up all the administrative sanctions and penalties, the minimum cost for a 'warn' range driver would be \$2,600 for a first offence to about \$3,200 for a third or subsequent offence. The minimum cost for a 'fail'

would be over \$3,300. All monetary penalties would be established by regulation.

Under the new approach, testing could take as little as six minutes, which is significantly less than the time required to administer a breathalyzer and process a drunk driver criminally, which is often up to four hours. As a result, police officers would get back on the road sooner, allowing them to catch more drunk drivers.

Once proclaimed, the legislation would be accompanied by a province wide public education campaign by Manitoba Public Insurance, further emphasizing the new costs and consequences of driving drunk.

According to the province, in 2017, 73 people were killed and 442 were seriously injured in traffic collisions in Manitoba. Drunk driving accounted for 32 per cent of those killed and six per cent of those injured. Already this year, 28 people have lost their lives because of a drunk driver.

Dr. Ian Alexander, who grew up in Clandeboye and now practices in Selkirk, says when he was going to medical school, a residency program like this one didn't exist in the Interlake so he had to train in Dauphin. He added family medicine is based on relationships and this program will allow medical students to be apart of the community they are training in.

"You have a built-in relationship with the community and it makes the hard work worthwhile to spend your efforts on people that you know," Alexander said following the announcement last Wednesday. "You don't get that if you go to a new town so it's a great opportunity."

Alexander, who has also lent a hand in bringing the program to the Interlake region, said lots of communities have shown interest in hosting the



program including Lac du Bonnet, Stonewall as well as Gimli.

"That has all been vital to making this happen is recognizing that it isn't just Selkirk, it's all of these communities," he said. "We know that this will help our recruitment and retention."

Residency is the last stage in training for doctors following graduation from medical school. Similar residency programs already exist in Prairie Mountain Health and Southern Health-Santé Sud. Approximately three-quarters of all graduates from those rural residency programs stay in Manitoba to practice. More than half of all graduates are still practicing in rural Manitoba 10 years later, said Dr. José François, head of the Department of Family Medicine at Max Rady College of Medicine and medical director of the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority's family medicine program.

"Having a site for the family medicine residency program located in Selkirk provides an additional opportunity for learners to experience the unique needs of a rural setting while better serving the residents of the Interlake," François stated in a release last week.

The selection of medical residents for these training opportunities will be made through the Canadian Resident Matching Service (CaRMS) for positions beginning in July 2019.

Residents selected for the IERHA program will work with community residents to address a wide range of health-care needs from prevention to chronic disease management, and across the full continuum of care from community health to hospital-based care to palliative care.

IERHA CEO Ron Van Denakker said they have been working on bringing this program to the Interlake for nearly four years.

"Training physicians locally leads to better recruitment and retention of these positions within the region," said Van Denakker, adding 17 towns and rural municipalities have shown their support for the program so far."I want to thank the broader physician community in our region that has taken a strong leadership role in making this program a reality."

The program will also emphasize understanding the health-care needs of Indigenous populations in the region and the social determinants that influence health. Other training will include work on pre- and post-natal care, nutrition and sports medicine.

The federal government has unveiled a new initiative aimed at supporting the mental and physical health of farmers in rural communities.

Farm Credit Canada (FCC) is contributing \$50,000 toward the National 4-H Healthy Living Initiative, which will be available to more than 7,700 volunteer leaders and 25,000 4-H members across Canada.

FCC is also partnering with mental health experts to create a resource for managing stress and anxiety on the farm called Rooted in Strength, according to Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada.

Poissant, parliamentary secretary to the minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food. "By increasing awareness, reducing risk factors, improving access to quality mental health services and eliminating the stigma often associated with mental illness, we can support mental well-being."

Canadian farmers and food processors across the country work hard every day to put safe, high-quality food on our tables, while driving our economy and creating good, middle-class jobs. Although farming can provide an amazing lifestyle with great rewards, it can also be hard on mental health. Farmers and their families often face high levels of stress because of forces that are beyond their control, such as weather, disease, commodity prices, and trade.

According to a 2016 study from the University of Guelph, 45 per cent of farmers reported high levels of stress while 40 per cent said they would feel uneasy asking for professional help.

"I am proud of the leadership demonstrated by Farm Credit Canada, 4-H Canada, and Farm Management Canada to support Canadian agriculture's greatest asset - the hard-working people who help shape this growing and dynamic industry," said Lawrence MacAulay, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-food.

The minister also noted that Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada is working with Farm Management Canada to support a project that will explore the link between mental health and the impact on farm business management decisions.

Through Budget 2017 the government of Canada confirmed \$5 billion over 10 years directly to provinces and territories to improve mental health and addiction services for all Canadians-including farmers.



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# **MOU** brings municipalities one step closer to faster internet service

Mayors and reeves moved another step closer to bringing high-speed and fibre optic internet service to their communities last week.

A memorandum of understanding was signed last Wednesday at the Manitoba legislature by JohnQ Public Inc., the Winnipeg Metropolitan Region's (WMR) economic development corporation, and two local and national Internet service providers – WireIE and RFNOW Inc. JohnQ says the regional fibre optic project – Connecting to Opportunity – is a prime example of how JohnQ works and what the WMR can accomplish through a collaborative business model.

According to a JohnQ spokesperson, internet speeds in the region do not meet the minimum CRTC requirements, and as a result, businesses have fallen behind the curve.

Colleen Sklar, executive director of the WMR, an organization recently tasked by the province to deliver economic development funding and programming throughout the region, says businesses need fast and reliable internet to stay competitive.

"The service speeds are very slow. Sometimes you'd get faster (download) speeds, but most businesses work on cloud architecture. They need good (upload) speeds," Sklar said. "This isn't about Netflix, this is about businesses being competitive with other parts of the country. Let's give business all the tools that they would enjoy in any oth-

### er metropolitan region."

"Cloud architecture" refers to programs such as Microsoft Whiteboard and Slack, digital workplaces that make it easy to share projects and ideas from almost anywhere in the world. Sklar said internet service in the Interlake does not meet the CRTC guidelines: Up until six months ago, 25 mbps (megabits per second) download and five mbps upload was considered "basic," but recently they've been changed to 50 down and 10 up, as society has increasingly relied on the internet to function.

Sklar added that the service will not be "utility-funded," meaning residents won't be taxed for whatever construction will be required for the service. Since the project is still in its early stages, it's unclear what financial model they will use, but Sklar said they will make sure there is competition between the different ISPs, which will hopefully lead to fair prices for residents.

For some communities, this will completely revamp their internet services.



St. Clements Mayor Debbie Fiebelkorn says this is a great win for the region.

"We have a lot of areas (in St. Clements) where we don't have any internet service, or it's very poor. In the areas we do have service, it's sometimes slow and intermittent," Fieblekorn said. "After the announcement was made, I did have a number of residents call and email me saying 'It's about time.' We really need it in our community.'"

Rob Barlow, CEO of WireIE, stated the two ISPs will use multiple technologies to bring high speed internet service to the region. The feasibility study originally mentioned "fiber-optic internet," which may be used in conjunction with other technologies, such as using microwave-based transmitters, or transmitters that output signals at a frequency that can pass through things like rivers and lakes.

Through JohnQ, the development of high-speed Internet infrastructure is being explored for 43 under-serviced communities in the 13 member municipalities in the METRO region surrounding Winnipeg. Many are shovel ready, which means construction could commence as early as mid-May 2019, according to JohnQ.

The next steps in the process including finalizing the business model, completing the design of the network, negotiating with other stakeholders, developing and recommending the final broadband service offerings for end user as well as developing and recommending an open access model for third party ISPs to promote competition.

## Circles for Reconciliation receives \$25K in funding from province

The Manitoba government is strengthening its support for reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people by providing \$25,000 in funding for Circles for Reconciliation.

"Our government is pleased to provide \$25,000 to Circles for Reconciliation, furthering the opportunity to learn about the shared history of Canadian Indigenous nations and peoples," Indigenous and Northern Relations Minister Eileen Clarke stated in a release last week.

Established in 2016, Circles for Reconciliation aims to create trusting, meaningful relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples as part of the 94 Calls to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

A small circle of 10 participants, five Indigenous and five non-Indigenous, is created and led by two trained facilitators, one of whom is Indigenous. Groups meet weekly or biweekly for 10 gatherings and volunteer facilitators lead participants through discussions on various themes such as the meaning of land for Indigenous people, residential schools, intergenerational trauma, the pass system and the '60s Scoop. There is no cost to participate, only a commitment to treat everyone with respect.

"The desire to foster respectful relationships is the heart and soul of what we set out to do in our project, Circles for Reconciliation," said Raymond Currie, project co-ordinator. "In the circle, people hear stories about the history of relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people over the last 150 years and everyone has a chance to listen, learn and share with one another."

To date, 430 circle meetings have been hosted involving 1,100 people and more than 4,800 hours of discussion on reconciliation. Circles have been completed with faith groups, corporations, educational institutions, social services agencies, service clubs and new Canadian agencies.

The task force will determine practical shortand long-term recommendations to combat the use and distribution of illicit drugs, such as



methamphetamine, opioids, cocaine and hallucinogens. It will include an oversight committee comprised of members from all three levels of government and be chaired by Karen Herd, deputy minister of Manitoba Health, Seniors

and Active Living and Michael Jack, the City of Winnipeg's chief corporate services officer.

The co-chairs, in consultation with the oversight committee, will determine members of a working group that will:

• identify areas to improve existing programming relating to the prevention, treatment and deterrence of illicit drug use;

• identify areas to improve enforcement, such as looking at practices employed in other jurisdictions, and explore Criminal Code changes that could further deter and combat the illicit drug trade;

• seek advice from experts including health professionals, social service providers, law enforcement officials, first responders and the legal and academic community; and

• provide recommendations on how government can better communicate with the community, the business sector and vulnerable populations on the dangers of illicit drug use.

The task force is expected to produce and publicly release a report in June 2019.

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### Black ice, blizzards and high snowbanks among list of winter driving concerns: CAA

In anticipation of snowy weather, CAA Manitoba surveyed its members about their winter driving worries. The results indicate that while hardy Manitobans don't let winter reduce the frequency of their travel, they do worry about hazardous driving conditions courtesy of Mother Nature and public works. In fact, black ice, blizzards, high snowbanks left by snowplows, ruts on the streets, blowing snow and snow on the road that's more than a few centimeters deep were identified as the top concerns by the vast majority of respondents.

"No matter where our members live in Manitoba, they all agree – winter driving can be challenging when the elements and street conditions combine. Specifically, our Winnipeg members noted snow routes and residential parking bans are additional considerations, while our Brandon and rural members cited slush and highway road closures as other concerns," says Erika Miller, communications consultant for CAA Manitoba. "Beyond the elements and maintenance, our members across Manitoba said distracted drivers, tailgaters, and people who drive too fast for conditions, whether they have winter tires or not, are the three most annoying winter driving behaviours which, frankly, are also unsafe."

Easy driving technique tips suitable for all winter conditions:

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1. Increase your following distance to avoid collisions: With or without winter tires, slippery streets demand an increased following distance for safe stopping. Remember that the speed limit is designed for ideal conditions - driving to current conditions may mean reducing your speed.

2. Prevent skidding by practicing good driving habits: Avoid applying the brakes so hard your wheel(s) lock (if your car is not equipped with antilock brakes), don't accelerate so fast that your wheels spin, and don't accelerate or brake while turning or taking a curve in the road.

3. See and be seen for safety: Remove ice and snow from the entire vehicle windows, lights, roof, hood and trunk to ensure proper visibility. Ice or dirt on headlights reduces their effectiveness by as much as 90 per cent. Leftover snow can harden and slide off the car as a sheet when moving, causing a dangerous situation for you and other drivers.

When weather changes, driving conditions can change quickly, too. Black ice can develop on bridges and overpasses when winds pick up. Motorists should never use cruise control when driving on a wet, icy or sandy surface.

CAA Manitoba surveyed a random, representative sample of 2,066 CAA Manitoba members residing in Manitoba between September 18 and October 2, 2018 in a quantitative online survey.

### Manitobans reminded to have a fire safe holiday season

The focus of this year's winter holiday fire safety campaign is to ensure everyone takes the time to address the hazards that cause fires during the holidays.

"Festive celebrations, flickering lights and winter greens are hallmarks of the holiday season, but they also present fire risks that can quickly turn this joyful time of year into a devastating one," said Growth, Enterprise and Trade Minister Blaine Pedersen, minister responsible for the Office of the Fire Commissioner. "The Office of the Fire Commissioner and the Manitoba Fire Service work to educate the public about potential fire risks during the holidays - let's 'Put a Freeze on Winter Holiday Fires' to help everyone safely enjoy the season."

This year's theme, Put a Freeze on Winter Holiday Fires, encourages people to reduce the risk from heating, holiday decorations, and candles, which all contribute to an increased risk of fire during the winter months. The Office of the Fire Commissioner is also reminding families and individuals to help reduce risk from cooking and other hazards, including carbon monoxide and electrical fires.

"It only takes a few minutes to be fire safe," said Brad Yochim, president, Manitoba Association of Fire Chiefs. "For example, when you walk through your home, make sure the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms work, keep lit candles away from decorations and make sure they are blown out before going to bed."

This season, pay attention to these safety tips that will help keep everyone safe during the holidays:

• be careful with holiday decorations and choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant;

• keep children and pets away from lit candles:

• keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn;

• blow out candles before going to bed:

• be aware that some electrical lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both;

• replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections.;

• read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect;

• test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms;

• stay in the kitchen when cooking on a stovetop;

• ask smokers to smoke outside and remind them to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them;

• provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers and wet cigarette butts with water before discarding; and

• tell guests about the home fire escape plan.

The Manitoba RCMP officially launched its 2018 Holiday Checkstop program on Dec. 1 and it will run until Jan. 1, 2019.

The focus of checkstops is the detection of high-risk drivers, including those who are impaired, not wearing a seatbelt, speeding, or driving while distracted.

Week one of the RCMP Holiday Checkstop Program, from Dec. 1-9, has resulted in approximately 2,500 vehicles checked across Manitoba during 59 checkstops.

Results from both checkstops and regular patrol during the week include:

• 28 people charged with a Criminal Code Impaired Driving offence (23 alcohol, 2 drug, 3 refusals)

The highest blood/alcohol reading reported was .27 (3.5 times more than the legal limit)

• Eight alcohol or drug-related tiered administrative roadside suspensions

 Nine people were charged with improper storage of alcohol or cannabis in a vehicle
 Ten people were ticketed for using a hand-held electronic device while

driving • Four people were ticketed for not wearing a seat-

"Safe and responsible driving is a choice every Manitoban needs to make this holiday season. Be assured that our officers will be out in full force over the holidays to get impaired drivers off the road," said Insp. Chris Moore, Officer in Charge of Traffic Services. "Consider your safety and the safety of everyone else on the road before you get behind the wheel, and make the smart choice. Plan ahead for a safe ride home to avoid serious, and possibly fatal, consequences."

There was a traffic-related fatality in Fisher Branch and another in Swan River during the past week. The causes in both collisions are still under investigation.

To date this year, 80 people have died, and 189 people have been seriously injured in motor vehicle collisions in Manitoba RCMP jurisdiction. Impaired driving is a factor in approximately 30 per cent of these collisions.

### **Province reminds Manitobans of their** rights when buying or using gift cards

Many shoppers will find gift cards a convenient shopping choice this holiday season. Whether giving or receiving a gift card, the Manitoba Consumer Protection Office is reminding everyone that The Consumer Protection Act ensures they get the most out of these products.

In Manitoba, purchasers cannot be charged a fee when buying a gift card unless it is to personalize or replace a lost card. This means that an activation fee cannot be charged to use the card or an inactivity fee for choosing not to use the card for some time.

Most gift cards issued in Manitoba can never expire, but there are a few exceptions. Gift cards may have an expiry date if they are issued for a specific good or service, like a manicure or a massage. They may also expire if they are given out for free, such as for a promotion or in a raffle prize.

Businesses that issue gift cards must, by law, disclose all conditions, limita-

tions and restrictions related to the card, as well as how to check the card balance. Keeping a copy of the receipt in case there are any problems with the card, such as failure to activate, is a good practice.

When a gift card is received, treat it like cash. Keep it in a safe place, but somewhere it won't be forgotten about because it can be difficult to replace a lost or stolen card. Consider registering the card on the merchant's website or loading it onto their app, if the option is available.

Different rules may apply to prepaid cards from banks and credit card networks, such as Visa and MasterCard, as they are regulated by the federal government. Consumers should read all terms and conditions, and take note of what fees they may be charged before choosing to purchase those types of prepaid cards.

The Consumer Protection Office investigates complaints about gift cards. Businesses that fail to comply with the rules related to gift cards may be subject to administrative penalties that range for \$1,000 to \$20,000.
